MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library has been chosen as a FirstSearch Pilot Project site for the next six months.

FirstSearch is available through the Library's on-line catalog. Library patrons may use FirstSearch's 17 databases to locate journal and magazine articles, books, and facts and statistics on a topic.

Training sessions, which are free and open to faculty, staff and students, will be conducted during March in 201 CCL. The schedule is:

Mondays: March 4, March 25 and April 1, 7 to 8 p.m.;

Wednesdays: March 6, March 20 and March 27, 1:50 to 2:50 p.m.;

Thursdays: March 7, March 21 and March 28, 3 to 4 p.m.

FirstSearch is an electronic information service providing on-line access to popular databases, according to Teresa Welch, CCL's on-line services coordinator. "Users can conduct in-depth subject searches, compile comprehensive bibliographies and locate hard-to-find document materials," she said.

Some of the databases include:

*WorldCat, the world's largest and most comprehensive computer card catalog with 33 million bibliographic records worldwide from which to choose;

*EBSCOMags Full Text, offering the full text of articles from more than 2,000 periodical titles;

*Article First, with more than 2.5 million citations describing articles in more than 14,000 journals, and

*NetFirst, the Internet finding-aid with more than 50,000 summaries and subject citations describing Internet resources.

MSU will offer this service until July 31, Welch noted. Additional information is available from CCL's reference department at 783-2251.

Jones, who earned his bachelor's degree from MSU in 1974, had served as the board's vice chair since 1994. First appointed as a regent in 1992, Jones recently headed the board's Student Life and External Relations.

A sales representative for Jack Kain Ford of Versailles, Ky., Jones is a past president of the MSU Alumni Association and a former board member of the MSU Foundation, Inc.

Jones is not the first MSU Pi Kappa Phi alumnus to have a high profile at the University. Another MSU alumnus and Pi Kap brother, Michael Mincey, serves as the University's vice president for Student Life.

MOREHEAD, Ky.----Former Gov. Brereton C. Jones will receive an honorary doctoral degree from Morehead State University at Spring Commencement on May 11.

Meeting Friday, March 1, the MSU Board of Regents approved awarding Jones the honorary degree of Doctor of Public Service for his demonstrated love of the state and his sensitivity to the needs of the people and institutions of Eastern Kentucky.

During his term, Jones proved himself to be a friend of MSU and its 22-county service region by endorsing a number of projects affecting the area. Among his most significant contributions to higher education was his support of landmark legislation overhauling the process for appointing members to institutional governing boards and the Council for Higher Education.

Also during the meeting, the University received a \$28,202 check as a GTE Focus Grant from the GTE Corporation. The award is one of 15 funded nationally and one of two awarded within Kentucky. The grant program is designed to assist professors in working to encourage minorities within their community to enter the fields of math, science or engineering. MSU's proposal was written by Dr. Lemuel Berry Jr., dean of the Caudill College of Humanities. Representing GTE were Robert Williams of Lexington, regional public affairs manager, and Bronnie Preece of Morehead, manager of Kentucky's Eastern District.

In other business, the regents initiated steps to declare several pieces of University-owned real property as surplus for disposal under the state statutes. The property includes 41.7 acres two miles east of the main campus on U.S. 60 which was formerly a trailer park; a faculty/staff housing complex north of downtown Morehead and another residence on Fifth Street known as the Home Management House. Proceeds from the sale of the properties will go into the University's Fund for Excellence, administered by the state, and the interest from the fund will be applied to other needs of the University, primarily for academic programs, according to Porter Dailey, MSU vice president for administration and fiscal services.

The board also elected the following officers for the coming year: L. M. "Sonny" Jones of Frankfort, chair; Buckner Hinkle Jr. of Lexington, vice chair, and Carol Johnson of Morehead, secretary. Dailey was appointed by the board to serve as treasurer.

Expansion of a lease for the Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in West Liberty was ratified. MSU has leased part of building owned by Frederick and May Lumber Company for classroom and office space for the center since 1987. With the additional space, the regents were told, the center will be able to reduce--but not totally eliminate--its dependency on space at the local high school.

In addition to providing more traditional classroom areas, the space will enable the center to have a distance learning classroom. The additional space will add \$17,538 to the current annual lease cost of \$31,093.

Also approved was an amendment to MSU's 1996-98 Capital Budget Request to change the Big Sandy Extended Campus Center request from lease/purchase of a new facility to sharing space within a new facility to be constructed on Prestonsburg Community College's campus.

