City Council In Consolidation Move

Hendrix Tolliver To Head Dept. Of Public Works
At a meeting held Wednesday, April 17, the Morehead City Council placed the gas, water and street departments under one head to be known as the "Department of Public Works."
Designed toward economy and efficiency, the new department will be headed by Hendrix Tolliver as superintendent in charge.
According to council members the move is expected to save the city at least twenty dollars on the month as concerned with the monthly expense of the last two years.

At this same meeting an ordinance was passed requiring property owners and persons in charge of property to remove all filth, garbage, waste and refuse from their premises and not allowing same to accumulate thereon.
The council set the fine at not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars for any person found guilty of breaking this ordinance.
An ordinance was also passed providing for a license fee to be collected from the operators or owners of any skating rink or swimming pool, operated within the city limits of the city of Morehead and such revenue may be derived from said license shall be placed in the general fund for the use of the city of Morehead. The license fee for operating the rink or pool is to be twenty-five dollars per year, the council set out. Any person breaking this ordinance if found guilty will be fined not less than fifteen dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars.

At the adjourned meeting held Tuesday, April 23, a delegation of citizens came before the city council asking that Lyons Avenue be improved, also that the street running from Wilson Avenue to Sigs Avenue be extended to Lyons Avenue.
Mr. Holland, NYA supervisor of Research and Statistics, explained to the council a proposed WPA project. The project would be embodied in such a way as to tax map for the city. Such a map, Mr. Holland explained, would prevent any property from escaping tax evaluation.

Ky. State Officers Seize Hi-Jacked Whiskey Here

Was Mason, Mt. Sterling, Arrested By State Officers

Twenty cases of whiskey, identified as part of two truckloads that were hi-jacked between Walton, Boone county, and Cincinnati in June 1939, were confiscated and one man was arrested last week on four charges; state revenue agents said.
A second man, they said, escaped but dumped ten cases of the hi-jacked liquor from his car near Bluestone, seven miles from Morehead.

Wesley Mason of Mt. Sterling was arrested by the revenue agents W. A. Jambo, B. S. Wigginton, J. Sam Sternberg, W. E. Hill, John M. Lytle and Leo Smith. Mason was released on \$1,000 bond pending his appearance here April 23 for a hearing before a U. S. commissioner.

Charges lodged against Mason, the officers said here: Knowledge by having in possession stolen liquor, transporting liquor without a license and carrying concealed a deadly weapon.

According to the state agents, Mason was arrested at a local dispensary where they said he was attempting to sell ten cases of whiskey which was found in his car near the dispensary.
A second man, driving another truck loaded with whiskey, fled in his automobile and outdistanced the officers, they said. Later in the night John Jones notified officers here that he had found ten cases of whiskey which had been dumped on the roadside near Bluestone, seven miles from Morehead.
