

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FOLK ART ON EXHIBIT





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
WHITESBURG NATIVE IS MSU STUDENT



MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University's chapter of Phi Kappa Phi honor society is inviting applications from outstanding students who wish to compete for fellowships worth up to \$7,000.


Graduating seniors with superior academic and leadership records should submit an application no later than Jan. 25.

The body of Barry T. Anglin of Ashland was discovered by MSU Public Safety Officer Reda Harris in Peratt Hall about 2:30 p.m. after friends and family members


reported they had been unable to contact him for several days.

Rowan County Coroner John Northcutt ordered the body transported to the state medical examiner's office in Louisville for a determination of the cause of death.

MSU Public Safety Director Richard Green said there was no indication of foul play but that his officers and the coroner's office would continue to investigate.



A reception for graduates and their families, sponsored by the MSU Alumni Association, will be hosted by President and Mrs. Eaglin immediately following the ceremony.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Agricultural Sciences and the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service will co-sponsor a commercial pesticide applicator training session on Monday, Dec. 19.

The program will begin at 8:30 a.m. in 419 Reed Hall on the MSU campus. Training will be offered for those needing initial certification and for those needing continuing education credits (CEU's) for recertification.


The session is approved for CEU units in categories 1, 3, 10 and 12, with 3 having been added recently. Following the lunch break, the Kentucky Department of Agriculture Division of Pesticides will conduct testing for the initial certification.

While the training program is free, the Agriculture Division does charge a fee for those wishing initial certification.

During the day-long session, Dr. C. Brent Rogers, MSU associate professor of agriculture, will present a section on weed identification.

The fraternity brothers collected 4,900 pounds of non-perishable food that has been donated to Christian Social Services of Morehead for distribution during the holiday season.





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MOREHEAD, Ky.---If you're skeptical about entering contests because you think no one ever wins, you may have a different opinion if you talk with Neal Wheeler, audio visual services coordinator at Morehead State University.

He was one of two contestants to win a "Sunshine Mills HEA Dream Hunting Trip." The excursion was videotaped and will be shown on ESPN's "Ultimate Outdoors" with host Wayne Pearson. The one-half hour show is scheduled to air on Saturday, Dec. 24, at 8 a.m. EST.

In early December, Wheeler was awarded a two-day hunting trip to El Campo, Texas, which is approximately an hour southwest of Houston. The award covered air fare, meals, lodging, outof-state licenses and stamps, and ammunition.

Listening to Wheeler talk about the experience, it is hard to determine which was the most exciting part. Was it hunting with Pearson, who is known for his hunter safety courses and working with children and a recipient of the Winchester Hunter Educator of the Year award? Or, was it hunting geese in the rice fields, shooting skeet and sporting clays, quail hunting or having the option of bass or cat fishing?

"When they told me the bass lake also was home to an eight-foot alligator, I decided that was an option I did not wish to pursue," he said.

After the first day's hunt, a storm moved into the area with 50 mile an hour winds and dumping more than two inches of rain in approximately one and a-half hours, for a total of six inches in less than 24 hours. "When the forecast was for another six inches of rain on the second day, I decided it was time to get out of there," he said. But while he had to cut the hunting trip short, Wheeler has no regrets about the trip because of the people he met and the experience.

A native of Boyd County, Wheeler is an avid outdoorsman. He holds a Hunters Safety Card for Kentucky, a requirement for winning this drawing, and has been a volunteer hunting instructor for the state for more than two years. He also trains Labrador retrievers which was a topic of conversation with Pearson during the hunt.

Besides the memory of the event, Wheeler received a camouflage hunting outfit, a plaque, tote bag, a magazine subscription and his name will be entered in other raffles to compete for future hunts. "Winning does not make me ineligible for other drawings," he said, as he pulled on his camouflage jacket that displays the Sunshine Mills logo.

And because he had such a good time, Wheeler would like to see a similar activity brought to Kentucky. "Why not have a dream hunt or a fishing trip in our state?" he said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---For Morehead State University, 1994 was truly a memorable year filled with good news, including a \$1 million gift, the largest in the institution's 107 year history.

Lexington philanthropist Lucille Caudill Little, a Rowan County native, made the gift in a four-year commitment to support the fine arts programs housed in what is now the Caudill College of Humanities. Her gift is part of a \$3 million goal to endow that college.

In early spring MSU's Board of Regents, following a special celebration of the fine arts presented as a tribute to her, approved the naming of the college in honor of Mrs. Little and her family, the descendants of the late Daniel Boone and Rosetta Proctor Caudill. Mrs. Little is the sister of Dr. C. Louise Caudill, Morehead physician and one of the founders of St. Claire Medical Center.

