NONPARTISAN GROUP PLANNING DINNER HONORING PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, TO RAISE FUND FOR WARM SPRINGS WORK

Tickets Will Be Offered At \$1.00 Per Plate; Committee Hope Every Citizen Will Help To Build Fund For Curbing Infantile Paralysis

Morehead will observe the "President's Birthday" fittingly on Saturday, January 29, with a community dinner. Plans are now being made, to be announced later for the place, the sale of tickets and the program.

Committees have been appointed by Mrs. Matye Burns, who has charge of the plans to carry out the arrangements. The general committee will decide the place where the dinner is to be held.

It is too well known to need repeating that the purpose of the annual observance of President Roosevelt's birthday is to raise funds for carrying on the work of the Warm Springs Foundation, an organization for the prevention and cure of infantile paralysis, the dread disease from which the president himself had suffered and from which he recovered.

Outside of actual expense, every realized from these dinners and dances, which will be held throughout the nation on January 29, will go to the building up of the fund in the foundation.

These dinners and dances are strictly non-political. They are offered to everyone, and everyone is urged to buy a ticket to fit local demand.

It is the hope of the committee to make this the outstanding dinner held in honor of the President, in this community. Remember that in buying a ticket to this dinner, you not only get together with your friends and neighbors, but you will aid mightily in helping to curb a disease that is at present the most dreaded in existence.

Tickets will be \$1.00, of which one half will be forwarded to the fund.

SMALL POX EPIDEMIC UNDER CONTROL AS SCHOOLS ARE OPENED THIS WEEK

New Cases Developing Are Light; Department Is Determined

A determined drive by the Rowan County Health Department, aided and supported by every agency in the county has brought the small pox epidemic well under control, according to Dr. T. A. E. Evans, county health doctor. Dr. Evans stated that he was delighted with the manner in which not only the citizens of the county had cooperated, but were vaccinated, and by taking all the necessary precautions against the spread of the disease, but with the cooperation of the community, they are prepared to take care of any further and are anxious to serve the people.

Speaking of the new cases that have developed in the past few days, Dr. Evans stated that the new cases at Haldeman and Pine Grove. While a scattering of new cases have developed at Haldeman with two new cases at Triplett, it is felt that the epidemic is definitely halted. The Health Department has, since last Friday, when the small pox was discovered, administered, over 1,000 vaccinations to citizens in all parts of the county.

"Hoping county is no place for an epidemic of this sort," said Dr. Evans. "We are determined to stamp it out completely. And we are equally determined to make sure that every child shall develop again. We believe that this care has taught the citizens of the county a valuable lesson as to the value and importance of protection of health through vaccination."

The state committee, nominating FSA Regional Director George S. Mitchell, Raleigh, N. C. and appointed by Secretary Wallace, to assist in the farmer and newspaper purchase loan program in Kentucky is as follows: Mark Ehringer, Managing Editor, Courier Journal and Rehabilitation in Kentucky, Berea; Dean Thomas Cooper, State Director of the Agricultural Extension Service, Lexington; Ralph H. Woods, State Director of Vocational Education, with office in Frankfort, residence in Lexington; Mrs. W. M. SCIENCE ..... is truth. The word "science" is defined in the dictionary as "knowledge gained and verified by exact observation and correct thinking." Which is another way of saying "truth". Whenever anybody tries to twist the facts of science to conform to a political philosophy or a religious creed he is waging war on truth.

There is a lot of that sort of warping the truth to fit preconceived theories going on in the world today. That is why the American Association for the Advancement of Science, at its mid-winter convention, invited the British Royal Society to join with it in setting up a "Court of Wisdom" representing the free nations of the world. The purpose is to propagate truth and fight every attempt to prevent the teaching of science uncolored by political or religious propaganda.

Many nations, numerous political bodies, are dictating today what shall and shall not be taught as truth. The action of the American Association is a new declaration of intellectual freedom from political restraint.

FREEDOM ..... of belief. Everybody is, or ought to be, absolutely free to believe anything he wants to believe, and to try to convert others to his belief. But no man or social group should have power to compel the teaching of beliefs which are contrary to the proven truths of science, or to prohibit the teaching of scientific knowledge.

Many people still believe the world is flat. Certain religious sects refuse to accept the scientific fact that it is round. The whole church refused to accept Galileo's first demonstration of the shape of the earth, and forced him to recant. Only a dozen years ago the intelligent world was shocked and amused by the trial of a Tennessee school teacher for teaching the truth about evolution, contrary to a state law which undertook to deny a proven scientific fact.

Such conflicts between knowledge and authority are not new. They can do incalculable harm. To teach history by suppressing facts which might lessen the glory of a national hero, or to reject as untrue a new scientific discovery because it was made by someone of a different religion is little short of criminal.

