ASHLAND, Ky.---Officials from Morehead State University and the Ramey-Estep Homes, Inc., today signed a professional training agreement providing for the sharing of resources and expertise.

The Ramey-Estep Homes, a private, not for profit treatment program for troubled adolescent males, will serve as a student teacher site as well as a learning environment for field experiences and practicums in a variety of disciplines for MSU students.

In return, MSU will provide appropriate consultant services to the homes, keep the agency informed of professional development opportunities for its staff and provide use of the Camden-Carroll Library to the staff for research and self-training.

"This truly is a remarkable partnership," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "When the Ramey-Estep Homes asked us if we would be interested in sharing resources, there was no question in our minds that this was something we wanted to pursue. This joint venture is further proof to the Ashland area that Morehead State is serious about its commitment to the region," Dr. Eaglin said.

"The staff of the Ramey-Estep Homes are very excited about this Memorandum of Agreement," said Rocky M. Hall, executive director of the Homes. "The services MSU can offer our staff, such as the use of the University's library, serving as a training informant and as a tour site, will enhance our ability to train our staff.

"Additionally, it will allow our program to grow and adapt to the continuous changes in the social services field. We were impressed with the MSU faculty's willingness and eagerness to participate in this agreement with our Homes," Hall added.

The agreement will impact a large number of our students, according to Dr. Harold Harty, dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences, whose departments will benefit most from the project.

"Undergraduate and graduate students in counseling, elementary and secondary education, health, physical education and recreation, sociology and social work programs will have the opportunity to work with and observe the staff of the Ramey-Estep Homes," said Dr. Harty. "The agreement allows us to offer our students a different learning experience," he added.

Dr. Marc D. Glasser, dean of MSU's Graduate and Extended Campus Programs, noted that the Ramey-Estep Homes are well-known in the region for providing a supportive environment to troubled youths and helping them to be successful.

"We are pleased to become a contributing partner to their efforts," Dr. Glasser said. "The Ramey-Estep Homes have a dedicated staff whose practices will be good models for our students," he added.

The Ramey-Estep Homes currently serve 77 males, who range in age from 12 to 21, and offer an on-site school program as part of the Boyd County School System.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Ascribing to the theory that students learn best by doing, Dr. Geoffrey Gearner, Morehead State University associate professor of biology, and three of his colleagues submitted a grant proposal to the National Science Foundation to improve their teaching of molecular biology.

As a result, the NSF, under its Instrumentation and Laboratory Improvement Program in the Division of Undergraduate Education, awarded MSU \$41,000 for a state-of-the-art undergraduate molecular biology laboratory. With the University matching the grant, the total for the project comes to \$82,000.

Working with Dr. Gearner on the lab proposal were Dr. David Magrane and Dr. David Saxon, professors of biology, and Dr. Craig Tuerk, assistant professor of biology.

"We've been teaching molecular biology by the traditional lecture method utilizing some simple demonstrations, but now our students will be able to gain more sophisticated experiences," said Dr. Gearner. "This really will improve our ability to teach concepts of molecular biology by letting students demonstrate those concepts in the lab themselves," he said.

"We wanted to enhance the undergraduate curriculum as a whole and not just one course," he added. Six science courses will be directly impacted with the addition of the lab equipment and it could impact others.

Dr. Gearner expects the eight station lab to be fully equipped by midterm, although some of the equipment is already in use. The lab is located in the new addition to Lappin Hall which opened two years ago. "We designed the lab in anticipation of being successful with our NSF proposal," he said.

The new equipment includes a floor model refrigerated centrifuge, a UV spectrophotometer and microplate reader, as well as student workstations composed of electrophoretic equipment, water bath and liquid handling equipment. In addition, a specialized digital camera will be used to document raw data generated by the students so they can analyze it.

