# Governor Offers New Program

### Speaking Before Joint Session Of General Assembly Offers 10 Point Program

No new taxes and liquidation of the state debt by November 1, 1938 topped a 10 point program presented to the Kentucky General Assembly today by Governor A. B. Chandler at the opening of its 102nd regular session.

The governor asked that no existing tax laws be changed and that the legislature end its regular session March 1, more than half a month ahead of schedule, to permit consideration of county financial problems in a special session.

**Pass Budget Bill**  
1. That the budget bill, presented today, and calling for the expenditure of approximately \$24,500,000 for general purposes for each of the next two fiscal years, be passed as presented as speedily as possible.

2. That no new or additional taxes be levied.

3. That no changes be made in present tax laws, "inasmuch as it is absolutely essential in order to meet the state's financial obligations that the income tax law, the cigarette tax law and the whiskey tax law and all other revenue sources now relied upon by the Commonwealth be retained."

**Asks Highway Bill**  
4. That a liquor control bill be passed quickly and its administration placed under Dr. James W. Martin, Commissioner of Revenue. (Administration now is vested in the Department of Business Regulation headed by J. C. W. Beckham.)

5. That the negro normal schools at Paducah and Frankfort be merged into one major institution at Frankfort.

6. That the rehabilitation of the state institutions be continued by adequate appropriations. (The budget bill calls for \$1,300,000 annually for building purposes.)

**Seeks \$12 Per Capita**  
7. That the appropriation for public schools be such as to provide \$12 per capita or slightly more than the current amount.

8. That the old age pension laws be left "substantially as they are at present" and an average pension grant of \$10 a month be continued.

9. That the present highway laws be kept intact.

10. That the system of private companies paying the salaries of deputy sheriffs be made illegal.

**Other Recommendations**  
The governor also recommended, although not in his "specific recommendations," that the \$500,000 annual appropriation for free text books be continued; that the Public Service Commission Act be expanded and enlarged to facilitate the commission's work; that all public roads in the state be put in the primary system of roads so the state may maintain them; that the Commissioner of Highways be authorized to map out county road programs in counties in which the fiscal courts fail to agree on a program within thirty days after April 1; that the State Highway Patrol be continued as now organized; that no effort be made immediately to free toll bridges; that the diversion of highway funds, and that paid lobbyists "be given to understand that they are unwelcome visitors to Frankfort during the sessions of the legislature."

The message was read before a joint session of the Senate and the House of Representatives in the house chamber. Lieut. Gov. Keen Johnson, president of the Senate, presided. The usual opening-day crowd thronged the chamber and the galleries and applauded the governor's remarks.

**Half Way Through**  
"This administration is half-way through," the governor said. "One half of its record has been made. I urge each member of the legislature today to go with us through the second half. I would like to have a part in an administration of public affairs that during a four year period wrote into the annals of history a record of honest, faithful and patriotic service. I believe that every member of this legislature wants to make a good record. I believe that sincerely in the heart of each of you there is a desire to do the job well."

Soliciting the support of the new and the old members of the two legislative branches, the governor said he was "in full sympathy" with them. "I am by the grace of God and the votes of the majority of my fellow citizens your leader," he said. "It is my highest desire to give to the people the kind of leadership that they are entitled to have."

The state's record of the last two years, he governor asserted, is "that of which all of the people can well be proud." This, he added, "has been made possible by the cooperation of those of you to whom the people of the state have committed the management of their public affairs."

"I do not claim to be the best governor the state has ever had," he continued, "but I do believe that I am the most fortunate—fortunate because of the fact that I have enjoyed the greatest measure of cooperation from the legislature, from the elective officials, from the appointed heads of boards and commissions, from the citizens of the state and from the public press."

"COME on in, the water's fine." Bathing in Japan is on a different plane from ours, as these two American gentlemen can tell you. Tubs are perpendicular there, instead of horizontal, and you stand in the water up to your neck. But we shouldn't laugh at this somewhat primitive scene, according to Consumer Information, which points out that only a hundred years ago, there were only 1,500 bathtubs in the United States, all of them in Philadelphia, where they had a city water system and taxed each tub \$3.00. Advertising of the advantages of convenient and sanitary bathing started 31 years later, has continued increasingly ever since, and has made the United States the cleanest nation on earth.
