ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AND IMPOSING AN ANNUAL OCCUPATIONAL LICENSE TAX ON PERSONS, FIRMS AND CORPORATIONS A N D BUSINESSES IN THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

WHEREAS, the general laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in such cases made and provided, delegate to the cities of the first class the authority and power to license and regulate trades, professions, occupations and businesses.

NOW, therefore, in order to provide revenue for the City of Morehead, Kentucky, from the collection of license taxes on such trades, professions, occupations, and businesses in this city, the following ordinance is hereby enacted:

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and Council of the City of Morehead, Kentucky, as follows:

SEC. 1 (a) Within the corporate limits of the City of Morehead, Kentucky, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to engage in any trade, profession, occupation or business, unless he or she shall have first procured a license to do so.

(b) The term "license" shall be construed to include within its meaning—person, firm, corporation, association, company or partnership.

(c) All revenue received from the payment of license tax and the amount of the fee thereon shall be paid to the city and become a part of the general fund of the city to be used for the general operating expenses of the city, except that all money collected under Sub-section (g) of Section 4 of this ordinance shall be used for the purpose of a fund to be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance, lighting and policing of the streets of said city. The licenses hereinafter provided for may be obtained by paying the City Clerk the license fee provided herein and upon receipt of said clerk shall issue license, of which shall be kept in a conspicuous place by the person to whom issued.

(d) Licensee shall be subject to inspection by any authorized agent of the City at any time.

(e) The license year shall be from January 1st of a given year and including December 31st of the same year, excepting the year 1940. All licenses hereinafter mentioned in this ordinance shall become due and collectable on or after September 1st and December 31st, 1940 shall expire December 31st, 1940.

(f) Any person who shall be engaged in any trade, profession, occupation or business hereinafter mentioned after the date herein provided shall be required to pay only a pro-rata part of the license required for a full license year and any person who shall be engaged in any trade, profession, occupation or business after January 1st, 1941, shall be required only to pay a pro-rata part of the license required for the license year in which the carrying on of such trade, profession, occupation or business begins.

(g) No partial payment for any kind of license shall be allowed or accepted.

(h) No refund upon a license shall be made by the City.

(i) Duplicate license shall be issued by the Clerk upon request of licensee for license lost, damaged or destroyed. For this service the Clerk shall be paid by licensee a fee of fifty cents.

(j) No license shall be transferred under this ordinance to any person for any purpose, other than time except by authority of the City Council.

(k) REVOCATION: Upon violation of any provision of this ordinance by any person holding a license, the City Council is hereby granted authority to revoke said license.

(l) LICENSE RATE IS PER ANNUM EXCEPT WHERE OTHERWISE SPECIFIED.

(m) VIOLATION PENALTY: Any such person carrying on such trades, professions, occupations, or businesses in said city without having paid the license tax and fees herein provided shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in the Police Court of the City of Morehead, Kentucky, a sum of not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for each such offense, each day that such trade, profession, occupation, or business is carried on after the license shall be considered a separate offense.

SEC. 2 (a) AGENTS ITINERANT: Every person being an itinerant agent, representative or solicitor, not otherwise herein specifically provided for, engaged in the business or occupation of canvassing from house to house, whether on foot or by vehicle, or otherwise, for the sale of any merchandise whatever, where such merchandise is to be sold for the installment plan or otherwise, shall pay a license tax of Five (\$5.00) Dollars per year.

(b) Each person delivering within the City, lumber and/or other building material, shall pay a license tax of \$10.00 per year.

(c) Building Contractor: Every contractor who operates a yard and/or maintains an office in the City, per year, \$5.00.

(d) Contractor of any kind, who does not have a yard or maintain an office in the city, per year, \$25.00.

(e) Bottled Soft Drinks, wholesale distributors, per year, \$25.00.

(f) CIGARETTES: Retail dealer in cigarettes, per year, \$10.00.

(g) Wholesale dealer in cigarettes or tobacco from an established business, or from a truck or vehicle and/or delivering city or vehicle shall pay an annual license fee for each vehicle or sub-agent of \$20.00.

(h) CIRCUSES OR CARNIVALS: per day, \$50.00.

(i) COAL DEALERS: Maintaining a coal yard and scales in the city limits, per year, \$10.00.

(j) COAL DEALERS: Soliciting or selling and not maintaining a scale in the city, per year, \$20.00.

(k) Coffee, Tea, Spices, etc., retail from house to house, per year, \$15.00.

(l) Clothing, Shoes, and other merchandise, per year, \$25.00.

(m) Dry cleaning, pressing, or conducting an agency from a permanent or fixed business establishment within the city of Morehead, Kentucky, shall pay a license tax of \$3.00 per day.

