MOREHEAD, Ky.---Leisure activities will soon come to an end for Morehead State University students as they head back to the classroom for the start of the fall semester.

For freshmen and other new students, registration begins with an orientation program on Monday, Aug. 11. Kicking off the information process, Dr. Will Keim, author of "The Education of Character: Lessons for Beginners" and a former college professor, will offer some advice on how to succeed on the college campus. A "Playfair" and social get-together round out the day's events.

On Tuesday, there are more opportunities for new students to learn about adapting to college life. Health educators Dave and Jeff will host an educational session on alcohol and other drugs; Dr. Marie Palmer, interim pastor of Morehead Christian Church, and Jerry Gore, MSU minority student affairs director, will address diversity, and Myron Doan, the University's dean of students, will provide an overview of expectations and responsibilities that will make for an easier transition to the new environment.

The new students will pay fees and buy textbooks on Wednesday, Aug. 13, the last step in the orientation process. A more leisurely day is on tap for Thursday when, among the other programs to promote school spirit, MSU's cheerleaders, who are national champions in their division, will teach the fight song, and join music faculty and students, for the "Alma Mater."

To help students become familiar with office locations and services on campus, new students will collect keys in a "Treasure Hunt," according to Susette Redwine, University Center program and special events coordinator. "During a campus scavenger hunt, information will be provided which will be beneficial for their success," she said. "When the hunt is completed, students will have an opportunity to select a key, unlock a chest and choose a prize."

For returning students, residence halls open for upperclassmen on Wednesday with the registration process to be completed on Thursday and Friday, Aug. 14-15, on the main campus. Students taking classes at various off-campus locations--including those enrolling in distance learning classes--also will register during designated times on these days.

With the paperwork done and registration completed, it's time for one last party before beginning one's studies. All students are invited to a street dance and ice cream fest from 8 until 11 p.m. on the lawn of the president's home and University Boulevard on Sunday, Aug. 17.

MSU classes, including evening and off-campus, begin on Monday, Aug. 18.

While the goal is to get an education, students may take a break from the schoolwork to enjoy a number of special programs, Redwine said. "The variety of activities should offer something for every taste," she said.

Scheduled to make campus appearances during the first weeks are: comedian Simon B. Cotter, Aug. 13; musician Rick Kelley, Aug. 14; hypnotist Tom DeLuca, Aug. 20, and the band Bricq, Aug. 27.

The remainder of the semester will continue to offer breaks in the students' schedules: Poolshark Tom "Dr. Cue" Rossman on Sept. 2-3; ventriloquist Dan Horn, Sept. 26; comedians Marty Putz, Oct. 1, and Elliott Branch, Oct. 22, and juggler Bill Fry, Nov. 5.

For the sports enthusiast, the MSU Eagles football team will be playing in Jayne Stadium with its first home game set for Thursday, Sept. 4, while the Eagle volleyball team begins the fall season in Wetherby Gymnasium on Friday, Sept. 19.

Also before the semester closes, play will get under way for MSU's Eagles and Lady Eagles basketball teams, both under the direction of new coaches this season.

Students, who would rather participate than be a spectator, may get involved in a Greek organization, Student Activities Council, Student Government Association, Residence Hall Association or a host of clubs and academic honor societies that are always looking for new members. Intramural sports also offer satisfaction for those who enjoy physical challenges.

If working on the set or performing in a play is among one's goals, a number of theatre productions will provide the outlet. During the coming year, students will present "The Madwoman of Chaillot," Oct. 16-18; "Working," Oct. 30-Nov. 1; "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead," Nov. 18-22; "The Night of the Iguana," Feb. 24-28, and "Long Ago and Far Away," April 13-18. Other cultural experiences include guest and student recitals and art exhibits.

When the semester is in full swing, the University will host students' relatives during Family Weekend, Sept. 26-27, and former students for Homecoming, Oct. 11-12.