Competition for NSF grants is generally pretty stiff, according to Carole Morella, director of research, grants and contracts, whose office assists faculty and staff in pursuing grants. There were 1,600 proposals from various science disciplines submitted for the Instrumentation and Laboratory Improvement Program and only 600 were funded.

"MSU faculty have had five successful NSF proposals in recent years, two of which were awarded this year. The faculty has done exceptionally well in obtaining grants to improve undergraduate instruction," Morella said.

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LAB EQUIPMENT ENHANCES LEARNING

Morehead State University science students are reaping the rewards of a successful grant proposal written by four faculty members of the Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences. A \$41,000 grant from the National Science Foundation's Instrumentation and Laboratory Improvement Program, matched by MSU, has resulted in a state-of-the-art molecular biology laboratory. Working on an experiment under the direction of Dr. Geoffrey Gearer, left, MSU associate professor of biology, are Yancy Holbrook, a Salyersville freshman, and Charity Salisbury, a Harold freshman. Milner won \$1,000 for his original music entitled "Olympic Fanfare and March" which he wrote during the summer while watching the '96 Olympics. The composition, which is nearly three minutes in length, will be performed by the Brass Band of the Tri-State on Tuesday, Dec. 10, at 7:30 p.m. at the Paramount Theater in Ashland.

"We are always happy to see our students honored for their own compositions, but, in this instance, are extremely pleased at the generosity of one of our former students," said Dr. Christopher Gallaher, chair of MSU's Department of Music.

Hill gave the MSU Foundation \$500 which was matched by his employer, Ashland Inc.

A native of Ashland, Hill is founder of the Brass Band of the Tri-State. This ensemble consists of professionals from the tri-state area of West Virginia, Ohio and Kentucky.

A music education major, Milner composes for all types of ensembles. He currently is working on an orchestral piece for another competition and would like to write film scores for movies in the future. MOREHEAD, Ky.—Teaching students that mathematics can be fun and they can enjoy the learning process has been one of the biggest challenges that Dr. Dora Cardenas Ahmadi, assistant professor of mathematics, has had to face since joining the faculty at Morehead State University.

"I find that when students first come to my class, they hate math," she said. "Thus, the job of changing attitudes and having them (the students) learn that they can do math is the first task. Once this is accomplished, only time limits how far students can go."

Dr. Ahmadi, who has been teaching math since grade school when she began tutoring her friends, describes math as "beautiful, fascinating. It's logic and helps us understand relationships; it explains so many things around us," she said. Now, she enjoys helping students see the "beauty" of it.

And with today's job market stressing the need for problem-solving skills, Dr. Ahmadi believes that all students need to rid themselves of their math fears because whatever career they plan to seek, they will be better prepared with a solid math background.

On the road to teaching good algebraic skills, Dr. Ahmadi incorporates various methods of teaching her subject that allows students to be more comfortable in her classroom. "Students need to be involved in the course," she said. "If they don't feel comfortable they won't ask questions and I don't know if they understand unless they ask."

In her calculus classes, Dr. Ahmadi has found that the students have a different attitude. "They are better prepared and ready to learn new material," she said. In this course, she uses the latest in teaching aids to promote active learning. Students explore mathematical ideas in groups, use computers and/or graphical calculators and present their work orally and in writing.

"It is enjoyable to see how hard they work and very satisfying to see the level of success they can achieve," she said.

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Dr. Ahmadi, who grew up in Cali, Columbia, taught math to middle school and high school students before advancing to the college level. She came to MSU from the University of Oklahoma where she was a teaching assistant, working on a Ph.D. in mathematics with an option in mathematics curriculum and pedagogy research. She also received her master's degree in mathematics there.

Her undergraduate years were spent at Mercy College of the University of the State of New York where she earned a B.S. degree in mathematics and at the University of Houston where she completed a B.S. degree in chemical engineering

In her nearly 10 years of teaching, Dr. Ahmadi has been active in several professional organizations and presented numerous papers. She is a member of the Mathematical Association of America, American Mathematical Society, Kentucky Association of College Mathematics Educators, Kentucky Academy of Science, and national and state Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Recently, she completed a year as a fellow with Project NExT, a prestigious national organization sponsored by the Mathematical Association of America and the Exxon Foundation. As part of this fellowship, she attended conferences, made presentations and stayed abreast of the latest research in teaching math with a score of other math professionals available to assist her in whatever needs she may have.

