Barkley Says Republican Party 'Dead' Issue

Jury Changes County Against 6-Ex Officials

Men Are Now Charged With Receiving Interest Or Profit On Public Money

The Rowan County Grand Jury last week recalled its indictment against former county Judge Chas. E. Jennings, former County Attorney W. E. Proctor, four members of the old Fiscal Court and Sidney Alfrey, Morehead citizen, but immediately issued another true bill against the seven men. The old indictment charged the men with "conspiracy to defraud" the county, in that they were charged only in the charge brought against them. "Receiving interest or profit on public money," said Circuit Clerk Joe McKinney said that there was little difference between the two charges and that he understood the indictment was changed on the advice of Commonwealth Attorney W. C. Hamilton. Sheriff Ben McRayner said that he had made no arrests in this case, because the indictment had not been turned over to him. McKinney said the indictment had not been given the Sheriff but that several of those named in the true bill had been in his office and that he understood all were to execute a bond in a "day or two." Bonds of \$500 each have been set by Circuit Judge D. B. Caudill.

The four magistrates under indictment are: J. B. Rose, Russell Burrows, Ben Hamm and Wm. F. Kegley.

According to the grand jury indictment, "they conspired together to sell a \$7,000 bond on the county to Alfrey with an agreed understanding to rebuy the bond immediately for \$7,500.

The grand jury in rendering its final report today urged that County Attorney be immediately file suit against the seven men to recover the \$500 illegally appropriated and used.

Game Wardens Nab Four For Violating Fish-Game Statutes

Two Men Charged With Hunting Rabbits Out Of Season Receive Fines

Four arrests were made during the last week by game wardens in this vicinity, in which they charge violation of the new fish and game statutes.

Wardens Bob Muttters and Van Greene arrested Bradley Harris on near Owingsville for hunting rabbits out of season. He was remanded to jail in default of a \$24.50 fine after pleading guilty.

The same wardens arrested Greene, broker of Montgomery county, charging him with hunting without a license. He was fined \$24.50 and placed in jail in default of payment.

In case of Clarence McClurg of Farmers for having squirrels in possession was continued in Rowan County court. McClurg and Claude Evans were arrested by Warden Muttters. Evans, however, was acquitted on buying squirrels, after his explanation was recommended by the Grand Lodge meeting at Louisville. Crutcher was recommended for appointment. Duley Elected Grand Master Of Kentucky Lodge

Morehead Man Is First
Citizen In East Kentucky
To Hold Highest Position

Probably the greatest honor that has ever been conferred on a Morehead citizen, was that elected C. P. Duley on Wednesday of this week, when he was elected to the highest office and the highest honor in Masonry, that of Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, as the thirtieth meeting being held in Louisville this week.

Mr. Duley is the first man east of Owingsville to be accorded this high honor. His name was placed in nomination by his fellow-townsmen, Dr. H. L. Wilson, Elector of Morehead who was elected yesterday at the State Convention and will be installed today.

Mr. Duley was assured of the office four years ago when he was elected to the office of Grand Junior Warden. The following year he assumed the duties of the office of Grand Senior Warden and during the past year he served as Deputy Grand Master.

This (Thursday) morning at 11 o'clock the installation ceremonies took place with all the pomp and ceremony attending. In keeping with the established custom of long years standing, the incoming Grand Master was presented with a bouquet of flowers by J. H. Powers representing Morehead Lodge 654, F. & M. Gets Highest Position In Masonic Lodge

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Aspirations Held By Many For Judge Post

That the Circuit Judge and Commonwealth Attorney races in the 21st Judicial District, composed of Rowan, Bath, Montgomery and Menifee counties will possibly be a thrilling fight next week was evidenced this week as News-Interviewed a portion of the prospective candidates.

It appears that there are many lawyers in the district who would like to have the Circuit Judge's place in fact none of those who have been prominently mentioned deny that they are prospective candidates for the position.

This list includes the present Circuit Judge D. B. Caudill and Attorney Lester Hogue of Morehead; Bridges, White, W. C. Hamilton, Earl W. Senff and possibly Henry B. Prewitt, who occupied the bench for 14 years preceding Judge Caudill's term. White, Hamilton, Senff, Prewitt are all from Mt. Sterling.

Commonwealth Attorney Hamilton states that: "I am very likely to be a candidate for Circuit Judge next year, in fact all signs point to the fact that I will be, but it is a little early to say whether I will seek reelection. Judge Caudill is regarded by most politicians as an almost certain candidate for reelection.