(n) Laundry Agency, conducting a laundry agency from a fixed or permanent business establishment within the City of Morehead, and/or operating a laundry plant within the City of Morehead, per year, \$3.00.

(o) Flour and or Seed Dealers, doing business at home, per year, \$5.00.

(p) Feather or Mattress renovating or similar business, per year, \$25.00.

(q) FRUITS AND VEGETABLES: Every person engaged in the business of selling fruits or vegetables wholesale from a truck, shall pay for each truck so operated, per year, \$10.00.

(r) FRUITS AND VEGETABLES: Peddling retail, constant moving from house to house, per day \$5.00.

(s) FRUITS AND VEGETABLES: Selling fruits, vegetables or other groceries from house to house from a truck, or otherwise, shall pay a license fee of \$20.00. Per day \$4.00.

(b) Health and Accident Companies, represented by a local agent, per year, \$5.00.

(c) Life Insurance, Foreign Companies, selling or soliciting by local agent, per year, \$5.00.

(d) Industrial Life Insurance, Foreign Companies, represented by local agent, per year, \$5.00.

(e) Rinsersant, Traveling or Non-Resident agents, solicitors or collectors (except agents of domestic and/or fraternal life insurance companies for insurance of any kind, whether paid by salary or commission, for each company so represented, per year \$35.00).

(f) Insurance collectors of any kind, not otherwise specified herein, for the use of the streets, pavements and public ways of the city, per year, \$10.00.

(g) Second-hand Store: Operating a store for the sale of second-hand furniture, fixtures, or other merchandise, per year, \$5.00.

(h) SA VING CLAUSE: Should any section, subsection or provision of this ordinance be declared by the Courts to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, except the section, subsection or provision of the ordinance so held to be invalid, said section, subsection or provision and every section of this ordinance is adopted as a separate ordinance.

(i) Any part of any ordinance in conflict with this ordinance is hereby repealed.

(j) This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of September, 1940, following its passage and publication as required by law.

blind person. The state may provide any amount above this as in the case of old age assistance. The Federal Act also provides that this assistance must be given in the form of money payments to the individual. This means that the grants are for unrestricted use by the recipient. This, therefore, marks a definite break from the traditional "Poor-law" procedure in that it provides relief in cash without making the recipient under any obligation as to its use.

As in the case of aid to dependent children, Kentucky is one of the eight states still unable to take advantage of the federal grants because of the lack of state legislation. It is regrettable that recent trials to remedy this situation were allowed to go awry.

Speed And Thrills At Ky. State Fair

Heading a galaxy of the best harness racers in the Nation, which will furnish speed and thrills aplenty at the Kentucky State Fair this year, starting on Tuesday, September 10th., will be Remus, 2:13 1-2, the gallant son of Protector-Symphonia by Guy Axworthy. Remus recently finished second to Spencer Scott in the Hambletonian, at Goshen, N. Y., and is entered in the Three-Year-Old Trot set for Tuesday, September 10th.

But it will be no walkover for the Harry Short star because there will be no opposition galore from such stoppers as Kitty McEwlyn, Sigelman Jim, Danville Anna, Personality, Leading Lady, Volition, Milestone and Jim Volo, to mention a few.

In addition to the Three-Year-Old Trot, which is worth \$2,000, there will be two other stakes for the same amount. On Wednesday, September 11th., the Commissioner of Agriculture's Cup will be the prize in the 2:14 pace and on Thursday the racers will go after the Governor's Cup, a 2:14 trot

affair. Added to these three stakes are a number of overnight events and a special performance, on Wednesday, by Greyhound, the world's fastest trotter; when he attempts to establish a new track record. The present track record is 2:01, set many years ago by the pace driver, Seps Palin, Greyhound's driver, who drove Winnipeg to the record. So, it should be a treat to see the veteran retainer when he attempts to lower his own Louisville track record.

KY. FARM NEWS

Gay Blakeman of Adair county burned eighteen tons of lime. He made a square stack, alternating layers of logs and limestone, and then set the logs afire. He is planning to spread the lime a ton to the acre.

Hardin county farmers received 2,011 tons of phosphate in the 1940 agricultural program. Orders now are being taken for next year's program, with five carloads already ordered for early fall shipment.

A. C. Glasscock of Marion county threshed 210 bushels of Balbo rye from 3.85 acres, after grazing it during early spring with 60 ewes and their lambs and six feeder calves. The rye made a poor start last fall but stood out heavily.

Twenty-eight acres of Italian rye-grass on the Bell county farm of O. G. Boden attracted the attention of farmers in several counties. He now is planning to sow most of his 400-acre farm to rye grass.
