### American Dental Society Observes 100th Anniversary

Members of the Blue Grass Dental Society will join dentists throughout the county during March in the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the American dental profession. Dr. Arthur M. Elam, president of the society, announced today.

Dr. Elam said the Blue Grass Society will hold a centennial dinner on March 2 to commemorate two important events in the history of dentistry: the founding of the first dental school in the world and the establishment of the first national dental association. The national celebration will reach a climax on March 18, 19, and 20 in Baltimore, Md., where in 1840, the first dental school in the world was founded.

More than four hundred district dental societies from across the country, representing some 45,000 members of the American Dental Association, will hold centennial dinners on the evening of March 2. During the following weeks 1,000 members of the profession will attend the Baltimore Centennial celebration.

Dr. Lucian C. Brun, general chairman of the Baltimore activity, reports that outstanding members of the profession from this county and abroad will present scientific essays at the Baltimore session. Scientific, health and historical exhibits will depict the evolution of every phase of dentistry. While presentations will recall dramatically the founding of dentistry and the milestones in its advancement.

### Famous Lecturer To Appear Here; Public Is Invited

#### "Slim" Williams To Lecture At Friday College Convocation

Clyde C. (Slim) Williams, the famous Alaska explorer, who completed in December, 1939, a journey by motorcycle from Fairbanks, Alaska, to Seattle, U. S. A., to dramatize the need for a motor road that will connect Alaska and the United States, is scheduled to give one of his thrilling and adventurous talks here Friday, February 15 at the Morehead College auditorium.

It will be remembered that Slim Williams first made himself internationally famous in 1932 by driving his wolf-dogs from Copper Center, Alaska, to Washington, D. C., 5,000 miles, in the interest of this great highway project.

Slim was born in California 58 years ago, but was reared in Texas. Since these empires weren't big enough for this big rambunctious explorer, he went to Alaska when he was 20, landing there with \$1.50 in his pockets, and potatoes were serving at \$1.00 and ham and veal \$1.00. Slim Williams now raises his own potatoes and that food is about ten percent cheaper up there than it is in this county.

Slim's university has been given out-of-doors. He kept his directions without a compass, noting the way the bushes grow on the shady side of a hill or the way the moss grows on trees. On cloudy or foggy days he would put his knife blade point on his thumb nail and it would cast a shadow.

During the second year of the Century of Progress in Chicago, Slim had his dogs at the Alaska exhibit. The business of the "International Highway" got lost in the shuffle of public interest in this man and his dogs, stepped the last part of the record of Jack London's novel "The Call of the Wild" for Slim was the person he had written about. Mrs. Roosevelt called it the most interesting person she had ever talked with and made a second special visit to his tent alongside the Alaska exhibit. Mrs. Roosevelt was entertained at the White House by President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

News received at Haldeman reveals that Col. L. P. Haldeman is very ill at his winter home in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, suffering from a heart attack.

Col. Haldeman was president of the Kentucky Fire Brick Company for thirty-five years before retiring in January, 1936. The town of Haldeman bears his name.

Col. Haldeman is seventy, and a host of friends throughout this section of the county who are wishing a speedy recovery for him.

### College Quint To Meet Big Green Here Tomorrow

#### Thundering Herd Pronounced As Toughest In Entire United States

Morehead is to meet the Thundering Herd of Marshall here Friday, February 16. Eagle Coach, Johnson is "mooning low." Marshall's current quint has been pronounced as one of the best in the entire United States, by the national press by virtue of its record 96 per cent victory over City College of New York. Previous to meeting Marshall, City College had never lost a game by as much as 40 points in its history.

The Big Green holds victory over Tennessee, all-southern leaders, and California, Pacific coast champs.

On the other hand, the Eagles have been spasmodic all season. Added to this they may be without the services of John Wiggers, suffering with an infected toe.

"We'll be lucky to lose to Marshall by 50 points," Johnson said today.

### Murray Drawn By Eagles In K I A C Tournament Game

#### Racers Hold 35-26 Season Verdict Over MSTC Quintette

Morehead's Eagles are to meet their sister college, Murray, in the K I A C tournament at City counters scheduled at Eastern State Teachers College in March.

Ellis Johnson and Len Miller represented the college at the drawings which were held in the Phoenix Hotel, Lexington, the early part of this week.

The Racers' hold one verdict during the regular season over the Eagles when they conquered the Moreheadians January 27 at May by a 35-26 verdict.

The K I A C draw game was much closer, however, than the score indicated according to Coach Miller, who today prophesied a Morehead victory over the Murrayites. "If nothing serious happens to us before the tourney."

Western, defending champion of the K I A C, drew a bye in the first round, Centre drew Union and Louisville, Georgetown.

Eastern, once winner and once loser to the Hilltoppers, this season, is considered as the biggest threat in the tournament. Morehead is the "dark horse."

### Reduction State-Wide Says President

A general rate reduction over the State affecting Morehead and Rowan county consumers, is being announced by Frank Maxey, manager of the local electric company.

New electric rate reductions saving consumers \$180,781 annually, a \$5,428,000 three-year construction program, and an employe retirement pension plan, were announced this week by R. M. Watt, president of Kentucky Utilities Company and Kentucky Power & Light Company.

Effective March 1, the latest in a series of rate cuts will apply to electric bills received April 1 by domestic, general commercial and municipal customers for street lighting. The slash followed conferences with the Public Service Commission. It brings to \$1,243,500 the total annual saving in the cost of electricity to users in the past six years, and to \$665,500 in the past three years.

To assure peak efficiency in service to customers in some 400 communities, and ample provision for future demands, the companies expect to spend \$1,337,800 this year, \$1,650,000 next year, and \$2,212,000 in 1942, for improvement and expansion of physical plant.

The work will include installation of voltage regulators and larger transformer substations and rebuilding and enlarging capacity of distribution lines in various communities. Mr. Watt explained that for similar work the companies spent \$620,300 in the past five years.

Employees of the companies have unanimously accepted a retirement income plan which became operative February 1. Under its provisions the maximum age of 65 and women at age of 60, on a living income. Pension payments are guaranteed by one of Kentucky's larger insurance companies.

"We are making the new rate cuts primarily to enable more customers to enjoy the advantages of electrically operated laundries, and comfort-giving devices at prices they can afford," Mr. Watt said. "These include the range, refrigerator, washing machine, vacuum cleaner, sewing machine, better-sight lamp and water heater."

It is our policy to lower rates as rapidly as the maintenance of first-class service, sound management and general economic conditions permit. All reductions have been worked out by negotiation with the Public Service Commission.

"Along with this policy we carry on a steady, rather large-scale plant construction program in the first program. We pay our employes decent wages and substantially add them to provide for old age. We help support the federal, state and local governments with the largest tax payments in the history of our companies. And we earn dividends for several thousand Kentucky stockholders, whose savings are invested in our business," Mr. Watt said.
