## MSU OBSERVES 'BRING YOUR CHILD TO WORK DAY': A Picture Story





MOREHEAD, Ky.--Three Morehead State University faculty members have been selected by their colleagues to receive the University's most prestigious faculty awards for their extraordinary achievements.

Dr. David J. Saxon, professor of biology, who has instilled the principles of scientific inquiry into the minds of countless students, was the recipient of the 1993-94 Distinguished Teacher Award established in 1964 by the MSU Alumni Association.

Dr. Brian C. Reeder, associate professor of biological and environmental sciences, who is internationally known for his work in wetland ecology, has earned the 1993-94 Distinguished Researcher Award, sponsored by the MSU Research and Creative Productions Committee and awarded annually since 1979.

Dr. Shirley Gish, associate professor of speech, whose extraordinary creative talents have enriched so many lives, was selected as the 1993-94 Distinguished Creative Production Award honoree.

The awards were announced at the University's tenth annual Academic Awards Convocation, held Sunday, May 15, in Button Auditorium. The event capped a weeklong tribute to scholastic achievement.

A faculty member since 1967, Dr. Saxon also serves as adviser for students in MSU's pre-medical program which, over the years, has enjoyed a higher than average student acceptance rate into medical school.

Describing Dr. Saxon as "an exceptional teacher," a colleague noted that he is a conscientious instructor who is always prepared for class and who constantly revises the course content to reflect the latest knowledge. "Dr. Saxon truly wants his students to succeed," he added.

Active in several professional organizations, Dr. Saxon also has received more than \$28,000 in institutional research grants as well as an HEW Title VI in conjunction with another MSU researcher. His current research interest is platelets and factors associated with atherosclerosis.

Dr. Saxon is a frequent presenter at professional meetings and has authored or co-authored several articles for scientific journals.

A two-time graduate of Morehead State University, Dr. Saxon earned his Ph.D. degree from Southern Illinois University.

Dr. Reeder, who joined the MSU faculty in 1989, has gained the attention of his peers here and abroad for his study of wetland issues. Focusing on ecosystems modeling, he currently uses his expertise to address environmental problems of Eastern Kentucky Watersheds.

He has received approximately \$140,000 from six externally-funded grants, including a National Science Foundation EPSCoR award.

Dr. Reeder has published 35 articles and abstracts in scholarly journals and has given more than a dozen presentations at professional meetings. His work has been cited many times in scientific literature. A member of several national and international scientific organizations, he also serves as a consultant.

Earning his Ph.D. degree in environmental biology from Ohio State University, he holds a master's degree from Marshall University and the bachelor's degree from Youngstown State University.

Dr. Gish is a multi-talented artist who is recognized nationally and regionally for her creativity. A member of the MSU faculty since 1989, she is a writer, performer, producer and director as well as a teacher.

She maintains an active schedule of oral interpretation and reader's theatre performances, adapting much of the material herself, and has developed several original scripts, producing some as videos. Her most recent work was "Me 'n Susie," a full-length play based on the life and community of Dr. C. Louise Caudill, which premiered last fall as a benefit for MSU's theatre program.

A finalist for the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education's 1992 Acorn Award for outstanding teaching, she has been awarded three residency grants from the Helene Wurlitzer Foundation in Taos, N.M., for playwriting and two MSU Creative Arts Grants.

She holds a Ph.D. degree and master's degree from the University of Arizona and earned her bacheror's degree from the University of Minnesota.

The student speaker for the convocation was Lenore Womack, Grayson senior, who graduates this month with honors. A philosophy major with an English minor, she has been accepted into the master's degree program at Baylor University.



With a teaching career that spans three decades, Netherton was recognized as last year's Distinguished Teacher; but she maintains an active role as a volunteer outside the campus classroom.

She is director of MSU's Eastern Kentucky Regional Foreign Language Festival, a volunteer French teacher for Rowan County's Elementary Division Gifted Education (EDGE) program, and has co-directed Rowan County Elementary Academic Days.



