MOREHEAD, Ky.----Programming this summer on WMKY 90.3 FM, public radio from Morehead State University, will include the return of an old favorite and the debut of a new program.

"Riverwalk Live from the Landing" returns to WMKY in July on Saturday nights at 9 p.m. Featuring spontaneous, collective improvisation just like you want to hear it, "Riverwalk" sets out to tell the story behind the fascinating journey American music made from the European traditions of the late 19th Century to the evolution of jazz and blues in the 20th.

The program features the Jim Cullum Jazz Band and various guests celebrating the lives and music of jazz greats, past and present.

Replacing "Bob and Bill" weekday mornings is "Classical 24," a program new to WMKY's audience, which will be aired from 9 to 11 a.m. The change became necessary because popular co-host Bill Morelock left the show to pursue other interests.

As its name implies, "Classical 24" will offer listeners a variety of classical music and will be hosted by Arthur Hoehn, whose experience from behind the microphone ranges from Mexico to Minnesota.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--- Ira Glass, host of "This American Life," was at a South Side Chicago barbershop recording two dozen men as they watched the Chicago Bulls in the NBA playoffs. One of the barbers insisted that the bulls would lose.

"Every time he'd open his mouth, there'd be a huge, hilarious argument," said Glass. "Guys were teasing him. He'd tease them back. It's moments like that when I really just want to buy everyone drinks, invite them to my house, and say thank you, thank you, thank you."

Funny, surprising moments of everyday America are what "This American Life" is built on. "We try to design it so that any listener, hearing the beginning of any story, will be unable to leave the radio," said Glass. "We hope he or she will sit in the car, in the driveway and wait until the story ends."

"This American Life" airs on WMKY 90.3 FM, public radio from Morehead State University, on Sundays at 11 a.m. The program replaced "Monitor Radio."

"'Monitor Radio' was a wonderful program, but we really believe that our listeners are going to like 'This American Life' also," said Larry Netherton, WMKY general manager.

Each week Glass chooses a theme--immigrant parents, quitters, people who lead double lives. He does a story or two. And he invites a variety of writers and performers to take a whack at the theme, with stories, monologues, short radio plays, miniature documentaries, "found recordings" and original works for radio.

"To me radio stories are best when they combine something funny and surprising with some deeper feeling," says Glass. Describing his work, Chicago magazine said, "Glass does stories that are casual and intimate in feeling, that seem almost to start in the middle of the story and are told in unfolding scenes. Sort of like a hipper version of Garrison Keiller."

Glass tells his stories on the air live, rolling in quotes, ambient sound and musical scoring as he goes. It's the sound of live radio, adapted to do the heavy lifting of documentary work. From week to week the subject matter and storytelling styles in the show change considerably.

Glass is a veteran National Public Radio reporter and producer, probably best known for his documentary stories on the Chicago public schools which aired on NPR's "All Things Considered" and "Morning Edition" from 1990 to 1995.

WMKY, an affiliate of National Public Radio (NPR) and Public Radio International (PRI), features news and information programs, classical and adult alternative music, and specialty programming.