Dr. Ahmadi is married to Seyed Ahmadi, MSU assistant professor of economics. They are parents of three children.

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MSU PROFESSOR TEACHES STUDENTS 'MATH'S BEAUTY'

Dr. Dora Cardenas Ahmadi, assistant professor of math at Morehead State University, enjoys teaching math but more than that, she is concerned about her students understanding the subject. "Math is logic and helps us understand the relationship of things around us," she said. In the last 18 months, Dr. Ahmadi received her Ph.D. degree, assumed a teaching position at MSU and completed a year of personal development as a Project NExT Fellow, a program jointly sponsored by the Mathematical Association of America and the Exxon Foundation.

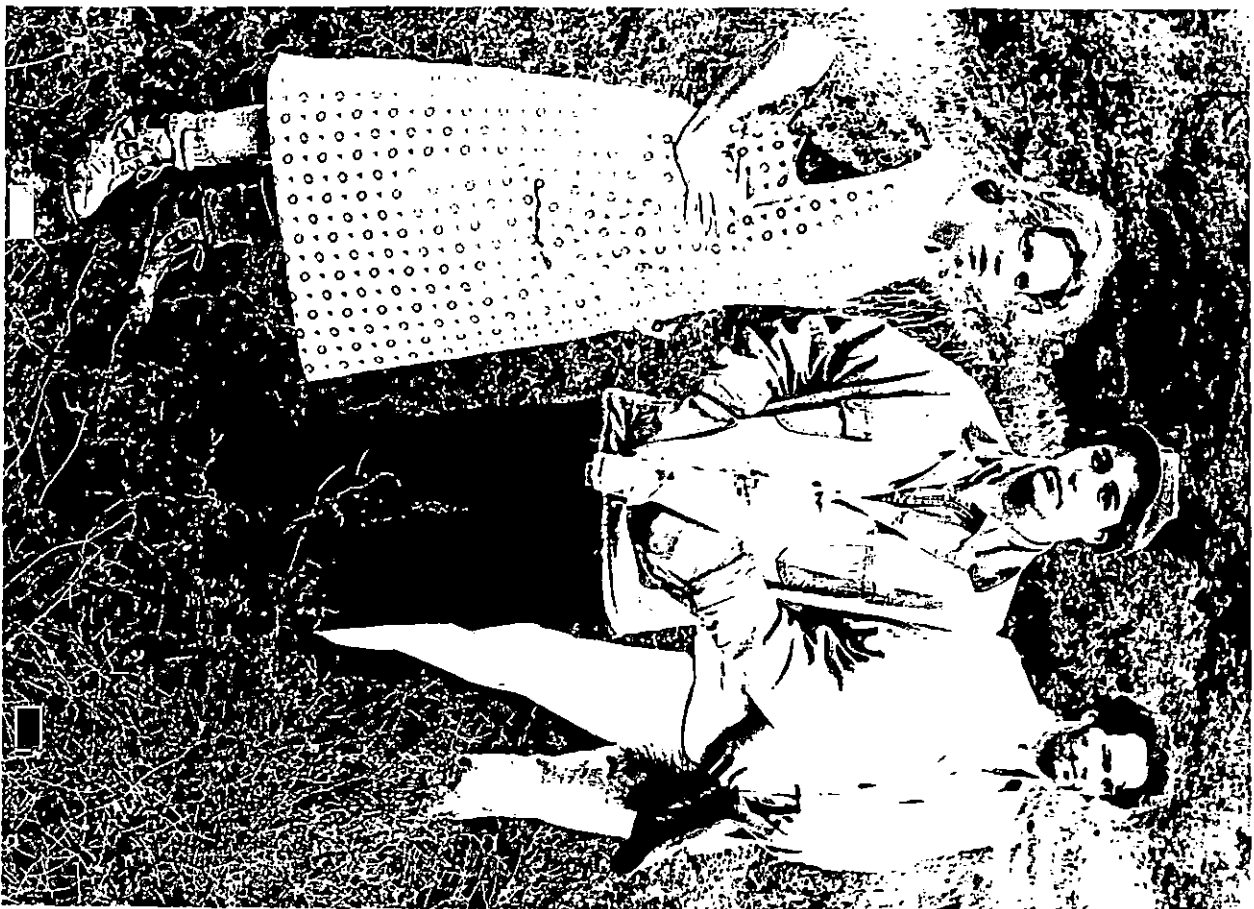

MOREHEAD, Ky.---With the beginning of the fall semester, student identification cards at Morehead State University have taken on a new look. According to Larry Stephenson, director of student activities, the change in ID cards has many advantages, both financially and technologically.

The new card looks like a credit card, featuring a color photograph of the Adron Doran University Center and a computer generated photograph of the student on front. A bar code and magnetic stripe are included on the back of the card.

One of the reasons MSU chose to go to a new ID system was a way to save money, Stephenson said. The photography equipment that had been used previously was in need of repairs. Also, the cost of film and lamination supplies had gone up.

The new card system, sponsored by the long distance phone company Sprint, will eliminate these costs. The company will loan photo equipment, computers and supplies to the university for the recarding process.

There is a second plus to the new ID system. "More things can be done with this card," said Stephenson. "The potential for options is great."

At first, students may not notice a difference in the two systems. Both cards allow access to various services, such as a dining plan and library services. The new card also can be used as a long distance calling card for students who become members of the phone service.

It's the potential of the card that offers the advantages, Stephenson added, noting that eventually students may be able to use the card in campus washers, dryers and vending machines. This will allow students to combine many services onto one card.

