In an exciting swim meet featured with many thrills the Morehead mermen were defeated by Berea 45 to 29 Wednesday night. In the first event of the evening the 270 yard medley relay Berea defeated Morehead to gain the first five points of the meet.

The 210 yard free style was next with Clark and Whitaker of Berea next and Hadley and Dickinson of Morehead in the third. Berea placed third to give that. Berea once more took a strong contender in any game, ex "Buck" Horton, is coaching a "Try" Tim Wynn, famous on winning ball team.
