MOREHEAD, Ky.—Two individuals will be recipients this year of the Morehead State University Founders Day Award for University Service.

Sherman R. Arnett, retired MSU administrator/educator and former state legislator, and Harlen L. Hamm, MSU professor of speech, will be honored during the annual Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony on Friday, April 7, at 10:30 a.m. in Button Auditorium.

Established in 1978 by the Board of Regents, the award is presented annually to recognize those who have given superior service over the years to the University. MSU Board of Regents Chair William R. Seaton will make the presentations.

"Mr. Arnett and Mr. Hamm, each in his own way, have provided distinguished service to this institution," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "We are proud and pleased to recognize them for their accomplishments and efforts on MSU's behalf."

The featured speaker for the convocation will be Joe Clark, a nationally-recognized public school educator. Clark was the subject of the movie "Lean on Me," which was based on his success in restoring order to an inner-city New Jersey high school.

Arnett, who came to MSU in 1972, was serving as associate director of financial aid and veterans affairs when he retired from the University in 1981. He also held faculty rank as assistant professor of education.

A two-time graduate of MSU, he served in the Kentucky House of Representatives from 1966 through 1971, where he was a tireless advocate for the University and the region. A member of the MSU Alumni Hall of Fame, he was recognized in 1969 by the Board of Regents for his distinguished and meritorious service, including his role in the institution gaining University status in 1966.

A former elementary and high school principal in Rowan and Elliott counties, Arnett was instrumental in building an infrastructure for Morehead-Rowan County, including serving for many years as board chairman of Rowan Water, Inc. An ordained minister of the Free Will Baptist Church, he also has served as chairman of the Gateway ADD Comprehensive Health Planning.

Hamm began his career at MSU in 1965, teaching speech and theatre at University Breckinridge School. He earned his bachelor's degree from MSU and a master's degree from Bowling Green (Ohio) State University.

Over his three decades of classroom teaching, Hamm has impacted on the lives of thousands of students. Until recently, he coordinated MSU's forensics program, which is known to be one of the best in the nation. He also founded and led the Kentucky Educational Speech and Drama Association for numerous years.

Working through leadership positions with other professional organizations at all levels, Hamm has done much to promote and enhance speech/theatre education and has been recognized for his efforts at the national and state levels. Additionally, he has raised thousands of dollars for student scholarships while giving countless hours to assist the University with other special projects.

Several other activities are planned that day as MSU marks 108 years of higher education in Rowan County and its 73rd year as a public institution. The day begins with a special breakfast for all retired faculty and staff members at which time Dr. Eaglin will recognize those who retired during the past 12 months.

At a noon luncheon following the convocation, 15 new MSU Fellows will be recognized along with other benefactors of the University. State Finance Secretary Crit Luallen will be the luncheon guest speaker. Tickets for the \$6 per plate luncheon must be purchased and picked up in advance.

Immediately after lunch, a historical marker in honor of the listing of MSU's original campus on the National Register of Historic Places will be unveiled. Following that activity, another event to launch the official beginning of the \$6.8 million Lappin Hall renovation project will be staged on the lawn of that building.

Capping the day will be the Alumni Awards Dinner at 6:30 p.m., highlighted by the induction of three new members into the Alumni Hall of Fame: Arye Ellington Dethmers, a corporate executive; Dr. J. David Richardson, a prominent Louisville surgeon/educator, and Dr. Carol S. Rivers, a continuing medical education publisher/consultant.

Dinner tickets are \$10 each and must be purchased and claimed in advance.

The Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center, will be the site for all meal events. **The deadline for reservations and picking up tickets is 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 4.**

MOREHEAD, Ky.—One of the most vital periods in the history of music will soon be revisited at Morehead State University.

Barry Drake, a renowned music lecturer, will present a multi-media presentation on the history of rock 'n' roll on Tuesday, April 18, at 7 p.m. in Breckinridge Auditorium.

The subject for Drake's lecture is "60's Rock: When the Music Mattered." The presentation consists of a lecture, slides, recorded music and interviews. An informal discussion follows the presentation.

Included in the discussion by Drake will be a look at some of the influential rock artists, including Jimi Hendrix, Bob Dylan, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Simon and Garfunkel, The Supremes, Otis Redding and The Monkeys.

A musician and rock 'n' roll historian, Drake owns his own record company, booking agency and management firm. He was recently nominated for the NACA Lecturer and Campus Entertainer of the Year Award.

A graduate of Manhattan College, Drake was a performer and songwriter in the mid-'60s. The New York native signed with Capitol Records in 1970 and has since recorded three albums and toured the U.S. and Europe.