The board approved extending eligibility for MSU's Alumni Grant program to grandchildren of degreed alumni who meet specific criteria. The original grant program was launched in the 1986-87 school year and now includes about 300 second generation students. The grants are renewable through four years of undergraduate study.

Long-standing loyalty and support by the Crosthwait(e) family of Rowan County was recognized as the regents designated a courtyard between Rader and Ginger Halls as Crosthwait Plaza. In a related action, the board approved the naming of a College of Business conference room as the Harold and Barbara White Conference Room to recognize not only their service to MSU but also their leadership in the forest products industry at the state and national level.

In other action, the board granted tenure to 10 faculty members, accepted the second quarter financial statement, ratified a series of personnel actions and approved a policy on alcohol and controlled substance testing for drivers to bring MSU in line with a federal act.

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
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MSU RECEIVES GTE FOCUS GRANT

He has studied with Lucien Lavallotte and Marcel Moyse and coached privately with Pablo Casals and performed the Mozart flute concerti at the Mostly Mozart Festival.

A faculty member at Brooklyn College Conservatory and Catholic University, he is music director and conductor of the McKeesport (Penn.) Symphony Orchestra.

Goldberg's campus appearance was made possible in part through a grant from United Musical Instruments U.S.A., Inc., and Don Wilson Music in Lexington.

McNeill completed a Master of Music degree at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music where she studied with Kenneth Griffiths and Sandra Rivers. She earned a bachelor's degree from MSU where she won the MSU Concerto Competition in 1989, the A. Frank Gallaher Memorial Music Performance Competition in 1990, and was chosen by the faculty to receive the Outstanding Undergraduate in Music Award in 1990 and 1991.

The award will be presented during the annual Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony on Friday, April 12, at 10:30 a.m. in Button Auditorium. Making the presentation will be L.M. "Sonny" Jones, chair of the University's Board of Regents.

Established in 1978 by the regents, the award is given annually to recognize those who have given superior service over the years to the University.

"As we also are celebrating the 30th anniversary of our University status, it is most fitting that we recognize Dr. Doran, who was president at that time and a key figure in the legislative effort," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "During the nearly 23 years that Dr. Doran headed this institution, MSU enjoyed unprecedented growth in its academic programs, facilities and student enrollment. Even in retirement, he has continued to be a friend and advocate of this institution," Dr. Eaglin added.

The featured speaker for the convocation will be former Gov. Edward T. Breathitt who signed the legislation which granted university status to MSU and three other regional institutions in 1966. Gov. Breathitt later was vice chair of the MSU Board of Regents.

As MSU's seventh president, Dr. Doran served from 1954 to 1977. A two-time graduate of Murray State University with a doctorate in education from the University of Kentucky, he served four terms in the Kentucky House of Representative, including one as Speaker of the House. A former newspaper editor, Dr. Doran also was an administrator with the Kentucky Department of Education.

Active nationally, Dr. Doran attended two White House Conferences on Education, a White House Conference on Education of the Disadvantaged, served on the National Advisory Council on Education Professions Development and was a member of the Appalachian Regional Commission's Advisory Committee on Education.

When not in class, Gaines assumes a different role, one with more responsibilities than that of the average student.

The 22-year old sophomore and her husband Anthony are parents of three young boys: Anthony Wayne II, 3 years; Thomas DeyVaughn, 2 years, and Christopher-Jaymes LaVelle, 4 months. They also are legal guardians for her two brothers, Lenard McDonald, 15, a sophomore at Rowan County Senior High School, and Lamont Dwayne McDonald, 13, a seventh grader at Rowan County Middle School.

What advice does she give for living in a home with six males? "You should try to have fun," Gaines said. She has been looking after her brothers since she was seven, and now with her own children, she believes she has a "chance to grow up with them."

The "family" is an important theme in the Gaines household. The older boys have chores and must make good grades in order to play football. They also assist in the care of the younger ones. Her goal is to provide an opportunity for each of the boys to be something. "It's important to keep them focused," she said. "When a situation does arise, the punishment must always be consistent," she added, noting that her brothers have always shown her respect.

And keeping things running smoothly is something she works toward every day. One way the family avoids stressful situations is by participating in group discussions at least three times a week. "At 'family time', everyone has a chance to voice an opinion about whatever concerns them," she said.

While her schedule is busy, Gaines has no regrets. Instead, she emphasizes that one should always keep a positive attitude. When something doesn't go like she had hoped, there is not time to fret, it's on to the next task at hand. "These things just make me stronger; they make me feel good about my life," she said.

For Gaines, the day begins with morning classes. She doesn't have to worry about the younger children, however. Her husband, a graduate student majoring in adult and higher education, spends this time with the boys where he home schools Anthony and Thomas.