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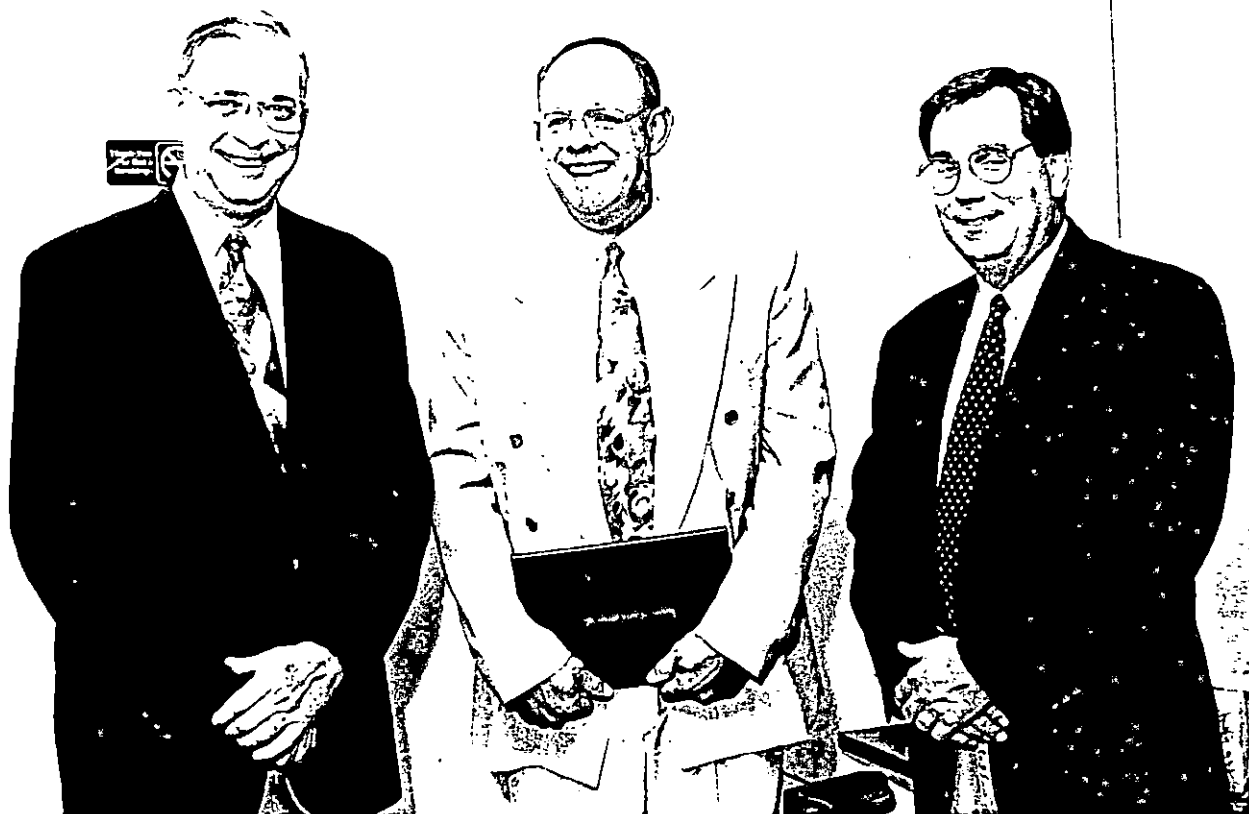
MSU'S MICKEY WELLS RETIRES

MOREHEAD, Ky.---While relaxation and enjoying the summer break are on the agenda for most 13-year-olds, one Bath County student chose to put the time to good use by taking a class at Morehead State University.

James Armstrong was looking for an educational way to spend his summer vacation before enrolling as a freshman at Bath County High School in the fall. Reviewing all options, he visited MSU's Office of Admissions to complete the application process which would allow him to take a class in graphic design.

"After talking with the young man and reviewing his ACT scores, I advised him to talk to those in the Department of Art," said Dan Cornett, director of recruitment. "From all indications, I believed he was qualified to take a class."

Receiving approval from MSU's Department of Art, Armstrong was enrolled in the class he wanted to take. When not enough students registered and the class had to be dropped, Deeno Golding, MSU assistant professor of art, agreed to devote his time to teach the young student anyway.

Each morning during MSU's Summer I, Armstrong rode to campus with another MSU student and for two hours, he and Golding stared at a computer screen, manipulating a design, and discussing what it takes to achieve the goal.

"All my life I have been working on computers," Armstrong said. "It takes a lot of patience to get it right." And even though he has a computer at home and chores to do, he admits he gets bored when he isn't in school.

During the term, Armstrong has been introduced to a number of applications on the Mac computer, such as Infiniti-D and Photoshop, Quark Xpress and Freehand, and has even used a scanner. He started with two-dimensional works and before the term is over he will have created a three-dimensional piece which will be placed on a video tape that can be shared with his friends.

Because this special project used animation as well as 3-D modeling, there were a few challenging moments, but Armstrong describes the work as "pretty much fun."

"He picked up really quick," Golding said of the young student. "He constantly looked at different ways to do things." Having a knowledge of space, architecture, design and mathematics are components which help in completing a design project, Golding noted.

With the goal of being a doctor one day, Armstrong plans to go to graduate school. Last year he was a member of the Gifted and Talented Program at Bath County Middle School, enjoys basketball and completing science projects. He also was a member of BCMS' Academic Team and participated in the Governor's Cup.

Armstrong is the son of Connie and Douglas Armstrong of Olympia.

MOREHEAD, Ky.----Work will begin this month on the former Union Grocery Building on First Street to turn it into the new home of the Kentucky Folk Art Center, Inc., currently located in a former residence on West University Boulevard.

Low bidder on the first stage of the renovation project at \$707,400 was D.W. Wilburn, Inc., of Lexington, which currently is completing renovations to Morehead State University's Lappin Hall. The project drew five bidders with the highest coming in at \$792,602.

The two-story, 10,000-square foot Union Grocery Building was originally built in 1906 with a 4,000-square foot addition to the west end constructed later. MSU acquired the structure earlier this year from the MSU Foundation, Inc. The Foundation bought the facility in 1993 and had been leasing it to the University.