The lecture, sponsored by MSU's Student Government Association, is free and open to the public.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Advance registration for Morehead State University's two summer sessions and the fall 1995 semester will be conducted Monday through Thursday, April 17-20 on the main campus, at MSU's extended campus centers and at Lees and Pikeville colleges.

Students currently enrolled and those interested in attending MSU this summer or fall may register during this period, according to Gene Ranvier, MSU registrar.

Course schedules containing trial schedule blanks are now available from academic departments and the off-campus advance registration sites.

In the directory of classes for the summer sessions, the tuition and fee schedule listed at the top of page 4 is incorrect. The correct summer 1995 tuition and fees may be found on page 7, according to the registrar.

Main campus students will advance register in their major department from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., beginning with graduate students, current seniors and juniors, on Monday, April 17. From Tuesday through Thursday, the final day, the process will be open to all other students as well. Students without a declared major will register in the Office of General Studies, 233 Allie Young Hall.

Advance registration at the Ashland Area, Big Sandy and Licking Valley extended campus centers; Lees College and the Appalachian Graduate Consortium at Pikeville College will be conducted from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday. The registration process on Monday, however, will be open only to graduate students, current seniors and juniors.

Off-campus students who have never enrolled at MSU before should contact their nearest extended campus center or off-campus registration site.

New students planning to study on the main campus should initiate the admissions process in 301 Howell-McDowell Administration Building for undergraduate students or in 701 Ginger Hall for graduate admission.

MSU's summer dates are June 5 to June 30 for Summer I and July 10 to Aug. 4 for Summer II. Fall 1995 classes begin Aug. 21.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---"I don't know what your ultimate destinies will be in life, but I can say unequivocally, the ones amongst you who will be happiest will be those who have sought and found ways to serve others. The highest individual destiny is to serve rather than rule."

From the time he took the cordless microphone in his hand until his final thank you, Joe Clark, a former public school educator, had the attention of his audience at Morehead State University's Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony on April 7.

Clark, who gained national attention for his tough stand on discipline at an inner-city New Jersey school, spoke eloquently for more than 30 minutes, sometimes asking, sometimes encouraging, and sometimes insisting that all Americans should work together to become one on this earth.

"I am convinced, as I trace this land, that we had better begin expeditiously to work cooperatively to bring about the appropriate changes that are having a deleterious effect upon the direction in which my country is going," he said.

Clark noted that one person with courage can make a change in our society, if that person is willing to stand up for what he believes in. Individuals must be willing to take the consequences of their actions, he said.

Encouraging everyone to work toward the goal of becoming one, he asked that others not be judged by the color of their skin or physical attributes, Clark said, "but by the manifest character they exhibit."

Recalling his years in the school system, Clark, who has been profiled in Time magazine and made appearances on "Nightline" and "Donahue," said teachers should not be blamed for the illiteracy and drug problems that are emerging today.

"We have a weakened educational system," he said. "We need to empower teachers, parents and students to become managers." While he has been called "batman" because of the baseball bat he had in his office, Clark joked that he had only used it to attract the media.

Also during the Convocation, the Founders Day Award for University Service was awarded to two individuals who have given superior service to the University through the years: Sherman R. Arnett, retired administrator/educator and former state legislator, and Harlen Hamm, professor of speech and former coordinator of MSU's forensics program.

The convocation was one of several events in the University's celebration of 108th years of higher education in Rowan County and its 73rd year as a public institution.

At a luncheon following the convocation, Martha Johnson, director of corporate community relations and public policy analysis for Ashland, Inc., presented MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin with a \$75,000 check on behalf of the Ashland Foundation. The gift represented the fifth payment of unrestricted funds from a five-year commitment made by the Foundation, totaling \$750,000.

Keith Kappes, MSU vice president for university advancement and executive vice president of the MSU Foundation, Inc., announced that Chakeres Theatres, Inc., had given the Trail Theatre building, to the MSU Foundation.

MSU, in partnership with the Morehead Theatre Guild, the City of Morehead, the Learning for Life Foundation and the Rowan County Board of Education, plans to convert the former movie theatre into a performing arts center. The gift was valued at \$110,171.

State Finance Secretary Crit Luallen, the luncheon speaker, stressed the importance of protecting our heritage while preparing for the future. She discussed several initiatives launched by the state under Gov. Brereton Jones' administration and MSU to do just that.

Citing the state's funding of MSU's Kentucky Folk Art Center and Appalachian Cultural Resource Development project, she said that similar projects were being mirrored in communities across the state.