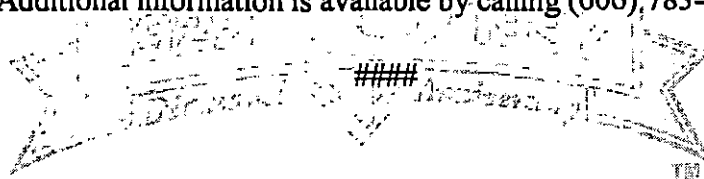
The program is free and open to the public.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Registration for Morehead State University's fall 1997 semester is scheduled for Aug. 13-15, with the first day designated only as a business day.

On Wednesday, Aug. 13, freshmen and transfer students who advance registered may pay tuition/fees in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Class schedules will not be processed on that day.

Entry into the payment area on all three days will be based on an alphabetical system by last name, which may be found in the directory of classes.

On Thursday and Friday, Aug. 14 and 15, students will develop class schedules in their academic departments. Those who have not declared a major will schedule their classes in 233 Allie Young Hall.

Undergraduate students, who have not previously been admitted or were not enrolled this spring or during either summer term, will begin the registration process at the Admissions Office, 306 Howell-McDowell. For graduate students, that stop will be 701 Ginger Hall.

Sophomores and juniors, who advance registered, may pay tuition/fees on Aug. 14 in the Crager Room from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Students who did not register for classes in advance will be admitted to the payment area from 4 to 6 p.m.

On Friday, Aug. 15, advance registered seniors and graduate students may complete the financial portion of the registration process in the Crager Room from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., while those who did not advance register will be admitted from 4 to 6 p.m.

Students at MSU's Ashland Area, Big Sandy and Licking Valley Extended Campus Centers as well as those at the Appalachian Graduate Consortium in Pikeville may register from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Thursday and Friday, Aug. 14-15.

The registration period for classes at Jackson, Maysville, Mt. Sterling and Whitesburg will be on Aug. 14 only, from 4 to 6 p.m. Students enrolling in distance learning classes offered at other regional sites may register at the main campus or at their nearest extended campus center.

All MSU classes, including evening and off-campus, begin on Monday, Aug. 18.

Schedule adjustments will be processed without charge Aug. 14-20 in the student's major department. Effective Aug. 21, drop-adds will be processed in the Office of the Registrar, 201 Ginger Hall, with the \$10 fee in effect at that times.

MORHEAD, Ky.---Juggler and musician Ken Sprano will visit the Morehead State University campus on Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 13-14.

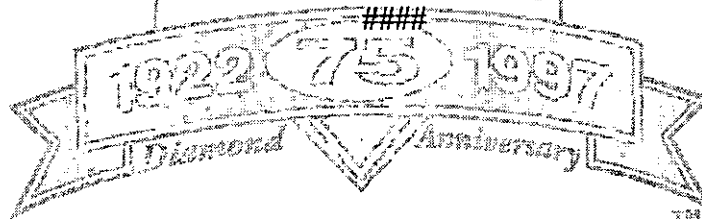
He will perform in the Adron Doran University Center.

ART STUDENTS PRACTICE THEIR CRAFT: A Picture Story

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Students taking classes in Morehead State University's Department of Art got some practical teaching experience recently when they participated in the Afternoon Art School for area youngsters.

The school, geared toward children 5 to 10 years of age, allowed MSU students who were advanced elementary education majors an opportunity to practice what they had learned in the classroom. The program exposed youngsters to various visual objects including Stonehenge, the Statue of Liberty, Pacific Northwest ceremonial masks, mosaics, Ukrainian decorated eggs and paintings by a number of great artists.

During the session, which ran for three weeks, elementary school students from Rowan County explored production processes and created their own works of art.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---"Within every challenge lies an opportunity" was the message Morehead State University faculty/staff members heard Wednesday (Aug. 13) from Dr. Michael R. Moore, the new executive vice president for academic affairs and dean of the faculty.

"The process of addressing the challenge provides an opportunity to take stock of ourselves, our assumptions and our needs and to emerge from that process much stronger and more focused, Dr. Moore said, speaking at the convocation that traditionally opens the fall semester.