"Most universities are going with this system," Stephenson said. Sponsors vary from long distance phone companies to banks. Students at schools that use the bank system will have access to their bank accounts with the cards. They can be used in automatic teller machines and as debit cards at many local merchants.

One day this will be a possibility at MSU, Stephenson said, but "we're far down the road from the banking concept." Still, by changing to the new system, MSU is well on its way there, and according to Stephenson, saving money in the process.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Normally when we think of athletes, we do not include cheerleaders. But the time, training and athletic ability required of this group rivals other sports. Not only do they provide enthusiasm for the team they support, but they themselves must engage in competition at the state, regional and national levels.

Each year cheerleading gets more competitive and more demanding, according to Myron Doan, cheerleading coach at Morehead State University. "There's more emphasis on gymnastics and tumbling requirements and the routines get more complex," he said. "The participants must be dedicated or they could never keep up with the necessary regiment."

And as the requirements for the squads change, there are additional responsibilities for the coach. He or she must be knowledgeable of the safety standards and cheer programs as approved by the Universal Cheerleaders Association (UCA) and the American Association of Cheerleading Coaches and Advisers (AACCA).

But Doan is sharing the knowledge he has learned in the more than 15 years he has been coaching MSU's squad. Last year he prepared and edited the "The Collegiate Cheerleader," which has been endorsed by UCA as the official college cheer coaches' manual. The publication includes information on safety, legal responsibilities, performer readiness, competition and nutritional safety. Because techniques change so rapidly, he already is planning for the first revision in 1997.

Of MSU's three cheerleading squads, Doan is direct supervisor and coach for the co-ed varsity squad which cheers for football and men's basketball, and the Lady Eagle varsity squad which cheers for women's basketball games. He also works closely with a graduate assistant who coaches the all-girl cheer squad which performs at men's basketball games.

