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## Blocked Kick Saves Day For Eagles In Saturday's Game

### Paul Adams, Center, Saves Day For 2,500 Homecomers

Things looked dubious for a few seconds in the last quarter of the Eagle-Maroon game as the powerful Eastern eleven pushed across six points and lined up to attempt the conversion, but Paul Adams, ace center, blocked the kick and the day was saved for 2,500 Homecomers last Saturday as the Eagles won 7-6.

Twice during the second period the Morehead aggregation pushed down into the Maroons inch line, but did not have the final spark to fire over the touchdown losing the ball on downs both times. The Eagle score came in the closing minute of the third frame when Bennie Vanzell galloped behind excellent blocking 38 yards for a winning six points following thru with a minute with a pole-firm kick for the extra point — the determining factor in saving the game it turned out.

Desperate for blood the Maroons pushed down the field in the last quarter getting into scoring territory for the first time during the melee as "Spider" Thurman, elusive Eastern back, led an attack that finally culminated in a touchdown after numerous Eagle injuries weakened them to such an extent that they were unable to back up the line.

For the Johnson-Miller combine Vanzell, Lastic and Varney shone in the back-field with Smith, Rose and Radjans doing great work on the Morehead forward wall. Schuster, Yeager and Thurman sparked the Maroon offense.

One of the highlights of the day was the performance of the Eagle band paced by Bill Mayhew, drum major who mounted a twelve foot platform and went through his antics during the intermission.

### Manager Hall Foils Thieves At Trail Theatre Sunday Evening

An attempted robbery of the Trail Theatre, the second in a year's time, was foiled by Manager Pete Hall Sunday evening when the marauders fled at his approach.

According to Hall, who heard noises up-stairs when "there should not have been anyone in the theatre," the safe in his office was up-set by the trespassers, but they didn't have enough time to open it before their fleeing which was assisted by running over the stage of the Eagle Pool Room adjoining the theatre.

No trace of the persons has been found.

## An Editorial

Tuesday the voters of Kentucky will go to the polls to select their Governor for the ensuing four years. The campaign between Governor Johnson and Judge King Swope has finally resolved itself into a battle of qualifications of the two candidates for this high office.

Governor Johnson is unquestionably the better fitted of the two. His practical experience with State affairs during his term as lieutenant governor, his knowledge of the needs of the State through his working with the Senate as their presiding officer, his even-tempered temperament fit him in every way to assume the duties facing the chief executive.

Keen Johnson may not make a flashy governor by his own admittance. But his sincerity of purpose, his intelligence and understanding of the importance and scope of his job will make him the only logical choice for Governor.

## Baptist Evangelist Speaking On World Conditions

Dr. Selus E. Tull, evangelist, who is preaching in revival services at the Baptist Church this week, is giving special attention to the Gospel as it relates to world conditions at this time. Monday night of this week he turned to these subjects as he spoke on "Perilous Times," applying the phrase in the Scripture to the present time. He showed how the breakdown of character and integrity in national and international affairs, the political and social world, has produced the perilous times which mark the world of shame which he said we are now living in.

Such subjects as "The Antichrist" and "The Secret of the Christian" characterize trend of discussions this week, with special emphasis on the plan of salvation as projected by God into what Dr. Tull calls a "Devil-controlled" world.

Large crowds attended these services which began Sunday, October 22nd. Dr. Tull will speak at 10:30 and 7:15 o'clock each day this week, closing Sunday night.

## Mt. Sterling Tobacco Show Scheduled For November 18th

The Mt. Sterling Board of Trade will hold a tobacco show and contest at the Farmer's Warehouse at Mt. Sterling on Saturday, November 18th. This is the first time in history that a special exhibit has been organized for the purpose of featuring the practical tobacco grower from Rowan county and other counties from eastern and east central Kentucky. Rowan growers produce good tobacco, but this is the first time they have had the opportunity to show their product at an exhibit, especially prepared for them.

Fifty-thirty premiums ranging from \$2 to \$25 in cash will be awarded at the exhibit. The grower may enter one of the classes with as little as 3 hands or about one pound of tobacco, and he may enter every class in the show with 21 hands or about 10 pounds of tobacco. Four premiums in each class are offered for a class of Tab, a class of Lugs, and a class of Bright Leaf. In addition there is a special class for 3 hands of Tab, one of Flyers, Trash, Lugs, and Bright Leaf. Four premiums are offered in this class. There is also a Grand Championship class

Ellis Johnson, head coach, is taking no chances with his boys and has been working them hard all week for the Williamson tilt.