The name of Bridges White, who would be bound to draw plenty of support, has been mentioned as a candidate. However, politicians will seek reelection, voters that cast his hat in the ring if the race should develop into a hard one.

It is agreed that Judge Prewitt and Judge Senff would like to be the Circuit Judge. However, the balance of the candidates are looking around.

At this time it appears fairly certain that the Democratic nominees will be either from Rowan or Montgomery Counties. No names have been mentioned from Bath or Menifee, although it is likely that County may ask for the Commonwealth Attorney's position.

Rowan County Attorney R. M. Cuy has already said that he will probably seek the Commonwealth Attorney's office if Hamilton runs for Judge. If Lester Hogue does not seek reelection, announced his candidacy for membership on the Board.

Two places are to be filled at the November 9 election. Ballots will be separate from the general election ballot. The members will be elected from county-at-large for a period of four years.

Although several names have been mentioned as prospective candidates for the place no others have filed. Among others talked of as possible aspirants is Dr. Homer L. Wilson, Morehead Dentist.

Asks For Re-Election On Record He Has Compiled During Last Twelve Years

Kentucky's Senior Senator and Majority Floor Leader Allen W. Barkley formally opened the November 8 Democratic campaign in Eastern Kentucky Wednesday with a vigorous attack upon the Republican party and a description of the G. O. P. as a "dead organization that is kicking in its last throes of life that is being snuffed out by an intelligent electorate."

"The Democratic nominee, speaking in the courthouse in Morehead," millions of voters who are charged that the Republican party is operated and controlled by big-moneyed interests with only their own wallets at heart. "Compare what the Republican party ever did for the average citizen with what the Democrats have accomplished for the farmers, and the laboring man during the last six years," he challenged.

Launching into the heart of his attack Senator Barkley pointed out that "in the four years preceding March 4, 1933 total bank failures numbered 6,364, the deposits in the country were approximately \$10 billion dollars." This, he said, occurred under a Republican regime while the Democratic party was in power.

Senator Barkley pointed out that the cash income of the farmer had increased by the President Roosevelt in 1932 to its present level of \$823,000,000. "And yet," he declared, "there are Republican politicians going about the country attempting to tell the people that the Democrats are ruining the farmer."

The farmer, he said, knows better than anyone else how misappreciated this propaganda is.

Among the highlights of the Democratic administration touched upon by Senator Barkley were: Farmers are saved from foreclosure and high interest rates; Dwellers in tenement houses, cheap power has been saved from the loss of the country; Farm income has been protected in many sections of the United States; the sale of 150 million acres worth of wildcat lands to the public has been held through proper legislation; been helped in building homes, More than 4 million people have been housed; housing being provided for people in the low income groups.

Honor To Mr. Duley

The election of C. P. Duley of Morehead as Grand Master of the Grand Masonic Lodge of Kentucky is a glowing honor and tribute to Mr. Duley and reflects credit and prestige on all of Eastern Kentucky and in particular Morehead and Rowan County.

So far as can be learned this is the first time that anyone residing east of Owingsville has held this the highest position that the Masonic Lodge has to offer in Kentucky.

Knowing of Mr. Duley's ability and the great interest that he has always taken in Masonic Lodge affairs we can but add our statements to that of everyone else who knows him intimately that in installing him the Masonic Lodge of Kentucky has done well. It is doubtful if anyone could take a keener interest in this work or do as much for the advancement of the lodge as can our Mr. Duley.

In The Republican Party Dead

For months there has been a growing knowledge in the United States that the Republican party is dying - that it has gone to its grave and will, in time, be replaced by another party, possibly composed of Conservatives.

The fact that the Republican party is on its last legs now is evidenced all over the nation, but possibly more particularly in Kentucky. In selecting candidates for Senate and Representative the Republican party made no effort to get out their leading politicians and statesmen. In other words the leaders of the party do not wish to set themselves up as a chopping block in the November 8 election.

Judge Haswell, the G. O. P. nominee for United States Senator to oppose Senator Barkley, is without contradiction a conscientious individual. However, he distinctly lacks the color, speech-making ability and the statesmen qualifications that many of his Republican colleagues possess.

It is noted that Republicans all over Kentucky took more interest in the August Democratic primary than they are now in their own candidates. They know, as does every other fair-minded political observer, that in Kentucky this year there is no chance for the G. O. P. Compare this with the situation a few years ago when the Republicans had both of the United States Senators in this State have been able to almost get their share of Governors. At one time they had a Congressman in old Ninth District, which is heavily Democratic.

