MOREHEAD, Ky.—What do Toyota, Lexmark, Browning and various other companies have in common with Morehead State University? They are all concerned with the success of young people in the modern workplace.

So concerned in fact that they have joined together to give students the opportunity to combine theory with practice as they experience the real world of work while at the same time earning college credit.

This concept, appropriately called Cooperative Education, is becoming the most popular way for students to gain work experience and prepare themselves for their chosen profession. MSU faculty and students who have participated in this program have positive things to say about this method of learning.

"It is the best way for students to get the much needed experience that qualifies them for employment," said Bob Hayes, chair of MSU's Department of Industrial Education and Technology. He has been working with the University's co-op students for many years.

A manufacturing engineering major, Carl Stanfield Jr., Tollesboro junior, worked at Browning last semester while taking classes at MSU. He believes the program not only gave him valuable work experience but made his classes more meaningful. "I would recommend this program to any student who wants to get a good job after completing their degree," he said. "It may take a little longer to graduate, but I will be able to get a job much faster when I do."

These are not flunky jobs, said Matthew Neff, a Maysville senior, who also had a co-op at Browning. "We work on real problems," he said. "I have the opportunity to use what I learned in school to make a real contribution to the company."

A co-op provides a win-win situation for employers as well, as Scott Roach, human resource specialist at Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Kentucky, Inc., in Georgetown, notes. "Unless it's just not possible, we hire all our employees from our co-op program," he said. "We can't promise every student a job, but the experience with us makes them extremely marketable to other corporations."

Kevin Bowling, a senior industrial technology major from **Mt. Sterling**, agrees with Roach. After he completed a co-op with Lexmark, Bowling has been offered a job upon graduation but he is looking at all options before making a commitment. "There are so many things that cannot be learned in the classroom," he said. "The co-op greatly improves your chances of getting a job."

Bowling, who completed three semesters at Lexmark, has worked in the electronic division where he designed circuits and also as a technical representative for the company. "This was a real world experience for me," he said. "I was actually on the front line assisting customers." He believes he was confident doing this because of the actual hands-on experience he had received in the training which included all aspects of laser printers.

Generally, co-ops range from one to three semesters and can be either part-time or full time depending on the company, according to Don Young, cooperative education coordinator. "The students' working hours and rate of pay are left entirely up to the discretion of the employer," Young said. "Most companies pay better than average wages and provide flexible hours."

Young's main concern is making students more marketable. "Our students need to be able to compete for the very best jobs possible and a co-op program gives them a head start in that direction," he said.

While students are reaping rewards through the co-op program, companies also are finding many benefits for being a sponsor in this joint venture, Young noted. Among the advantages are: allowing a company to base permanent hiring decisions on actual on-the-job performance; creating a network between the company and the college; cooperative education programs are proven to be a cost effective means in satisfying long-term human resource needs; students may be assigned to "special projects" such as market surveys, reports, computer programming, and lowers the company's cost for benefits.

Students interested in a co-op position should apply through the Office of Cooperative Education, located at 322 Allie Young Hall. If there is an opening, the application will be forwarded to the company where it will be reviewed. If the student's qualifications meet the company's needs, the applicant will be called for an interview. The company has the option of hiring the individual.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---From the state's highest leader on down, the importance of higher education was the running theme of all who spoke during Morehead State University's Founders Day celebration today (April 3).

"Education is not only the most important responsibility placed on state government but on us as a society," Gov. Paul Patton said. "And I will, to the best of my ability, increase the awareness of higher education."

When introducing the governor, MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin described him as a "higher education champion" and one who has given hope to those living in Eastern Kentucky.

Gov. Patton was the featured speaker at MSU's Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony. The Convocation was one of a series of events as MSU concluded a year-long celebration marking its 75th anniversary as a public institution of higher learning.

Education is the foundation of civilization, the governor noted, and the ability to pass along that accumulated knowledge is the genesis of progress in civilization. However, in educational terms, 75 years is not a long time and much work still needs to be done because "we are building on a heritage of a lack of higher education."

He encouraged the crowd to push for more resources and continue to make available quality bachelor's and master's degree programs. "The commitment made at the last session (of the legislature) which was in the millions of dollars of resources, is not an end but only a very meager beginning."

Drawing on the University's logo for the last year, "Rich Heritage, Bright Future," Gov. Patton urged MSU personnel to remember where they had been, "build a desire for knowledge in the people in the region" and "have a brighter future with greater challenges."

That higher education will be exciting in the decades ahead also was reinforced by Dr. Leonard V. Hardin, chair of the Council on Postsecondary Education, at the Founders Day Luncheon. "With all the changes that have taken place in postsecondary education the last year, there has never been a time as correct and right as today," he said.

Looking at the future, Dr. Hardin credited cooperation as the crux for getting things to move along. "Institutions cannot be all things to all people," he said. "Tailor your programs to meet your goals and missions."

