MOREHEAD, Ky.---While going to school is no laughing matter, Morehead State University students will get some comic relief before classes begin this fall.

On Monday, Aug. 14, comedian AJ Jamal will talk about his family as well as "Mr. Fix-it Man" and "CoCo the Cooking King" at 9:15 p.m. in Button Auditorium. Renee Hicks, described as "bold, beguiling and bald" will ask the audience to question their own personal quirks on Thursday, Aug. 17, at the same time and location.

Both programs, sponsored by MSU's Student Government Association and Student Activities Council, are free and open to the public.

A Cleveland, Ohio, native, Jamal claims he was put on the earth to make people laugh. From the typical class clown to the "human volcano of wit," he provides entertainment that is appropriate for all ages complete with spinning, splitting, twisting and his trademark "A.J. Bounce."

Jamal is a graduate of Kent State University where he received a bachelor's degree in television and radio. He spent two years at Cleveland State University's engineering school before being recruited by IBM where he worked as a computer engineer.

Deciding to follow his dream of becoming a stand-up comic, Jamal moved to Los Angeles in the late 1980s. He went on tour with Diana Ross and The Temptations, opened for Kenny Loggins and Aretha Franklin, and made television appearances on the Arsenio Hall Show, Comic Relief, MTV's 1/2 Hour Comedy Hour and Showtime with Jerry Seinfeld.

The early 1990s saw Jamal as a cast member on Fox's In Living Color which lead to hosting his own show Comic Justice on Comedy Central.

Hicks also talks about family and friends in her comedy routine where she tries to "open the soul to laughter while opening the mind to understanding." A frequent visitor to college and university campuses across the U.S., she made more than 150 stops on her 1993-94 tour.

Among the television shows to her credit are Comic Strip Live, Two Drink Minimum, Stand-up Spotlight, Evening at the Improv and Caroline's Comedy Hour. She also appeared on the sitcom Hangin' with Mr. Cooper and in the Keenan Ivory Wayans' film Low Down Dirty Shame.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Registration for Morehead State University's 1995 fall semester is scheduled Aug. 16-18, with some changes in the overall process.

On Wednesday, Aug. 16, only students with fewer than 30 hours and who advance registered, will pay their tuition/fees in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center. Class schedules will not be processed that day.

Wednesday's hours will be 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. for students with last names beginning with the letters A through K and from 3 to 6 p.m. for the L through Z group.

On Thursday and Friday, Aug. 17-18, students will develop class schedules in their academic departments. Those who have not declared a major will go to 233 Allie Young to schedule classes.

Sophomores and juniors only may pay their tuition/fees on Aug. 17 in the Crager Room, ADUC. The hours will be 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. for those with last names beginning with the letters A through K and from 1 to 4:30 p.m. for the L through Z group.

On Friday, Aug. 18, seniors and graduate students will be admitted to the Crager Room for tuition/fee payment.

Undergraduate students who have not previously been admitted or were not enrolled last spring or during either summer term, will need to begin the registration process at the Admissions Office, 301 Howell-McDowell. For graduate students, that stop is 701 Ginger Hall.

Registration at MSU's Ashland Area, Big Sandy and Licking Valley Extended Campus Centers and the Appalachian Graduate Consortium will be conducted from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Aug. 17 and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Aug. 18.

The registration period for classes at Jackson, Maysville, Mt. Sterling and Whitesburg will be from 5 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 17 only.

All MSU classes, including evening and off-campus, will begin meeting on Monday, Aug. 21.

Schedule adjustments will be processed without charge Aug. 17-23 in the student's major department. Effective Thursday, Aug. 24, drop-adds will be done in the Office of the Registrar, 201 Ginger Hall, with a \$10 fee in effect.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has announced that Stephen Tyler Staggs of Mt. Olivet is among those students receiving a Morehead State University Award for the fall semester.

Staggs, son of Gary and Marcella Staggs, is a graduate of Deming High School where he was valedictorian of the senior class. A sports enthusiast, he was a member of the Class "A" All-Tournament Basketball Teams and his school's varsity basketball team as well as the all-area, all-region and all-state teams. Listed in "Who's Who Among High School Students" and "Who's Who in High School Sports," he was a member of the Class "A" All-Academic Teams and received the Outstanding Math Award.

To be eligible for the Morehead State University Award, applicants must be admitted to MSU as an entering freshman or transfer student; have an Admissions Index of at least 550; transfer students must have at least a 3.00 grade point average (on a 4.00 scale) for the equivalent of at least one full term, and submit a completed scholarship application to MSU.

