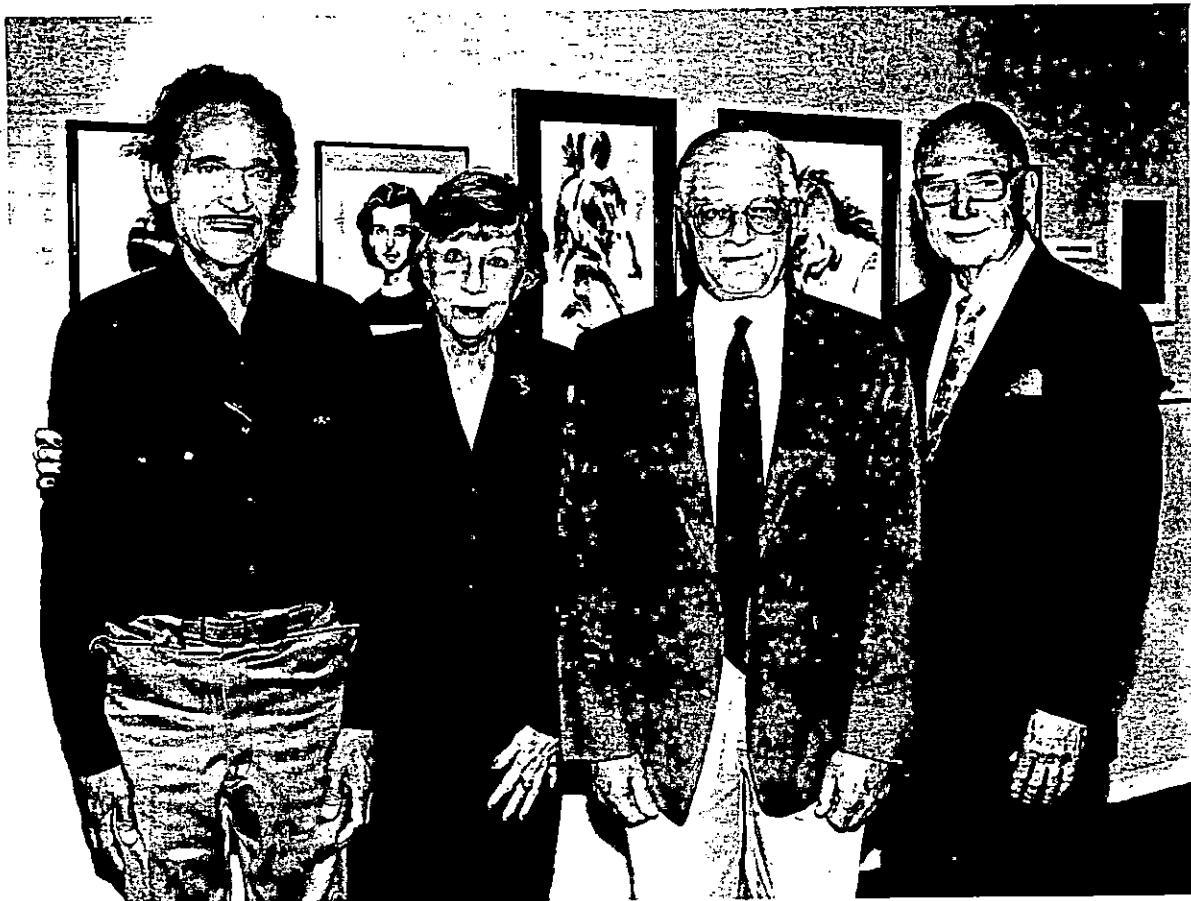
SIX RETIRE IN HUMANITIES AT MSU

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Board of Regents will provide President Ronald G. Eaglin with a deferred compensation package upon his retirement.

In making the announcement at its June 2 meeting, board vice chair Buckner Hinkle noted that a portion of the money for the deferred compensation package is being donated by a "generous friend" of the University. The funds will be placed in a trust, and should the president leave either voluntarily or involuntarily before the end of his contract, all monies will revert to the University.

Board Chairman L.M. (Sonny) Jones noted that a retirement plan was part of a verbal commitment made to Dr. Eaglin when he came to the University in 1992.

Also during the meeting, the regents gave the president a \$5,000 raise, bringing his salary to \$150,000 for the new fiscal year which begins July 1, and extended his contract by one year which now runs through June 30, 2002.