WEST LIBERTY, Ky.—What better way for prison inmates to repay their debt to society than by educating themselves to become contributing members of society was the question posed Friday night (May 20) by one of those inmates.

Asking the question was Richard Daneault of Bellevue, the student speaker for a special commencement program held at the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex for the inmates and their families.

Daneault was one of 14 inmates of the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex who earned degrees this year from Morehead State University under a program offered there through the University's Licking Valley Extended Campus Center.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin, other MSU officials and faculty robed in traditional academic gowns, and state corrections officials were present for the ceremony.

In his commencement remarks, Daneault urged that convicted felons continue to be allowed the use of Pell Grants to fund their education. Congress currently is considering discontinuing this form of financial assistance to prison inmates.

Countering the argument that inmate use of federal funds deprives the underprivileged, he said that 75 percent of convicted felons come from broken homes and families at or below the poverty level.

Admitting that while the time for intervention is in the early stages of child development, Daneault said that adults still can change their lives.

"This is what the Pell Grant program offers us. It gives those of us, who so desire, the opportunity to advance our knowledge and enhance our chances of becoming productive members of society," he said.

It costs the state approximately \$28,000 annually to house an inmate and that doesn't include the cost of supporting families if state assistance is needed, he told his audience.

Eight out of 10 parolees who didn't take advantage of educational opportunities while incarcerated become repeat offenders, according to Daneault. "On the other hand, only one in 10 of those who earned a college degree while incarcerated return to the penal system. This becomes a fairly solid argument for retaining the Pell Grant programs in correctional institutions," he said.

"Considering that 75 percent of convicted felons will one day be reintroduced to society, would it not be logical to reduce the recidivism rate from its current 60 to 80 percent to 10 percent or lower?," he asked. He added that educated parolees not only would become productive members of society, but also would be taxpayers instead of state dependents.

"Some opponents of Pell Grants for inmates like to say that the program rewards us for negative behavior and claim that we should be paying our debt to society and not vice-versa," he said.

"But what better way is there to repay our debt to society than to take rehabilitation seriously and become contributing members to that society," he added.

Not all the graduates elected to take part in the ceremony and several participants declined to have their names released, according to EKCC officials.

Among those receiving Associate of Arts degrees, in addition to Daneault, were Steve Collins of Lexington, Martin Lewis of Louisville, Tim Loving of Indianapolis, Ind., Barry Metz of Newport, Kenneth Renn of LaGrange, David Rice of Cincinnati, Ohio (with distinction) and Samuel Sumner of Hazard. Three other members of the 1993-94 graduating class also earned their degrees with distinction.

MSU President Eaglin who conferred the degrees told the graduates that the University was proud of the program "which helps prepare you for a productive life once you leave here. We know that education has been the best path to rehabilitation," he said.

EKCC Warden Michael J. O'Dea welcomed the inmates families and other guests to the ceremony which was followed by a reception.

MSU has been offering college classes at EKCC since fall 1990 and this was the third class to graduate from the program.

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

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.—An 11-week intensive telemarketing effort has resulted in \$100,941 in pledges to the Morehead State University Foundation, Inc., this spring.

"With 3,615 individual pledges, we expect to generate more than twice what we have with past phonathons," said Bill Redwine, acting director of Alumni Relations and Development.

"We have already received nearly half of the pledged funds and expect to see about an 85 percent fulfillment rate," Redwine said. Last year's campaign resulted in approximately \$30,000 being raised.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Returning to school wasn't an easy choice for Cindy Wylie of Grayson, a non-traditional student at Morehead State University, but she is back with enthusiasm, motivated by the belief that education is her best foundation for building a career and reaching a dream.

"I used to work in a sewing factory where I made minimum wage. Now that I'm back in school, I feel like I have a future and that I'm going some place," said Wylie.

Twenty years ago she had been a college student at Berea College, but after completing only two years there, Wylie left to get married.