Being a cheerleader means being willing to make sacrifices for the good of the squad, Doan said. "They must go to classes like other students, but in addition, they attend practices three times a week and perform at athletic events, some of which occur during the time when other students are on break."

Doan is concerned that some still have the misconception that being selected a cheerleader is a "popularity" contest. In today's competitions, participants must be physically fit, self-disciplined and demonstrate athletic ability. In addition, because they are ambassadors for the University, they must be poised, articulate and project a positive appearance and image.

"After making the team, competition among the squad's members usually keeps the individuals on their toes to remain on the team," Doan said, noting that he has been fortunate in not having to deal with behavioral problems that other coaches have experienced.

MSU's cheerleaders are in practice almost all year. There's tryouts in April, summer practice in May and then camp in August. When school starts, so do the 10 hours a week of practice to get ready for football and basketball season. Whether or not they get a spring break or winter holiday depends on the University's athletic schedule.

As the squad prepares for this year's competition, it will do so under pressure of being the winners of the National College Cheerleading Championship. In fact, MSU has won the national title in Division I for the sixth consecutive year, its seventh time in nine appearances. Qualifying rounds will be held in November for the 1997 competition scheduled for Jan. 11 in Orlando.

Being national winners is not the ultimate goal, Doan is quick to stress. "I just want them to have fun and enjoy the experience," he said. "When we go to competition, the only thing I ask is that they do the best they can do."

But he is pleased that the hard work of the varsity cheerleaders did not go unnoticed this year. The team was profiled in the August 1996 edition of "American Cheerleader," complete with photo and comments by one of the members.

On a full-time basis, Doan is MSU's dean of students, responsible for implementation and supervision of the Student Conduct Code. He came to the University in 1972 and has held positions as assistant manager of WMKY Radio and assistant dean of students.

A native of Falmouth, he earned B.M.E. and M.M. degrees from MSU and was a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity, Alpha Epsilon Rho national broadcasting society and Phi Kappa Phi and Gamma Beta Phi honor societies.

In addition to featured speakers, presenters from all over the United States will explore the achievements of women, both ordinary and famous, in promoting social change.

The program for the sixth annual Grote Symposium will feature workshops, paper presentations and panel discussions on a variety of topics, according to Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU associate vice president for academic affairs and symposium chair.

Deedy has made numerous performances as a professional storyteller at festivals, schools, conferences, bookstores and museums nationwide and in Canada. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Because she ranks getting an education among the most important things in life, a Morehead State University student wants others to have the opportunity to share the experience.

Connie Spencer of **Denniston** has donated a quilt to help raise funds for the Roberta R. Brown Memorial Scholarship Fund. The scholarship will be given to a non-traditional student when the fund reaches \$10,000.

"We are always looking for fund-raising activities and are very appreciative of this contribution," said Jacquelyn H. Scott, MSU's non-traditional and commuter coordinator who started the original Non-Traditional Endowed Scholarship Fund. In 1995, the Non-Traditional Eagle Society voted to change the fund's name to honor the late West Liberty resident who had been a good role model for other non-traditional students.

"Connie is so grateful to be enrolled in school and this is her way of making a difference," Scott said. "Her enthusiasm is catching."

Other students tell her she is a "pot full of bubbles," but Spencer doesn't care what they think or that they tell her the bubble will get busted. "Not one person in my community has said I shouldn't be doing this (going to school)," she said. "And my professors have been so helpful; I appreciate everything they do for me," she added, noting that most young people don't take notice of the advantages they have available to them.

While she is only in her first semester of college, Spencer is sure this is the right place for her. "Other than my kids and my husband, this (education) is the most important thing in life. It makes me feel better than anything."

But deciding that one needs an education is no easy task, Spencer notes, adding that a 15-year absence from the classroom makes one apprehensive.

Spencer dropped out of high school when she was still a freshman and got married. "People always tell you what it's going to be like without an education, but no one knows how important it is until it's too late," she said.

