Proctor's Injunction Over-Ruled

Local Attorney Wins Delay In Attempted Dis-Barment Proceedings Brought Here

Former Rowan County Attorney W. E. Proctor lost his motion for a restraining order against the Kentucky Bar Association to halt their lawyers from taking evidence in the disbarment proceedings against him, but won a delay in the case here Tuesday.

Special Judge Hannah over-ruled Proctor's motion for a permanent restraining order, which would automatically have done away with the disbarment case which was brought by Norman Lewis. However, it was agreed by Francis M. Burke and other lawyers from the Bar Association to wait until after the October term of Circuit Court before taking evidence since Lewis has filed a civil action against Proctor, which will be tried at that time.

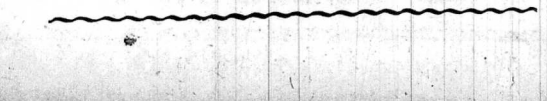

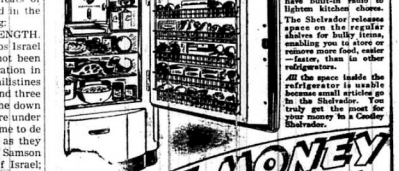

The Governor Spends Much Time Away

During those absences, Lieutenant Governor Keen Johnson was acting Governor, for services as acting Governor, Johnson has received \$2,599.25.

Chandler will go down in history as Kentucky's greatest vacation Governor. Those vacation trips took him to the Caribbean Sea, Cuba, Mexico, Louisiana, several times, Va., Indiana, New York, Virginia, and several other states. He has spent a lot of time at mineral springs about the country.

The record shows that Governor Chandler was out of Kentucky the following days: In 1936—January 2, April 4, May 6, June 11, August, September 4, October 17, December 3, 1937—January 5, February 4, April 28, May 1, Sept. 2 to Oct. 2, for 31 days, Dec. 2, 1938—January 8, April 5.

He spent those three days in January, 1938 in Washington trying to get President Roosevelt, Senator Barkley and Senator M. M. Logan to enter into a trade under which Senator Logan would have been given a position on the federal bench and thereby pave the way for his entry into the Senate without running against Barkley.