Steps also are being taken to prepare Kentuckians for the 21st Century, she said, pointing to the General Assembly's funding of the Lappin Hall renovation project at \$6.8 million, the only capital construction project to funded in the 1994 session. Progress is underway on a statewide Information Highway which will reach into all 120 counties.

The luncheon, hosted by the MSU Foundation, was the backdrop for recognizing 15 new MSU Fellows and honoring fund raising volunteers. Accepting the Most Valuable Giver award on behalf of Chakeres Theatres, Inc., was Michael H. Chakeres of Springfield, Ohio, president and CEO of the corporation.

Other award recipients were Resvie Wheeler of West Liberty, Volunteer Fund Raiser of the Year; Dr. James Smallwood and Robert Hayes, associate professors of industrial education, Outstanding Faculty Fund Raisers, and Jonell Tobin of West Liberty, director of MSU-Licking Valley Extended Campus Center, Outstanding Staff Fund Raiser.

Activities continued after lunch with an unveiling of a historical marker denoting the listing of MSU's original campus on the National Register of Historic Places. Moving to the lawn of Lappin, a sign announcing the start of the Lappin Hall renovation project was erected.

Closing the day's activities was the Alumni Awards Dinner, sponsored by the MSU Alumni Association. Recognized for their accomplishments by induction into the Alumni Hall of Fame were: Arye Ellington Dethmers, corporate executive; Dr. J. David Richardson, surgeon/medical educator, and Dr. Carol S. Rivers, medical education publisher/consultant.

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## MARKING HISTORIC DISTRICT

Morehead State University's original campus which is comprised of nine buildings has been designated as an Historic District and placed on the National Register of Historic Places by the U.S. Department of the Interior and the Kentucky Heritage Council. MOREHEAD, Ky.—Those interested in learning how to improve their motorcycle skills or merely learn the basics of motorcycle riding will want to attend a course being offered at Morehead State University.

Sponsored by MSU's Office of Continuing Education, the three-day "Motorcycle Rider Course for the Beginner" will be offered April 21-23, May 19-21, June 9-11 and June 16-18. Friday's classes begin at 6 p.m. with Saturday and Sunday classes beginning at 8 a.m.

A one-day "Experienced Rider Course" will be held on Saturday, May 27, and Sunday, May 28, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

All classes will begin with registration in 209 Downing Hall. On-cycle exercises will be held in the parking lot above MSU's Academic-Athletic Center.

Class size is limited to 12 students and early registration is encouraged. Proper attire is required for all riding exercises.

The beginning course is designed to introduce the rider to motorcycling. It will provide practice in basic riding skills and develop street riding strategies. Cost is \$85 and motorcycles and helmets will be provided.

The experienced riding course is a refresher for riders who want to practice street riding skills. It will allow participants to polish riding skills and develop finesse while emphasizing strategies to reduce risk. The cost is \$50 and riders must provide a street legal motorcycle in good riding condition.

The courses will be taught by instructors certified by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation and approved by the Kentucky Motorcycle Rider Education Program.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Author and poet Rosellen Brown will be on the Morehead State University campus on Wednesday, April 26, to read from her work at 8 p.m. in 111 Claypool-Young Art Building.

The reading is free and open to the public. A reception will follow in the Alumni Center where she will answer questions about writing and the movie business.

Brown is the author of nine books including four novels, collections of poetry, short fiction and essays. Her most recent book, "Cora Fry's Pillow Book," is a moving portrayal a woman of modest means but rich imagination. The "novel in verse" follows Fry's joys and struggles from childhood through marriage, children and grandchildren.

The writer's best-selling novel, "Before and After," tells the story of what happens after a family in New Hampshire learns that their lovable 17-year-old son is the prime suspect in the brutal murder of a local girl. It is currently being made into a movie starring Meryl Streep and Liam Neeson.

"Rosellen Brown's plot can be counted on to grab a mother or father by the ventricles," said Time magazine reviewer John Skow. Entertainment Weekly called the book "a masterful American tragedy" and the New York Times described it as "an unabashed read-until-dawn page turner."

Brown, who is a professor in the Creative Writing Program at the University of Houston, has written seven other books which include "Civil Wars" and "Tender Mercies." Her fiction, poetry and essays have appeared in various magazines, while her short stories have been published in these anthologies: O. Henry Prize Stories, Best American Short Stories and Pushcart Prizes.

Winner of the 1984 Janet Kafka Prize for the best novel by an American woman, Brown also was selected that same year as one of Ms. magazine's 12 "Women of the Year." She is a recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship and an American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters Award.