Her afternoons are filled with homework, taking care of the children and other obligations that are typical of a college student, Gaines notes. She is active in the Black Gospel Ensemble and performs with the group. For the past several months, she has been working toward organizing a non-traditional minority student association on campus.

Gaines has personal reasons for this new undertaking. "When I first came to the campus, I didn't know anyone that I could turn to for support," she said. It is her wish that the student organization will alleviate that anxiety for other students.

"It's important to have self confidence," Gaines said. For her, that translates into striving to achieve one's goals.

While a student at Withrow High School in Cincinnati, Ohio, Gaines participated in the Upward Bound program where she received encouragement and mentoring from its group leaders. When she graduated in the top 10 percent of her class, she decided, from among 23 scholarships she could have accepted, on Morehead State. She was going to study law.

Once on the campus, Gaines realized being a secondary education and English major appealed to her more.

After taking off last semester for the birth of her youngest son, Gaines is now back in class and involved in other activities as well. Along with school obligations, she and her family make bi-monthly treks to northern Kentucky where her husband is an associate minister at United Community Christian Church, 1710 Maryland Avenue in Covington.

Talking with Gaines one quickly realizes she would like to do more if only she had some extra time.

A constitution has already been submitted for consideration, Gaines said. Once it is approved, officers will be elected.

The purpose of the new group would be to lend support, according to Gaines. "Whether its giving a student a lift to the grocery store or just to have someone to talk to, the need is there."

Gaines has been working closely with others at MSU who have experience in working with students, such as Jacquelyn H. Scott, non-traditional and commuter coordinator who is an adviser for the Non-Traditional Eagle Society, and Jerry Gore, director of Minority Student Affairs.

"This has been a sharing of resources and activities," Scott said. "The non-traditional minority student association coordinated a Valentine's Day party for children of all MSU students."

According to Gore, the organization is taking shape because of Gaines' desire to help others. "She is aware of the students' concerns and is trying to make improvements that will pay dividends in their lives," he said.

A number of activities are in the works with the next scheduled program to be a "Power Luncheon," set for Saturday, March 30, in the Commonwealth Room, Adron Doran University Center.

Because of the number of single African American parents on campus, the program will deal with morale, self-esteem and other issues that are of importance, Gaines said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Rosemary Carlson, associate professor of finance at Morehead State University, has the distinction of teaching the first on-line class in the state of Kentucky, according to Dr. Autumn Grubb-Swetnam, director of distance learning.

Dr. Carlson, who has been teaching at MSU since 1983, is teaching Finance 660, Financial Management, on the Internet as part of the College of Business' redesigned Master of Business Administration degree program.

Teaching classes via the Internet is not a new concept. It allows many beneficial experiences for both the students and the instructor that the traditional classroom environment cannot provide.

"A class offered on the Internet allows students in many area of the world to participate, those who cannot come to this area," said Dr. Carlson, who describes herself as a computer person. "I have a student in the class who lives in Korea. He is a businessman who wants to learn more about U.S. management. He found out about the course through the Internet," she added.

The other 27 students in the course live in Pikeville, Lexington and many areas in between. (To receive credit for the course, all students must enroll at the University, be accepted into the graduate program and pay tuition just as any other MSU student would.)

In addition to eliminating geographic constraints, time constraints are eliminated as well. "We don't all have to be here at once," said Charles Hensley, originally from Pineville, who is a graduate student enrolled in the course. "The professor and the students don't have to conform to the same schedule. We can work and study at whatever times are most convenient."

The greatest convenience, though, is that students will no longer have to quit jobs to work on their M.B.A. degrees. Hensley is on educational leave from his job at General Motors Saturn Corp. in Michigan, and would not have to have taken this step if more courses were offered on-line.

Both the students and Dr. Carlson enjoy the relative anonymity that corresponding via the Internet affords them. "My critiques of students' work feels less personal through the computer, and thus less intimidating. This allows me to get to know my students better, for the anonymity makes them feel less shy and more likely to ask questions that they might not ask in a classroom," said Dr. Carlson. Hensley agreed, and believes that this also makes it easier for students to get to know one another and allows greater interaction between the students, providing more opportunities for collaborative learning.

Students and instructor enjoy and are excited about the innovation of this learning experience, but are finding it somewhat time consuming. Dr. Carlson said it takes "forever" for her to respond to all of her e-mail, while Hensley said that homework is first of all done on paper and then keyed in, which with numbers is quite slow.