For nearly nine years she worked at Continental Medals in Clay City before leaving for the birth of her first son. The desire to be a nurse, a dream she had had since she was a little girl, grew stronger during those quiet times while she was home and had time to think. "I thought I had wasted enough of my life and didn't want to waste the rest," she said.

After telling her husband Earl what she wanted to do, Spencer was even more encouraged when he was so supportive. "He said if it would make me feel better, do it," she said, noting that besides the moral support he volunteered to help with arrangements for their sons, Morgan, 3, and Travis, 2.

By the time she enrolled in college, Spencer had decided to major in nursing so she could "help others and show people that I care." She followed that same philosophy when she decided to make the quilt.

After hearing Scott discuss the scholarship fund during freshman orientation, Spencer tried to think of ways she could make a contribution. "Quilting is something I've done all my life," she said, adding that she wanted to do something that would appeal to everyone.

When Scott approved of her idea, Spencer decided to make it an MSU quilt. She purchased the materials, deciding on a blue background with MSU running diagonally across gold material, machine stitched and then tacked. It includes the year and 10 school scenes.

"I wanted to make something that everyone could relate to," Spencer said. She hopes the person who gets the quilt really enjoys it, but if they don't, she enjoyed making it.

If proceeds are substantial, Spencer plans to make a quilt each year as long as she is physically able. "It's wonderful to go to school and everyone should have this experience," she said.

Those who wish to support this endeavor, which is especially for non-traditional students, are encouraged to purchase a \$2 ticket for the quilt which will be given away near the end of the semester, Spencer said.