The plans call for renovating the first floor space into a small auditorium for audio-visual display programs, an exhibition gallery, an exhibit area for the permanent KFAC collection, reception/sales area and lobby.

The project also includes razing of that addition, refurbishment of the exterior, and replacement of the mechanical system. MSU officials expect the renovations to take approximately eight months to complete.

The second floor will remain as open space until additional private funds become available.

Funding for the renovation project primarily comes from grants, including \$717,400 in federal transportation department funds, and some private support.

A private, non-profit corporation, the KFAC serves as the steward of MSU's nationally-acclaimed folk art collection.

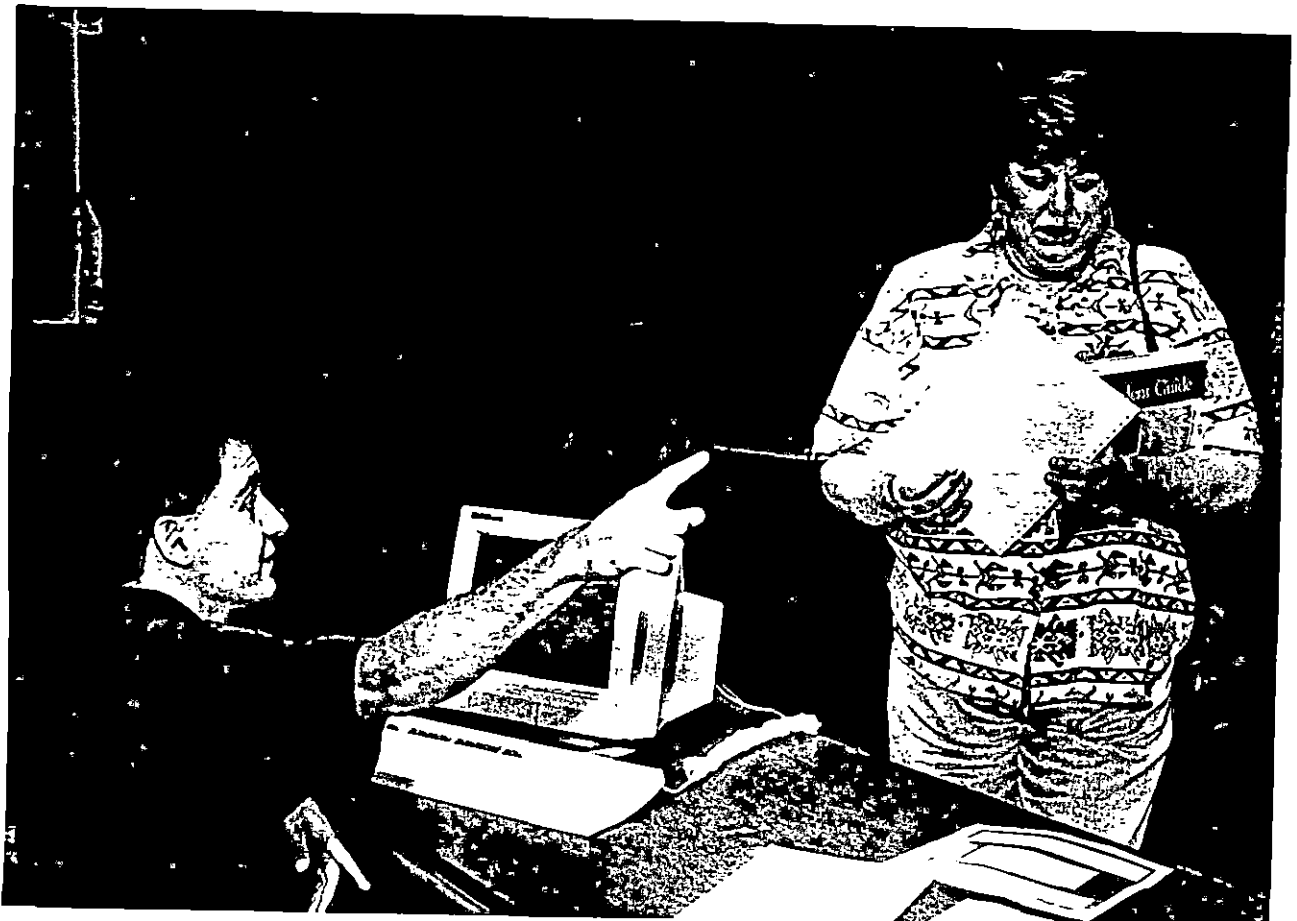

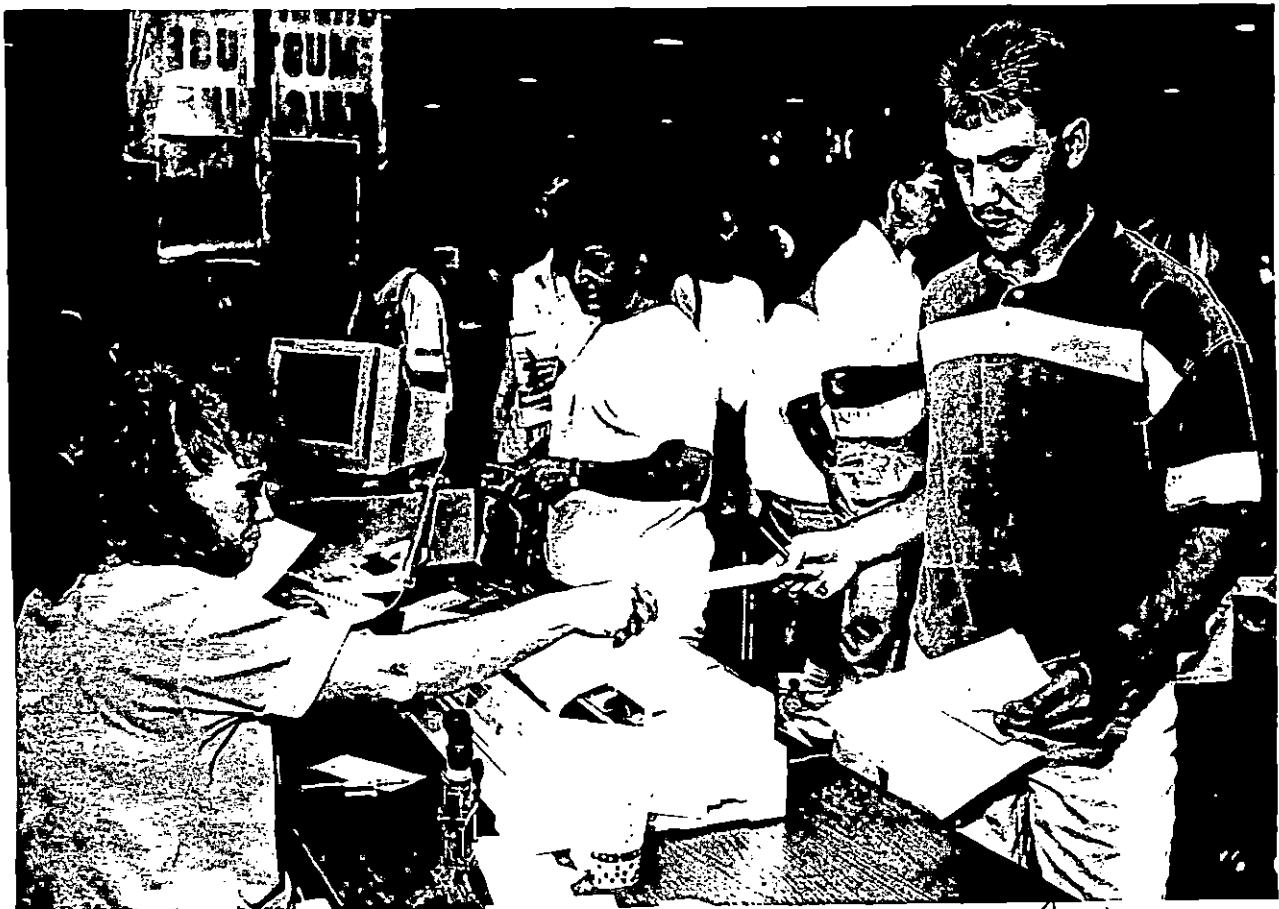

Two land parcels, located one mile east of Rodburn, will be sold separately at 10 a.m. on the site. Part of the former MSU trailer park, one tract is 23.6 acres and the other is 17.9 acres.

The residential properties will be auctioned off at 1 p.m. under a tent on McClure Circle. Prospective buyers will have two opportunities to examine the houses. Preview periods are scheduled from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, July 27, and Saturday, Aug. 3. Auction personnel and representatives from lending agencies will be on hand at McClure Circle to answer questions.

The addresses of the specific single family residences are 204, 205, 208, 209, 212, 213, 216, 217, 220, 221, 224, 225 and 229 McClure Circle and 520, 524, 604 and 608 North Wilson Avenue. MSU's former Home Management House, located at 107 Fifth Street, and another single family residence at 514 North Wilson will be sold separately from the others.

