 Editor and Publisher of the jail along with the other public buildings and while many improvements should be made as a general rule they are in a very good condition.  
 We wish to recommend that the

Rowan County Fiscal Court at once take steps to have the bridges which were washed out by the flood and more especially the two steel bridges on North Fork replaced at the earliest possible time. We realize that Rowan County has no money and we respectfully suggest that they get in touch and have the Rural Highway of the State Highway Department cooperate with them in this matter.

We have examined the complaint about the street in the city of Morehead leading from Sam Wheeler's to the No. 10 voting house, we find that it is impassable and we suggest that the city take immediate steps to repair and open up that street.

We further recommend that the Rural Highway Department carry out their program as originally agreed upon on Dry Creek in Rowan county. We think that it is of great necessity that the cliff be blown off and the road raised around that hill.

We wish to commend the County Judge in his action in closing of the road houses in Rowan county. We suggest that if possible and it is within his power, that he continue to maintain a strict supervision over these places.

We recommend that the city officials and all the other officials take such steps as are made to clean up Railroad Street in the city of Morehead and to close all places that are nuisances in the city and county.

Reports have been made to us relative to a poll tax levy of \$2.00 for school purposes in Rowan county. We have investigated this matter and find that due to indebtedness incurred prior to the Administration of Roy E. Cornette, County School Superintendent, and the present Board of Education that it is necessary and mandatory that the Board request a maximum levy to meet payments upon said indebtedness. The Board of Education and the Rowan Fiscal Court should not be blamed for this levy.

We went upon the grounds and through some of the buildings at the Morehead State Teachers College and find that same is in good condition and well kept. We commend President H. A. Babb for his administration of the affairs of said college. We especially wish to thank President Babb and W. H. Rice, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds at the College for the courtesies extended us while making our investigation.
