# To the Good Citizens Who Receive Old Age Pensions

### To the people now receiving Old Age Assistance checks: Are you spending your old age pension checks in ritious living?

Old age pensions in Kentucky have averaged \$9.37 a month; many receive considerable less. Yet Governor Chandler said when the first checks were delivered by him "don't spend this in ritious living, because if you do I will take it away from you."

In 1933 the United States Congress, under the leadership of President Roosevelt and Senator Alben W. Barkley, passed an act under which every person 65 years of age and in need can secure a pension of \$30 a month, if the state in which the person resides cooperates with the federal government. Many persons in Kentucky, by reason of circumstances beyond their control, have been forced to secure or to apply for this old age assistance. This is not to their discredit, but it is to the discredit of Governor Chandler and his administration that Kentucky is third from the bottom among all the states in the amount paid to these needy people. Only Mississippi and Arkansas are lower. Ohio pays \$23.04, Illinois \$17.90, Indiana \$16.12, California \$32.91. Old Age pensions in Kentucky have averaged only \$9.37 a month.

Governor Chandler promised the old people of this State in 1935 when he was a candidate for Governor that he would support legislation providing for pensions of \$30 a month. After he was elected Governor, he put through a bill in the Kentucky legislature limiting to a maximum of \$7.50 a month the amount Kentucky would pay to each pensioner, thus refusing to match the money offered by the federal government through the efforts of men like Senator Barkley, which would have made possible to you and other pensioners payment of \$30 a month.

Do you realize that every unnecessary employe in the Old Age Pension Department of the State government takes money away from the old people of this state? Do you realize that the pay of each such employe would provide for more than thirteen old people the average amount which pensioners have been receiving, or would help to increase the amount you have been receiving? Yet

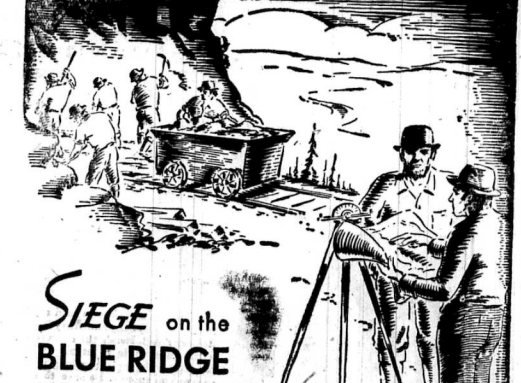
hundreds of such jobs have been by the Chandler administration to his political henchmen for the purpose of strengthening the Chandler political machine in the present campaign.

Do you realize that during July Governor Chandler is putting approximately twenty thousand additional old people on the pension list who will receive a check in July and possibly in August before the primary, and then in all probability be dropped from the pension rolls? The money to pay these new pensioners will come from what would otherwise go to you, as no additional funds have been made available by the state administration for old age pensions during the next two years.

In addition to this shameful treatment of the old age pensioners, Governor Chandler is now attempting to intimidate them, under threat of being deprived of their pensions, into voting for him in the present primary. July checks are being delivered in person by field agents who are attempting to deceive the pensioners in believing that unless Governor Chandler is elected United States Senator the pension checks will be discontinued.

You are entitled to the pension you are receiving. It should be \$30 a month. The funds for these pensions do not come from Governor Chandler, but from tax money paid by the people. It was made possible by President Roosevelt with the help of men like Senator Barkley, who stands for and who voted for pensions of \$30 a month. Governor Chandler has reduced them to the pitiful small amount which you are now receiving. Remember these facts on August 6th and go to the polls and vote for Senator Barkley. The ballot is secret. You can vote as you please. There is no way the pension agents who threaten you can find out how you vote. Show your resentment against the treatment Governor Chandler is giving you and your appreciation for the friendship of Senator Barkley by voting for Senator Barkley. Ask your friends and relatives to help you obtain the \$30 pension to which you are entitled by voting for Senator Barkley for United States Senator.

