Four Consolidated Schools Of County To Open Monday Morn

Pre-School Teachers Meeting Scheduled Here Saturday Morning

More than 1,500 students of Rowan County's four Consolidated Schools, located at Farmers, Elliottville, Haldeman and Morehead, will find a three months vacation Monday morning and start another nine months of school.

At Elliottville and Haldeman the new buildings, constructed by the WPA, will be open for the first time, although they are not fully complete. Six rooms are finished at the Haldeman school with the gymnasium and auditorium about two-thirds complete. These completed rooms will be used by the upper six grades.

Elliottville also has six completed rooms but the auditorium and gymnasium are not finished. It is expected that the new school building at Farmers will be ready for occupancy within a month, Supr. Roy Cornette stated.

The Consolidated teachers will hold their annual pre-school meeting in Morehead Saturday. This meeting will begin at 9 a. m. at the Morehead High School building.

General discussion of attendance, rules and regulations and the chief objectives to be attained during the school year of 1938-39 will be the principal topics of discussion at this meeting.

All Consolidated teachers must register their teachers' and health certificates at the office of the County Superintendent before the opening of school.

Supplies, record books and teacher equipment will be given out at Saturday's meeting.

Mrs. A. F. Ellington is principal of Morehead, Austin Riddle at Farmers, Frank Laughlin at Haldeman and Ted Croshaw at Elliottville.

Friday, September Ninth Last Day For Voters Registration

Registration Has Been Light Since August Primary, County Clerk Says

Registration since the August primary has been exceptionally light according to County Clerk C. V. Alfrey, who stated today that not more than 15 names had been added to the voting list.

The date for registration expires September 9. This is the same date that a change in registration for the August primary next year requires. In short a Democrat may change to a Republican before September 9 and vote in the Republican Primary in August, 1939, and vice versa. Persons wanting until after August 9 to change their registration cannot participate in a primary until 1940.

The fact that a Governor and all the other state offices, a Circuit Judge, Commonwealth Attorney and a Circuit Court Clerk are to be elected next year is expected to cause a number of last minute changes in registration, principally from Republican to Democrat.

Statute Provides That Drivers May Be Subject To Examination By State Patrol

Drivers who did not secure their drivers license before yesterday will be subject to a rigid examination by the Kentucky State Highway Patrol, Circuit Clerk Joe McKinney said today. This is in conformity with a state law which provides that a motorist picture showing a license was not issued prior to September 1.

Approximately 450 drivers in Rowan County have not, as yet, secured permits. Last year McKinney issued approximately 1,800 drivers licenses. At noon yesterday 1,350 had been issued.

State Alleges That Father Attacked Him With Knife. Funeral Conducted Here

A charge of murder has been placed against Ollie Middleton of Elliott Court following the death of his son Clifford Middleton in a Grayson hospital Saturday.

The commonwealth alleges that the elder Middleton attacked his son with a knife inflicting the injuries that caused his death. Immediately after the attack young Middleton was rushed to the hospital at Grayson but medical treatment was not sufficient to save his life.

Officers at Sandy Hook said the father was in a "drunken stupor" when he wielded the knife on his son. The charge is without a permit.

Funeral services for Middleton were held at the Church of God in Morehead Sunday afternoon. The rites were held by the Rev. T. F. Lyons, pastor.

Greathouse Files Answer In Fouch Suit

Lexington Man Denies Any Liability, Asks Damages In Counter Action

A blanket denial of charges made in the civil suit brought by Mr. and Mrs. John Fouch of near Rothbar against W. Greathouse of Lexington was made in an answer filed in Rowan Circuit Court by the defendant through the law firms of Hogge and Hogge, Morehead and Woodard, Dawson and Hobson of Lexington.

Greathouse says in the action that his son, John Greathouse, was using the car without his permission and further that the accident was caused not by the negligence of his son but by gross carelessness and negligence of Fouch's claimant that his car was damaged to the extent of \$500. Greathouse asks for judgement in this amount in a counter-claim.

