"Creating Jewish Characters for Television," slated for later this semester, will chronicle portraits of Jewish life from the early days of "The Goldbergs" to recent hits like "Seinfeld."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Kentucky Center for Public Issues and Morehead State University are teaming up to launch The Pulse of the Commonwealth, focus groups and surveys in Rowan and the contiguous counties and elsewhere in small and medium-size communities to identify issues of great concern to the state's population.

Citizens will be selected from these communities and guided by trained facilitators associated with MSU. The results of these focus groups will be used to fashion a statewide survey to gauge all Kentuckians' attitudes.

The focus groups and survey, intended to be annual events, are part of the Kentucky Center's CommonWealth/CommonQuest civic-engagement project. Once issues are identified, the Center, working with colleges, universities and other institutions, will form study circles, small groups of citizens who will learn about the issues and propose ways to resolve them.

Headquartered in Frankfort, the 10-year-old, citizen-based Kentucky Center for Public Issues promotes citizen awareness and involvement in tackling the state's biggest problems. Among the goals of the Center are to begin a process of bringing Kentuckians together to think about what is best for the state as a whole. The group publishes a bimonthly journal, hosts and cosponsors a weekly call-in program on public radio and conducts forums, moderates debates and organizes policy councils to study issues, such as the best way to select judges.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Dr. Janet Gross, professor of nursing at Morehead State University, has been appointed interim director of International Education programs for the coming year.

She will fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Dr. Dean Owen, professor of education, according to Dr. Michael Moore, executive vice president for academic affairs.

Her career in nursing led Dr. Gross to Australia three years ago where she taught a health care course. Since that time, she has served on MSU's International Affairs Committee and has collaborated with the Cooperative Center for Study Abroad (CCSA) teaching in Australia, providing more than 30 students with an opportunity to experience Australian health care first hand.

Dr. Gross will teach a health care course in South Africa in June, marking the first time that the CCSA has offered classes in that country. Courses in the history of South Africa, comparative study of South African and American education systems and the peoples and cultures of Africa also will be offered during the summer program.

Noting that the time involved, in addition to her classroom duties, would be extensive, Dr. Gross said: "It is something I'm interested in and it's extremely satisfying. The learning that takes place is incredible. It's discovery learning at its best."

Morehead State is a member of a number of consortia groups that provide study abroad for students as well as lecture opportunities for faculty. In addition to the CCSA, MSU collaborates with the Kentucky Institute for International Studies which coordinates study programs across Europe, with the Kansai Gaidai Institute which facilitates courses in Japan and the Magellan Exchange which offers courses in the Netherlands, Belgium, Finland and Germany. Each of these programs offers students academic credit and some qualified students may receive financial aid to defray costs of their studies. In addition, a culture abroad program is available through several Chinese universities in collaboration with the Caudill College of Humanities.

With these opportunities for international education, Dr. Gross hopes there will be more students participating. "The experience of studying abroad has a significant and lasting impact. They learn how to travel, how to exchange currency, how to adapt to a different culture, and most importantly, how to accept people for their differences," she said.

During her term as director, Dr. Gross would like to enhance the programs by increasing visibility for international education experiences, recruiting more students, offering more support to the office of International Student Support Services and working toward greater diversity among international students. Currently, there are approximately 120 international students attending Morehead State.

This summer three additional MSU faculty members will be teaching in the CCSA program: Dr. Rita Egan will teach education courses in Scotland and England; Dr. John Philley will teach a geology course in Canada, and Thom Yancy will instruct a communications course in London. Other MSU faculty members will participate in the KIIS program in the summer of 1999. They include: Mary Jo Netherton, who will serve as director of the KIIS program in France; Dr. Roma Prindle who will teach music in Salzburg, Austria, and Dr. Bob Frank who will teach intercultural communications in Bregenz, Austria.

Study abroad courses range from general education requirements to more specialized classes that will fit into a particular major. Students do not always have to be proficient in the exchange country's language to participate.

Dr. Gross is encouraging students to plan now to enroll in an international education program during their academic career at MSU. "The first step is to develop personal goals for what they want out of a study abroad program," she said.

