## NYA Provides Low Cost Sidewalks For Local Residents

**Expects To Obtain Council As Sponsoring Agent at No Cost to City**

Low-cost sidewalks will be made available to property owners of Morehead if plans proposed by Bernard Whitt, NYA supervisor, are accepted by the city council.

Whitt said Tuesday that a project to lay sidewalks for all home owners who desire them will be laid before the council at the next meeting.

A local governmental unit must sponsor the project although there is no expense involved to the sponsoring agency.

The NYA will furnish all the trucks, gravel, sand, labor and request sidewalks to be laid on their property will have to furnish only the cement and gasoline for hauling the materials. The average cost to a homeowner with a fifty-foot frontage is six dollars or 12 cents a linear foot.

The sidewalk project is expected to be a part of a larger street and sewer building project. Whitt said that West Liberty has completed more than two miles of sidewalks under the supervision of the NYA and that it is the most popular project handled by the NYA.

More NYA youths will be added to the working force if enough residents apply for assistance.

## Paderewski Cause Of War Over Poland-Dr. R. D. Judd

Paderewski laid the foundation for the '39 dismemberment of his beloved country in 1918, was the statement of Dr. R. D. Judd, head of the department of education, Morehead State Teachers College, ex-former army officer, yesterday in an interview.

The fact that this world-renowned musician helped to bring about the future disruption of his home land is pointed out in an old copy of an American newspaper printed in Paris which Dr. Judd has a copy. Dr. Judd who was commander of Battery A, 88th Heavy Artillery during the war, was in Paris at the time that Paderewski presented his idea of clipping off the neighboring countries to make up the present state of Poland.

"Such use of my name has been made without authority from me, without my consent and contrary to my expressed wishes. So I accordingly, instruct that you do not place my name on the ballot as a candidate for the office of mayor nor for any other public office."