In the realm of bricks and mortar, MSU was fortunate to have the only higher education capital construction project authorized by the 1994 General Assembly--Lappin Hall's second phase. The \$6.9 million project involves renovation of the science building which was originally built in 1937 with an addition in 1961. Phase I, completed last year, was construction of a 33,000-square-foot addition.

During the year accreditation for the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences was reaffirmed through 1998 and that of the Veterinary Technology program extended through 1995.

As a result of a grant from the Knight Foundation, MSU was able to expand access of its computerized degree audit program to six two-year Eastern Kentucky college campuses. The program enables students to see immediately how their work at the two-year schools matches requirements for MSU's baccalaureate programs as well as what courses are needed to complete their degree work.

The University also was selected to participate in a special initiative of the Association of American Colleges designed to assist schools in incorporating diversity, democracy and liberal learning into their curriculum. MSU officials are looking to enhance both racial/cultural and gender diversity.

Good News 2-2-2-2-2

Not only did materials prepared for MSU's first Spring Gala, "A Musical Fantasy Cruise," garner a Special Award of Merit from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), but so did the University's first-time publication, Focus, a magazine devoted to faculty research and creative production. This past year's gala, "A New York Fantasy," netted \$21,000 to enhance programs in music and theatre.

The Admissions Marketing Report, a national publication for professional admissions personnel, also bestowed Awards of Merit on the Student Viewbook and its companion piece.

Throughout the year, WMKY 90.3 F.M., public radio from MSU's campus, and its staff earned numerous awards for excellence in news and sports reporting.

And for the fourth consecutive year since 1991, the University's varsity cheerleaders brought back the Division I title from the National College Cheerleading Championships held in San Diego, Calif. The squad earned the top spot in 1988 as well.

Marking 107 years of higher education in Rowan County and 72 years as a state institution, MSU celebrated Founders Day 1994 by honoring several of its own. Dr. J.E. Duncan, dean emeritus of the former School of Humanities, received the 1994 Founders Day Award for University Service. Additionally, the day's events provided an opportunity to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the arrival of President Emeritus and Mrs. Adron Doran in Rowan County in 1954.

Special recognition also was given to Mrs. Little, who was named Most Valuable Giver; W. Stu Taylor, Volunteer Fund Raiser of the Year, and Dr. C. Lee Tyner, coordinator of MSU's veterinary technology program, and Harlen Hamm, professor of speech, Outstanding Faculty/Staff Fund Raisers.

Inducted into the Alumni Hall of Fame were Dr. Lauretta Flynn Byars, vice chancellor for minority affairs at the University of Kentucky; Ann Karrick, former school teacher, coach and administrator, and Dennis Speigel, president of International Theme Park Services, Inc.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin also launched the Heritage Campaign, a multi-phased project aimed at preserving the University's human legacy by honoring those who have made notable contributions to the University's history and those who have served for significant periods of time.

The first phase involves renovating the Gold Room, using native hardwoods, into a space where suitable recognition may be given those who have received awards for teaching, research, public service, creative expression and leadership. The second phase will be the development of an outdoor memorial plaza to honor those who have served MSU since its inception in 1887. The final phase will be an on-going expansion of the University Memorial Fund which underwrites named scholarships in memory of deceased faculty and staff members.

Spring brought good news to several MSU family members, who were selected by their peers for special honors. Recognized for excellence were Dr. David Saxon, professor of biology, Distinguished Teacher Award recipient; Dr. Brian G. Reeder, associate professor of biological and environmental sciences, Distinguished Research Award recipient; Dr. Shirley Gish, associate professor of speech, Distinguished Creative Production Award recipient; Mary Jo Netherton, associate professor of French, and Tim Rhodes, director of financial aid and scholarships, recipients of Distinguished Service Awards.

MSU's Board of Regents offered some welcome relief to students and their parents with the approval of locked-in housing rates. Students who live on campus continuously through their college careers will find that future housing increases will not be passed on to them now. New rates will be applicable to new students and returning students who lived off-campus.

This was also the year that the MSU staff members elected their first regent under legislation enacted by the 1994 General Assembly. Gene Caudill, administrative superintendent in the Office of Physical Plant, began a three-year term as the staff representative in July.

In the late summer, MSU became one of six sites in the state to share \$1.4 million in federal funding under AmeriCorps, a new national service initiative. Gov. Brereton Jones announced the funding at a news conference on campus. MSU's project, MSUCorps will provide tutors and mentors for high risk students from an eight-county area in cooperation with Family Resource and Youth Services Centers.

And again, MSU captured the Ohio Valley Conferences 1993-94 Academic Achievement Banner which it had won in 1987, 1988 and 1993. It is awarded to the school whose athletes have the highest combined grade point averages compared to average for the entire student body. Morehead State's student athletes had a combined g.p.a. of 2.74, which was not only the best in the conference compared to the entire student body, but also was the top overall g.p.a. among the nine league schools.

