MOREHEAD, Ky.---Seventeen Morehead State University faculty members, including a two-person research team, will share nearly \$51,600 in institutional research and creative production grants.

The awards which range from slightly under \$1,000 to \$4,863 were granted on the basis of proposals submitted during the fall semester, according to Dr. John C. Philley, MSU executive vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculty.

Morehead State has been supporting faculty research efforts since 1968-69, soliciting proposals and awarding grants during the academic year and in the summer.

"Our institutional awards are designed to recognize and stimulate research and creativity among MSU's faculty, said Dr. Philley. "When selecting proposals for funding, the committee looks not only at how the project will broaden the applicant's knowledge, but also at what the study will add to the current pool of knowledge.

"Encouragement of professional growth through research and creative production is important to an academic community as it both enriches our faculty members and the students whom they teach," the executive vice president added.

The University's Research and Creative Production Committee is responsible for reviewing the proposals and making recommendations to the executive vice president for academic affairs. Chair of the committee is Carole Morella, director of MSU's Office of Research, Grants and Contracts.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Ronald F. Tucker, professor of industrial education at Morehead State University, has been appointed by Gov. Brereton Jones to a three-year term on the Kentucky Job Training Coordinating Council.

An MSU faculty member for 25 years, Dr. Tucker earned his doctorate from Oklahoma State University.

A former Education Professional Development Act (EPDA) fellow, Dr. Tucker was the only Fellow in the United States to serve an internship on the Education and Labor Committee of the U.S. House of Representatives. The appointment was under the chairmanship of the late U.S. Rep. Carl D. Perkins of Hindman.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.—Dr. Edward B. Reeves and Dr. Robert A. Bylund, Morehead State University professors of sociology, have been honored by the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion (SSSR) as co-recipients of the 1993 Distinguished Article Award.

The award-winning article by Drs. Reeves and Bylund, "Anonymity and the Rise of Universal Occasions for Religious Ritual: An Extension of the Durkheimian Theory," was published in the June 1992 issue of the Journal for the Scientific Study of Religion.

The article is considered noteworthy for its use of sophisticated statistical procedures and innovative application of sociological theories.

Dr. Reeves received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Kentucky and joined the MSU faculty in 1984. Dr. Bylund received his doctorate from Pennsylvania State University in 1979 and joined the MSU faculty that same year.

The pair of sociologists are currently collaborating on an investigation of the evolution of political institutions.

The SSSR is an international body of scholars which includes sociologists, psychologists, historians, anthropologists and theologians. The society serves as a stimulus and network for communication related to research on religious institutions and religious experiences.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has received a \$20,000 grant from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation enabling the University to expand access of its computerized degree audit program to six two-year colleges in Eastern Kentucky.

Established in 1950, the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation makes national grants in journalism, education and the field of arts and culture.

The Foundation also supports organizations in communities where the Knight brothers were involved in publishing newspapers but is wholly separate from and independent of those newspapers. (The Lexington Herald-Leader is a Knight-Ridder newspaper.)

Collaborating with MSU as participants in the program are Ashland, Hazard, Maysville, Prestonsburg and Southeast community colleges along with Lees College.

The advising-degree audit system allows students to see immediately how their work at the two-year schools matches requirements for MSU's baccalaureate programs as well as what courses are needed to complete their degree work.

"The Knight Foundation is to be commended for helping us link our campus to these schools so that we can offer Eastern Kentucky students this service," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin.

"This project is a unique partnership of higher education institutions and shows the commitment of all of us to helping our students," Dr. Eaglin said.

MSU has been using the "Computer Assisted Advising-Degree Audit System" since 1991. The electronic program was developed totally in-house by the Offices of the Registrar and Information Technology.

Already on-line at each school, including both the Whitesburg and Cumberland campuses of Southeast, the program will ease the transfer process for students moving from these two-year institutions to MSU, according to Dr. Marc D. Glasser, MSU dean of Graduate and Extended Campus Programs.

"Students can obtain an accurate picture of what courses they need to complete any specific four-year degree at MSU and will receive a printout of that information on the spot," Dr. Glasser said.

"This collaborative effort also speaks directly to a key element of MSU's Mission Statement which calls for facilitating the transfer process," Dr. Glasser added.