Most of the residences were constructed in the late 1960s and early 1970s. In March, MSU's Board of Regents declared the U.S. 60 East parcels and the houses as surplus property. "With the local housing market improving considerably in recent years, there is less and less demand for University faculty/staff housing," MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin told the regents in March. MSU officials note that occupancy rate for the McClure Circle Complex has declined to less than 50 percent.

Proceeds from the sale will go into MSU's Fund for Excellence, which is administered by the state, and the interest dedicated to academic programs.

This is how Dr. Cathy Barlow, chair of Morehead State University's Department of Elementary Reading and Special Education, defines her first encounter at teaching a class by compressed video. Now, with improvements in the process, she is eagerly looking forward to teaching the course again this year.

During the 1995 fall semester, Dr. Barlow, relying on the minimal experience she had obtained while at the University of Evansville, volunteered to teach the University's first compressed video class, an introductory graduate special education course.

In this pioneer endeavor, Dr. Barlow taught at five sites: MSU's Extended Campus Centers in Ashland and Prestonsburg, Jackson, Mason County High School and on the main campus where the class originated.

"Through the use of compressed video, students could see and talk to me," Dr. Barlow said. "The equipment was voice activated, resulting in students being able to ask questions and interject comments and I could give immediate feedback."

Describing the opportunity as an enjoyable experience, Dr. Barlow laughs when she describes how the course kept her on her toes. "While it's still teaching, it's very different," she said. "You can't have a bad day and you have to always be prepared in case the equipment should go down."

Since equipment failure was a possibility, Dr. Barlow created a "little black box" which included assignments and prepared materials for each of the teaching sites. Using other faculty members as her courier service, the boxes were dropped off before the class and returned afterwards with the students' papers.

For the new process, Dr. Barlow was a one-person show. She manipulated all equipment, including computer, document projector, VCR and camera, while continuing her lecture. The technology has expanded and there will be facilitators to assist her when she begins teaching by compressed video in the fall.

Besides allowing one instructor to teach at several locations, there are a number of other advantages of having this technology, Dr. Barlow noted. "This medium of instruction means less travel for the professor," she said. "Most classes are taught from the MSU campus and the professor will only need to make a couple of visits to each of the teaching sites during the course."

As MSU begins the fall semester, there will be 22 classes taught by compressed video and two courses via the Internet, according to Dr. Autumn Grubb, director of distance learning. "Beginning with one class in fall '95, the program saw extensive growth this spring with additional offerings scheduled for this fall," she said.

At the start, offerings were available at five sites with an additional two locations added for the spring 1996 semester. This fall, there will be 12 sites available with two points of origin on the main campus.

Technology also is allowing MSU to assist in other areas, Dr. Grubb said. "By utilizing Internet and implementing web pages, we are now capable of allowing faculty to design instructional components for use in a 'virtual' classroom," she said. "And new this fall, Mason, Magoffin and Pike County high schools will be offering courses and sharing curriculum through facilitation by MSU."

Along with the improvements that come with learning a new technique, there also are additional challenges, according to Sherry Waddles, a distance learning facilitator at MSU's Big Sandy Extended Campus Center who was there when Dr. Barlow taught that first class.

"Each semester there are changes in the ways I can assist the professor," Waddles said. "Besides monitoring the activities on site and videotaping all classes, this fall I also will assist students with e-mail, powerpoint presentations and gaining access to the library and Internet."

University faculty members who will be teaching compressed video classes have already received a 34-hour training program with another in-depth training session on tap before MSU's fall semester begins.

