ASHLAND, Ky.---Whether you're a non-rider, a new rider or just want to learn the skills of riding a motorcycle, Morehead State University's Ashland Area Extended Campus Center has a class that will meet your needs.

For beginning cyclists, there is Motorcycle RiderCourse: Riding and Street Skills (RSS). Appropriate for riders of all ages, the course will include classroom instruction in on-cycle maneuvers in a controlled off-street environment. Tips on how to safely operate a cycle, beginning with the proper mounting technique and gradually working up to swerving and emergency braking techniques, also will be included.

A 20-hour course, the beginning class will meet on Friday evening from 6 to 10 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday, 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. It will be offered five times during the coming months: April 26-28, May 10-12, May 17-19, June 7-9, and June 21-23.

A knowledge test and an on-cycle skills evaluation will conclude the course.

Participants must be at least 16 years of age to register. Those under 18 must have a waiver signed by a parent or guardian before taking the course.

For the more knowledgeable rider, there is Experienced RiderCourse (ERC) which allows participants the opportunity to fine tune their street skills. Classroom instruction offers mental strategies necessary to reduce risk.

A one-day course, the ERC will be taught April 21, May 26 and June 16. The time is 8 a.m. until 6 p.m.

The cost is \$75 for the beginning course and \$50 for the advanced class. All classes begin at MSU's Ashland Area Extended Campus Center, 1401 Winchester Avenue.

Instructors for the program are certified by the Kentucky Motorcycle Program. Early registration is encouraged because of limited class size.

MOREHEAD, Ky.----Advance registration for Morehead State University's two summer sessions and the fall 1996 semester will be conducted Monday through Thursday, April 15-18, on the main campus and at extended campus centers.

Students currently enrolled and those interested in attending MSU this summer or fall may register during this period, according to Gene Ranvier, MSU registrar.

Course schedules containing trial schedule forms are now available from academic departments and the off-campus registration sites.

Main campus students advance register in their major department from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., beginning with graduate students, current seniors and juniors on Monday, April 15. On Tuesday, the registration process will be open to all other students. Students without a declared major will register in the Office of General Studies, 233 Allie Young Hall.

Advance registration at the Ashland Area Extended Campus Center and Lees College will be conducted from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Advance registration hours for the Appalachian Graduate Consortium at Pikeville College, the Big Sandy and Licking Valley Extended Campus Centers will be from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. The registration process on Monday, April 15, will only be open to graduate students, current seniors and juniors. All other students will be processed Tuesday through Thursday.

Off-campus students who have never enrolled at MSU before should contact their nearest regional registration site.

New students planning to study on the main campus should initiate the admissions process in 301 Howell-McDowell Administration Building for undergraduate students or in 701 Ginger Hall for graduate students.

MSU's Summer I is scheduled for June 10-July 5. Special arrangements may be available for public school educators, administrators and other school personnel whose school year will not end prior to the start of Summer I classes. The second summer term runs from July 8 to Aug. 2, while fall classes begin on Aug. 19.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead's Occupational and Academic Retreat (MOAR) program, hosted by Morehead State University, will participate in the federally funded Summer Food Service Program for Children. The program operates under guidelines similar to those of public school food service programs.

Taking part in this program enables the sponsors to hold down costs so that most families can afford to send their children to camp.

The program is available to the 40 MOAR participants selected by JTPA eligibility, school counselor recommendations, and interviews conducted by the MOAR program director. All children will be served the same meals at no separate charge regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability and there is no discrimination in the food service.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---An East Kentucky entrepreneur, the executive director of the Kentucky League of Cities and a corporate executive will be inducted into Morehead State University's Alumni Hall of Fame as part of the University's 1996 Founders Day celebration on Friday, April 12.

This year's inductees are:

James H. Booth of Inez, president of Beech Fork Processing, Inc., and of eight other companies all related to the coal industry;

Sylvia L. Lovely of Lexington, executive director of the Kentucky League of Cities;

Gary W. Riley of Fort Wayne, Ind., a corporate management specialist who is currently in the process of acquiring a new company.

They will be recognized as distinguished graduates during the Alumni Awards Dinner at 6:30 p.m. in Adron Doran University Center. The dinner is one of a series of public activities marking the 109th year of higher education in Rowan County and MSU's 74th anniversary as a public institution. This year MSU also is celebrating the 30th anniversary of its University status.

