Over \$200,000 Expended In Morehead In New Buildings

Business And Private Home Erection Booming

Over \$200,000 is being expended in Morehead for the construction of new buildings both business and private homes with many of them nearing completion and others to be completed within a short while, it was learned today.

E. E. Maggard is erecting a two-story building next to the People's Bank on the site formerly occupied by Dr. Garred which will be occupied by Earl McBryer, owner of the Economy Store. The new brick building will be completed and ready for occupancy on or about the first of December, according to Maggard.

Alf McCaskey, proprietor of the Caskey Taxi Company and manager of the City Hotel, destroyed by fire last July 4th, is rebuilding on that site. When completed, Caskey's establishment will house a new Kroger grocery, the Trail Barber Shop and the Pay House. The latter two were formerly in the City Hotel.

John Cecil, proprietor of the Midland Trail Hotel, is building next to the Eagle's Nest. Meanwhile work was begun last Monday on the new Independent building on the Sun street lot next to the Trail Theatre. One of the most modern of its kind, the new structure will house offices and the plant of the Morehead Independent with several apartments on the second story.

Eagles Crippled For Tilt With Eastern Maroons

Injuries Sustained In Trancy Game Put Seven On Bench

"Only a miracle will see seven of my boys into the game against Eastern here Saturday," opined Ellis Johnson, Morehead College coach, today.

"I'm not trying to put out any propaganda either," Johnson declared. "We don't have a single substitute lineman and just enough able bodied backs to play the game."

Four backs and an equal number of linemen are out of the game-two for the season and two more seemingly doomed to play the rest of this year from the bench also.

Glendon Stanley and Bruce Rowland have been lost to the squad since before the "Western encounter and how the Eagles are without the services of Harry Hatfield, another back, Cockey Collins, 190 pound fullback, Co-captain Roy Bailey. "Unk" Gant who accounted for two of Morehead's touchdowns against the Transylvania Pioneers last Friday night, Stanley Radjuna, sea guard and perhaps the outstanding performer on the entire squad, and Ed Adams, only center of the Eagle eleven.

Coaches Johnson and Miller find themselves hard put to fill in the holes caused by injuries sustained Friday. Sprained ankles and bad knees loomed today as the Blue and Gold's largest enemy.

Miller today switched Astor Collins and Junior Lawson from their regular positions to tackles hoping that they would show enough improvement in a week's time to start Saturday against Route Rankin's Maroons. "We understand that Eastern has possibly the best team in its history and we will be extremely anxious to keep the 'Hawg-Rifle' this year."

There will be no rough sessions at all this week. I'm afraid to risk it," Johnson said. "The Eagle-Maroon game will climax homecoming festivities at Morehead College."

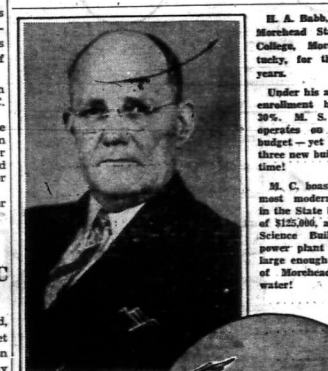
Mr. Earl King Senff will coach the team and he stated that everyone interested in trying out for the team should report when practice starts in about a month.

Jennings Lauded By Board For NYA Work Here

Work Done By NYA Here Since Flood Saves Board \$660.00

The Rowan County Board of Education meeting in the offices of Superintendent Roy Cornette Monday expressed their appreciation to Charles E. Jennings, Rowan NYA supervisor, for the work done by his boys and himself for the rebuilding of Morehead after the flood of July 5.

Over \$1192.00 has been expended in wages to 44 youths engaged in this work which has been distributed to 39 families, according to Jennings, with repaid work done on school property at a net saving to the board of \$660.00.

The complete resolution passed by the Board lauding Jennings follows:
"The board discussed the work which has been done by Mr. Jennings and the NYA boys and many favorable comments were expressed. It was moved by L. H. Layne and seconded by Alvin Caudill and passed by the unanimous vote of the board that the following resolution be adopted:

RESOLVED, that whereas the Rowan County Board of Education feels that due to the work done by Charles E. Jennings, NYA supervisor, and the NYA boys, under his supervision in Rowan county, that this board has been able to run their school schedule with very little interruption and due to the recent disastrous flood that occurred in this community on July 5, 1938, which damaged some school houses and wrecked and ruined others, that without the aid of the National Youth Administration and the splendid work they have done for this board on our program as efficiently. This board wishes to express their confidence in Bernard E. Whit, Area Supervisor, and Charles E. Jennings, supervisor of boys projects in Rowan county, for the splendid work they have done and the cooperation they have given us.

FURTHER, That this board desires to express their willingness to cooperate with the National Youth Administration one hundred per cent as we have always done in the past.

FURTHER, That the secretary be instructed to forward a copy of this resolution to Robert K. Saly, State Director, NYA, Bernard E. Whit, Area-supervisor NYA, and to Charles E. Jennings, supervisor NYA Rowan county.

M. C. Overpowers Hapless Pioneers In Night Game

Eagles Emerge On Long End Of 20-0 Count After Many Fumbles

In a game marred by frequent fumbles the Morehead Eagles over-powered a hapless Transylvania eleven last Friday night at Lexington emerging on the long end of a 20-0 score.

Threatened twice in the first quarter with Eddie Vanzelis and Joe Lustie carrying the leather for the Johnnies-men, the Eagles were not until the second quarter before pushing over their initial score and followed through again within that period scoring on an 85 yard by "Unk" Gant who raced from his own fifteen stripe to score.

Bennie Vanzelis scored the final six points for the Blue and Gold eleven in the last quarter after the crippled Eagles had pushed nearly fifty yards down the field to the shadow of the Pioneer goal. Transylvania threatened to score but once after pushing to the Morehead three yard line aided by a fifteen yard penalty on the Eagle eleven for clipping but their attack bogged down after three tries and their last attempt found them further from their goal than ever.

Thirteenth Celebration Of College Is Saturday

Between 3,500 and 4,000 Homecomers and friends of the college are expected to be present on the MSTC campus Saturday when that institution celebrates its thirteenth annual Homecoming, according to President H. A. Babb.

Climaxed by the classic Eagle-Maroon tilt scheduled for two o'clock at the Jayne Stadium, the day's festivities will include a banquet "without" speeches and a dance in the gymnasium that evening with music furnished by the Tophatter's orchestra of Huntington.

One feature of the football game will be the battle for the "Hawg-Rifle" a symbolic relic of victory donated by the Campus club in 1896 and which goes to the winner of the Morehead-Eastern tilt each year. The Eagles have retained it since its conception and, according to members of the squad, "it is going to stay this year."

McBryer Finds Willie Day Dead

Called To Investigate Car Parked On Road Without Lights

"I've made plenty of arrests, but I never before arrested a dead man," declared Deputy Sheriff, Ben Wainwright today.

Called late Sunday night to investigate a car standing in the middle of the road without lights McBryer found Willie Day, 47, of Salt Lick, in company with Ivan Traylor, Hamford McKenzie and Millard McClave sitting in the car with two full bottles of moonshine on their persons.

The deputy sheriff removed all four of the men to jail. "It was after arriving there," McBryer said "that I noticed no signs of life in Day. I took him to Dr. Blair who pronounced him dead."

Day is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, and three children of Ashland, Ky.

Funeral services were held yesterday with the Ferguson Funeral Home and Reverend T. F. Lyons in charge. Burial was made in the Clearfield cemetery.