Dr. Moore, who joined the administrative staff July 1, spoke specifically to the changes in higher education governance and budgeting which were effected by House Bill 1.

House Bill 1, known as the Kentucky Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997, was enacted during a special session of the General Assembly this spring.

Noting that MSU was fortunate in comparison to many institutions in other states, Dr. Moore said that House Bill 1 not only had a positive effect on this year's budget but also gave "us more of an opportunity than ever to become the masters of our own destiny."

One of the funding provisions in the bill gives MSU and other public institutions the opportunity to compete for dollars from several trust funds, including from one specifically for the regional universities, known as the Regional University Excellence Trust Fund.

The vice president told his audience that under the RUETF, MSU could receive approximately \$800,000, but to receive these funds the University would need to submit a proposal to develop at least one nationally recognized program of distinction or one nationally recognized applied research program. Also some level of matching funds will be required.

The degree to which programs are interdisciplinary in nature and have an economic impact on the region are expected to be two of the major criteria that the CPE will use in awarding funds, according to Dr. Moore. "Detailed guidelines and criteria may not be officially available from the newly-established Council on Postsecondary Education until November and the deadline for submission of applications may be as early as January," he said.

So that MSU can be as prepared as possible to apply for these funds, Dr. Moore said that he would be distributing a request for proposals within the next two weeks. "Since we have few details regarding the nature of the final proposal, the initial RFP will serve more to secure a statement of intent and a general explanation of the program you are proposing," he said.

"If you have ever dreamed about developing a nationally recognized program of distinction or applied research program, now is the time to start committing that dream to hard disk and paper," Dr. Moore said. "As I said earlier, this is perhaps the greatest opportunity for new funds we have ever had," he added.

"I have no question about our ability to accomplish this," he said. "I continue to be impressed with all that you have accomplished in the past. You have the talent, the creativity and the commitment," Dr. Moore added.

Registration for the fall semester continues through Friday, Aug. 15, and at 6:30 p.m., President and Mrs. Eaglin will host a University-wide picnic for all employees and their families on Crosthwait Plaza.

On Sunday, the Student Government Association and Dr. and Mrs. Eaglin will host the annual street dance and ice cream fest for all faculty, staff and students. The event, held on University Boulevard in front of the President's Home, will run from 8 to 11 p.m.