In his report to the board, Dr. Michael Moore, executive vice president for academic affairs, discussed persistence and graduation rates of college freshmen during the period 1991-98. He noted that preliminary data indicated that MSU had the highest graduation rate of the six regional universities by more than seven percentage points.

In personnel matters, Staff Regent Gene Caudill asked the board to support a recommendation to bring MSU's staff salaries up to local market levels and faculty salaries up to the average of Kentucky's regional universities.

The board also presented a memorial resolution to Shirley Hamilton on behalf of her husband, Steve, for his contributions to athletics and community service and to Erin Hughey, Student Government Association president, for her service as a regent during the last year.

In other action, the board approved a \$71 million operating budget for 1998-99, a 1.99 percent increase from last year; authorized reorganization of the Office of Minority Student Affairs to create an Office of Multicultural Student Services; approved revision of the Student Media Board Charter; promoted 15 faculty members and two librarians; accorded emeritus status to 10 retiring faculty members and approved MSU's Public Safety officers' participation in the Kentucky Law Enforcement Program Fund.

Also receiving board approval was a proposal for the Kentucky Folk Art Center, Inc., to become an affiliated corporation of MSU.

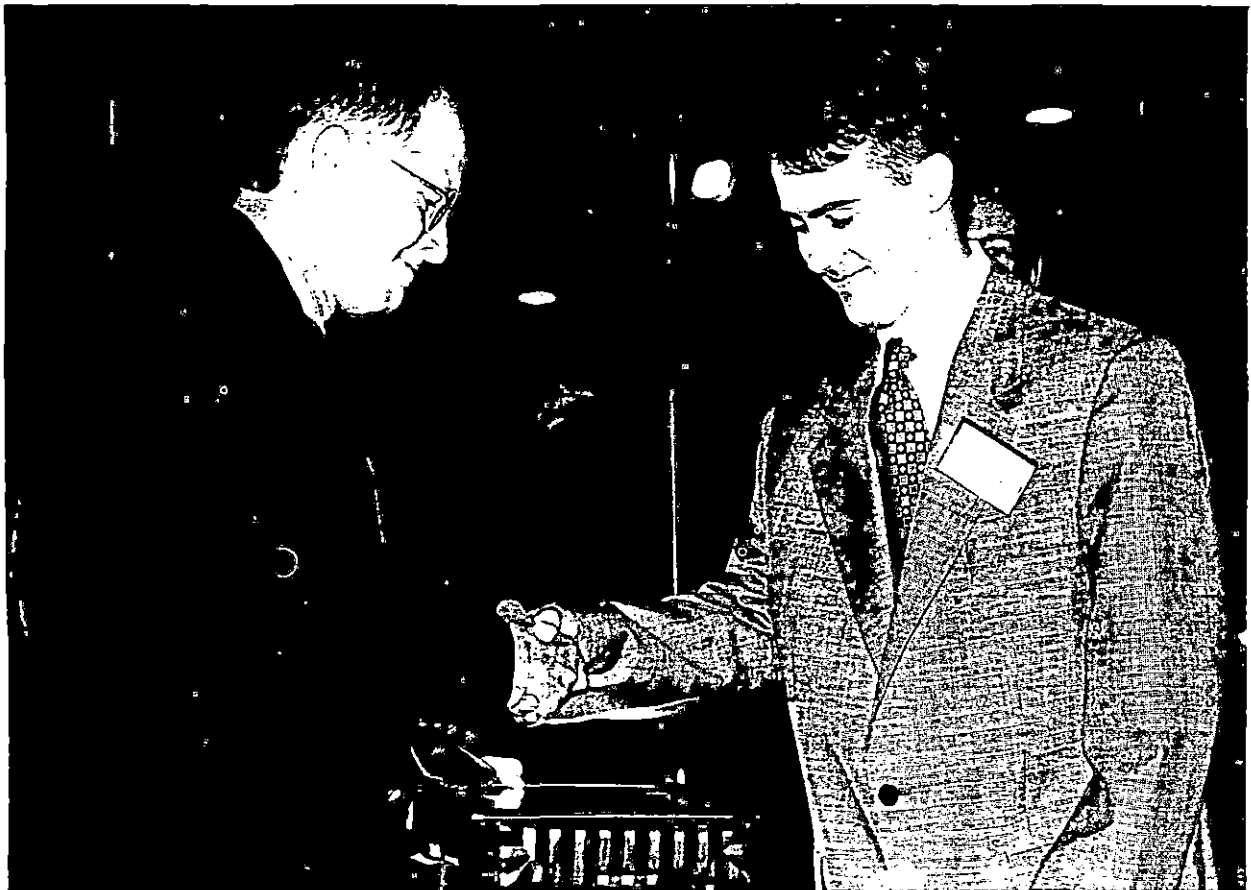

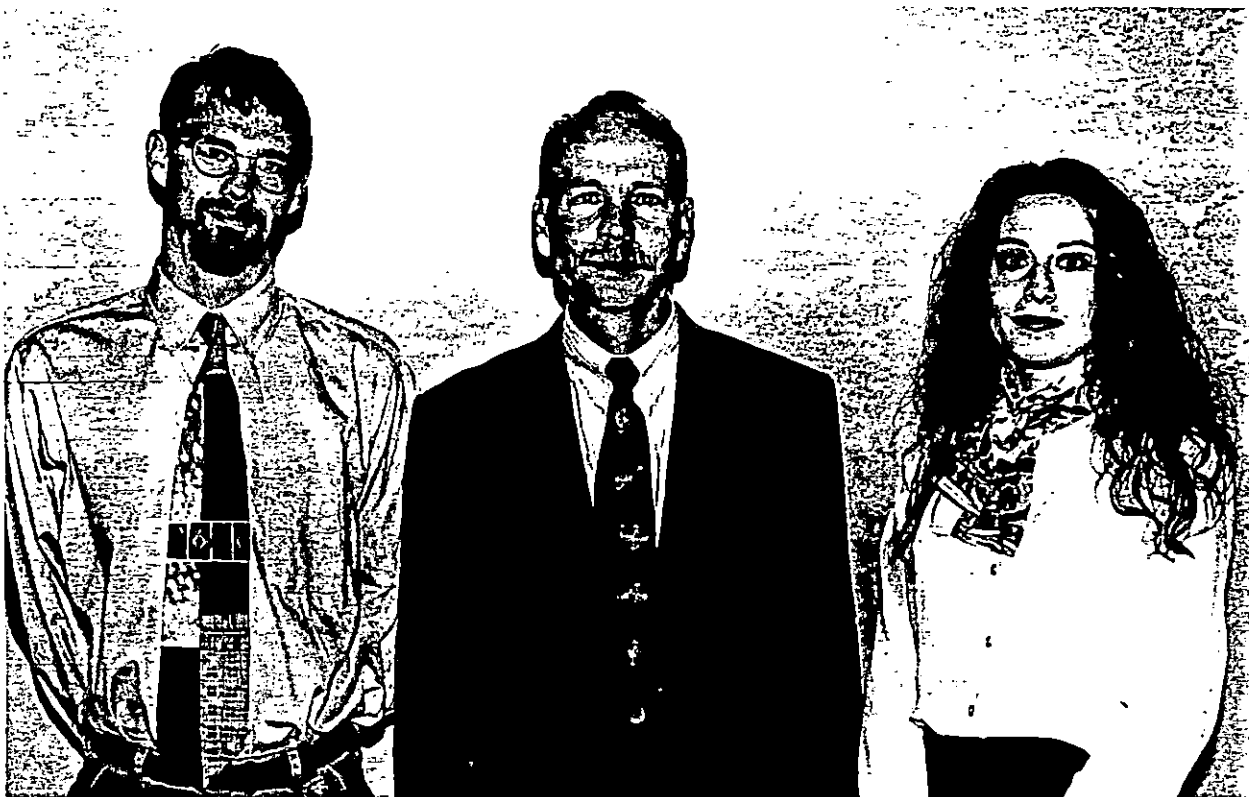

MOREHEAD, Ky.----“Banjo Women in West Virginia and Eastern Kentucky: A Multimedia Exhibit” is on display now through July 1 in the gallery, Claypool-Young Art Building on the Morehead State University campus.

The exhibit is the work of Dr. Susan A. Eacker, MSU assistant professor of history, and Geoff Eacker, director of the Art Center at Miami University in Ohio. The display is the result of research completed while the couple were Rockefeller Scholars-in-Residence at the Center for the Study of Ethnicity and Gender in Appalachia at Marshall University during the fall of 1997.

As part of Morehead State University's Appalachian Celebration, participants will have the opportunity to see Fleming County's covered bridges in a day long tour through the region on Monday, June 22.

The tour begins at MSU's Waterfield Hall Conference Center at 8:30 a.m. with return set for approximately 5 p.m. The charge is \$35 for Continuing Education Units (CEU's) and \$75 for six hours of Teachers' Professional Development Credit.