The scholarship, valued at \$1,200 per year, is renewable for three academic years if a 2.75 g.p.a. is maintained during each of the first two semesters and a minimum cumulative 3.00 g.p.a. for each semester thereafter. Transfer students must maintain a minimum cumulative 3.00 g.p.a. for each semester.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—With summer nearly over it's time to get back to the routine of exercise.

Morehead State University's Office of Community Development and Continuing Education is sponsoring classes in water and step aerobics scheduled to begin in early August.

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
MSU STUDENTS TO RETURN TO CAMPUS

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Betty Porter, professor of nursing at Morehead State University, has been named chair of the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences. She previously held the post from 1983 to 1992 when she returned to full time teaching.

Dr. Porter was appointed to the leadership role in mid-July, according to Dr. Gerald DeMoss, dean of the College of Science and Technology.

"We are very fortunate to have such a qualified individual to head the department," said Dr. DeMoss in announcing the appointment. "Dr. Porter's administrative experience, along with her knowledge of MSU's nursing programs, are important assets to the department and the students we serve."

A native of Greenup County, Dr. Porter is responsible for guiding the University's two-year and four-year nursing programs as well as an associate degree program in radiologic technology.

Dr. Porter taught at MSU from 1971 to 1979 before leaving for additional education, returning in 1983 as head of the department.

A graduate of MSU where she earned bachelor's, master's and Ed.S. degrees, Dr. Porter received M.S.N. and Ed.D. degrees from the University of Kentucky's College of Nursing. On Aug. 1, she completed the Post Graduate Scholars Program at UK in the Family Nurse Practitioner Program.

Active in numerous professional organizations, Dr. Porter is currently a member of the Kentucky Nurses Association, American Nurses Association, National League of Nursing, Kentucky League of Nursing, American Medical Association Auxiliary, Kentucky Medical Association Auxiliary and Sigma Theta Tau, national honor society in nursing, and Morehead State University Baccalaureate Nursing Program's Honor Society.

She has presented several workshops covering topics of relevance to the nursing profession. In addition, she has attended more than 60 conferences/presentations dealing with nursing education and parent-child nursing.

Listed in "Who's Who in American Nursing," Dr. Porter was the recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award from the former School of Applied Sciences and Technology and received the Kentucky League for Nursing Nurse Educator of the Year Award in 1986.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—The 1995 graduating class of Morehead State University's Veterinary Technology Program achieved a 100 percent passage rate after taking the Veterinary Technician National Examination.

All 13 members of the class, who sat for the licensing exam in June, earned passing scores, according to Dr. Lee Tyner, coordinator of the program.

"This tells a lot about the character of our program. We are very proud of our students and the faculty," Dr. Tyner said. "This achievement, along with reaccreditation by the American Veterinary Medical Association, has made this year one to be remembered."

This summer the students are completing preceptorships, which is the final requirement prior to receiving their degrees. "They will be qualified to be licensed as veterinary technicians in most states, while a few states have additional requirements," Dr. Tyner said.

Graduates of MSU's Veterinary Technology Program are qualified to assist in all areas of veterinary work. The coursework is designed to ensure adequate skills in clinical practice and laboratory testing in such areas as surgical assisting, anesthesia, radiology, clinical pathology and other veterinary medicine-related practices.

Graduates of the two-and-a-half year program earn the Associate of Applied Sciences degree.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's MSUCorps is one of nine programs in the state to share \$2.5 million in federal funding under the national service initiative, AmeriCorps.

Gov. Brereton C. Jones visited the MSU campus last week to announce the 1995-96 funding of \$427,800 for the University's program which will enable MSUCorps to serve additional Eastern Kentucky counties.

Noting that Kentucky's AmeriCorps programs had received \$2.5 million this year in comparison to the 1994-95 figure of \$1.4 million, Jones said that this was a result of the state's successful efforts over the past year.

"We must continue to invest in programs like AmeriCorps that are successful," he said. "Notice that I say invest, not spend, because there's a difference," the governor added.

In accepting the grant on the University's behalf, MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin said that the AmeriCorps and MSUCorps programs exemplify the ideals of people helping people.

At its inception last year, MSU's program, one of six in the state, received a \$239,177 grant from the Corporation for National Service through Kentucky's Community Service Commission.

MSUCorps, launched in fall 1994 as a three-year effort, is designed to improve the level of educational success by high risk school children through a comprehensive program of tutoring, mentoring and other services to those students and their families.

"We have been very pleased with the outstanding results generated by the program and the cooperation we received during our first year," said Steve Swim, MSUCorps coordinator. "The additional funding makes it possible for us to increase our tutors and mentors for the program's expansion," he added.

This year, the University's program will serve 13 counties, rather than eight as in last year, working through 30 Family Resource and Youth Services Centers in those counties.

