Stanley Yates, driver of a local "Mary Jane" bread truck, property of the Midland Baking Company, Morehead, escaped serious injury when his truck, headed toward Morehead, crashed into a pick-up truck Monday afternoon near Brammers Store, seven miles east of Morehead.

The pick-up truck was from Wisconsin and was driven by a representative of an electric concern of that state. Loaded with several drums of oil the pick-up is said to have swayed on a curve so that Yates was unable to give his loaded bread truck from its path.

Both trucks were completely demolished by the impact. Yates suffered serious cuts about the head and mouth requiring several stitches to close.