"The participating schools themselves have recognized the importance of the computerized checksheet by making a financial commitment to it as well," the dean said. "It's an extraordinary gesture on their part and they've taken an active role in making all this possible," Dr. Glasser added.

The schools in the University of Kentucky Community College System as well as Lees College are providing financial assistance in the amount of \$500 each for a total of \$3,000 to assist with equipment and installation costs.

"With this computer network in place, it will be possible for us to bring other academic information programs on-line in the future," Dr. Glasser said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—As a result of her own experiences with racial and sexual discrimination as a former shipyard welder, Ernestine Winfield says she knows what it's like trying to break the barriers of social myths.

Now as coordinator for Morehead State University's Minority Teacher Education Program (MTEP), Winfield's goal is to help minority students break similar social barriers so they can become teachers in the state's public school system.

"We have a dire shortage of minority teachers in Kentucky," Winfield said. "It's to the critical point now, so much so that lawmakers during the current legislative session are looking for ways to increase funding and programs to get more blacks in education."

Kentucky's State Education Department is currently placing more emphasis on recruiting minority college students into teacher education programs, according to Winfield. The purpose of MTEP is to encourage more minority students to major in education.

"It is important to have minority teachers in the public education system, because there are many young minority students in the state who don't have role models or mentors with the same cultural background," Winfield said. "Without role models, those students may not be able to visualize higher goals for themselves."

The MTEP office at MSU was created in 1988 to aid with scholarships, tutoring and advising. In many previous cases, Winfield said, minority students who wanted to be in the teacher education program weren't able to because they lacked money, information and direction. With the help of the MTEP office, those students now are realizing their opportunities in teaching careers.

Winfield's positive attitude and practical approach to problems gives her just the right chemistry to lead minority students into the education field. She uses her labor experience and teaching expertise to guide students toward their goals.

Winfield's wide smile conveys a savvy, understanding nature as she talks about her labor experience and how it led her to MSU to pursue a vocational teaching degree.

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"I worked as a welder at a shipyard in the Louisville area until I made my decision to get a college degree and teach vocational welding," she said. "Since I was the only female welder there, it was difficult to form friendships with my male co-workers.

"But I worked harder than anyone else--I had to. In fact, I concentrated on work so much that I forgot about wanting my co-workers to like me," she said frankly. "As it turned out, my hard work was the only thing that saved me, because when I got ready to leave the job, they told me I had done such good work that I made them look bad!"

Winfield's smile returned as she described turning her life around and pursuing her lifelong love--teaching.

She enrolled at MSU at the age of 35, obtained her associate, bachelor and master degrees in welding, industrial education and vocational education. She taught in public schools in Louisville after graduation and, not long afterward, was hired as a welding instructor at MSU in 1991. In 1992, she was named coordinator of the MTEP program.

Winfield says she knows what it's like to be discouraged by perceived social obstacles. The lack of minority teachers in public education is one of those obstacles that she hopes her students can overcome. Her motivational message to them is her own success story, however.

"I hope my students can look at themselves as trailblazers, not minorities," she said. "I reached my goal after many hardships, too, and I want to convey that same message to my students.

"Vocational education became my love, my passion and my life," she emphasized. "My family always put great emphasis on education. My mother and father were born in the hills of Alabama and had little education of their own, but they always wanted it for their children."

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University's fine arts and intercollegiate athletic programs were in the spotlight at a recent meeting of the Board of Regents.

At a special Fine Arts Celebration showcasing the talents of MSU students and faculty, the University paid tribute to Lexington philanthropist Lucille Caudill Little.

Mrs. Little, a member of a distinguished Rowan County family, has contributed \$1 million to support MSU's fine arts programs. Her gift, part of a \$3 million goal to endow the College of Humanities, is the largest single donation from an individual in the University's 107 year history.

Meeting on March 7, the board approved renaming the college as the Caudill College of Humanities in honor of Mrs. Little's parents, the late Daniel Boone and Rosetta Proctor Caudill and their descendants.

After considerable discussion, the regents unanimously voted to authorize MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin to begin a process which could result in the University going to non-scholarship football. Dr. Eaglin requested board approval to negotiate an agreement with the Ohio Valley Conference which would allow members to move to non-scholarship football while competing as full OVC members in all other sports.