New service counties include Boyd, Elliott, Fleming, Johnson, Lawrence and Morgan, while efforts continue in Bath, Carter, Lewis, Magoffin, Menifee, Montgomery and Rowan.

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
GOV. JONES ANNOUNCES MSUCORPS FUNDING INCREASE

MOREHEAD, Ky.----Morehead State University has established an Office of Recruitment and Retention to strengthen cooperation between admissions counselors and the faculty and to coordinate campuswide student retention efforts.

"It is important that we not just admit students, but that we develop a continuum of contacts through various retention strategies to assist students in being successful in their college careers," said Dr. John C. Philley, MSU's executive vice president for academic affairs.

"We believe the Office of Recruitment and Retention is a step toward coordinating our efforts in this direction," Dr. Philley said.

Dr. Beverly McCormick, a faculty member from the College of Business, will head the new academic affairs unit as the interim assistant vice president for recruitment and retention.

Assisting her in recruitment efforts will be Dan Cornett, a veteran admissions officer, who has been named MSU's director of admissions.

"Dr. McCormick brings to this post not only enthusiasm and some innovative ideas, but also an important perspective, that of the faculty," Dr. Philley said. "Mr. Cornett's years of experience with the admissions process will be an asset as they begin this new venture," he added.

Dr. McCormick, a professor of real estate, just completed two years as interim dean of College of Business and has been a faculty member since 1985. A former Faculty Senate chair, she earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Kentucky and the J.D. degree from the University of Louisville.

A frequent workshop presenter for various professional and educational agencies, Dr. McCormick is recognized as a Designated Real Estate Instructor by the Real Estate Educators Association, a national organization in which she is an officer.

Cornett, an MSU staff member since 1979, fills a vacancy created with the retirement of the former director, Charles Myers. He joined the admissions staff in 1987 as assistant director and later was named associate director. Cornett previously served as associate registrar.

Cornett earned his bachelor's and two master's degrees as well as the Rank I in secondary education from MSU. He is a member of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers and its Kentucky affiliate.

"Our goal," Dr. McCormick said, "is to not merely admit students, but also to help them with the transition into college and track them through to graduation. Throughout the year we will be launching new recruitment and retention strategies, but to do this successfully, we will need the involvement of the faculty and all offices across the campus," she added.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Because the world is ever changing, students must be prepared to compete for the jobs of the future in business and industry.

That was the message delivered by three business leaders who took time from their respective jobs to offer some advice to Morehead State University personnel today (Aug. 16).

Joining MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin for a panel discussion at the annual faculty and staff convocation to kick off the academic year were:

J. Dan Lacy, vice president for corporate communications at Ashland, Inc., and immediate past chair of the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education;

Glenn Leveridge, executive vice president of Trust & Investment Management Unit, Bank One in Lexington and a member of the Council on Higher Education;

John Mays, chairman of the board of First American Bank of Ashland.

The trio, who are active professionally and civically, are all MSU graduates.

Lacy urged the faculty to be aware of what is happening in the business world. "Change is occurring at such a much faster pace--primarily because of technology--that we must continuously polish and hone our skills, constantly change the way we do business."

Comparing the work place of the '60s to the present day, Lacy said that the thrust of individuals has been replaced by teams, cooperation has replaced competition, and quality and customer satisfaction have replaced winning.

Lacy suggested that to be prepared for the 21st century we might consider "teaching our children practical knowledge and theory but also help them to understand and apply flexibility, innovation, problem solving, teamwork and communication skills."

Noting that most people have the perception that higher education is not fulfilling the needs of students, Lacy asked the group to consider the beliefs of critics and plan accordingly to meet those challenges.

Change is evident on both the corporate side and the education arm, according to Leveridge.

"No longer are you rewarded for attendance but you are rewarded for performance and everything is measurable and accountable," he said of the corporate world. "No longer do you wait for annual reviews but these are done on a quarterly basis.

"We challenge our staff as to whether they want to be victims or navigators or survivors," Leveridge said.

Change is a continual process which must be dealt with, according to Mays. "It will be there whether we like it or not, but we need to learn how to become sponsors of that change and change it into our direction to make it beneficial to us."

Agreeing with his fellow panel members, Mays listed information technology, problem solving, communications and sales as being of utmost importance for survival in the future.

In his comments to the group, Dr. Eaglin listed MSU's campus being named among the safest in the nation, accreditation of the College of Business and reaccreditation of the Veterinary Technology Program among the highlights of the last year. He then issued a challenge to the faculty and staff members for the coming year:

"Know what is out there and how we can change what we do to make it understandable and useable in the next millennium."


