**Kentucky Will Have Many Quail This Season**

Is Reported Best Hatching Season In Many Years

Steve Wakefield, field representative for the Division of Game and Fish, after making a survey of two thirds of the counties in the State to check the results of the quail distribution, reports this is the best quail hatching season the Commonwealth has enjoyed in years.

The indications are that there will be more quail this fall than has been noted for the past 25 years. This is proof, Wakefield stated, that the Division of Game and Fish is right in planting quail in pits in the spring of the year. Hereafter quail were placed in the fields in covens in the fall of the year at about ten weeks old, but did not show very good results. After experimentation the Department found that adult quail distributed in pairs in the early spring are better able to take care of themselves; hatch a larger number of young; and protect them better than was formerly the case with young covens planted in the fall.

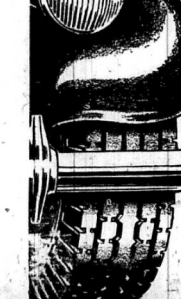

### He Went To Jail—And It Added To His Greatness

Who do you suppose was the most famous short-story writer who ever lived? You have read his stories. More than six million copies of his books have been sold, and they have been translated into at most every language on earth, including the Japanese, Esperanto, Czech-Slovakian, Danish, Norwegian, French, German, Swedish and Russian. His pen was born about seventy years ago.

O. Henry's life is a striking illustration of a man who battled against tremendous odds and succeeded, in spite of terrible handicaps.

First, he had the handicap of very little education. He didn't even attend high school, and he never saw the inside of a college, yet his good stories are studied as models of good writing in half the universities of the land.

Second, he was handicapped by the ravages of disease. The doctors feared that he was going to die of consumption, so they took him away from his home in North Carolina, sent him down to Texas, and he got a job herding sheep on a ranch there.

Today, automobile tourists drive hundreds of miles out of their way to see that ranch, and as they approach it, they look their cars and walk reverently over the ground where O. Henry once tended his flocks.

Third, he had the apparent misfortune of being thrown into prison. It happened this way.

After he regained his health, O. Henry returned to his home in Austin, Texas. The cowboys and sheep men in that section had the habit of walking into the bank when the clerks were busy and helping themselves to as much cash as they wanted, signing a receipt

for it, and then going about their business.

Suddenly one day a state bank examiner came to town, inspected the bank's cash—and found money missing. O. Henry, the cashier, was arrested. He was handed into court, and although he probably had never taken a dishonest dollar himself, nevertheless he was sent to prison for five years.

The prison sentence seemed like a calamity at the time, for O. Henry began writing, in prison, the brilliant stories that were destined to make his name honored and loved wherever the English language is spoken. It is quite probable that he would never have written at all if he hadn't been sent to prison.

I was talking to Warden Lawson, of Sing Sing, recently, and he told me that almost every man in Sing Sing wants to write the story of his life. In fact, so many of the prisoners in Sing Sing want to write that the prison school gives them a free course in short-story writing. Fortunately, very few of them succeed, but nevertheless, it is a fact that many well-known men have written in jail.

When Richard Lovelace was thrown into an English prison, two hundred and fifty years ago, he glorified his dangerous writing situation of the well-known poems of the English language. It is a love poem that he wrote to his sweetheart. It is entitled, "To Thine from Prison. Stone walls do not a prison make, Nor iron bars a cage.

The spiritless mind, an innocent, Calls that a hermitage; If I have freedom in my love, And in my soul am free, Angels alone that are above, Enjoy such liberty.

SUBJECT: CALEB: LIFETIME DEVOTION. Joshua 16:9-15.

Golden Text: "Let us go on at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it." Numbers 13:30.

Caleb is one of the only two persons who started from Egypt, who were permitted to enter the Promised Land. He and Joshua, the other who entered, were the two of the twelve spies who went from Kadesh-Barnea to spy out the Promised Land. They brought back what we call in this modern day a "minority report." The other ten said there were giants, warlike men, in that country, and other obstacles, all of which made victory impossible. Caleb and Joshua reported in the words of the Golden Text.

"I. H. Meyer gives a graphic comment on Caleb which I quote here: "Amid the marchings and counter-marchings, the innumerable deaths, the murrainings and rebellions of the people, he retained a steadfast purpose to do only God's will, to please Him. To know no other leader, and to heed no other voice. It was of no use to try and involve that stout lion's cub in any movement against Moses and Aaron. He would be no party to Miriam's jealous spite. He would not be allured by the wiles of the girls of Moab. Always strong and true and pure and noble, like a rock in a changeful sea, a snow-capped peak in a change of cloud and storm and sun. A man in whose weaker nature men could hide, and who must have been a tower of strength to that new and younger generation which grew up to fill the vacant places in the van of Israel." He bore fruit in old age, and to the last was fat and flourishing."