For Wylie there were a few logistical hurdles to overcome when she decided to come back to school. Living approximately 55 miles from campus, she has to make the trip daily, leaving her two daughters, Orlena and Danette, and husband, Alfred, to fend for themselves.

Her husband and daughters are thrilled and excited that she has returned to school and, Wylie said, "They say I'm less grouchy, because I'm more relaxed."

According to Wylie, her priorities are based on the principle that your family must come first. She wants to be home when her girls get off the bus, because she believes her role as a wife and mother truly are her most important responsibilities.

When studying at home, Wylie takes breaks to spend time with her daughters and reserves a half hour before their bedtime to talk with them.

That caring nature is reflected in her choice of social work as her major. "I would like to work in a school with teens. They need someone they can relate to. I want to be a role model for my children and other students as well," she said.

"I have learned a lot about me since I've been back," she said. "Because I'm a lot happier with myself I feel like I can give more to my family and to other people. I've made friends and I enjoy my life."

Wylie said that going back to school has helped her physically, mentally, and emotionally. She had developed carpal tunnel syndrome, a nerve disorder caused by repetitious action in the wrists or hands.

As a result of this condition, she now wears wrist braces and receives federal funding from Vocational Rehabilitation to assist with her pursuit of a degree. "The government pays for my books and tuition. Without this help I would never have been able to return to school, so I am very grateful," she added sincerely.

Wylie credits Becky Walker, the director of the East Carter Youth Service Center for not only helping her locate the fiscal resources to enable her to enroll at MSU, but also for providing an incredible amount of moral support.

"I owe a lot of credit to so many people who have been supportive of my being back in school," Wylie said.

One of those people is Jacquelyn Scott, MSU non-traditional student counselor. Wylie remembered that when her car broke down, Scott allowed her to borrow hers until she and her husband were able to get the car running again.

Having just completed her first year as a student again, Wylie said that the biggest challenge she faced was learning how to study and take tests.

At the outset, she felt a little out of place as an older student, but Wylie found her instructors to be really helpful. "I realized early that I could talk with them and they were willing to give me the assistance I needed to succeed."

"The positive rewards of returning to school have far out weighed the negative," Wylie stated. "Now I'm on a campaign to try and get others to return to school. I've been encouraging people to come back. I've counseled friends and brought them applications."

In fact, when she's not in class, studying or spending time with her family, Wylie serves as a volunteer at the Youth Service Center.

"It's one way I can give back to the community," she said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---When you teach, you spend your life with the best part of the American population.

This is the major reason why Dr. Roger H. Jones, professor of art at Morehead State University, tells students they should consider teaching as a career.

He bases that observation on the nearly 40 years he has spent working with students. Nearly three decades of that time has been spent at MSU.

In less than three months, Dr. Jones will enter the world of semi-retirement where his teaching load will be cut in half.

"I guess I just wanted to bow out gradually," Dr. Jones said. After two years, he plans to quit teaching at the college level and do some of the things he's been "wanting to do and just has not had the time."

Of utmost importance on his list of things to do are directing tours to Mexico, writing a book and working on a degree in Spanish as a Donovan Scholar.

With a love for Mexico that goes back to pre-school days, Dr. Jones said he didn't get to see that country until after he graduated from college. Even though he has been to Cuba, Japan, Italy, Greece, Egypt, Ethiopia, Kenya, Spain, Portugal, Canada, England, Scotland and Wales, he still proclaims that Mexico is his favorite. "I love the country, its people, its food, its art and music," he said.

Drawing information from his extensive travels, Dr. Jones believes he would enjoy being a tour guide when he's retired. He has conducted several summer educational tours to Mexico, Great Britain and even the Worlds Fair when it was at Knoxville. He has already contacted Saga Tours, which caters to those over 50 years of age, and told the staff of his interest in serving as a guide, especially in Mexico.

And, just because he has always wanted to be proficient in Spanish, he would like to go back to college and get a degree in the language. "Oh, I speak it but only to a degree," he noted. While it isn't perfect, he has "never missed a meal" because of a language barrier.