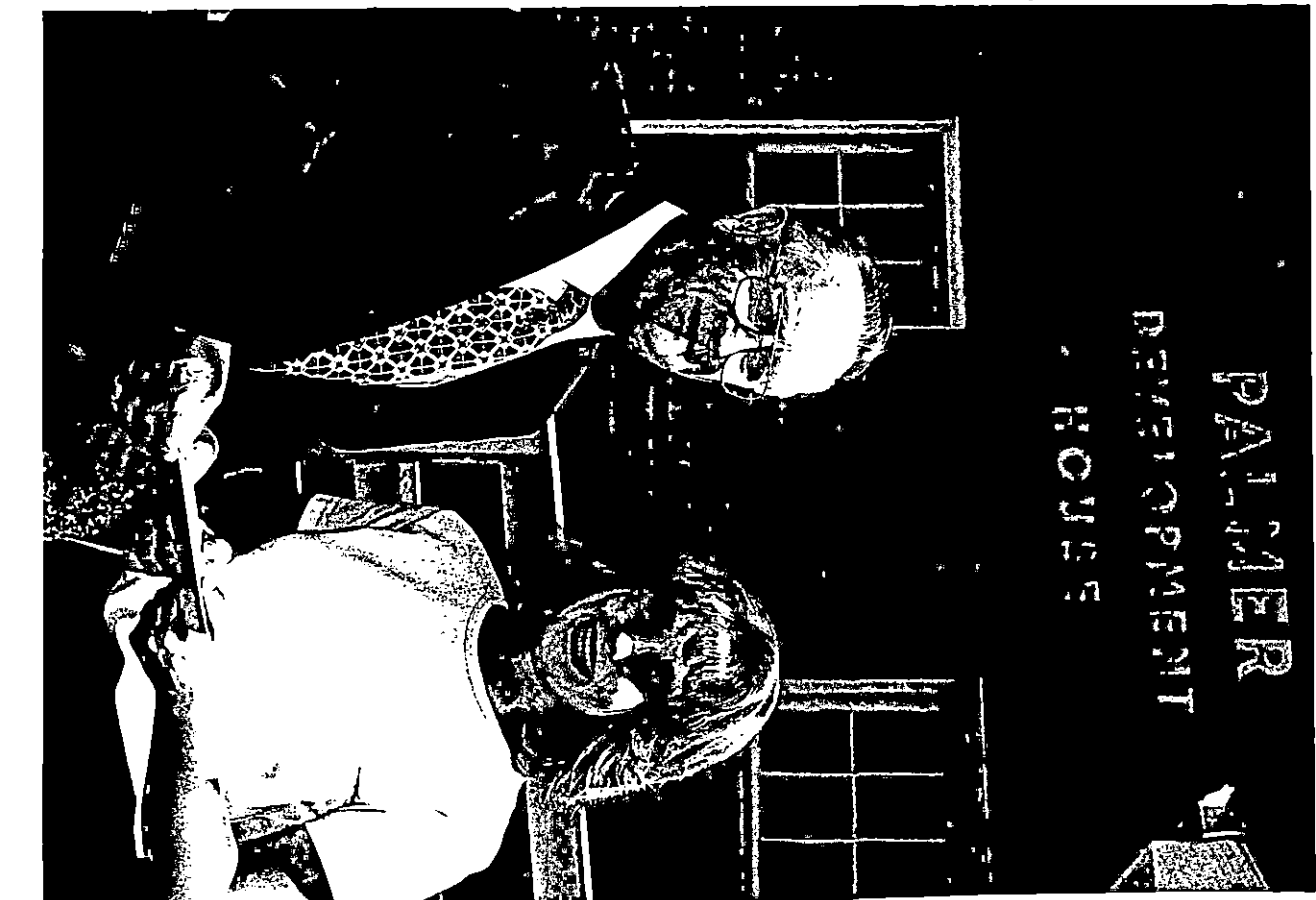

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Earlier this year, Morehead State University's Office of Physical Plant received a \$63,584 grant for energy conservation measures which are expected to result in a substantial savings to the University's utility costs and help the environment.

April Haight, MSU's recycling and energy conservation coordinator, and Joe Planck, director of physical plant, received the funding for the project which was completed in June.

Funded through a matching grant from the Department of Natural Resources and Division of Energy's Institution Conservation Program, the project involved replacing many of the current lighting fixtures with more energy efficient lighting systems. Motion sensors and timing switches were installed in the classroom and mechanical rooms.

The project which covered Ginger Hall, Breckinridge Hall and Baird Music Hall, was estimated to cost \$127,069, according to Haight. New lighting was installed in each building, giving MSU an annual utility savings projected at \$45,688. In addition to a reduction in utility costs, emissions of carbon dioxide, sulfur dioxide and nitrogen dioxide will be less," she said.

"MSU has joined Green Lights, an organization which helps members save money and prevent pollution. We will survey all of the facilities on campus and upgrade lighting with more efficient technologies where profitable. Since the inception of Green Lights in 1991, more than 2,300 organizations have partnered with EPA. These organizations are saving over \$240 million annually and have reduced carbon dioxide emissions---the equivalent of taking more than 334,000 cars off the road."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Two Morehead State University departments have joined together to add a new program option for students.

Beginning this fall, MSU students may now select an educational associate degree option in historic preservation. It will be coordinated by Carolyn Taylor, associate professor in the Department of Human Sciences, and Dr. Charles Patrick, associate professor in the Department of Industrial Education and Technology.