Citing a number of fiscal concerns such as decreasing general fund support, Title 9 issues of gender equity and escalating costs, Dr. Eaglin told the board that he believed that there was no other alternative but to follow this course.

"We just don't have enough dollars to do what we want to do," he said, noting that the school's academic programs also were undergoing review.

"It is just a question of priorities," said Dr. Bruce Mattingly, faculty regent.

Addressing concerns that non-scholarship football would impact MSU's minority enrollment, Dr. Eaglin said that minority access to higher education was no longer an issue. The University already has begun initiatives that place a greater emphasis on recruitment and retention of minority students, he added.

"If we have to depend upon athletics to do what is needed to increase our minority enrollment, we are heading in the wrong direction," said Regent Buckner Hinkle.

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In other actions, the board elected officers, approved revisions to several personnel policies, granted tenure to 13 faculty members, ratified an amendment to the Faculty Senate Constitution, endorsed a revised Mission Statement, ratified a series of personnel actions, extended the banking services contract with Citizens Bank and the contract with Kelley, Galloway and Company for the 1993-94 fiscal year audit, and authorized a lease purchase agreement for microcomputers.

The regents elected William R. Seaton as chair; Sonny Jones as vice chair; Carol Johnson as secretary and Porter Dailey as treasurer. Seaton has served as chair since 1989.

The board approved the deletion of MSU's associate degree programs in corrections, journalism, broadcast operations, broadcasting, computer information systems and office systems.

The regents next meeting is scheduled for May 20.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Helping students from other countries adjust to life in Kentucky is the role of Clement Liew, the international student counselor/adviser at Morehead State University.

Liew counsels and recruits students while ensuring that immigration regulation laws are met for these students traveling from overseas. He also helps them learn how to adjust to life in eastern America.

One hundred and two international students are attending MSU this spring, according to Liew. "The numbers go up every semester as students are drawn to Morehead State because of its simplicity and beauty. The city's clean streets and fresh air attracts them," he said. "Some international students are not fortunate enough to grow up in areas as pollution-free as MSU," added Liew, who is a former international student himself.

Originally from Kota Kinabalu, Sabah, Malaysia, Liew attended Southern Illinois University for one semester. After hearing about MSU from a friend, he visited the campus and transferred almost immediately. Since then, he has received a bachelor's degree in government and a master's degree in adult and higher education with an emphasis in counseling from MSU.

"There is a lot to be learned from living and taking classes with students from foreign lands," commented Liew. "We can exchange thoughts on cultures and ideas and teach each other things you can't learn in a classroom." In recalling his homeland, Liew noted that Malaysia's population of nearly 17 million has an astronomical amount of multicultural diversity for such a small country.

In Malaysia, it is essential to speak several languages to communicate, according to Liew. Among the languages spoken are Chinese, Malaysian and Indonesian, just to name a few. In addition to languages, various religions are represented in this country: Christianity, Moslem and Buddhism.

In recruiting students for the University, Liew said MSU advertises in the "U.S. University Guidebook," which is used by students who are looking for an American university that meets their needs, and also participates in ELS College Fairs. He sends brochures to foreign high schools but relies mostly on friends telling others about the great experience they are having at MSU.

When asked, "Do you like MSU?" Liew responded, "Morehead is a good place, that's why I came here and that's why I've stayed."

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University has revised its summer school schedule and will open its first summer session a week later than previously announced, according to Dr. John C. Philley, MSU executive vice president for academic affairs.

The action was taken to enable the region's public school teachers whose school year has been extended as a result of the severe winter to pursue their education, he said.

Under the new calendar, registration for Summer I will be conducted Monday, June 13, with classes beginning on Tuesday, June 14, and continue through Friday, July 8.

Registration for Summer II will be Monday, July 11, with classes starting the next day and continuing through Friday, Aug. 5.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Four seniors in the teacher education program at Morehead State University have begun student teaching this spring semester with an added challenge: traveling to England for their first experience as instructors.

Kelly Hairston of Langley, Dana Fleming of Jackhorn, Christene Kirkwood of Lee City and Shari Houser of Williamsburg have departed for Sunderland, England, to teach in primary schools, according to Shirley Blair, MSU director of student teaching.