Also at the convocation ceremony, Dr. Charles Pelfrey of Olive Hill, professor emeritus of English, was presented the Founders Day Award for University Service. In his acceptance remarks, he commented on his reasons for coming to the University in Eastern Kentucky and why he stayed for more than 25 years.

At the Founders Day Breakfast, MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin honored faculty and staff members who had retired during the last year and ceremonies were held for the unveiling of two historical markers which will be erected: First Building and Land, 1889, and First Faculty and Staff, 1923. A time capsule, sponsored by the Student-Alumni Ambassadors, also was interred.

Also at another event, 138 faculty/staff members, who gave a total of 2,772 years of service to the University, were memorialized in the plaza at the Little Bell Tower.

At the luncheon, hosted by the MSU Foundation, Inc., was the backdrop for recognizing 16 new MSU Fellows and honoring fund raising volunteers. Awarded the Most Valuable Giver Award was Willie Blair of the Arizona Diamondbacks. Other award recipients were Bonnie Eaglin, Volunteer Fund Raiser of the Year; Dr. Benjamin Malphrus and H. Jack Webb, Outstanding Faculty/Staff Fund Raisers, and Terry W. Ensor, Foundation Board Member of the Year.

Closing the day's events was the Alumni Awards Dinner, sponsored by the MSU Alumni Association. Recognized for their accomplishments by induction into the Alumni Hall of Fame were J. Paul Nickell of Raleigh, N.C., award-winning director; Dr. Bonnie L. Rogers of Porterville, Calif., president of Porterville College; Dr. James H. Thomas of Kansas City, Kan., professor of surgery and of family practice, University of Kansas Medical Center; Keith Kappes, MSU's vice president for University Advancement, and Steve A. Hamilton (posthumously), former athletic director and basketball, baseball and track star at MSU and former major league baseball player.

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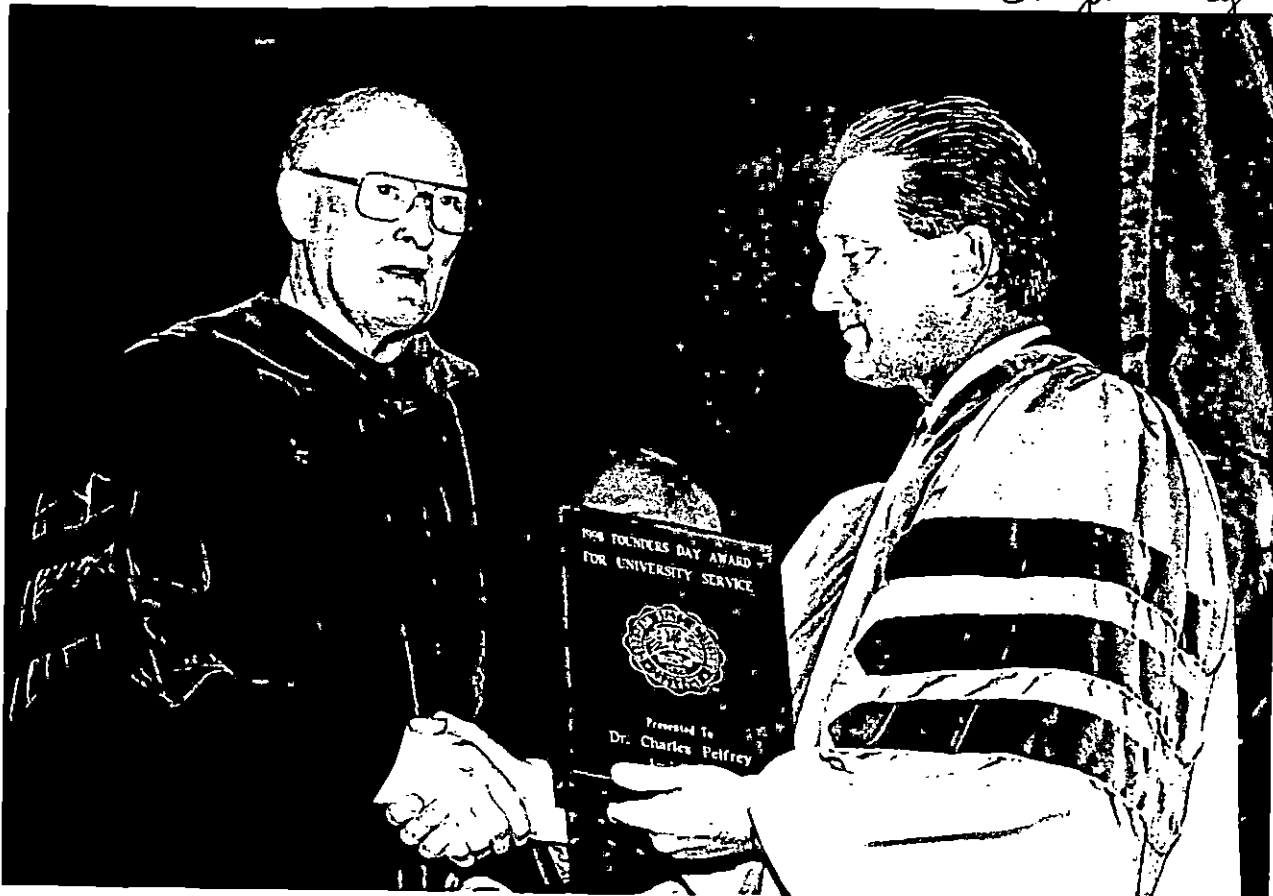
MSU HONORS DR. PELFREY