"Historic preservation is a multi-billion dollar industry in the United States but there are few individuals who are trained in the proper techniques of building restoration and rehabilitation," said Taylor, who initiated the program. "As interest continues to grow in preserving our cultural heritage, so does the need to provide interested individuals with skills necessary to restore, conserve and maintain older and historic resources."

Preserving one's heritage is not new to MSU as nine of the University's buildings were added to the National Register for Historic Preservation in the spring of 1995. "MSU's Center for Community and Economic Development houses the Appalachian Cultural Heritage Project which is locating, documenting and registering historic sites in 33 counties in Eastern Kentucky," said Taylor.

Only one college in the nation, Belmont College in St. Clairsville, Ohio, is offering an associate degree in building preservation, according to Taylor. The school, which allows 60 students to enroll in the program, was recognized in 1994 as recipient of the Ohio State Historic Preservation Office Public Education and Awareness Award.

The new option at MSU will provide new ways of restoring historical landmarks as well as the benefits that will be achieved by the community, according to Taylor. "The program will provide internship opportunities for students to go beyond the classroom and enhance their knowledge about cultural preservation," she said.

Graduates of the program will be qualified to work in a variety of fields including: museums, research, state and local government, as house inspectors, or become self-employed as preservation specialists.

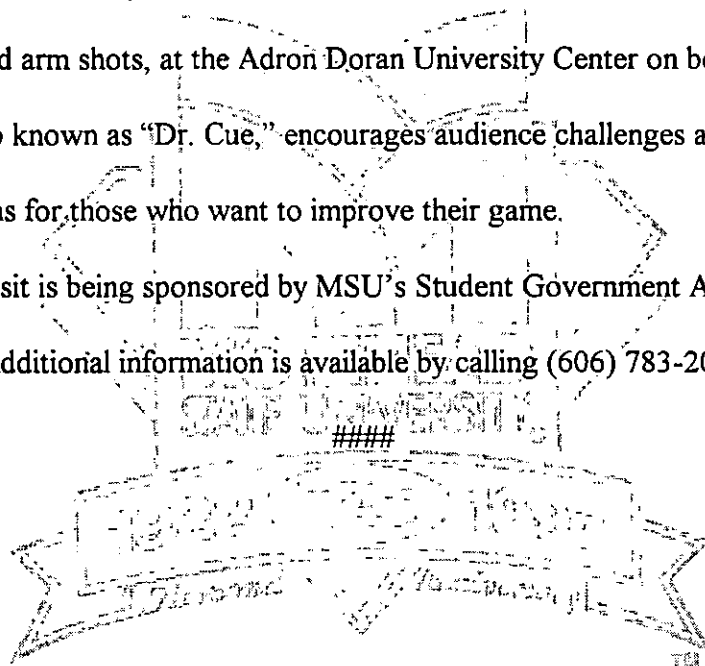

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Forty-six youth from Bath and Rowan counties spent eight weeks this summer at Morehead State University as participants in a special Job Training Partnership Act Summer Enrichment Program.

Funded by JTPA in cooperation with the Workforce Development Cabinet and the TENCO Private Industry Council, the program offered the young people 160 hours of on-the-job training combined with 96 hours of academic classwork.

TENCO serves the counties of Bath, Boyd, Bracken, Fleming, Greenup, Lewis, Mason, Montgomery, Robertson and Rowan.