"I am learning computers and the Internet as well as finance," added Hensley. Dr. Carlson said that the Internet is quickly becoming essential to the business world, and this experience will help provide an edge for MSU grads. Also a variety of up-to-the-minute information on business is available through various World Wide Web sites and user groups. For example, stock market figures are available with only a 15-minute delay. Students also can make many good contacts, and there are places on the Internet where resumes can be posted.

As exciting as all this is, it is only a part of the recently reworked M.B.A. program. MSU faculty studied what businesses wanted of M.B.A. graduates, and structured the program to provide that. The curriculum was changed and the program made much more competitive with other similar programs.

The college's goal is to make the entire M.B.A. program available through Distance Learning, either via compressed video or the Internet, so that students may have the option of not having to quit jobs any more to earn a graduate degree. This will allow MSU's program to have a greater outreach and greater enrollment. Traditional classes will still be taught.

Dr. Carlson will continue to offer graduate finance courses on the Internet. In Summer I she will teach Financial markets (FIN 620) and in the fall Bank Management (FIN 625, a new class).

Also this fall, Dr. Robert Royar, assistant professor of English, will offer Technical Writing I (ENG 591) via the Internet. Dr. Royar previously taught at New York Institute of Technology, where complete programs were offered on the Internet, with typically small classes and conducted much like an independent study.

Dr. Carlson earned her B.A. degree from Morehead State University, and her M.B.A. and Doctor of Business Administration degrees from the University of Kentucky. A resident of Lexington, she has presented numerous papers at professional meetings throughout the nation.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---What started as friends singing together in college during the '60s has continued to the '90s and so has their music.

Five years ago, Dr. Steve Young, Harvey Pennington and Glenn Buckner combined their friendship and love of folk music to develop "Friends and Folk," a locally-produced, weekly radio show which airs on WMKY 90.3 F.M., public radio from Morehead State University.

The program is broadcast on Saturdays at 3 p.m. To celebrate the show's fifth anniversary, a special two-hour show is set for Saturday, April 6.

"It's amazing that the three of us have been able to put up with each other for the last five years," said Dr. Young, "Friends and Folk" producer and co-host, adding, "And probably, it's more amazing that our listeners have put up with us for this long."

Buckner, also a co-host, said of the show: "It gives us the opportunity to get together each week, a little pickin' and keep our friendship strong."

The trio has completed nearly 120 shows since "Friends and Folk" first aired on April 6, 1991. While the show has experienced some changes during its five-year history, the basic themes of friendship and finding humor in life has remained the same.

The show's early focus was on featuring traditional folk music through the '60s but later expanded to include contemporary folk artists. Features were added during the second season and remain a popular part of the program today. Through the evolution, one thing has remained constant: the three co-hosts open each program with a different song each week.

Finding new material can often be challenging but the trio has never repeated an opening song, Dr. Young said.

The "real life" jobs of the musicians provide an interesting contrast to their roles on the show. Dr. Young is professor of education at Morehead State University, Pennington is the Rowan County attorney and Buckner owns Farmers Mercantile.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University is one of 15 institutions nationally and one of two in Kentucky to receive a 1995 GTE Focus Grant from the GTE Corporation. The grant project, entitled the "Mathematics-Science Outreach Program," is designed to assist professors in encouraging minorities and women to enter math, science or engineering fields of study.

The effort is a collaborative venture between the Caudill College of Humanities, the College of Science and Technology and the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation.

A check in the amount of \$28,202 was presented to the University at a recent Board of Regents meeting by Robert Williams of Lexington, regional public affairs manager for GTE, and Bronnie Preece of Morehead, manager of Kentucky's Eastern District for GTE. Accepting on behalf of the University was Dr. Lemuel Berry, Jr., dean of the College of Humanities, author of the proposal and the project director.

"We are very proud to be awarded the grant which will be an advantage for our future endeavors," Dr. Berry stated. "The overall focal point of our program is to work with students in grades 7-12 and to encourage certain populations of minorities and women to become involved in the areas of mathematics and science."

The program will encompass the 22-county MSU service area as well as Louisville and will consist primarily of a science and math fair during which students will compete for recognition in their areas of participation.

"Our goal is to have at least 200 students visit our campus," Dr. Berry continued. "There will be a number of categories in which the students may participate, such as oral and written quizzes, presentations of math and science projects, group problem solving activities and written essays."

There is a large under-representation of minorities and women in the sciences and mathematics today, and Dr. Berry believes that the fair will "serve as a stimulant to get these students involved in mathematics and the sciences so that they can carry this success into their college life and look at careers in these areas of study."

The science and math fair will be held at the beginning of May in the Adron Doran University Center on the campus.