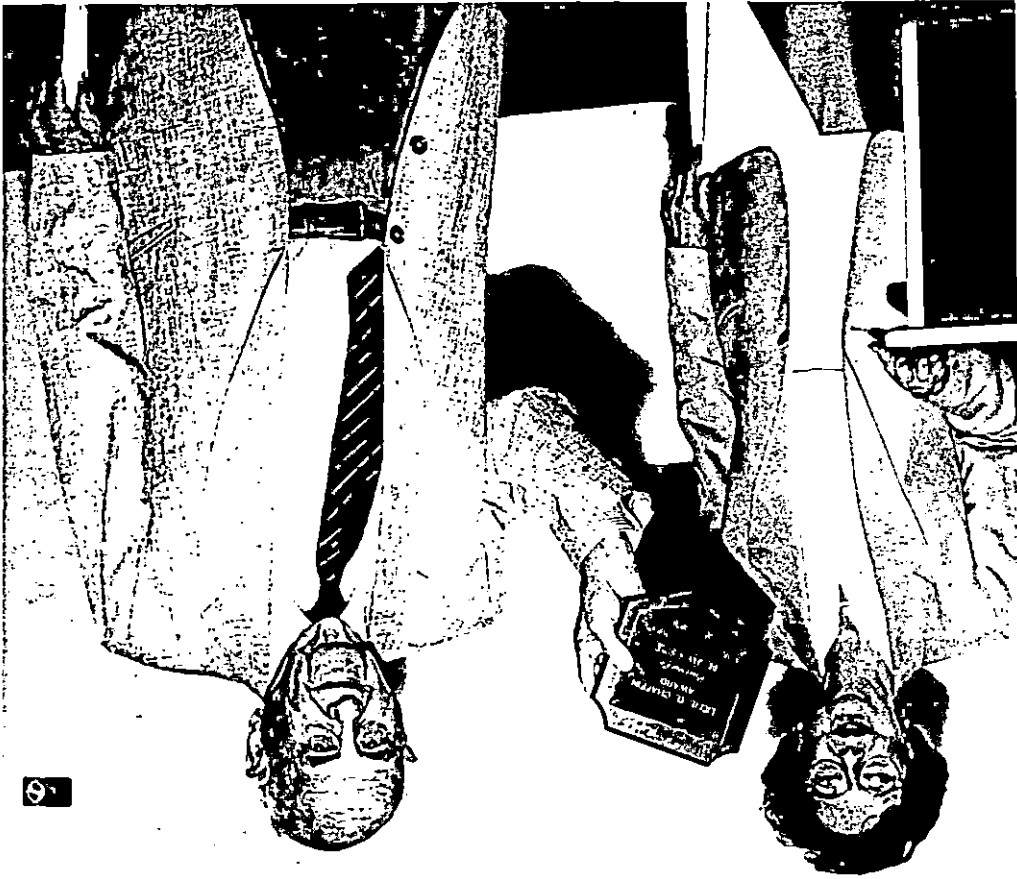

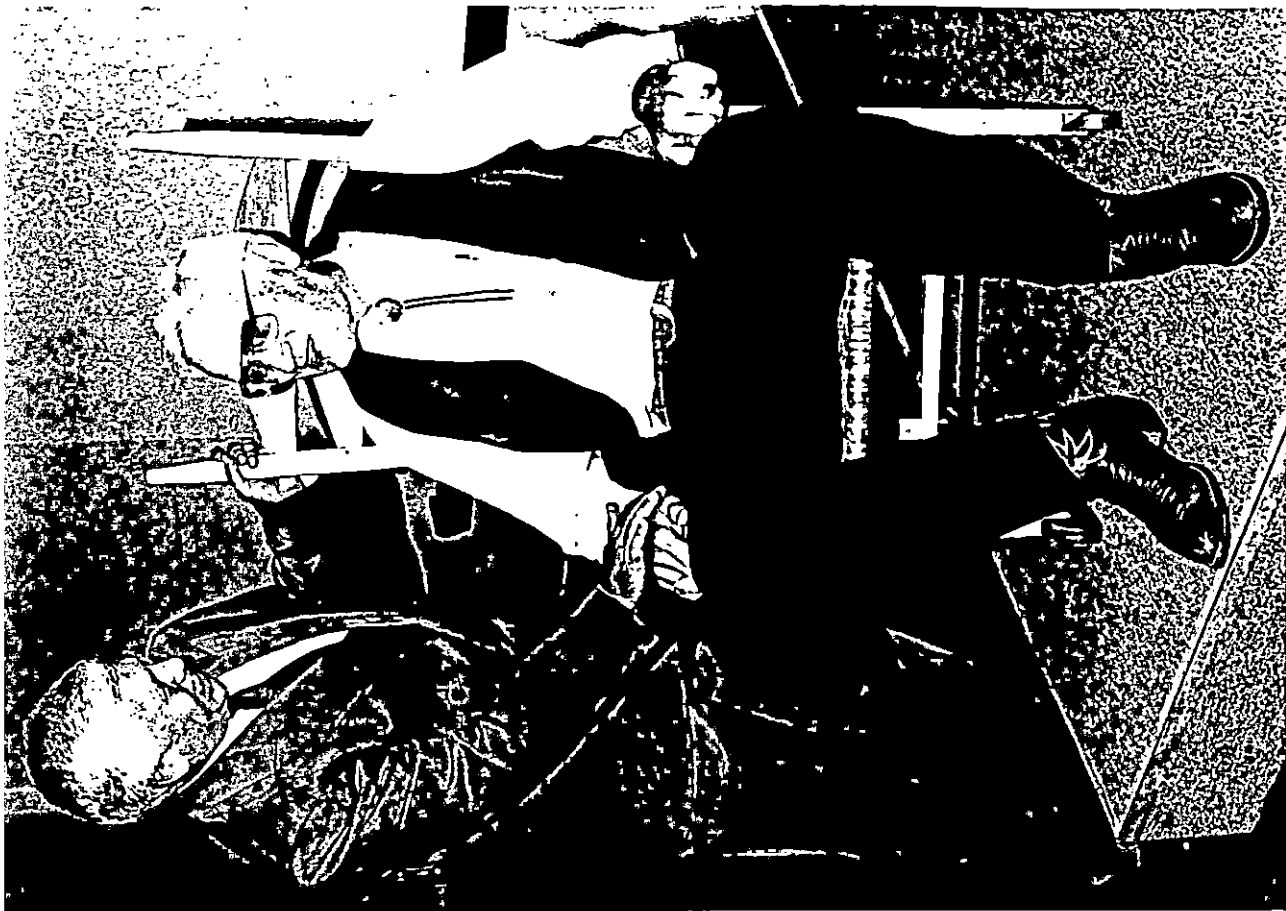
Cutlines:

