**A Good Idea From
Fleming County**

Every month and sometimes every other
week someone makes the rounds of the bus-

ness houses or homes, asking for donations
to send a sick person to the hospital.

Fleming county had a similar situation in
1935. A small group of residents did some-
thing about it. They formed the Fleming
County Charity Hospital which has furnished
funds for the hospitalization of twenty-five
persons since October 1, 1938. They collected
approximately \$400 during a drive in October
last year. Since January 1 the organization
has paid out \$526 for hospitalization of 23
persons.

The Fleming Gazette explained the work-
ings of the plan last week. Each person is
asked to contribute \$1 (during the October
drive) and as much more as he can give to
this worthy cause. The fund is handled at
present as it has been since it was started,
that is, the money is given to any Fleming
County doctor, who has a needy sick patient
who needs hospitalization. They have only
to call and a check is given immediately.

Those in charge of the fund have estimated
after four years experience that at least \$600
is needed to carry on this work. Last year
when the call was made on Fleming Coun-
tymen, the response was good, many people
willingly and gladly signed pledge cards for a
five year period and no trouble is anticipated
for this year's collections.
It's a good idea.


