## Barkley Carries County; Wins By Landslide

### Children Of Prof. Banks Are Injured

#### Fear That Amputation May Be Necessary Of Bill Banks' Right Arm

Failure of the brakes on a bicycle to hold caused injuries to Billy Banks, 11, and his sister, Gay 8, years old children of Dr. and Mrs. G. B. Banks in West Morehead Tuesday afternoon.

The children, riding double on the bicycle, were coming off the hill near Turner's Store, when they were unable to stop or slow down as they hit U. S. highway 60. The bike crashed into the car of Robert Maters.

Billy was immediately taken to the hospital after receiving local first aid. He received deep bruises and cuts about the head and body while his arm was mangled. It is feared that the arm will have to be amputated, but physicians are waiting in an attempt to save the member.

Gay received cuts and bruises about the body. Her injuries were painful although not serious.

### Frank Conn, 49, Killed Thursday By C. & O. Train

Funeral services for Frank Conn, 49, who was killed Thursday by a Chesapeake and Ohio train was held at the Hayes cemetery at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

He was found Friday morning on the railroad tracks near Hittman, his body in a mangled condition. It is believed that either passenger train number 24 or an early freight hit him.

Mr. Conn was born December 18, 1888 at Pond Lick, Ky., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leiza Conn. He had been an employee of the Kentucky Fire Brick Company for the last 25 years.

Surviving are his wife, Martha Hall Burton Conn and the following seven children: Luther, Homer, Platte May, Myrtle, Lorene Margaret and Mable Sue. He also has two surviving brothers, Luther Conn, and Bill Conn, both of Flemingsburg and a sister, Pearl Murphree, Tripplet, Ky.

### Bates' Majority For Congress Nears 15,000 Mark

Incumbent Carries Fifteen of Twenty Counties; Wins Greenup By Almost 15 To 1

Carrying his home county, Greenup, by 3,150 votes, the largest majority a candidate ever received there, Joe B. Bates was nominated on the Democratic ticket for Congress by a decisive lead of almost 15,000 votes. Thomas Burchett, Ashland, was second in the race in which sixteen men participated.

Bates carried 15 of the 20 counties in the district with Burchett carrying 1 and Blake four. Mr. Bates ran a close second in those counties which he lost.

Burchett carried his home county, Boyd, while Blake carried Nicholas, where he lives. Blake also had a plurality in Bracken and Mason.

Bates received almost as many votes as all the other candidates combined. He will be opposed in November by Cliff Hayes, who received the Republican nomination without any opposition.

### City Council Acts To Curb Bad Drainage

### Adkins Captures Elliott Judge's Nomination

#### Barkley Carries County By 291; Bates Runs Far Ahead Of Burchett

Harold Adkins won the Democratic nomination for county judge in Elliott County in a three-cornered race in which the candidates were separated by only 50 votes.

Bobby, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Hogge and the printer's devil at the Rowan County News explains it this way:

"We were in swimming when the undertow caught us and dragged us to the bottom of the pool. I struggled and struggled in an attempt to reach the surface but I could not get away from the undertow. Finally I gave up fighting and a thousand thoughts flashed through my mind in what I guess was a few seconds but seemed like hours."

"I thought of my mother then I thought of all the men thing. I had done in my life (knowing I didn't see what men things he has ever done). Then Mother kept coming to my mind again and then I thought that surely I wasn't going to meet my death by drowning."

"Just as everything was going black I came into contact with the stone wall along the dam and just remember pulling myself out to land. The undertow had swirled him into the bank."

### Wins Primary With 70,000 Majority

 A majority of over 70,000, the largest ever recorded by a candidate in a Democratic primary in Kentucky, was given to Senator Alden W. Barkley in Saturday's "red hot" Kentucky primary. Senator Barkley, an ardent New Dealer, and majority floor-leader had the support of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Following Senator Barkley's landslide victory Governor Chandler wired him his congratulations and pledged his support in the November election.

### Committee Reports Merchants Giving Generously To Support Of Event

Thirteen proved to be a lucky number for Allen Barkley in these parts.

Senator Barkley carried 13 precincts in Rowan County; was leading 13 votes after 13 precincts were counted; carried number 8 precinct by 13 votes, and carried 13 counties in the Eighth Congressional District.

### Majority In State Climbs Above 70,000; Gov. Chandler Concedes

Senator Alden W. Barkley won re-nomination for United States Senator by the largest majority that was ever given a candidate in a Democratic primary in Kentucky.

His final majority was 70,883. It was a landslide for the ardent New Dealer and Majority Floor Leader. Senator Barkley jumped into a lead on the first precinct reported in the state and continued to increase it rapidly thereafter until Tuesday when the count was finally completed.

John P. Haswell of Louisville will be Senator Barkley's opponent in November. The Republican vote was exceptionally light.

Senator Barkley carried Louisville and Jefferson County by 30,257. The vote there was: Barkley 19,508; Chandler 10,749.

Senator Barkley carried all but two congressional districts and lost them to less than three thousand. The big surprise was Kenton and Campbell counties, which Chandler had claimed by his majorities. Barkley carried both of these heavily populated counties.

