He was also in the insurance business here. He was survived by five children; Donna, of Farmers, Ky., Leora Johnson of Zilpo, Ky., Mabel Kelley of Haldeman; Elda Messinger of Beatty, and the late art of Morehead. His wife, Nannie, also survives.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday from the local Baptist Church by Reverend Lant, pastor of the Christian Church here, officiating. Burial was made in the Caudill Cemetery. The Burial Lodge was in charge of last impressive rites at the grave.

It appearing to the Court that by the judgment herein the lands herein described have been condemned and the United States has paid into the registry of the Court the amount awarded as compensation for the following tracts, viz: Mrs. F. M. Robinson & E. Hogge Tract No. 242a. Mrs. F. M. Robinson & E. Hogge Tract No. 242b.

and said funds now remain in the registry, and it further appearing to the Court that the remaining questions to be determined are of an equitable nature.

Therefore, in order that the claims of all parties to share in said funds may be properly established and determined, it is ordered by the Court that each party claiming the whole or a part of the land described and condemned herein, or of the above funds, who has not heretofore filed in this cause an appropriate pleading setting forth specifically the nature and extent of his claim, shall file the same within ninety (90) days from the date of the entry of this order, and in default thereof will be precluded from the benefit of this proceeding and from participating in the distribution of said fund.

After the expiration of said ninety (90) days, all issues arising between adverse claimants as to the ownership of any of the lands condemned, or as to the rights of

such claimants to share in said funds, shall stand for trial before the Court at such time as may be fixed by the Court; and if any such claimant shall fail to appear and prosecute his claim at the time so fixed his claim to share in such fund may thereupon be dismissed by the Court for want of prosecution.

Under the heading "NOTICE TO FILE CLAIMS," the Clerk shall cause a copy of the foregoing portion of this order to be published in the issue of the following newspaper, to-wit: Morehead Independent, Morehead, Kentucky.

The cost of such publication shall be paid out of the funds held in the registry of the Court in this action.

Eighteen of the forty-eight will enter college in September and expressed definite desires for training in one of these vocations: medicine, home economics, business, beautician, teaching and dramatic art.

The conferences were based on material prepared by a study of the colleges in Kentucky and a chart was used showing the comparison of Kentucky colleges as to the cost of fees, board and room, the age of the school, number of buildings, numbers on the facul-

ty, numbers acres, enrollment, entrance requirements (whether on high school credits or by examination) vocational training offered by each, the extra-curricular activities offered at each, the general tone of the college as to scholarship, religious atmosphere, social life and athletics, type of students in attendance (wealthy or poor) and the laboratory and dormitory facilities.

Kentucky colleges offer vocational training in the following fields: engineering, general and liberal arts, medicine, law, chemistry, business, agriculture, teaching, religion, art, music, library science, social-work, journalism, home economics, science and physical education.

Extra-curricular activities were found to include orchestra, band, glee club, journalism, dramatics, oratory, athletics, class organization, debating, fraternity, social clubs and religious organizations. The student about to enter college should consider the nearness to his home, the training offered for his life work, the churches and general atmosphere of the town and the size of the student body. Small schools give the student