## SIEGE on the BLUE RIDGE

ENTER now Claudius Crozet, Esq., a picturesque and important figure in the Chesapeake and Ohio story. Ex-officer of Napoleon, first professor of engineering at West Point, an organizer of Virginia Military Institute, Principal Engineer of the State of Virginia, he was an engineering genius and man of vision.

Q He had been champion of steam railroads before any were operated in America, advocate of tunneling mountains before it had ever been attempted for a railroad. To him the State entrusted the tunneling of the Blue Ridge and building of the 17-mile Blue Ridge Railroad to connect with the Louisa Railroad, and later, become its property.

Q Having surveyed the mountains, Crozet anticipated "more difficulties in 6 1/2 miles than usually are spread over fifty." Yet he little knew how great would be the obstacles or how long the task. Work begun in 1849 was not ended

until 1854. He had not foreseen the underground problems—rock of extraordinary hardness in one place, soft and crumbling formations in another. . . . subterranean floods. . . . dangerous rock-slides

Q Yet he won. Armed for his siege of the heights with none of the modern equipment, he built not one but four tunnels through the Blue Ridge. They stand as models of engineering technique and as a monument to the pioneer hardihood which built this railroad. . . . Today, as the inspiration of devotion to a vision of service, Chesapeake and Ohio takes the noble example of Claudius Crozet

SUBJECT: GIDEON: FOLLOWING IN GOD'S PLAN. Judges 7: 1-15:24

Golden Text: "Have not I commanded thee? Be strong and of good courage." (Joshua 1:9)

Gideon camped by the spring of Harod with an army of thirty thousand men, men who had been hastily mobilized, and were, for the most part, untrained. He thought the army too large. This, in spite of the fact that just across the hill lay the hostile Midianites in large numbers like bands of locusts.

God said to Gideon: "Reduce the number of men. Tell all who are afraid to turn back to their homes." At this test twenty-two thousand left the army. That many men, who lacked courage could have wrecked the army, and brought defeat.

The mixed multitude of moral cowards which we have to carry along in our citizenship, and often in our religious movements, are often the cause of our defeats, and our lack of spiritual progress.

Still the army was too large for God. He applied another test: "Let the men to lap water like a dog. All who cannot do it can return to their homes." All but three hundred men returned to their homes.

With three hundred men Gideon struck the choice soldiers of the army—Gideon was to attack the almost innumerable host of the Midianites.

What did Gideon think of all this? Whatever he thought, he had learned to trust God. God needs men, but it is not by the multitude of men that he does his work; it is by the courage and surrender of men. One man surrendered to God for use in His plan.

worth more than a thousand who are afraid to trust God. So God encouraged Gideon that night. In the darkness he sent Gideon, and an officer down the hill to the camp of the Midianites. They crept to the side of a tent and heard two wakeful soldiers talking. One was telling of a dream: "I dreamed that a cake of barley rolled into the Midian camp, struck a tent, and overturned it so that it lay upon its side. The other replied: 'I understand the interpretation. This barley cake is the sword of Gideon. Into his hand we shall fall.' Gideon and his aide went back to their army camp.

While God uses men in His purposes, He also uses a sword. He advised Gideon's men into three companies—a hundred in each company—and put into the hand of each man a trumpet and a pitcher with a torch inside it. They quietly entered the camp of Midian all around the hills above while it was dark. Together they blew their trumpets, arousing the sleeping Midianites, then together they broke their pitchers, making a ring of light around the hills. Together they cried: "For Jehovah and for Gideon!"

Thinking that thousands were upon them, the Midianites were frightened and demoralized. It was easier for Gideon's men to fall upon the Midianites. The victory was complete. Gideon followed God's plan even though it was against all military tactics. Gideon's purposes have never been accomplished by the might of many. They have been done by the might of God through the courage and willingness of a few. This is the way of God.