In the accident Fouch was injured seriously while Mrs. Fouch sustained bruises and cuts. In two separate actions the Fouch's sued \$20,500 damages. One youth, an occupant of the Greathouse car, was killed. The accident happened at the intersection of L. Highway and the Sandy Hook road.

Fouch claims the other car was coming from the home of the brothers, Artie, Elwood and Kenneth at home.

C. and O. Railroad Has Increased Passenger Rates

Effective last Thursday rates on passenger fares on the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad were increased approximately one-half cent to the mile. This raise was made for the Eastern rate by permission of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Railroad rates had been at a flat two cents a mile for the last year. Prior to that passenger rates were three cents a mile and at one time were as high as three and a half cents.

World War Is Feared; Troops Are Mobilized

Czech Situation Becomes As Forceful Aggressor

Another World War, with Germany as the aggressor, is feared throughout civilized nations today.

Although Europe's condition of affairs is being simmering for many months, it has not until yesterday that matters reached a boiling point and in every nation of the World a general international conflict is held likely. The situation today is more critical and War more imminent than it has been at any time since 1918.

Germany's attempted annexation of Czechoslovakia is the principal cause for alarm. Great Britain is urged its most drastic statement yesterday with the declaration that "we will fight if War comes."

Meanwhile a million German troops are going through War maneuvers. France has its standing army fortified along the German border. Great Britain's entire army and great industry tonight feared that the Sudeten German minority's decision to reject the Czechoslovak Government's newest offer of concessions was taken with the full backing of Germany and indicated that Chancellor Adolph Hitler was determined to force an immediate showdown, with arms if necessary.

France affirmed once again to-day its determination to march to the aid of Czechoslovakia in case of German invasion. Today it appeared that Germany would make that invasion.

The position of Italy in case conflict comes is doubtful. Apparently well founded reports in London and Paris are that Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy has informed Henlein of his refusal to refuse to support of the Sudeten autonomy demands, regardless of what Hitler does.

It is known that Britain and France are attempting to get all of Europe to unite solidly against the Germans if conflict comes.

Morehead has been in the football doldrums for the last three years, principally because Coach Hookbrooks has had little material to work with. In fact Morehead has hardly had enough boys out for football to make a team during this time and as a result the number of victories scored were small. However, things are now taking a turn for the better.

Coach Hookbrooks has produced a number of outstanding football players at Morehead High. At one time, some six or seven years ago, the Vikings were among the most feared in Eastern Kentucky.

Post Office Appointment Is Held Up

Department Rules Old Examination Void Under New Law Passed By Congress

The appointment of a postmaster in Morehead was halted this week as the postoffice department handed down a ruling that the appointment could not be made from the register of eligibles in the examination conducted here February 23.

The ruling affected 430 post-offices of the first, second and third classes in the United States of which Morehead was one.

Congressman Joe B. Bales and Senators Alben W. Barkley and M. M. Logan all recommended the appointment of William E. Crutcher to the Morehead postmastership, but the appointment was held up pending a decision on whether the old examination which was taken under a Presidential Executive order would be sufficient for the Morehead appointment. The postoffice department ruled that a new examination be held and upon the advice of Congressman Bales a new examination was held at Morehead postmastership has been called to be held at once.

It is expected that it will take two to three weeks for a new eligibility list for the Morehead postoffice.

Under the new order, passed in the closing days of the last session of Congress, the appointment may be made from the three highest eligibles. Under the Presidential Executive order which Morehead had its previous examination only the highest eligible could be named.

However, Crutcher has his standing army ruled that no one, even the highest eligible, could be appointed from the old register as the new law automatically did away with everything that had been done in the past where no appointment had been made.

Mr. Crutcher also had the support of former Congressman Fred M. Vinson who resigned to accept a Federal judgeship, prior to the lease of the register for Morehead and afore the new law was passed in Congress.

Vinson and the late William Vinson, Jarrell Vinson played with the Louisia high school for five years and was an All-Big Sandy football back his sophomore year and All-Big Sandy quarterback his junior and senior years. He received his college training at Morehead State Teachers college where he played with the Morehead Eagles four years, being graduated at Morehead last June.

Vinson announced today that although school at Fort Gay does not open until September 8, he started football practice last Monday.