The academic enrichment program was based on a hands-on activity approach with real world applications. 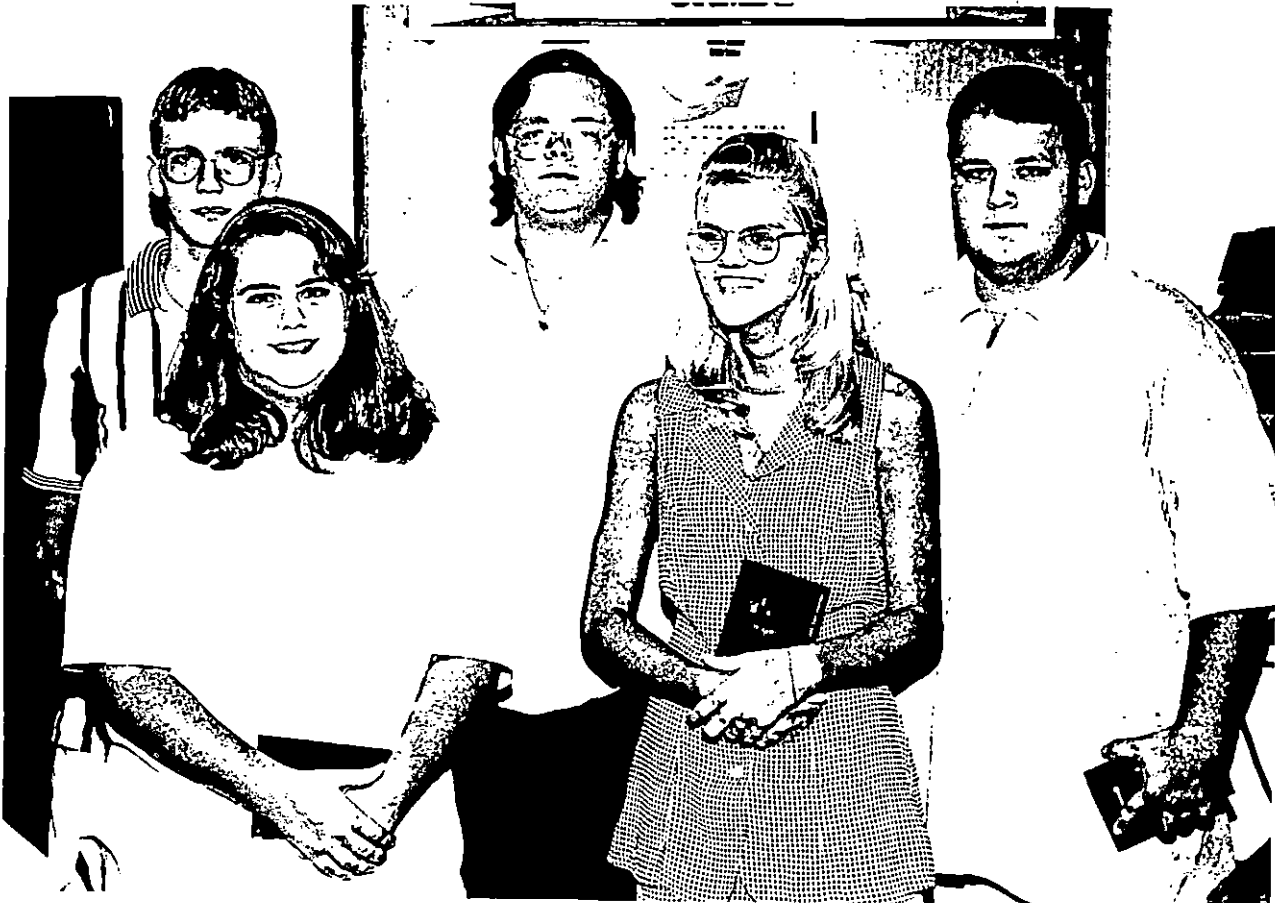