Participants are encouraged to wear comfortable shoes on this journey back in time. Cameras are a must for viewing the engineering of the bridges.

The county's most photographed bridge is the Goddard White Covered Bridge, located just off State Route 32. It is described as "the only surviving example of the Ithiel Town Lattice design in the state. While strolling along the bridge, you will see the timbers joined by wooden pegs. Viewing this bridge is special, not only because it is the oldest remaining covered bridge open to traffic in Kentucky, but to see how it frames the Goddard United Methodist Church in the background.

Across the highway from the Goddard bridge is the Goddard Country Crafts mall where many items made by local and area artists and crafts persons are for sale.

The journey will continue to the Ringos Mills and Grange City covered bridges that are representative of the late 1860s. The countryside provides a scenic view while the area near Grange City is an offering reminiscent of Scotland.

Additional stops along the tour will include antique shops, historic downtown Flemingsburg and a herb garden featuring theme gardens of herbal, biblical and a garden of Scotland.

Culminating the trip will be a visit to the village of Old Washington in Mason County. Founded in 1785, Washington is located on land purchased from Simon Kenton and was a popular outpost for pioneers traveling in the area.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Tucked away on a quiet street in the farm town of Flemingsburg, in a house filled with a lifetime of mementos, Ronald and Jessie Cooper paint and carve the days away. The renowned folk artists are the recipients of Morehead State University's 1998 Appalachian Treasure Award.

The award is given each year to recognize individuals with unusual talents and dedication to promoting and preserving Appalachian culture. Past recipients include: James Still, 1988; Jean Ritchie, 1989; Loyal Jones, 1990; Gurney Norman, 1991; Lyndall "Granny" Toothman, 1992; Homer Ledford, 1993; Minnie Adkins, 1994; Albert Stewart, 1995; C. Roger Lewis, 1996, and J.P. Fraley, 1997.

The Coopers will be honored at the Opening Reception of the Appalachian Celebration on Sunday, June 21, at the Claypool-Young Art Building. The public is invited to attend the reception that begins at 6 p.m. Entertainment will be provided by Cari Norris who performs traditional music on the lap dulcimer, frail-style banjo and guitar.

Even with all the fuss of being well-known artists, the Coopers live very quietly. Most people who live near them aren't aware that the traffic to the Cooper's home is anything more than just the family traipsing in and out. Collectors from across the country have found the path to the Cooper's door and the "Step on in and yell, we are upstairs" sign that hangs there.

The couple are usually upstairs in the workroom. Jessie uses the sink, left over from the days when the house was two apartments, to clean up from their work. Paint splatters cover the floor and work tables, but there is no disarray, only a neat, organized clutter.

The art work displayed around the house, is reminiscent of that sold across the country. It began more than a decade ago when Jessie convinced Ronald, who was recovering from an automobile accident, that painting would help pass the time as well as heal his mind and body. Jessie knew the rewards as she has been painting most of her life.

"I began painting when I was very young," Jessie said. "You know, in those days crayons were saved for school. Well, I wanted to draw and paint when I wasn't in school. So, I would go down to the creek and pick out a flat rock, then I would pick up colored rocks and draw pictures on that flat rock. I would play that way all day.

"I didn't own a set of paints until Ronald and I were married," she said, gazing up at her husband of 50 years. "He bought me my first set. Lord knows we needed the money for other things, but Ronald wanted me to have the paints."

Always ready to recognize Jessie as the true artist in the family, Ronald interjects a quiet “Jessie needed a set of paints.”

The scenic, religious paintings of Mrs. Cooper have been favorites of collectors since she sold the first ones at a yard sale. Her work always includes a clear, blue sky, green grass and a scattering of people, animals, trees, flowers and buildings. Scenes of baptisms in a river or life on a farm painted on tables, shoes, boxes and rocks turn every day items into works of art.

“Sometimes people give us things to paint or even leave them on the porch,” Jessie said. “Whenever I find something, I know when I pick it up what I will paint on it.”

Ronald’s work has the same religious theme, only with more fire and brimstone and feature the red devils for which he is known. One of their newest pieces is an old gas furnace. Jessie painted a blue and green landscape on the top while Ronald covered the remainder of the furnace in shades of red and black, filled the insides with flames tormenting sinners and a devil.

Ronald likes to use his art to get the message of Jesus to the viewer. “I believe the scenes showing the horrors of hell offer a chance for redemption to the viewer,” he said. He declares this work his ministry as three people have credited it for bringing religion into their lives.

