College Basketers Trimmed By 26-12 Score; Breck Wins 25-23

While the Morehead State College Eagles were busy losing to the Transylvania Pioneers at Lexington 26-12 Tuesday night, the protégés of Bobby Langhins were trying to even up the evening's dirt by conquering the Winchester Shawnees 25-23 at Winchester, fifteen miles away from the scene of the Eagle slaughter.  
The Pioneers turned Indian for the night and completely scalped the hapless and so far-winsless Eagles who have never been able to get under way so far this season on succumbing to Holbrook, Wilmington and Transylvania.  
The Breck battle was close fought throughout the game with the Shawnees threatening to overcome a Thinius lead of 16-10 at the half-way mark.  
Johnson paced the Eagles with eleven points and Guy was high for the Shawnees with eight tales.  
In the preliminary game the Winchester "B" team whipped the Breck reserves 23-9.

## Large Crowd Witnesses Johnson's Inauguration

Makes Promise That Commonwealth Will Strive To Live Within Its Income During Next Four Years

### Noted Authority To Speak Monday



**DR. R. H. CROSSFIELD**  
One of the most distinguished men to address a Morehead College assembly is to speak at assembly Monday morning, December 18, at ten o'clock.

Dr. R. H. Crossfield, president-elect of Transylvania University, will speak on the subject, "Problems of a Modern World."

The public has been invited to hear this speech which is under the auspices of G. C. Blanks, of the College English department.

Dr. Crossfield is past president of Transylvania, Hamilton College, Lexington, the College of the Bible and William Woods College of Fulton, Missouri.

Dr. Crossfield was president of the college of the Bible at the time that Dr. Franks was a student there.

A world-wide traveler, the Monday-spoken is a noted authority upon the problems of Japan and Scandinavia.

The promise to make Kentucky a great governor was made Tuesday by Elen Johnson, Richmond publisher, as he took oath for a four-year term.

He succeeded himself, having served since October 9 as the successor to A. B. Chandler, who resigned to accept appointment as United States Senator.

Gov. Johnson promised to respect a mandate of the people against increased tax burdens. Stressing his purpose to keep expenses within the means of the Commonwealth he would propose legislation to provide increased aid to the needy aged and funds to make operative the Teachers Retirement Act.

"Measured by her tax resources," he said, "Kentucky is a relatively poor State in the economic scale. We thus can afford less debt than our richer neighbors. So we are pledged to keep the State's expenses within the State's income and to reduce the State debt."

He frowned on any diversion of the highway fund and importuned the General Assembly to take a State-wide view of legislation.

"I earnestly plead with you," he said, "to support your Governor as he insists that there be applied to all legislation the simple but accurate test: 'Is it for the best interest of all Kentucky without operating to the detriment of any section?'"

From a huge, festooned platform in front of the new Capitol, with State dignitaries and officials around them, Governor Johnson and Rufus K. Meade, the auditor, started their terms as Governor and Lieutenant-Governor.

The flag-decked Capitol Ave., with its lines of green down the center, spread a vista down which there were jammed thousands and thousands of spectators, all trying to get as close to the parade as they could. Some in the more venturesome spirits in the gathering found a way to get onto the lofty Capital roof and perch on its ledges to watch the festivities.

Miss Humphrey took her mother to Illinois, her home state, for burial.