Private giving to the University in fiscal 1993-94 reached an all-time high of nearly \$1.8 million, a 5 percent increase over the previous year. Among the more significant gifts were Mrs. Little's first \$250,000 to establish the \$1 million W. Paul And Lucille Little Endowment Fund and \$150,000 from the Ashland Oil Foundation. More good news was the increase in the total number of contributors which grew by 14 percent from the previous year.

Additionally for President Eaglin, the year brought a resounding vote of confidence by the Board of Regents with an extension of his contract through 1998.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Six Morehead State University faculty members have received grants totaling \$26,400 from the Kentucky Department of Education to fund programs for the coming year.

Dr. Joe Bendixen, professor of agriculture, \$3,200 to prepare teachers in vocational agriculture for the public, secondary schools in the state;

Dr. Charles Coddington, Department of Industrial Education and Technology chair, and John VanHoose, assistant professor, \$16,000 to continue and upgrade the state's industrial education teachers through the activities of field-based educators;


Dr. Gerald DeMoss, College of Science and Technology dean, \$500 to coordinate vocational education programs within the academic programs at MSU;

Jane Ellington, associate professor of human sciences, \$3,200 to coordinate activities to improve the quality of secondary and post-secondary vocational home economics programs;

Dr. Sue Luckey, professor of business education, \$3,500 to train additional business education teachers in the service region.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Center for Community and Economic Development at Morehead State University has received funding for the registration of historic resources in Eastern Kentucky.

The \$140,000 grant, funded by the Appalachian Regional Commission, is designed to create economic opportunities by increasing tourism and other economic strategies from the location and registration of historic sites, according to Michael Harford, MSU professor of management and co-director of the CCED.

Harford lists farmlands and historic buildings as possible examples of resources to be used in the project.

"MSU personnel will travel to these areas, assist communities with identifying historic resources and, most importantly, help with planning ways to increase tourism through the use of those resources," Harford said.

The grant is one of several awarded to the CCED to improve the overall quality of life for residents throughout Eastern Kentucky.


Other projects implemented by the CCED include a study of hazardous materials along I-64. As with that project, MSU students will participate in the current study.

"When you talk about how this grant benefits MSU, then you have to talk about the students," Harford said. "Students will participate in all phases of planning and locating sites across Eastern Kentucky." The ARC grant also is expected to strengthen the overall economy of MSU's service region.

The current grant is a result of Gov. Brereton Jones recommendation to the ARC that funding be established to develop historic sites in Eastern Kentucky.

The funding period expires July 1, 1995.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University has received a significant grant designed to develop mathematical laboratory models for the undergraduate program in mathematics.

Funded by the National Science Foundation, the \$50,000 grant is one of 600 awarded out of nearly 1,800 applicants, according to Joyce Saxon, MSU assistant professor of mathematics.

Saxon, who wrote the proposal for the national grant, is excited about the improvements the grant will offer. Working with her on the project are Dr. Rodger Hammons, Department of Mathematical Sciences chair; Dr. Lloyd Jaisingh, professor of mathematics; Dr. Daniel Seth, assistant professor of mathematics, and Dr. Robert Lindahl, professor of mathematics.

"The funds will be used to provide lab explorations that will help students learn concepts, not just facts and figures." Saxon said. "The money will provide for lab equipment which will improve students understanding of math and improve the instruction they receive."

The grant, funded by the NSF's Instrumentation and Laboratory Improvement Program, is among the largest NSF grants ever received by MSU.

"This is an important and prestigious grant," Saxon noted. "The proposal had to clearly show how MSU would meet NSF standards. That only one-third of the applicants received the money tells a lot about our plans for improving math instruction at the undergraduate level."

The focus group for improvement in instruction will be introductory level math courses, ranging from college algebra to calculus I. Saxon hopes to reduce the failure and drop out rates in the introductory courses.

"We will concentrate on making the learning enjoyable," she said. "Students are used to math instructors lecturing with chalk and nothing else. Now we can work on helping students understand how math works through better technology."

Saxon plans to have equipment in place as early as next spring.

Feb. 4-Dylan Thomas. A flamboyant troubadour, Thomas reads his rich language as displayed in such works as "Under Milk Wood" and "Do Not Go Gently into that Good Night."

Feb. 11-Pablo Neruda. Guru of surreal and sensual verse, Chilean poet Neruda helped spur one national revolution and another in Spanish literature.

Feb. 18--Robert Lowell. In a turbulent life, Lowell fathered "confessional poetry," transformed English literature and twice won the Pulitzer Prize.