"Concord will be no set-up and we can't believe in taking any chances," Johnson said this morning. Johnson was formerly connected with the Williamson high school where he coached several years before taking over the reins at Morehead.

## White Has No Opponent For District Judgeship

Interest of Rowan countians centers for the next few days toward Tuesday's election with local races occupying as much of the spotlight as State races.

Keen Johnson, carrying the banner of the democratic party, heads a list of candidates almost certain to ride into office with him in the event of his election, opposes King Swope, Fayette county judge, in the major State race with most interest concentrated on some of the minor State offices.

W. Bridges White has no opposition in his race for the Circuit Judgeship running on both democratic and republican tickets. J. Sidney Caudel, democrat, opposes E. C. Kindrell for the office of Commonwealth's Attorney and J. J. Thomas, Owsingville, carries the democratic bid against Woody Hinton, Morehead, for the State senatorship.

Running for the representative of the 96th district is democrat V. E. Green opposed by S. M. Bradley.

In the race for Circuit Court Clerk Joe McKinney, incumbent, is running against J. B. Rose, democrat.

In the Clerk of the Court of Appeals race L. Lee Stewart, Republican is matched against Charles C. Connell, democrat from Louisville.

J. H. Adams has no opposition in his race for constable in District 1.

His interest is being manifested in the city council race where H. C. Haggan, John Will Hobcock, Virgil Wolford, Oscar Patrick, H. C. Barker and Austin Riddie compete for the basis of their progressive ticket are opposed by the Citizens Ticket comprised of H. C. Haggan, Harry Goldberg, Sam Caskey, Frank Havens, Otis Carr and Ed Fannin.

H. C. Haggan is running on both the Progressive and the Citizens tickets.

### Morehead Teacher Discusses Farming

#### Duty of Teacher To Examine All Details

The business of teaching vocational agriculture gives the teacher a chance to visit many farms in a county. While visiting, the boys who are regularly enrolled in All-Day classes of agriculture, the teacher gets to see the home and observe farming conditions of that farm and neighborhood.

In visiting a farm, it is the duty of a teacher to examine every detail of the farm as far as possible without being too inquisitive, in order to help the farmer solve his immediate problems.

The type of a farmer's man is can be judged by this observation and this is not to be destructive criticism of any one. No one person is in mind. The following things will give clues to facts: 1. How the Homestead appears, conditions of the house, surroundings, conditions of the outbuildings. The amount of paint used on the buildings and the use of white wash. The farm fences are important on a farm, condition of gates, driveway, barn lot, and the barn. Farm tools that have been used the past summer are usually on the outside some where in the barn lot, or in a fence corner.

The list above is as important to a farm as it can be. It is part of it, and if these things are not cared for, the appearance or attractiveness of a farm is gone. I have mentioned these things to show you how we sometimes let important things go until they cost money.

If your home conditions can be improved by mending, repair work, fencing and so on, now would be an excellent time to start on these odd jobs. Farmers should have all their machinery in the dry, with oil on used parts to prevent rusting and be in good condition for the next spring use. A rusty Maldboard's not pleasant to deal with at all.

I am very much interested in Home Beautification and will be glad to help plan or suggest to any one in order to help improve our farm homes.

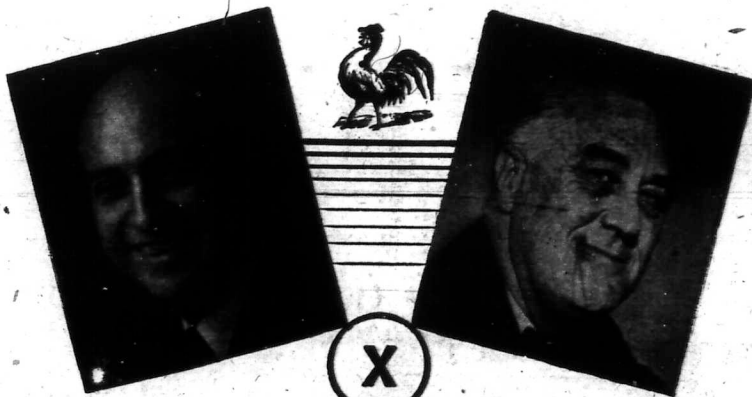