"We want our students to see how the education process differs. These student teachers will have an opportunity to see the British infant schools and how they work," Blair said.

The 12-week practicum will help fulfill requirements necessary for the students to obtain their Kentucky teaching certificates, according to Blair.

The exchange program is a significant experience for the prospective teachers because the British infant and primary schools served as a model for Kentucky's Education Reform Act, prior to its adoption in 1990.

For the fourth straight year, MSU students are participating in an educational consortium with the University of Sunderland. The consortium was formed to give students exposure to the British school system's child-centered education philosophy which coincides with the goals of the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA), Blair said.

Participating students exchange tuition costs and pay only for travel and food. The program offers a cultural enrichment that is affordable, she emphasized.

"The students are excited about the unique teaching experience and agree that it will enhance their ability to communicate and understand cultural differences," Blair said.

Six students from Sunderland have traveled to Morehead State to experience student teaching in the primary system here. Blair said those students will be observing and teaching at Rodburn Elementary School and Morehead Grade School for 12 weeks.

"The practical teaching experience is not only necessary, but will enable our students to understand more about functioning in the classroom under a new set of guidelines, particularly the goals set forth by education reform," Blair said.

"The students from Sunderland have been taught similar educational techniques throughout their childhood, so they can bring a positive perspective to our education system," she added.

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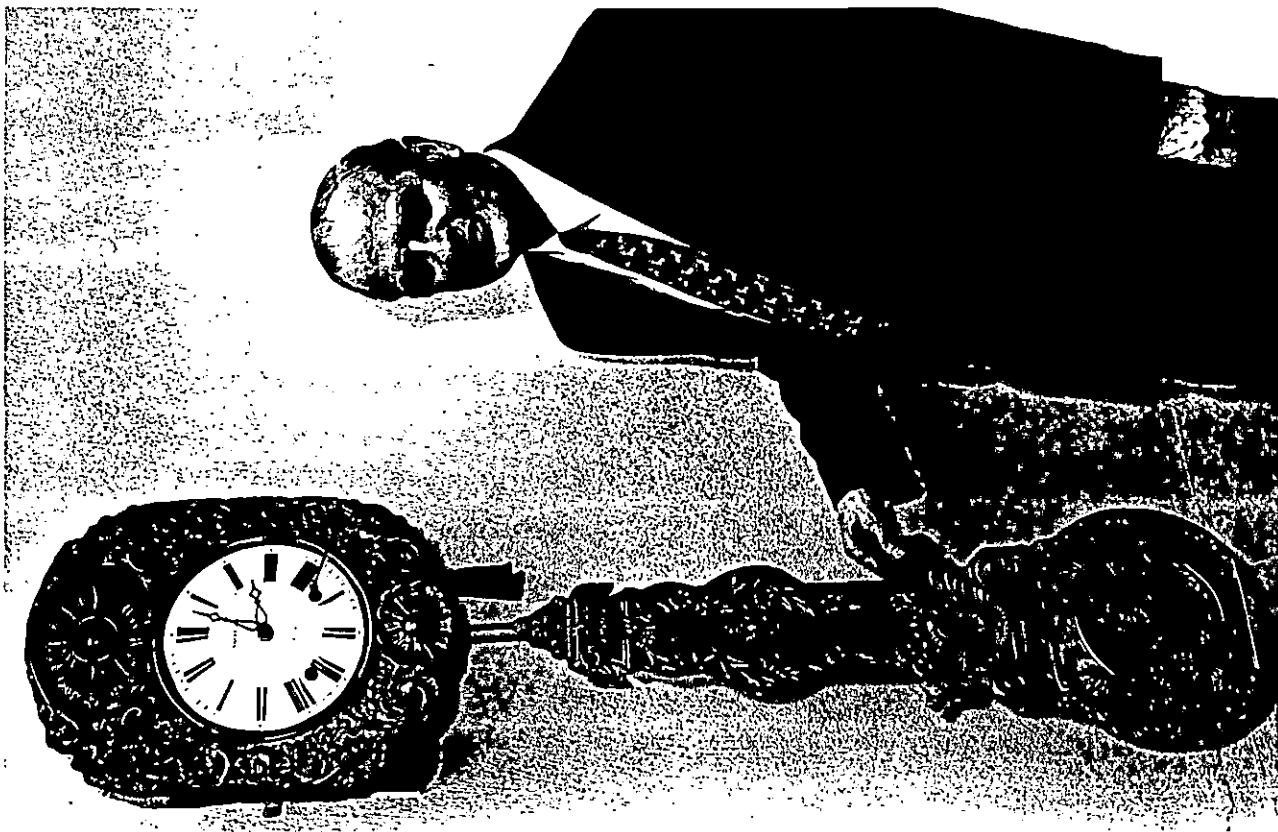