Other events include the Convocation and Awards Ceremony at 10:30 a.m. in Button Auditorium, followed by a noon luncheon at which time 21 new MSU Fellows and other supporters of the University will be honored. Also scheduled is the opening of the Presidential Portrait Gallery in the Heritage Room in ADUC at 2 p.m. and the official groundbreaking of the new Wellness Center near Jayne Stadium.

Booth, who earned his B.B.A. degree in 1970, worked his way through college at Wolf Creek Collieries as an underground miner and later as a foreman. With his MSU degree completed, he accepted a management position with the company. In 1975, he started a contract mining operation at the Pevler Complex, owned by Island Creek Coal Company, in Martin County. This single unit contract mine was the beginning of a major mining group that now is supplying over 3 million tons of coal annually to eastern U.S. electric utilities.

In the mid-1980s, Booth and his associates entered into the retail industry with convenient and fast food stores; building, hardware and mining supplies; commercial and residential rental, and motels. Mining and retail operations under his ownership employ approximately 600 people.

Recently recognized as the state's 19th largest coal producer, he currently serves on the Inez Deposit Bank Board of Directors and the Pikeville College Board of Trustees. His most recent endeavor is the establishment of the James H. Booth Leadership Endowment Foundation at Georgetown College.

MORHEAD, Ky.---More than 600 middle and high school students from around the state are scheduled to participate in the Kentucky Science Olympiad at Morehead State University on Saturday, April 20.

In addition, three teams of students from Ontario, Canada, and one team from Virginia will compete in the Olympiad.

Beginning at 9 a.m., 15-member teams will be competing in 30 events which will be taking place simultaneously in locations across the campus, according to Dr. Ron L. Fiel, professor of science and coordinator for the events.

An awards program, set for 3 p.m. in Button Auditorium, will conclude the day's agenda. The winning middle school and high school team will advance to national competition which will be held in Atlanta later this year.

"The competitions range from basic constructions to aerodynamics and physics," Dr. Fiel said. "Some events will utilize problem-solving skills while constructions in other projects will require the most accurate of measurements."

Knowledge of all areas of the science field will be necessary for the competitions, Dr. Fiel. noted. Among the events are:

\*Mission Possible-students will design and build a Rube Goldberg device which demonstrates a series of energy transfers to accomplish a specific task;

\*Qualitative Analysis--students will be asked to identify certain cations and anions in a solution, using an unknown solution, flow chart and necessary chemicals and equipment.

\*Write It Do It—students will prepare a written description of a contraption and another student in a separate room will attempt to recreate the contraption using only the written description.

\*Scrambler--students will design and build a device that will transport an uncooked egg along an 8-12 m curve as fast as possible and have the device stop closest to the finish line.

The winners will be determined by the most number of points scored in the competitions. The out-of-state groups will not be competing against the Kentucky students, Dr. Fiel said.





MOREHEAD, Ky.---"We must not turn our backs on our most precious resource, the education of our young people."

Former Gov. Edward T. Breathitt, who held the state's highest office from 1963 to 1967, is still supporting higher education today. He was the featured speaker at Morehead State University's Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony (April 12).

The Convocation was one of a series of events as MSU celebrated its 30th anniversary as a University, 74th year as a public institution and 109 years of higher education in Rowan County.

Outlining the evolution of higher education in the state, Gov. Breathitt asked that today's leaders take a stand for higher education.

"State funding is down; we are no longer state-supported but state-assisted," he said.

"Each of you have a voice. It is time to rededicate ourselves." Observing that education is at a crossroads (in the state) and still suffering growing pains from KERA, the former governor encouraged all of higher education "to work together."

The Convocation also included reenactment of the signing of HB 238 on Feb. 26, 1966, which granted university status to MSU as well as Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University and Murray State University.

Gov. Breathitt credited then-MSU President Adron Doran for his understanding of the people in the region, and specifically the legislature, for getting the bill passed. He outlined a discussion he had with Dr. Doran and how that meeting led to the passage of the historical legislation. "I was very appreciative of his advice," the former governor said. "From that time on, I knew if he asked for anything, it was for the good of the state."

Earlier in the program, Dr. Doran was honored as this year's recipient of the Founders Day Award for University Service. In typical oratorical fashion reminiscent of his days as speaker of the house in the state legislature, the former president recalled his experiences when he first came to the campus in April 1954 and the events which led to the granting of University status.

After offering thanks to his devoted and loyal helpmate of 65 years, his wife Mignon, Dr. Doran described the award as a "Mountaintop Experience" for the two of them. "Thank you for remembering," he said.