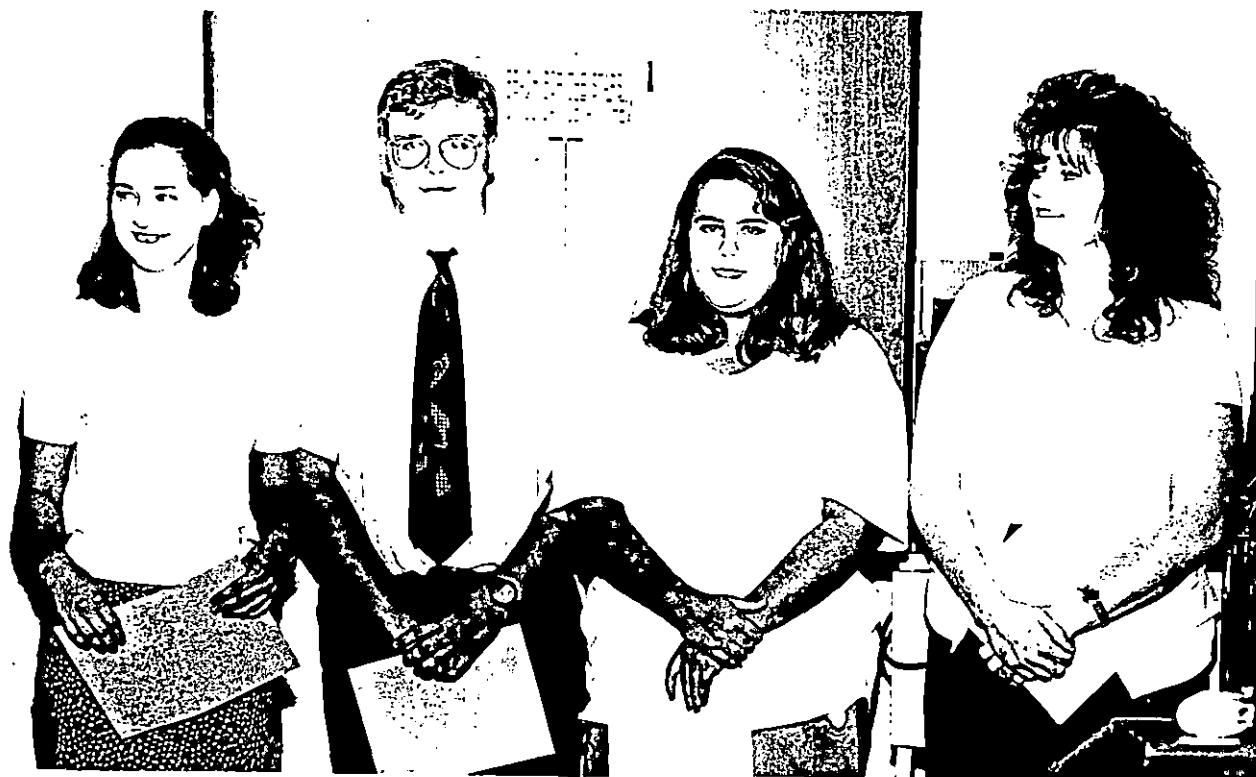

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Whether you're just starting out, need a refresher course or have been riding a motorcycle for some time, Morehead State University's Community Development and Continuing Education Program, in conjunction with the Kentucky Motorcycle Program, is offering a RiderCourse that may be right for you

For beginning cyclists, there is a "Riding and Street Skills" (RSS) class. The course will include classroom instruction in on-cycle maneuvers in a controlled off-street environment. Tips on how to safely operate a cycle, beginning with the proper mounting technique and gradually working up to swerving and emergency brake techniques, also will be included.

Concluding the course will be a knowledge test and an on-cycle skills evaluation.

A 20-hour program, the beginning class will meet on Friday evening from 6 to 10 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday, 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Courses will be offered on Sept. 19-21; Oct. 3-5; March 20-22; April 10-12 and 24-26; May 1-3 and 29-31 and June 12-14 and 19-21.

Participants must be at least 16 years of age to register. Those under 18 must have a waiver signed by a parent or guardian before taking the course.

For the more knowledgeable rider, there is the "Experienced RiderCourse" (ERC) which allows participants the opportunity to fine tune their street skills. Classroom instruction offers mental strategies necessary to reduce risk. Individuals who have a current motorcycle license, have access to a street legal cycle and some riding experience, fall in this category. Participants may bring a rider to serve as a passenger.

A one-day course, the ERC will be taught from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Sept. 7, 20 and 28; Oct. 11 and 26; March 8 and 29; April 4 and 19; May 9 and 18, and June 6.

The cost is \$75 for the beginning course and \$40 for the advanced class. Early registration is encouraged because of limited class size. The instructors are certified by the Kentucky Motorcycle Program.