TRUTH ..... shatters fear. The truth is that most people are afraid of the truth. Human nature prefers to live with its comfortable delusions about the world and its mechanism, rather than be disturbed by the revelation that things we have always believed are not true.

One result of our reluctance to believe and accept scientific truths is that most of us live under the shadow of needless fears. The savage who believes in the power of malevolent unseen spirits, invoked by the medicine man as the victim of the same sort of fear which many people who call themselves civilized have of sitting in a draft or getting their feet wet.

The trouble with most of us is that we have absorbed a lot of half-truths which are often more terrifying than utter ignorance. If everybody knew the whole truth about the world we live in and how to live in it we would all be rid of the illusions which make us unhappy.

"We shall know the truth and the truth shall set you free." RELIGION ..... and science. I often hear people speak of "the conflict between science and religion." There is no such conflict, if one understands both. Dr. Robert A. Millikan, one of the greatest scientists in the world, says "Science and religion go hand in hand. Both are concerned with truth and truth alone."

Religion is, in essence, a rule of life, a guide to right living. It teaches that if one does evil, evil consequences will follow to himself or to others, while if he lives by the rules of his religion he will gain health, contentment, comfort, and eventual happiness. Science does not dispute any of the fundamental truths of religion, but rather tends to prove them true by discovering why and how good or evil effects follow good or evil conduct of one's life.

Science neither affirms or denies the final rewards or punishments which religion teaches. It merely says it has no proof one way or the other. The life hereafter is a matter of faith. But the whole trend of scientific research is toward proving that in this life the teaching of religion are the safest guides.

**THE SUNDAY  
SCHOOL LESSON**

Written Each Week By  
B. H. KAZEE  
Pastor of The Baptist Church

Subject: Adjusting Life to Service.  
Mark 1: 14-28  
Golden Text: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent ye, and believe the gospel." Mark 1: 15.

Last Sunday we left Jesus at the close of his temptation, in which he resisted the devil with the Word of God. Mark does not record a number of events which followed, but Luke and John record them; after the temptation Jesus immediately returns to John, who publicly identifies him as the Lamb of God. Andrew, Simon, Philip, Nathanael, and perhaps James, all first visit to Jesus. Then Jesus makes his follow visit to Cana of Galilee. Jesus returns to Jerusalem, purifies the temple, and is visited by Nicodemus. Jesus goes from Jerusalem to some part of Judea, wins other disciples, who were baptized by his followers, receives the testimony of John and testifies concerning him. John is imprisoned. Jesus leaves for Galilee, passing through Samaria, talks to the women at Jacob's well, spends two days at Sychar, cures the nobleman's son at Cana.

We find now, Jesus calling disciples, Simon and Andrew, James and John, calling them to leave their fishing and their father, and telling them He will make them fishers of men. Thus the disciples leave off fishing and begin to learn of Jesus, following Him. What do they find in adjusting their lives to service? They must learn many things.

First, that Jesus was preeminently a preacher. Preaching has characterized the Christian religion and made it distinctive from all others. It thrives on preaching, and wherever preaching is neglected it recedes. Jesus preached the gospel of the kingdom of God. That is, the good things that sinful men might become citizens of a kingdom in which they find eternal life, and sins forgiven. Jesus preached that the way to enter by repentance toward God, and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance means to change the mind, turn around in our views about God, sin, righteousness, and judgment. It is to quit ignoring God, turn around and see what God says. Not only to see, but to agree that God is right about our sinfulness and his righteousness. Quit disagreeing with God and agree with Him.

Thus Jesus called those who had repented and believed, and they left their nets to follow him. Soon they went into Capernaum. There, on the Sabbath day they followed Jesus into the synagogue, where they heard him enter into a general discussion following the reading of the Scripture. He spoke with authority, something more than the Scribes could do, about the meaning of the law, not merely the letter. In the synagogue was a man with an unclean spirit. Jesus showed his authority by commanding the spirit to come out of the man. The spirits recognized Jesus as God, something more than some men do. But they obeyed his voice and came out.

All who serve God must form an acquaintance with His power to work miracles, and to interpret the Word of God. This is the work of the Spirit in us, to show us the truth and make it effective within us.

The lack of cooperation between Congress and the Administration not altogether a matter of antagonism to the President, though more the result of that feeling finds expression on Capitol Hill. There are a hundred or more bureau chiefs, heads of special "administrations" and the like who have ideas and projects of their own which they are bent upon putting into effect, and the air of Washington is full of whippersnappers' gossip about the Administration is going to do, which are based upon the schemes of these bright young men. Nobody is ever sure, however, that they will not "sell" the President on these ideas, as many of them have done in the past. The result is that Congress has no guide as to what the executive really wants done.