At the luncheon which followed the Convocation, leadership again was the keyword as Dr. Roy P. Peterson, secretary of the state's Cabinet for Education, Arts and Humanities, spoke. He told the gathering that leaders are people who refuse to give up and said that the state must nurture those with leadership qualities.

"A talent like leadership arises in all people," Dr. Peterson said. "It is how people use it to reach the potential that makes the difference." In closing his remarks, the secretary said that the key to the commonwealth's success is to work together for the good of all.

The luncheon, hosted by the MSU Foundation, Inc., was the backdrop for recognizing 21 new MSU Fellows and honoring fund raising volunteers. Accepting the Most Valuable Givers Award were Dr. and Mrs. Ted L. Crosthwait of Frankfort. Other award recipients were Bronelle Skaggs of Paintsville, Volunteer Fund Raiser of the Year; Janet Ratliff, instructor of marketing, Outstanding Faculty Fund Raiser, and Clara Keyes, head of special collections at MSU's Camden-Carroll Library, Outstanding Staff Fund Raiser.

Activities continued after lunch with the opening of the Presidential Portrait Gallery in the Heritage Room, where oil paintings of the past 11 MSU presidents have been hung. This was followed with a mock brick-laying to officially launch the new Wellness Center project.

Closing the day's events was the Alumni Awards Dinner, sponsored by the MSU Alumni Association. Recognized for their accomplishments by induction into the Alumni Hall of Fame were James H. Booth of Inez, an East Kentucky entrepreneur; Sylvia Lovely of Lexington, executive director of the Kentucky League of Cities, and Gary W. Riley of Fort Wayne, Ind., a corporate management specialist.



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

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Appalachian Heritage Project, conducted by Morehead State University's Center for Community and Economic Development, recently received some valuable historical records about Morehead and Farmers from a Morehead builder.

Phillip B. Hollan donated a set of microfilmed "Sanborn Insurance Maps" from the early to mid-1900s, which were originally prepared for fire insurance agents, and which now will aid the Appalachian Heritage Project efforts to identify and document historic resources.

. "Today these maps provide important data to people who want to learn about the history of towns and neighborhoods," said Lynn David, coordinator of the project for MSU's CCED. "They are useful to a wide variety of people, including urban specialists, social historians, architects, geographers, genealogists, local historians, planners and environmentalists, "she added.

Funded by grants from the Kentucky Heritage Council and the Appalachian Regional Commission, the Appalachian Heritage project involves locating, documenting and registering historic resources as well as creating reuse/redevelopment strategies for them. The project scope involves 33 Appalachian Kentucky counties.

"Mr. Hollan's own interest in local history and early buildings in Morehead was the impetus for his donation," David said. The Morehead maps are dated 1908, 1914, 1928 and 1941, while those for Farmers are from 1928 and 1941.

Sanborn maps are large-scale plans which show the outline of each building, the size, shape and construction, including the location of windows and doors. The maps also give street names, street and sidewalk widths, property boundaries, building uses and house/block numbers, according to David.

"Extensive information on building use is given, ranging from symbols for generic terms such as stable, garage and warehouse to names of owners of factories and details about what was manufactured in them. Other features shown include pipelines, railroads, wells, dumps and heavy machinery," she said.

"In our work of documenting urban buildings, these maps provide us a visual history of the building and growth of the community. Mr. Hollan's interest in our work shows a sense of community spirit that is most appreciated," David added. The microfilmed Sanborn maps will be housed in the Special Collections area of MSU's Camden-Carroll Library.

## MSU OBSERVES FOUNDERS DAY: 'A Picture Story

MOREHEAD, Ky.—"We must not turn our backs on our most precious resource, the education of our young people."

Former Gov. Edward T. Breathitt, who held the state's highest office from 1963 to 1967, is still supporting higher education today. He was the featured speaker at Morehead State University's Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony.

The Convocation was one of several events as MSU celebrated its 30th anniversary as a University, 74th year as a public institution and 109 years of higher education in Rowan County.

Outlining the evolution of higher education in the state, Gov. Breathitt asked that today's leaders take a stand for higher education. "State funding is down; we are no longer state-supported but state-assisted," he said. "Each of you have a voice. It is time to rededicate ourselves."

Observing that education is at a crossroads (in the state) and still suffering growing pains from KERA, the former governor encouraged all of higher education "to work together."

The Convocation also included reenactment of the signing of HB 238 on Feb. 26, 1966, which granted university status to MSU as well as Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University and Murray State University.