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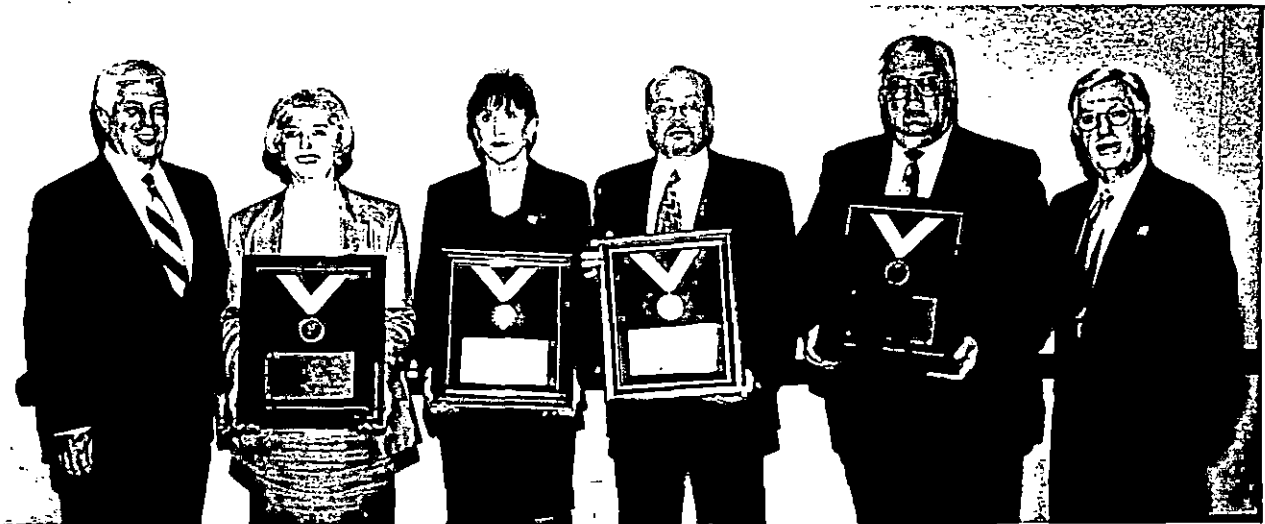

ASHLAND, Ky.---Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin announced here tonight that the institution's public radio station, WMKY, would extend its broadcast signal with five FM translators in Eastern Kentucky.

Dr. Eaglin told the East Kentucky Leadership Conference that the first translator had been approved by the Federal Communications Commission for Inez and primarily would cover Martin County with fringe service in parts of Lawrence and Johnson counties in Kentucky and Mingo County in West Virginia. The translator will broadcast at 88.3 on the FM dial and is expected to be operational this summer.

"WMKY has been serving most of our service region for more than 30 years and we are excited about the prospect of reaching all of the 22 counties with the quality programming of National Public Radio," Dr. Eaglin said. "We are filing FCC applications for additional translators in Boyd, Floyd, Pike and Breathitt counties to go on the air next year."

A translator is a miniature, low power transmitter which rebroadcasts a radio signal within a radius of about 20 miles.

Dr. Eaglin publicly thanked Mike Duncan and Inez Deposit Bank for helping provide a tower site for the first translator and Jim Booth for assisting with the engineering costs.

WMKY operates at 90.3 on the FM dial with a power of 50,000 watts from its main transmitter at Morehead. On the air daily from 5 a.m. to midnight, the station is a charter member of National Public Radio and has won numerous awards for its news, public affairs and cultural programming.

MOREHEAD, Ky.----Contrary to information sent by a group called the Undergraduate Campus Card Office and bearing the National College Registration Board seal, Morehead State University does not require that company's "Campus Card" ID for its students.

Apparently mailings have gone out nationwide to prospective college freshmen telling them to send a \$25 fee to the firm, located in New Jersey, for this card, according to Mike Walters, associate vice president for fiscal services at MSU. In its letter, UCCO says this card "is required for many services and purchasing privileges at whichever college or university your student chooses to attend."

"This card is neither required nor endorsed by Morehead State," Walters said. "It is not necessary for new students to purchase it. The University has received several calls from parents asking where to send the card fee and we want to assure them that this card is not authorized by MSU," he said.

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