There is much actual antagonism toward the bevy of "planners" surrounding the President than there is toward Mr. Roosevelt himself.

To Fight Food Monopolies  
One of the items of gossip now in circulation is that Administration planners are working on a nationwide program for government-sponsored consumer cooperatives. The idea is that these would be an effective weapon against the growth of food monopolies. The rumor sounds plausible because of the recent reports of working out of the country in regard to consumer prices. In the beginning of the New Deal the emphasis was all upon higher prices. Now the administration has become low-price conscious.

It is no secret that a group of Administration planners are working on a Labor program which is designed to abolish the present system of paying wages on an hourly basis and substitute a yearly pay schedule, with longer hours of labor in rush seasons and shorter hours in slack seasons.

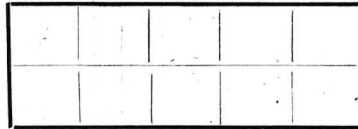

### Better Health

Undulant fever in man is caused by the same germs that produce contagious abortion in farm animals. It is not easily distinguished from other diseases that give rise to prolonged fever. Victims of undulant fever often are told that they have tuberculosis or malaria or typhoid fever. The disease can be recognized usually by a blood test and some times the germ can be grown from the patient's blood. Those that have had undulant fever give a positive skin test for the disease.  
 By experiments on animals it has been shown that the disease may be caught either through the skin or by swallowing the germs in milk. But more germs have to be swallowed than placed on the skin to cause infection. This leads to the conclusion that human beings are more easily infected by contact with animals that have contagious abortion than by drinking the milk from these animals. Also, it has been found both in this country and in France that the victims of undulant fever are more frequently those that have touched the animals or their dead bodies or their manure than those that drank their milk. And, in any case, milk can be made safe by pasteurization.

The prevention of contagious abortion in cattle, goats, sheep, and pigs the farmer. It is also probably the most effective way of preventing undulant fever in man. Any plan for the eradication of the disease in animals will have to take into account the fact that the greatest amount of infectious material is present when the animal aborts.

### Survey Is One Fourth Finished

The surveying of timber on Cum berland National Forest is now approximately one quarter finished. 94,000 acres have been covered since July 1936 by crews operating in Laurel, and McCreary counties. At the present time four 8-man field crews and an office force of four technical men are working on the inventory of timber on Government-owned land.

The information being gathered includes amount of merchantable timber, quality of timber, rate of growth, work necessary to improve the stand of timber and maps showing location and types of timber now standing. The data will be worked up to make Management plans for the entire Forest which, when operative will protect a continuous yield of wood products. Stabilization of employment through woods work in and near the area will be mighty important benefit to the local people.

Management plans can be made effective only through the ceaseless efforts of the Forest Service in its control of fire and correction of destructive logging practices. Fortunately, epidemics of timber destroying insects and disease are rare in Kentucky and research workers are continually learning how to better combat and control them. Destructive logging on National Forests by private operators has been eliminated through legal regulations. The degree of success with which an over and sustained yield of timber can be produced through planned management, will depend largely upon the amount of damage done by Forest fires. The cooperation of every forest user in being careful with fire in the woods will do much to bring about the many benefits, particularly the employment, which result from stabilization yield of forest products.

Farm Agents, will examine applications for loans, appraise the farms applicants propose to purchase, and recommend applicants who have the character, ability and experience deemed necessary for successful farm ownership. County Agents will also be expected to co-operate in farm management advice to the new purchasers," according to the announcement.

"Applications will be filed with County Supervisors but county officers will not be ready to accept formal applications for loans until county committees have been named and the State Advisory Committee has recommended the counties where tenant purchase loans will be made this year. Because only \$10,000,000 was appropriated for the first year for the entire United States, funds will not be sufficient to make loans for the first year is more than a limited number of counties.

When you go to market these days you'll be seeing artichokes. The French which remind you of a water lily bud and the Jerusalem which give long and brown and add in bunches. You may pause a minute before the French variety but I do hope that the spirit of advancement will prompt you to invest.

French artichokes usually are most plentiful in market just when fresh vegetables are scarce and hard to come by. Consequently they put in their appearance at a most opportune time because they are simple to prepare and serve and often take the place of a green salad. One artichoke, ordinarily is calculated as a serving, although very large globe may be halved or even quartered. Cook them whole and divide just before serving.

Serve artichokes some evening when you are giving roast beef for dinner. Here's an easy menu that will please the whole family: Tomato juice cocktail, roast beef with brown gravy, potatoes baked with meat, artichokes with hot mayonnaise, up-side-down apple gingerbread, milk, coffee.

The center or "choad" always is removed before serving but it usually is left in while cooking because after it is cooked it pulls out easily. If removed before cooking cut away with a sharp knife and tie-ribs with a cord to keep its shape.