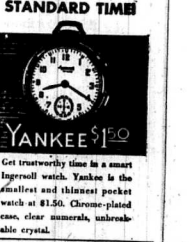

## He Wasn't The Only Smart Man With A Bad Memory

THOMAS A. EDISON  
One day when I was having lunch at the Vanderbilt Hotel in New York, I noticed that when the coat room girl took my hat, she didn't give me a check for it. I was a bit surprised and I asked her why she said it wasn't necessary to give me a check—that she would remember me—and she did. She told me that she had often taken the hats and coats of two hundred strangers, stacked them up in a pile and handed each man the right coat and the right hat as he walked out. I talked to the manager of the hotel and he told me this girl hadn't made a memory mistake in fifteen years.

I doubt whether Thomas Edison could have accomplished a feat like that even if you had offered him a million dollars. Edison had a very poor memory—especially in his youth. In school, he forgot everything he was taught, and he was always at the foot of his class. He drove his teachers to despair. They declared that he was a dullard, a rascal, a failure.

But that was too stupid to learn, and the doctors even predicted he would have brain trouble, for his head had an extraordinary shape. As a matter of fact, he attended school only three months during his entire life. At home and what a magnificent job he did, for he all but transformed the world in which we live.

Yet later in life Thomas Edison developed a remarkable memory for scientific data, and he mastered most of the scientific facts in his vast private library. He developed an extraordinary ability to concentrate, to forget everything but the subject he had in hand.

**Farmers Should Plan For Federal Loans Now, Cobb Says**  
Prompness Necessary For Best Results; Demand May Be Heavy  
"Now is the time for farmers expecting to borrow from the Farm Security Administration for 1939, to begin making their farm plans," said County Supervisor Clarence W. Cobb, Morehead, who is in charge of the Farm Security Administration's rehabilitation program in Carter, Elliott and Rowan Counties.

"The plans should provide for seeding winter cover crops, winter legumes and fall grains this fall, in addition to a balanced farm plan for 1939 and thereafter. In order to make satisfactory plans for fall planting, it is advisable if possible for tenant farmers to make rental agreements during July and August, Mr. Cobb said." If loans are needed to assist in financing these plans, the FSA is prepared to make small loans to farmers who are unable to secure adequate financing elsewhere," he pointed out.

Explaining that the lack of the Farm Security Administration is not only to help disadvantaged farmers by lending them money but by assisting them to adopt successful farming practices, Mr. Cobb stressed the need of starting early.

"Our goal is to try to get every FSA borrower, whether tenant or owner, to have his farm plan worked out during late summer and early fall," he said.

"Hard work combined with convenient credit, good equipment and good farming practices, in most cases, mean the difference between failure and success, but in order to get good farming practices underway we have to plan ahead," he added.

**Penalty for Violation by School Teacher:** Any principal or teacher, or other officer who shall willfully fail to comply with the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined more than twenty-five dollars nor more than fifty dollars and may have his certificate revoked.

**Six Radio Speeches Planned By Head Of Social Security**  
New Laws Concerning Federal Set-Up Will Be Discussed  
A statement just issued by M. E. Vaughn, Manager of the Lexington office of the Social Security Board reveals that he will begin a series of six radio speeches over WLAJ Broadcasting Station, Lexington, Kentucky at 4:30 Friday afternoon.

According to Mr. Vaughn, employer and employee wage taxes for the Old Age Retirement Fund are paid on a quarterly basis. The deductions for the months of April, May and June are due and payable before the close of duties on July 31. Only one week remains to file a complete return of taxes on wages paid during the last three months to the Bureau of Internal Revenue, Louisville, Kentucky, Mr. Vaughn said.

Since it is the responsibility of the Bureau of Internal Revenue to handle all tax matters, Mr. Vaughn as representative of the Social Security Board is primarily interested in seeing that all employers understand their responsibility and are relieved of any tax delinquency burdens.