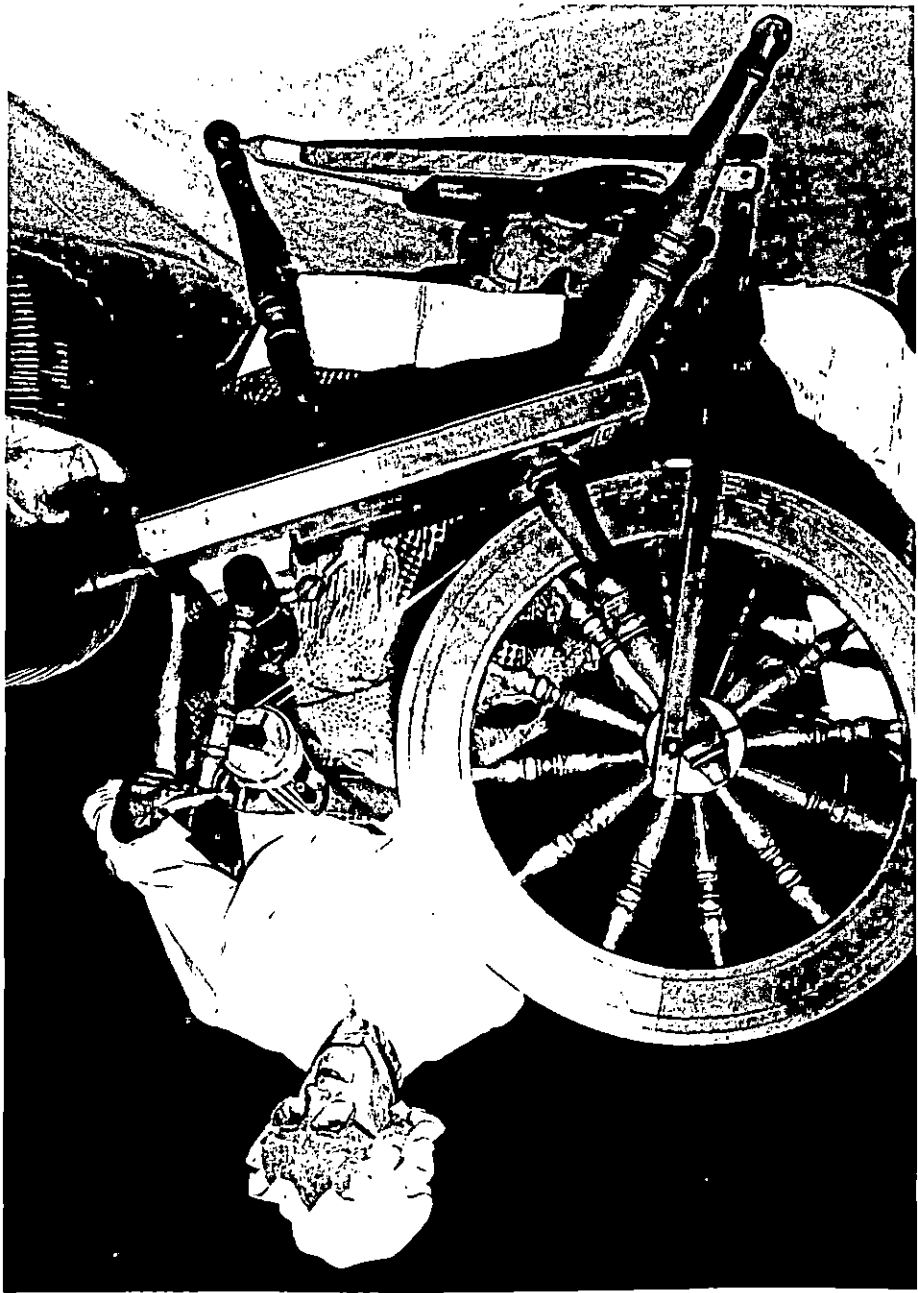

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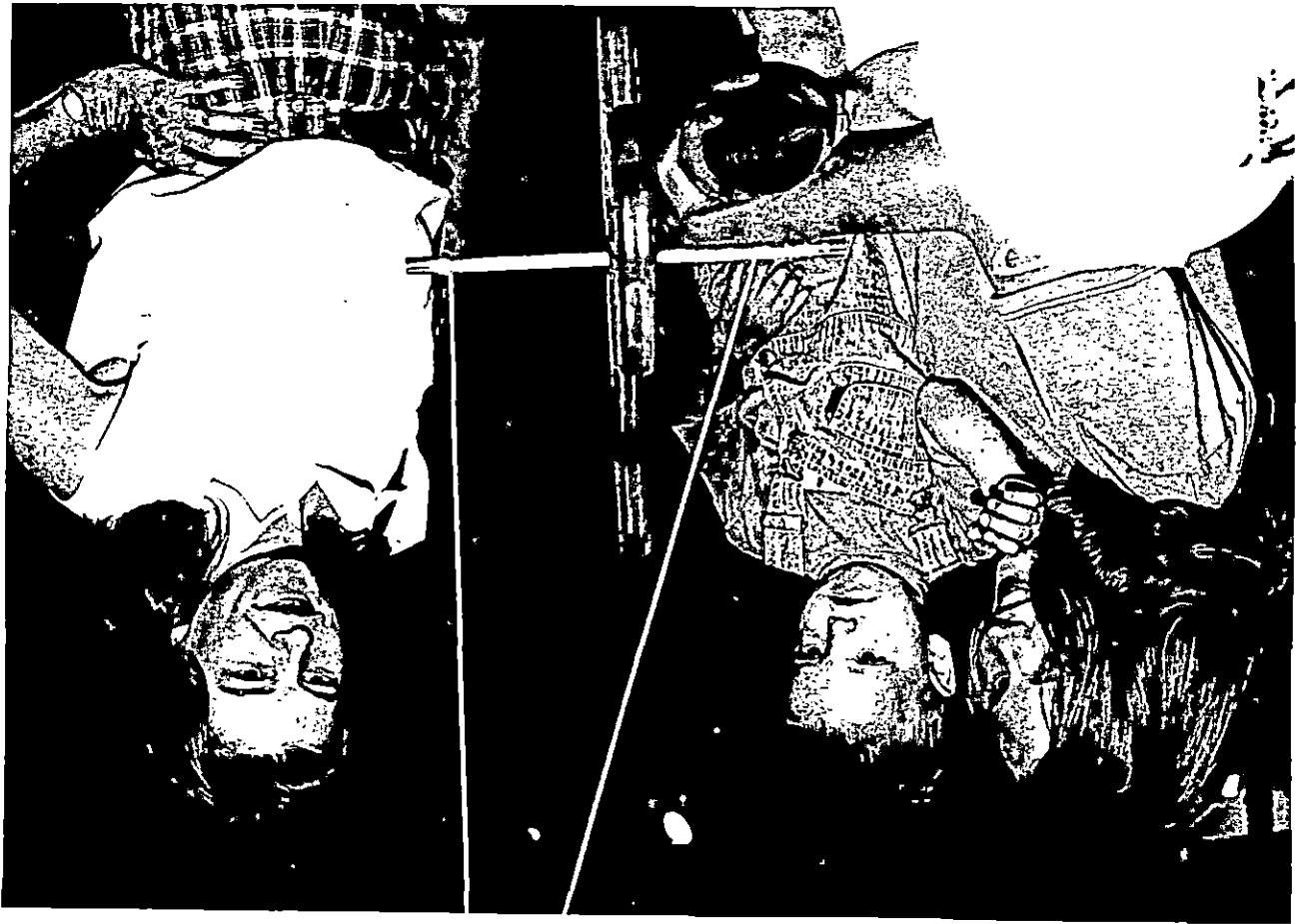

Tips on how to safely operate a cycle, beginning with the proper mounting technique and gradually working up to swerving and emergency braking techniques, also will be included.

Concluding the course will be a knowledge test and an on-cycle skills evaluation.
