Annual Rally To Be Held March 4; Candidates To Have Own Orators

Morehead's largest and best attended program, the annual Winter Carnival, will be held March 16, in the College gym with a king and queen, selected by popular vote, and a series of twenty-five names and twenty-five cents to the cause.

According to Miss Ezer Robinson, chairman of the social committee, names of candidates for king and queen should be submitted by the first of March.

The annual rally will be held March 4, at 7 p.m. in the college auditorium. Each candidate will be entitled to one golden-tongued speech, and the winner will be elected by their respective group for a period not exceeding five minutes.

We Will Not Fight In Europe

Beginning in this issue, THE TRAIL BLAZER joins its sister papers in Kentucky in a national movement designed to promote the cause of permanent peace and strictest neutrality in contrast to the situation abroad, and to fight the insidious propagandists now clamoring for war with the United States as the scapegoat.

Originating at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, with Stanley Frankel as national chairman, this movement, called the College Front for Peace, is being embraced by collegiate papers over the entire country.

Main goals which the Peace Front advocates are: (1) making college students conscious of the fact that they will fight and die in the next war; (2) that public opinion is a deciding

factor in any governmental action and we, the college students of today, form a vital part of that public; (3) that students must rid themselves of the defeatist attitude—we don't have to become involved.

College students, if the United States enters the war abroad, stand to gain much. We will gain the loss of our lives, or if we are unlucky, just a few crippled limbs or a maimed body. We will gain the deaths of our mothers, wives, and sweethearts. We will gain the destruction of our homes and the loss of our jobs. We will gain the post-war depression which is sure to follow. We will gain another step forward for fascism, communism, and a host of other "isms."

Once our country attempted these gains and what a costly mistake it was. Hundreds of thousands of young men sacrificed to the tune of making the world safe for democracy—a tune which blinded us to seeing the real reason for war profiteering.

So, students, if these "gains" are not so appealing, make your stand. Take a firm footing on the ground yet unstained with blood, and cry, "We will not fight in Europe."

What Students Don't Know

Some students wander aimlessly through college, not knowing that there are regulations which must be considered before the bestowal of the certificate on degree. Few ever realize until they are seniors that a major blank should be filled out by the time they are sophomores, and that this is the junior year. These blanks are secured at the registrar's office, and are to be checked and taken to the head of the department in which you are majoring.

How many know that for each unexcused absence one-half percent is deducted from your standing? Absences immediately before and after holidays are counted as double cuts in the class record. When the number of cuts is any course equals the number of credit hours in that course, the student must take a special examination, for which a fee of two dollars is charged.

To drop a class, just see the dean, secure a "drop" card, take it to the professor whose course you are discontinuing, get his signature and return the card to the dean's office.