While he has no plans of beginning a novel in the next few days, writing is something he has done for several years. He has written articles on education, travel, tropical birds and dolls. For some publications, such as Madame Alexander's Doll Review, Dr. Jones also has been a contributing photographer.

Throughout his teaching career, he has been involved in numerous professional organizations. While still a high school teacher, Dr. Jones was the youngest president of the Kentucky Education Association which had a membership of approximately 33,000 and president of the Kentucky Department of Classroom Teachers. Since coming to MSU, he has been president of KEA's Morehead Chapter. He also has served as president of the MSU chapter of Phi Delta Kappa and for six years was the group's area coordinator.

While chatting with the professor, it does not take long for one to realize that his true love is education. "I always wanted to be a teacher," he said. "I liked school so much, I didn't look at life without school."

Dr. Jones jokingly recalls how, after his graduation from Breathitt County High School, his mother chose a college for him. "She looked for one with a 'hard curriculum'," he said. She settled on Georgetown College and he stayed there until completing his degree. He believes that was a wise choice, because when he enrolled in the University of Kentucky to work on his master's degree, it "was like going back to high school" for him.

Because of his accomplishments since those early days, Dr. Jones was one of the first recipients of Georgetown College's top honors, the Alumni Award.

With a master's degree in hand, the young educator got a job teaching English at Estill County High School. For his next assignment, he returned to his alma mater to teach art, Spanish and journalism where he stayed for the 13 years.

It was while teaching at BCHS that he first visited Morehead State College, bringing students for the annual senior day. "I was really impressed. President (Adron) Doran knew every student in that student body of approximately 600," he said.

Getting to know Dr. Jones on those campus visitations, Dr. Doran soon offered the high school teacher a position at the college, working in school relations where he did recruiting and school visitations. It was like being part of a family, Dr. Jones recalled. Every day the faculty met at a "faculty table" in the cafeteria where they had a social hour and visited with others they had not seen all day.

"All the occasions were big events," Dr. Jones continued. "Everybody went to the retirement dinners." The camaraderie also was evident in the student population because they knew each other and were more interested in what others were doing, he said.

While persons with advanced degrees were scarce on the campus at that time, Dr. Jones was one of the first to start working on a doctoral degree. He "left with a handshake" to go to Indiana University with the idea he would have a job at MSU when he attained the degree.

During the regular school term, Dr. Jones always planned where he would go during the summer break.

He has traveled almost around the world, with the notable exception of Australia but plans to go there soon, possibly in the late winter months so he "can experience two summers in one year."

Besides traveling, Dr. Jones enjoys reading and doing crossword puzzles, while Paco, his small, green Brazilian parrot, rests on his shoulder. When he is fully retired, he plans to get another parrot—a bigger one that talks more than Paco.

The love for the colorful tropical birds led Dr. Jones to an extensive collection. Several varieties may be seen in photographs in his office and on the walls at his home. His admiration for the works of Walt Disney also attributed to an enormous collection of Snow White memorabilia.

To others around campus, Dr. Jones is noted for his drawings of the MSU eagle mascot. "At one time, I had the Eagle as a member of the Marching Band, with one playing every instrument," he said. He also has done program covers for various organizations, as well as being asked to design the University's presidential medallions.

Education has been an important factor in the life of Dr. Jones. Because he was encouraged by his parents—his father worked for the University of Kentucky as superintendent of agriculture at an experiment station in Quicksand and his mother taught at Lees College after their children were grown—he has adopted the "everyone should teach one" theory. He paid the educational expenses for his niece to go to college.

"It was important that she get a degree," he said. "Now, she will be able to make it no matter what." He credits education for the success in his family; his two sisters are teachers and his brother, who also has a doctorate, does extension work at the University of North Carolina.

When Dr. Jones was a high school teacher, his principal once told him: "You are brainwashing the students; they all want to be teachers---and they all want to go to Mexico." For students taking his art education classes today, the same may still be true.

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

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
