## Agriculture Tips

Agricultural development was at a low ebb fifteen years ago in Eastern Kentucky. If we take an inventory today of the progress made through the years it is an amazing story. Many counties said that there was no hope, there was no use trying to develop the poor land, that those sections were beyond improvement were wasting their time. But let us take an inventory of some of the progress brought about during this period.

Farming, Mining, and Mosaic counties were about the only ones throughout the eastern part of the state that employed agriculture agents. These came Carter County and from that time on the employment of county agents was rapid. Practically every county in eastern Kentucky has one or more county agricultural agents and many counties employ Home Economics demonstration agents. Farming and Mosaic counties were about the only two counties that had Smith-Hunter agricultural agents in their high schools. Today, every county in the eastern part of the state has one or more Smith-Hunter agricultural teachers and additional departments will be established this fall.

There were no 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers of America or Home Economics Clubs in this section. Today these are operating in every county and doing a splendid piece of work. This section had no extension agents. "Master Homekeepers" but today this area has furnished its share in competition with the rest of the state. Eastern Kentucky has furnished several winners in the Counties' Annual contest of home improvement.

For the benefit of those students who are not familiar with our method of classifying and shelving books or who may not know the various "keys" to the use of the library, we are presenting a series of brief explanations of these facts.

First of all, why do we classify books? We classify them so that we can find them more easily. We also classify them so that we can find them more easily.

What system of classification do we use? We use the Decimal Classification system which was worked out by Melvil Dewey and is therefore known as the Dewey Decimal System. When books come into the library they are classified. The books assigned are marked on the backs and the author's name and title are written on the books. They are then placed according to these classifications. All books with the same classification number are arranged alphabetically by their authors.

Example: The Psychology of Human Traits, by Edman are placed on the shelf with the other 301's, but by the alphabetical arrangement Edman would come before Ellwood. The books we work from the left to the right around room shelves. The books are shelved in the same manner as those in the reading room.