Gov. Breathitt credited then-MSU President Adron Doran for his understanding of the people in the region, and specifically the legislature, for getting the bill passed. He outlined a discussion he had with Dr. Doran and how that meeting led to the passage of the historical legislation. "I was very appreciative of his advice," the former governor said. "From that time on, I knew if he asked for anything, it was for the good of the state."

Earlier in the program, Dr. Doran was honored as this year's recipient of the Founders Day Award for University Service. In typical oratorical fashion reminiscent of his days as speaker of the house in the state legislature, the former president recalled his experiences when he first came to the campus in April 1954 and the events which led to the granting of University status.

After offering thanks to his devoted and loyal helpmate of 65 years, his wife Mignon, Dr. Doran described the award as a "Mountaintop Experience" for the two of them. "Thank you for remembering," he said.

At the luncheon which followed the Convocation, leadership again was the keyword as Dr. Roy P. Peterson, secretary of the state's Cabinet for Education, Arts and Humanities, spoke. He told the gathering that leaders are people who refuse to give up and said that the state must nurture those with leadership qualities.

"A talent like leadership arises in all people," Dr. Peterson said. "It is how people use it to reach the potential that makes the difference." In closing his remarks, the secretary said that the key to the commonwealth's success is to work together for the good of all.

The luncheon, hosted by the MSU Foundation, Inc., was the backdrop for recognizing 21 new MSU Fellows and honoring fund raising volunteers. Activities continued after lunch with the opening of the Presidential Portrait Gallery in the Heritage Room, where oil paintings of the past 11 MSU presidents have been hung. This was followed with a mock brick-laying to officially launch the new Wellness Center project.

Closing the day's events was the Alumni Awards Dinner, sponsored by the MSU Alumni Association.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Anthony Scott Kuzak may not have started out to be a pioneer, but that may well be what he has become.

On May 11, Kuzak will be the first student to graduate from Morehead State University with a nanny certification.

"I wanted to break tradition," the Sandy Hook native said. "There aren't that many men in the field and I just love to work with children."

Students completing the nanny program, administered through MSU's Department of Human Sciences, will receive a Certified Professional Nanny (CPN) certification from the American Council of Nanny Schools, Inc., according to Carolyn Taylor, associate professor of human sciences who supervises the program. "After MSU has its first graduate, the program will then be eligible for certification," she said.

In addition to Kuzak, two other students are currently taking classes in the program,
Tonya Christian, Morehead sophomore, and Megan Mundie, Downer's Grove, Ill., junior. Of
the three, Kuzak is the only one who has completed the two-year course.

As graduation time rolls around, Kuzak has been completing a portfolio which he calls a "nanny survival kit" that he plans to use on the job. "This kit has activities for all age groups, he said. "It includes diabetic meals, activities that are developmentally appropriate for any child, even how to design a nursery."

To be successful in the program, Kuzak suggests one should have dedication and an undying love of children. "That helps to promote an environment that allows a child to explore and expand its opportunities," he said. "The bottom line is that you will be the parent while the real parent is away, so you need the capacity to love that child enough to respect it as your own."

In the nanny program, all the classes focus on the child, from birth to primary, he said. "Once we understand the child and how it develops, we can better understand why the child reacts the way it does." He believes this understanding will help him to guide a young child whether he is working in a family situation or a day care facility. In addition to classroom instruction, Kuzak has completed a 240-hour practicum with the Head Start program.

Although he has always wanted to teach, Kuzak tried other areas before enrolling in the nanny program. He first came to MSU as a music major and earned an Associate of Arts degree in humanities in December 1992. He then took time out of his studies to teach music and Spanish in the Elliott County School System.

While trying to decide what he wanted to do with his life, Kuzak talked with Taylor who got him interested in the nanny program. He completed the Associate of Applied Sciences degree in early childhood development in December, which fulfilled requirements for the nanny program. He will receive a Bachelor of Arts degree in interdisciplinary early child development with a minor in Spanish in May.

As he explores the possibilities of his career, Kuzak notes that there is always a need for day care. "Now I am looking at all my options," he said.

Crediting his mother, Lea Porter, for being a "great" role model, Kuzak cites high morals, goodness and warmth and integrity as trademarks which he can give to a family. Because of the support he has received, he is a strong advocator for setting goals and not settling for any substitute. "It's out there if you are willing to work hard, you can achieve whatever you desire," he said.

Another factor that makes the nanny field so inviting, according to Kuzak, is the large number of corporate women who are single parents. "Their children need male role models," he said.
