## Double Votes Will Be Credited All Subscriptions This Week

At a meeting of the City Council held Tuesday night arrangements were made for the immediate construction of water lines and electricity to supply the territory recently annexed by the City of Morehead.

The construction of the water lines was referred by the council to Virgil Wolford, Commissioner of the Water Department and the matter of supplying electricity to Russell Barker, Commissioner of the Electric Department.

The city council also authorized W. H. Riser to prepare plans for the completion of all sanitary sewer lines in the east end of Morehead.