Lacking the patronage which they distributed freely only among their own party and facing the indisputable fact that this nation has ceased to vote for big moneyed interests the Republicans are casting about to save what they can of the wreckage. Republican leaders are trying to carry out the ideals of that party day are secretly planning a new party alliance. The ideals of that party would be the same as the present G. O. P. set up.

Cozy To Feature Boys Town

"There is no such thing as a free lunch." Father Edward J. Flanagan made that statement twenty-one years ago. Whatever their race and creed, boys are just boys to him. That's why boy's town Nebraska, is on the map.

Twenty-one years ago Father Flanagan started a refuge for homeless men, where they were given food and kindness. Forty years ago he had a chance at boys. Homeless, then, they were homeless and helpless as adults.

"If a boy has but one friend upon whom he can really count when he grows up, it is another of Father Flanagan's contentions.

Twenty-one years ago he conceived the idea of getting hold of homeless boys before they were hopeless. His work with these men, most of them, hoboes, narcotic addicts, or drunks, carried the priest that they were in this condition because they had never had a chance at boys. Homeless, then, they were homeless and helpless as adults.

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With the permission of his bishop, he borrowed money from a pawnbroker friend with which he opened an old house at Twenty-fifth and Dodge Streets in Omaha. Then he started looking for boys, who might be helped. Two came from a "workingman's hotel," while three more were recruited from a court just as they were about to be sentenced - to reform school. Father Flanagan made himself answerable for these boys. Their responsibility was his before the possibility was his before the court.

Word of what he was doing spread throughout the middle west. Soon the old house was jammed. Boys of every size and description, with only one thing in common. Outside its walls they were friendless. In the father Flanagan had no money. In the daytime he tramped the streets soliciting donations for his refuge. At night he gathered the boys for their meals, teaching them simple lessons in English, Arithmetic, history and penmanship.

The first Christmas dinner was the most fortunate moment of his life until his friend, the pawnbroker, arrived with his arms loaded with keys for the boys' pleasure and care for their stomachs.

Three years after he had started his dream to working he purchased a farm on Lincoln Highway eleven miles west of Omaha. Again his pawnbroker friend assisted in the raising of funds.

Ten years later his dream came true for he had incorporated a city of 250 population centered in a 320-acre farm, and comprising eleven brick buildings, four schools, dairy, workshops, recre-

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Subject: VALUES IN A DAY OF WORSHIP. Ex. 20:8-11; Luke 13:10

Golden Text: "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." Ex. 20:8 There is much discussion, and from various points of view, on the matter of the Sabbath. From my own viewpoint, I believe we are taught in Hebrews, the fourth chapter, that the Sabbath was fulfilled in the coming of Jesus just like, other laws, but its meaning was not totally discarded. Rather, it was made more complete with meaning, just as other laws were. God rested for his labors on the seventh day. When Israel was designated as God's chosen people, the seventh day or Sabbath was made a sign unto them, meaning that when Jesus should come, they might rest from their labors and work for salvation rest in a complete faith in what Jesus should accomplish their salvation. Thus, Hebrews, "The Sabbath was a rest, therefore, to the people of God." In other words, just as the Lord's supper represents the finished work of Jesus in bringing a rest, therefore, to the people of God. Likewise, instead of a Jewish Sabbath, observed by rest, typifying the rest which should come when Jesus did our work and striving to rest, instead of this we have the Lord's Day, a day of service for God. It is appropriate because Jesus arose on that day, and began the ministry of declaring his finished work. It is therefore for us to make a day we work for God, not necessarily a day of doing nothing. Our labor that day should be holy unto Him.

Besides Jesus and the apostles observed the first day of the week as the Lord's day.

Now, there is a very unique meaning to the Monday observance, one seventh of our time holy unto Him. It does not mean that we are free to use the other six days regardless of what God desires. Let me illustrate. We pay a certain amount of our income to the government for taxes. The government has a right to take this money from us. But this tax is an admission on our part that our entire property belongs to the government, if a crisis should arise which would demand it. The oath of citizenship declares that our common government owes us all, inasmuch as we are all pledged to the common good.

So, when we give God the "first fruits" of our income, our tithes and offerings, we admit that we have belongs to Him, and all should be handled for His glory. Thus, we observe the Lord's Day as a special day in God's service - one seventh of our time indicating and admitting that all our time belongs to God, and that every day is His to be used for His glory.

The values on this day of worship, then, come in recognizing in a special way that God owns us all, both by creation and by price, and our special worship and service are an admission of this great fact.