Caleb was eighty-five when he asked for the hardest place in the conquest of Canaan. Hebron was a mountain section, fortified against attack by a strong people. Caleb knew it was difficult, but he told Joshua he was as strong as he was forty years ago, and that the Lord would be with him. The result was that he conquered because that he wholly followed the Lord God of Israel."

Few men live to be eighty-five now, much less boast of their youthful strength and vigor. Right living will produce long life. Obedience to the laws of health, to the laws of government, to the laws of morality and to the laws of spiritual life will make a man live long and be strong. This is the dispirited nation of ours is a nursery of sick babes compared to Caleb.

On the other hand, many of our older soldiers of the Cross are laid on the shelf entirely too early. About the time a preacher has accumulated enough experience and sense to be rich in the values of life to the people, these modern churches want to lay him aside. Why? Well, he has "grown old" and doesn't see eye to eye with our younger generation. Really, that is why he is now more valuable. He knows a better way. It's the old story of "old fogies" who are too slow for a "progressive" age. This world is too fast. It has run on ahead of most of the things worth while, and left them. Caleb had lived a vigorous life, a sensible life, and when given a chance, showed himself able to conquer big things. But his age and experience had taught him that the great strongholds of life are conquered "not by might nor power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord."

# Farm News

## A NUMBER OF THINGS

The Mexican Bean Beetle. Concerning this pest, reports are mixed. In some parts of Kentucky, none is found. In other, however, it is abundant, nevertheless vigilance should be maintained. Where a full crop is about, or a super-crop, as in some reports, the fight must be obviously continued. Always, the schedule should be observed. The spray or dust for the first time when egg-clusters are seen, and again, 10 days later, no more, no less. Perhaps, a third spraying, 10 days later, may be needed, but two properly given, usually are adequate. The control materials must be put on the under side of the leaves, where the larvae always, and only, feed.

Bordeaux Mixture.—As all gardeners know, this is the spray to use to stop "blight" on tomatoes, egg plants and saffaly, and many are protecting their crops. As a result of the wet weather and cool nights, mildew has appeared on these crops and on beans. The control usually recommended is spraying with lime-sulfur or with copper oxide spray, but Bordeaux may be used instead, for Bordeaux is easy to make or everywhere easy to obtain in prepared form, whereas the others may not be. 4-1-50 is the proper strength. In beans, the regular bean beetle schedule will serve, the customary arsenical added to the Bordeaux, to control both troubles. On tomatoes, the first Bordeaux spraying should be given as soon as any "blue mold" is observed, and a second should follow in 10 days. These two sprayings will serve also to check the tomato "blight" to come later. Thus a double purpose is accomplished.

Late Cabbage.—July 1 is the accepted date to set late cabbage plants, of the varieties Late Flathead or Louisville Drumhead. If none can be had, seed may be sown in groups of three or four where the cabbage is to stand, the seedlings thinned to one at a place. The varieties should be medium early, as Copenhagen Market, Succession or All-Seasons. If a variety is suspected in the soil, Wisconsin No. 8 should be used instead or the standard late sorts, and Wisconsin All-Seasons instead of the medium early sorts just named.

Winter Beets.—It should not be overlooked, now, to make a sowing of beets for winter storing or for late canning. Detroit Dark Red is the best variety.

Cultivation.—At the risk of being considered illiterate, the remainder is given to shave or "scalp" the soil surface, rather than to "work" it deeply, and to make no hills or ridges about the plants or along the rows. This is dry weather "in, advance," and dry weather may come. At least, labor has been saved the gardener, and this is something.

## THE FARM AND HOME

Since it costs 25 percent more to add an outlet after the job has been completed, wiring should be carefully planned, with consideration to future needs, and with the excess of outlets rather than too few.

Shade and an abundance of good drinking water are two requirements of livestock and poultry during the hot months. Where there are no trees, sheds should be provided for shade. Many farmers are using water tanks made of concrete or other materials.

Cold milk is a delicious summer drink. Either whole or skimmed, it is especially palatable on a hot day, when properly cold, and serves both as a food and as a drink. Many persons who think they dislike milk, relish it cold in summer.

Close clipping of the lawn in mid-summer may permit the sun to burn out much of the grass. Set the mower to cut as high as possible, and mow the lawn only often enough to keep it from looking unkempt.

Dairy farmers who will need butts for fall or winter should be looking about them now, suggests the dairy division of the College of Agriculture. "Do not wait until the last minute and expect to find the butt you want at your price."

Four months afterwards Chase appeared at a little Indian village clad as bargained, stronger than ever, and collected his wages.