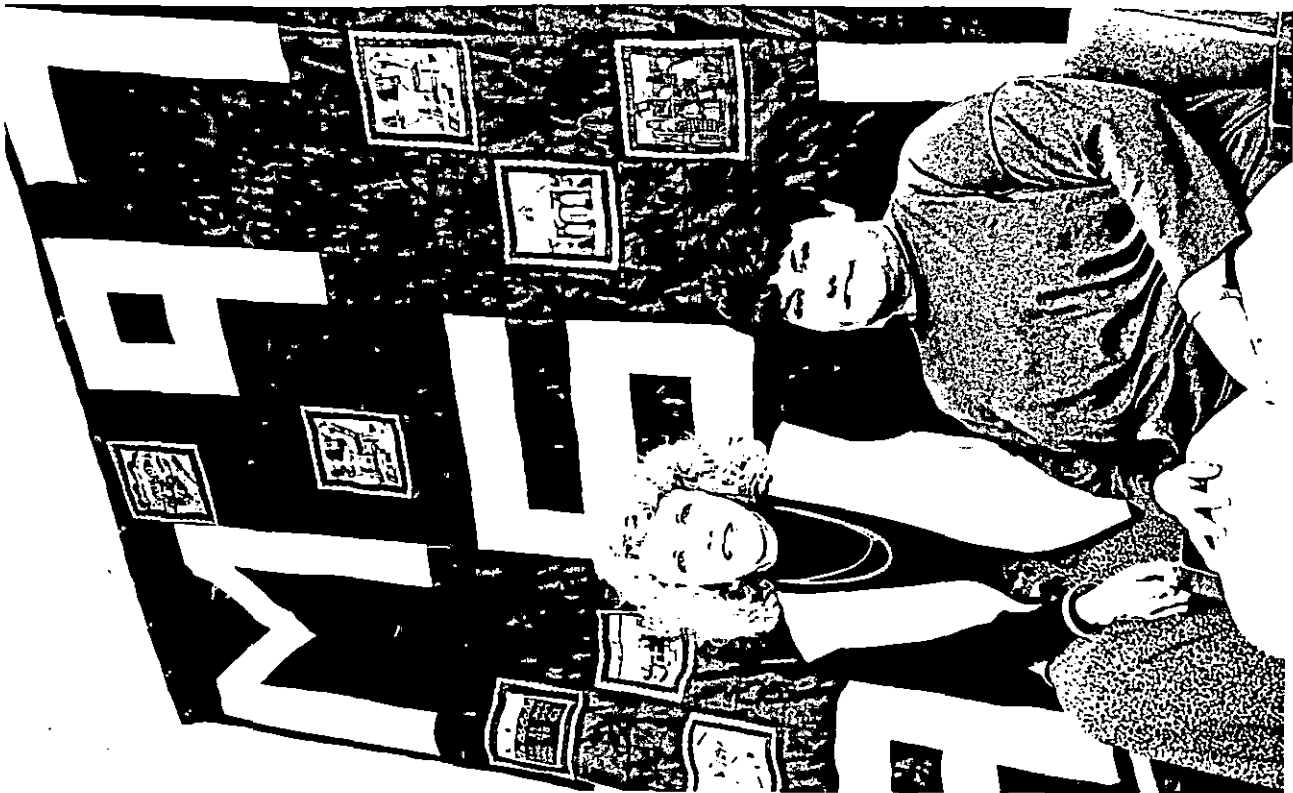

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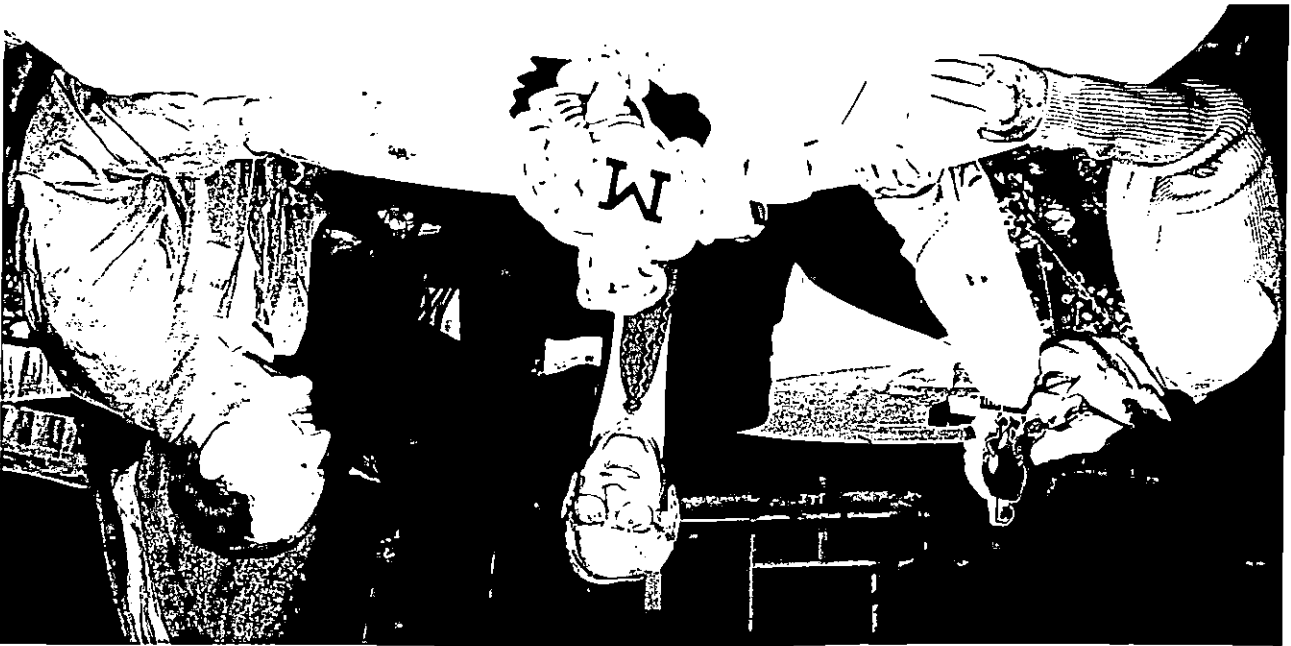