The dinner is one of a series of public activities marking the 107th year of higher education in Rowan County and MSU's 72nd anniversary as a public institution. Following dinner, there will be an MSU theatre production in Button Auditorium. Curtain time for the comedy, "On the Verge," is 8:30 p.m. Persons reserving tickets for the dinner or the luncheon also may purchase theatre tickets at a reduced rate of \$5 each.

Other events include the Convocation and Awards Ceremony at 10:30 a.m. in Button Auditorium, followed by a noon luncheon at which time major donors and other friends will be honored.

Dr. Byars, who earned her baccalaureate degree in sociology with emphasis in social work from MSU in 1970, is responsible for overseeing and coordinating a wide variety of minority affairs programs at UK, including the Martin Luther King Jr. Cultural Center. She also is involved in recruitment of African-American students as well as program development in educational and health areas. She has been in her current role since 1990.

She also completed a masters degree and Rank I at UK. While in Florida, she started that state's first full-time physical education and camping program for trainable retarded youngsters. Karrick returned to Montgomery County in 1970, where, in addition to teaching, she held such administrative posts as school health coordinator and director of pupil personnel until her retirement in 1992.

Professionally, Karrick has held the top offices in the Kentucky Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, the Kentucky Association for School Health, Kentucky Practical Arts Association and Kentucky Girls Sports Association as well serving on numerous Kentucky High School Athletic Association committees.

Her list of community involvement credentials is nearly endless running the gamut from civic and service organizations to the special olympics and the American Cancer Society as well as the Bluegrass State Games. She also is an active volunteer with the American Heart Association and the Girl Scouts.

She has been honored by the Cancer Society multiple times, by the Heart Association, and by the Kentucky Association for HPER of which she is a life member. She recently was inducted into the KHSAA Hall of Fame.

From ticket taker and seasonal worker at the old Coney Island Amusement Park to president of the Cincinnati-based company, International Theme Park Services, Inc. (ITPS), Speigel has more than 30 years experience in the theme park/leisure industry. MOREHEAD, Ky.—Terry Byrd, a non-traditional student at Morehead State University, returned to school because he knows that a college degree will open more doors for him.

For 10 years he worked as an assistant program director and engineer in the radio business. "You don't work radio, you live it. I wanted more time of my own, so I came back to school," he said.

Now, the Louisville senior is majoring in computer information systems at MSU. While he can take a computer apart and put it back together, that's not enough: "None of that will get you in a potential employer's door unless you have a four year degree."

So, he set his sights on a college education and decided on MSU because he liked the area. "It was quiet and had a real feeling of home here," he said.

Morehead State had other features that Byrd liked. "MSU is large enough that you get a professional education, but it's small enough that every professor knows your name," he commented.

Even though he's glad he came to MSU, he describes his schedule as insane. "I am carrying 18 hours this semester plus working nine hours a week in the Office of Career Planning," he said. "It's like having a 40 hour work week."

Byrd believes it will all be worth it when he gets that degree. He plans to graduate in May of 1995 and then get a job with a company working in some aspect of computer operations.

Education is very important to Byrd. "Not only is it necessary for a job in my field, but I consider a day that I don't learn something is a day wasted," he said.

"Change is what keeps people going. If you do the same thing all the time you vegetate, that's why I like variety," he said.

Byrd has demonstrated this with a number of jobs and accomplishments. For instance, he was a deputy sheriff in Jefferson County where he operated the main frame computer that kept track of the money coming in and out of the county.

A graduate of Waterson College in Louisville with an associate degree in computer programming, Byrd wants to be "comfortable" in the future. "I don't want to be a slave to my job," he commented. "I want to do something I enjoy."