MSU's Department of English, Foreign Languages and Philosophy is sponsoring Brown's campus appearance. Dr. Michelle Boisseau, MSU associate professor of English, is coordinating the activity.

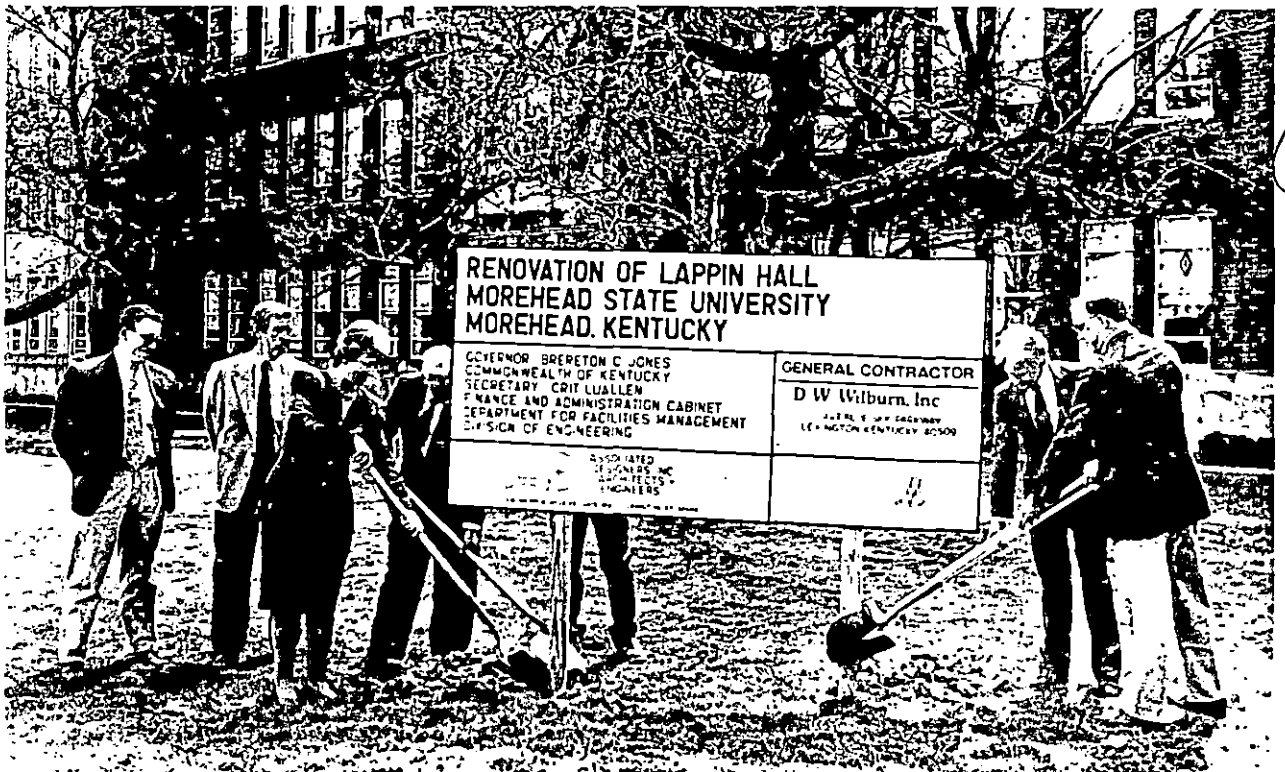
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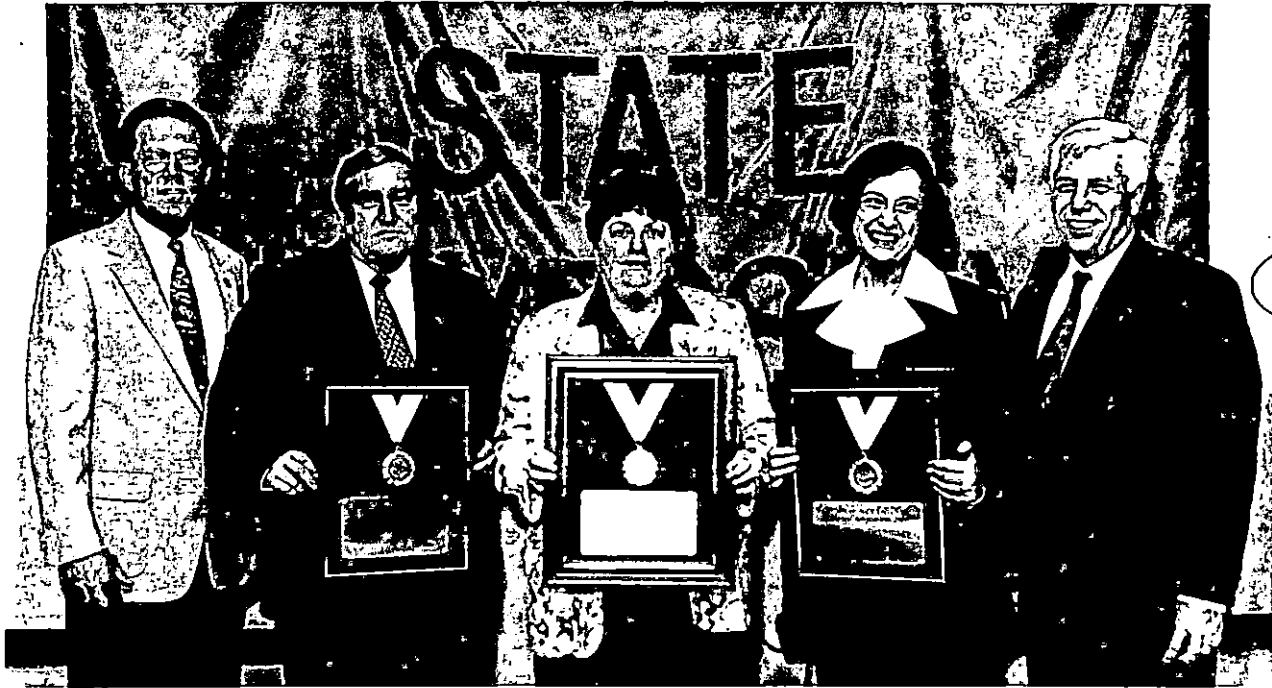