For approximately 10 years, the Coopers sold exclusively to MSU’s Kentucky Folk Art Center. But, after a call from a dealer in Wilmington, N.C., they agreed to sell directly to Elaine Johnson’s gallery.

“We had never priced a piece of our own,” Ronald said. “We just always took it to the Folk Art Center and they priced it for us.” After coming to an agreement, Coopers loaded the car with art work and headed for Wilmington where Johnson was waiting to take the couple to dinner.

Arriving at the House of Blues Restaurant in North Myrtle Beach, Ronald was amazed at what he saw. “We were met at the door by one of my bird houses and inside, around the top of the room and behind the bar were my devils.”

When Johnson inquired about Ronald’s feelings, upon seeing his work displayed in this atmosphere where the music was loud and everyone was drinking, he replied: “It seems to me it is right where it should be. These people need to hear the word of the lord.”

The couple has slowed down the production of their art work and only work a few hours each day since Ronald suffered a heart attack last year. But one thing the artists agree “Even if we couldn’t sell a piece of our work, we would still make it.”

The Lovenia and William Richardson Gallery, the Garland and Minnie Adkins Gallery and the Jimmie Ruth Auditorium were unveiled by Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin and family and friends of the honorees. MSU operates the facility in cooperation with Kentucky Folk Art Center, Inc., a non-profit corporation headed by M. Ray Pace of Lexington.

The Richardsons, who live in Morehead, operated a wholesale grocery in the building before selling it to the University's Foundation in 1993. The \$50,000 gift was provided by their children, Drs. MOREHEAD, Ky.—WMKY 90.3 FM, Morehead State University's listener supported public radio station, has made some program changes in response to listeners' requests.

Beginning July 6, the station will air National Public Radio's "Talk of the Nation," weekdays at 2 p.m. The program is a talk show that focuses on news and issues behind the headlines. Later that day, classical music fans will hear more of their favorite music beginning at 7 p.m. and continuing until midnight each weekday evening.

"During our fund drives and day-to-day operation, listeners have continually requested more news and classical music," said Gordon Nichols, WMKY manager. "The station is planning a locally produced talk show that will address issues in the region and utilize the resources of MSU on a daily basis," he said. The new program is scheduled to air later this year.

The weekend programming on WMKY will have two new additions to its Sunday schedule beginning July 5. On Saturday, July 11, "The Environment Show" expands to a full hour at 5 a.m. WMKY's "Nothin' But the Blues" will become a three-hour program, beginning at 9 p.m.

These changes also are following listener requests for more NPR news and classical music, Nichols noted. "We have had a number of requests for repeating 'Car Talk' from people who miss it on Saturdays. Also, several months ago we added an additional hour of 'Bluegrass Diversion' and thought that another hour of the blues show would be popular with those fans," he said.

Accompanying the IBA Concert Band will be three band directors from Kentucky high schools. They are Teresa Elliott, **Henry Clay**, an MSU alumnus; Nannette Moore, **Louisville Male Traditional**, an MSU alumnus, and Brad Rogers, **Oldham County**.

In addition, two graduate students in the Department of Music at MSU will serve as student administrative and supervision assistants. They are Alicia Hudson of **Noctor** and Meredith Mains of **Falmouth**.

The IBA tour also includes a 109-member marching band who will be directed this year by Dr. Jon R. Woods, associate professor of music and director of The Ohio State University Marching Band. Selection in the IBA band is based on demonstrated musicianship, such as participation in a state, regional or national honor band, as well as leadership and citizenship. All applicants must have been recommended by their high school band director or a university band director. Upon acceptance, each student had to participate in a rigorous audition procedure for part and seat arrangements.

International Bands of America is guided by a panel of internationally recognized music educators who consult and assist in the development of the program. The Board of Advisers include: Dr. Richard Blatti, The Ohio State University; Paula Crider, The University of Texas, Dr. Bentley Shellahamer, Florida State University, Dr. Woods and Dr. Miles.

In demand nationally as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator, Dr. Miles teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting at MSU. He has conducted concerts and clinics throughout Europe, England and Canada and currently serves as president of the College Band Directors National Association-Southern Division. He recently co-authored "Teaching Music through Performance in Band," Volumes I and II, GIA Publications, "Block Scheduling: Implications for Music Education," Focus on Excellence Publications, and "Block Scheduling Implications for Music Educators" and "High School Restructuring: Additional Resources," Kentucky Coalition for Music Education.

Dr. Miles holds a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Florida State University and graduate and undergraduate degrees from the University of Illinois and Appalachian State University.