Barkley did not lose a county in his home district, the first. With the exception of Warren County, Senator Barkley carried every county in which a state institution is located. Chandler lost Calloway County, the home of Murray College, Fayette County, where the University of Kentucky is located, Madison, home of Eastern State Teachers College, and Rowan where the Morehead State Teachers College is located.

Keen Johnson, the Lieutenant Governor who stumped the state this muggy last in his home county 14th Humphrey's highway campaign, and one of Frankfort's biggest political lions had the honor of carrying the state. Other state officers met a like fate at the hands of the people in their home counties, with the exception of Dan Tabb, Nelson County. Tabb's home (Continued On Page Four)

### Senator's Majority In Rowan County 48; Cops 13 Precincts

Carrying thirteen of Rowan County's 20 precincts, Senator Alden W. Barkley swept to a surprise victory here Saturday, gaining a total majority of 48 votes in the county.

Governor Chandler went into the lead in number 1 (Morehead) precinct which he carried by 38 votes but Senator Barkley gradually ate into his lead thereafter. Not until number 10 precinct was counted were the forces of Governor Chandler willing to admit that the county would be close as they gained only a majority of 8 votes in that ward, the largest in the county, instead of the 100 expected. After losing number 10 Senator Barkley pulled up a few votes in almost all precincts to gain the advantage.

Barkley carried both Farmers, precinct, Number 2 by 17 and number 11 by 38. The Senator led by a majority of 21 in Pierce, 2 in Hogtown, 8 in Pine Grove, 7 in Halde-man, 10 in McKenzie, 15 in Hayes, 18 in Lewis, 27 in Morehead 18, and 6 in Brushy 20.

Governor Chandler carried Morehead 1 by 38, Brushy 6 by 26, Morehead 7 by 14, Morehead 10 by 6, Cranston by 10, Dry Creek by 6, Plank by 23 and Morehead 19 by 6.

The vote was heavy throughout the county. Fair weather prevailed. Although there was possibly more interest in this race than in any other in the past the voting was quiet with no disturbances being reported in the county.

There was an unusually large number of spoiled ballots called by so many candidates on the Senatorial ticket.

It was remarkable how close all precincts were in the county, demonstrating that sentiment was fairly evenly divided here.

### Large Majority In County Given Bates

Congressman Joe B. Bates received the largest majority that a Democrat ever held in Rowan County Saturday when he received 1272 more votes than his nearest opponent, Tom Burchett, Ashland who had the support of most of the veterans.

Bates, a life-long friend of former Congressman Fred M. Vinson, carried every precinct in the county by an overwhelming majority. His greatest majorities however were piled up in the rural precincts where 10 farmers chose him over such as much as a 20 to 1 advantage.

Although Mr. Vinson made no outright endorsement of Mr. Bates, it was understood throughout the district that the former popular Ashland Congressman would like to be succeeded by the Greenup Con-

Are Staying At Park Lake Camp. FSA Extends Farm Tenant Program To Twenty-One Counties. Counties Recommended By State Committee, County Supervisor, Cobb Says.

Loans to help farm tenants be come owners under the Bankhead Farm Tenant Act, which has been made by the Farm Security Administration this fiscal year in 14th, Graves, Jessamine, Morgan, Union, Warren, Wayne, Taylor, Hardin, Ballard, Harlan, Callaway, Davies, Fleming, Logan, Madison, Pendleton, Pulaski and Shelby Counties.

These include 11 counties already under the tenant purchase program, as well as 10 new counties. The new counties are the first listed. This information was just received from State Director Earl McKee, Lexington by C. W. Cobb, County Supervisor of the Farm Security Administration, Morehead.

Mr. Cobb said the counties were selected by the Secretary of Agriculture upon advice of the State Advisory Committee on the Basis of types of farming area, prevalence of tenancy and availability of good farm land at fair prices, freedom on what the farms will manage and the farmer's income.

"For the present loans to buy farms will be made only in the counties designated, but regular loans will be made for such things as seed, fertilizer, livestock and farm tools are available in every county to eligible farmers and farm tenants unable to obtain such credit elsewhere," the County Supervisor pointed out.

New Appropriation Given N. Y. A. (Continued From Page One) schools throughout the state. The new appropriation, which is the one made last year, will make possible the employment of approximately 100 new people.

In addition to the 34 colleges, 120 county school systems and 180 independent school districts participate under the NYA student aid program. Local school authorities select the students and supervise their work. Eligibility is determined, first upon the basis of need and, second, upon ability to perform satisfactory school work. Employed students, who are between 16 and 24 years of age, receive government checks issued on the basis of time reports submitted by school officials.

All of the participating institutions are being notified of their respective allotment and the funds will be made available within the next few days, Mr. Salpers said.

High school and elementary students helped through the NYA program earn up to \$6.00 per month and college students are allowed to receive up to \$15.00 monthly. However, the average payments are slightly below the established maximum earnings since many school officials feel it desirable to distribute NYA funds among a large number. Hourly rates of pay are based on wage rates prevailing in the community.

Work performed by NYA students including research, teaching, retail, clerical work, messaging and laboratory assistance, construction, library service, book repair, landscaping, and recreational work. School and college officials are encouraged to assign students to work which is in line with their school interests.