"Whether through making chairs out of trees, tatting, carving ax handles, making musical instruments or music itself, each of these persons are notable for having adhered to the form, and yet succeeded in saying something new through the time-tested techniques passed down by preceding generations."

A reception for the exhibit will be held at the Center on Wednesday, May 3, beginning at 4:30 p.m.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Bill Rosenberg has little spare time to kick up his feet and relax as competition manager for judo at the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Instead, he will oversee hundreds of athletes from all over the world who will kick up their own feet in search for a gold medal.

Rosenberg is now totally engrossed with his role as competition manager for judo in the upcoming Olympics. Formerly director of risk management for Morehead State University, he has served in various capacities since joining the staff in 1970. His retirement was effective March 1.

"The next two years will be crazy," Rosenberg said, from his office in Atlanta. "This time next year I plan to have 200 people on staff, but even then it will be busy."

Rosenberg's new duties involve the planning and implementation of all judo-related events during the Olympics.

"We will work closely with ACOG, the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games, to help coordinate housing, transportation, medicine, and training sites for the athletes," he added.

Experience in national and international judo competitions is proving to be Rosenberg's biggest asset as he settles into his new administrative position. He began in 1983 as a team manager for judo. As team leader in 1984 and 1988, he led judo teams on their pre-Olympic tours throughout Europe.

"Judo is well embraced throughout Europe and Asia," Rosenberg said. "It has a small, steady following in the states but it is a much larger sport internationally."

Among other administrative duties, Rosenberg also will oversee the writing of the competition management manual, a guide to management of the various Olympic events.

"My experience in judo, from my early days in the Army to working in the Olympics, has really prepared me for this moment," said Rosenberg. "Otherwise I'd be overwhelmed."

Although Atlanta will be home for Rosenberg until after the Olympics are over, he still finds time for his family. "She has been wonderful," Rosenberg said of his wife Alice, who will join him when the Olympics begin and serve on his staff as a volunteer. "We have a son in school near Atlanta and we make an effort to see each other at least twice a month."

The judo competition will be held in the Georgia World Congress Center. Rosenberg marvels at the site's capacity and structure.

"The building has eight convention centers, three of those serve as international broadcast centers and five are used for sports-related venues. It's an extraordinary place to have the judo competition," Rosenberg said.

The Olympic village opens July 6, 1996, with the training scheduled to begin July 7. Until then Rosenberg will be hard at work making sure the judo competition runs smoothly once the Olympics begin.

"It's a wonderful opportunity and I plan on having lots of fun," said Rosenberg. "It's an honor to have been chosen for competition manager and I'm confident this will be a great Olympics with judo playing a major role in its success."
