Court of Appeals Upholds Alfrey's Powers as Clerk

Clerk Given Right To Act Without Interference
Fears that Rowan County Democratic voters would be unable to cast their ballots Saturday were dispelled Thursday when the Court of Appeals refused Judge D. B. Caudill's request to set aside a writ of prohibition, preventing him from ordering County Clerk Alfrey to list Leslie Brown's name on the ballot.

After reversals for both sides, the ballots were printed early Thursday and delivered in the afternoon to the County Clerk, C. V. Alfrey, without the name of Brown as a candidate.

3 Cars Damaged In Accident Thursday

Mrs. Margaret E. Taylor, 65, Louisville, and four sisters riding in a 1930 Ford V-8 with her were injured in a crash with a machine owned by James Crisp, 42, Morehead.

The accident occurred at three o'clock Thursday afternoon on the detour around the bridge six miles east of Morehead.

Mrs. Taylor is said to have lost control of her machine as she climbed the rise on to Route 68 and plunged directly into the Crisp car, a 1939 model Chevrolet. Crisp was parked at the time witnesses say.

An Ideal Laundry truck operated by Eddy VanHoose, Ashland, parked in back of the Chevrolet, was damaged slightly by the Crisp machine.

300 ROWAN COUNTY FAMILIES RECEIVE 350 SEED PACKETS

Will Provide Fall And Winter Supplies
The Disaster Relief unit of the Red Cross with headquarters at Lexington announced this week that it had practically completed the delivery of 6,000 packages of garden seed to more than 4,500 flood affected families in 17 Eastern Kentucky counties. About 350 Rowan County families are estimated as numbering 22,100 people.

Mrs. L. W. Lashley is chairman of the society. The church is located at 41st and Herdman streets in west-end Louisville.

Merchants Award To Be Given August 12
The Merchants' Club will hold its last Award Day of the year, suspended since the flood, on Saturday, August 12, in front of the Eagle's Nest at 3 o'clock.

Fifty dollars as usual will be given away. The first prize is \$15 in cash. The club members decided at a recent meeting to hold one more Award Day so that holders of unused tickets may have an opportunity to participate for prizes.

RED CROSS BEGINS BUILDING PROGRAM

Case Work For 285 Families Completed
The building program of the American National Red Cross rebuilding and repairing flood-wrecked homes is progressing rapidly. Miss Helen J. Moss, area director, said yesterday. D. A. Handy, national building adviser, is supervising the work.

Needs of 285 families have been taken care of. Case work is going forward quickly since workers from the surrounding counties have completed their work and put to work here. Total number of families registered was 545.

Miss Moss stated that the Red Cross expects to finish the work in the county by August 15. She hoped that all persons in need have registered but if they have not done so, to immediately report to the city hall.

A red biplane owned by Paul Dameron, 29, of Detroit, turned turtle in a muddy field near Farmers-Thursday afternoon when Dameron attempted to take off with a load of John Y. Brown campaign literature.

Approval Received On Disaster Loans

Payment will be made this week on several loans made by the Disaster Loan Corporation to individuals damaged by the flood. Representatives of the D. L. C. are receiving applications daily at the Morehead Public School, Room No. 1. The office will not remain open permanently for applications. W. E. Taylor, agent, said yesterday, and advised all persons who intend to apply for a loan to do so immediately.

University Professor Speaks At Convocation

Jose Adams, professor of education at the University of Kentucky, spoke at convocation at the College Thursday morning. Adams is the author of the "Child-Centered Speller" which is used in all Kentucky grade schools.

Man Dies Near Farmers Saturday Night

Kenneth E. Evans, 64, died Saturday night at the home of Miss Amy Loux, four miles above Farmers on the Licking river. The body was shipped to Doydstown, Pa., Wednesday for burial. No information could be obtained on the survivors of Mr. Evans. He had lived in the county the last eight years.

Average Vote In County Is Expected

Climaxed a strenuous campaign on the part of many candidates, Saturday more than 3,600 Rowan County voters are expected to go to the polls to vote for their respective candidates.

The polls open at six o'clock in the morning and close at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The Democrats are expected to poll about 2,300 votes and the Republicans 1,300.

Speakers for the candidates, as well as the candidates themselves, from the highest as well as the lowest offices urged Rowan County voters at various times this week at the court house to place an X after the right name. Three candidates for the nomination of governor and one representative spoke here in the last week. They were John S. Cooper, Republican; King Swopes, Republican; John Y. Brown, Democrat, and O. M. Rogers, Democrat, for Keen Johnson.

40,000 MAJORITY IS DOPED FOR KEEN JOHNSON SATURDAY

Campaign Manager Says Eighth District Is For His Candidate
Keen Johnson will win the Democratic nomination for Governor in the party primary Saturday by a margin of upward of 40,000 votes, J. Lyter Donaldson, State campaign chairman for the Richmond publisher, predicted yesterday.

Donaldson claimed Johnson would carry seven of the nine congressional districts, conceding the remaining two to his opponent, John Brown Brown by small majorities. Johnson's campaign leader estimated that approximately 400,000 votes would be cast in the party contest Saturday. He predicted Johnson would carry the eighth district by 4,500 votes.

"Keen Johnson's victory Saturday is a certain trend and shift of voters to his standard has been noticeable to all political observers for more than three weeks. This trend has not been confined to any one section of the State but has been general, and is expected to be the primary of Saturday to result in a landslide."

"In addition to this trend, the dignified campaign which has been waged by Keen Johnson has won for him innumerable friends and made the most favorable impression on the voters of the State."

J. J. Thomas Making Active Race For Office

J. J. Thomas, of Owingsville, candidate for the Democratic nomination for state senator, is making an active campaign for the office in Rowan county.

AN OPEN LETTER

TO EVERY VETERAN OF THE WORLD WAR:

I am a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Commonwealth's Attorney in this District.

I served as a volunteer in the United State Army in the World War.

I am a member of the Montgomery Post, American Legion.

I seek your support upon exactly the same grounds as I do that of the other voters of this district—my fitness, such as you may deem it to be, for the office and my solemn promise to administer it, if elected, with absolute impartiality and to the best of my ability. I lay no claim to the undivided support of all veterans because of my undistinguished record as a soldier.

I do feel, however, that you are entitled to know how one candidate for this office has attempted unfairly to use his own service in the army and his membership in the Legion to his own advantage at the expense of another of your comrades-in-arms.