A faculty member at MSU for more than 15 years, Dr. Gross has taught in both the Baccalaureate (BSN) and Associate (ADN) Degree nursing programs as well as served as interim chair of the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences. Active in professional organizations, she is currently president of the Kentucky League of Nursing.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---In a continuing effort to keep its student population healthy, Morehead State University is offering hepatitis B vaccinations to all students through the University's Caudill Health Clinic.

According to national statistics, approximately 75 percent of all reported hepatitis B cases occur between the ages of 15 and 39 years, making college students a significant group at risk. Every year in the U.S., approximately 240,000 people are infected with the disease.

Hepatitis B may be transmitted through contact with infected blood through any break in the skin, according to Madonna Weathers, director of student development. Other methods of transmitting the disease are by exposure to contaminated sharp instruments used for tattooing, body piercing or IV drug use, by unprotected sex with an infected partner or by sharing of razors, toothbrushes, or earrings with an infected person.

Although this communicable, life-threatening virus will infect one in 20 people, hepatitis B can be prevented with a safe and effective vaccine, Weathers noted.

Immunization for hepatitis B consists of a three shot series given over a six-month period. Students 19 years of age and under receive the adolescent series at the cost of \$30 or \$10 per dose. Those 20 years and older receive the adult series at the cost of \$75 or \$25 per dose.

"It is important that students receive their first dose prior to Nov. 6 in order to complete the series before the end of the school year," Weathers said.

The hepatitis B vaccine is administered Monday through Friday from 8:15 to 10:45 a.m. and from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at the Caudill Health Clinic. When checking-in, students should inform the receptionist that they wish to receive the hepatitis B vaccine.

The staff of the Caudill Health Clinic will provide information to allow students to make an informed decision regarding the hepatitis B immunization, Weathers said.

It will look specifically at the University's Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree program that offers classes through compressed video and via world-wide-web-based instruction. Also under scrutiny will be the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program, professional education and other support classes.

A substantive change visit by SACS occurs as colleges and universities advance their program offerings, according to Dr. Marc Glasser, MSU associate vice president and dean of Graduate and Undergraduate Programs who is serving as coordinator for the SACS team.

"We have an aggressive and growing distance learning program which is serving students throughout the region," Dr. Glasser said. "As a result of our responsiveness to student needs and the growth of these programs, SACS will review the effectiveness of our distance learning activities."

Morehead State worked closely with SACS as the distance learning program was being established, including submitting three detailed reports on the University's offerings via distance learning, Dr. Glasser said. Copies of these reports are available for review at the circulation desk in Camden-Carroll Library. The visiting committee will evaluate multiple aspects of the program now in place, offer suggestions for improvement and identify strengths of MSU's distance learning program.

The substantive change committee is composed of six educators and administrators from throughout the South, who have been selected by SACS specifically for this assignment. They include: Dr. Edwin A. Rugg, committee chair, vice president for academic affairs at Kennesaw State University in Kennesaw, Ga; Dr. G. Jack Allen, associate executive director of the Commission on Colleges; Dr. Pamela C. Levi, dean of the School of Health Sciences at Georgia College and State University in Milledgeville, Ga.; Dr. Suzanne G. Logan, director of the division of continuing education at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas; Dr. Teresa M. MOREHEAD, Ky.---One of every nine women in this country will develop breast cancer at some time in her life, according to statistics from the American Cancer Society. For menopausal women, that number increases to one in eight, according to Kenitha King, who works with the Kentucky Cancer Network. "That does not include the approximately 1,400 men in this country who develop the same type of cancer each year.

"In Kentucky, there are more than 700 deaths and some 2,900 new cases of breast cancer yearly," said King, a registered nurse for more than 20 years with Morehead State University's Student Health Services. She and other members of the staff are always campaigning for awareness and prevention among college students but especially during National Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October.

"We want college students to become aware of the statistics, of how frequent breast cancer occurs and how important it is for early detection," King said. As a part of the awareness campaign, she has visited a number of groups on the campus, including MSU 101 classes, which serve as orientation for freshmen and transfer students; spoken at sorority meetings and conducted residence hall programs. Her message is simple: "Early detection is the key to survival."

To better inform the student population, the clinic staff presents information on testicular self-examination (TSE) for males as well as breast cancer for females. Testicular cancer is the most common type of cancer in men ages 20 to 35. Yet, because it accounts for only about 1 percent of all cancers in men, many people have never heard of this type of cancer. Testicular cancer is of special concern to young men because it can occur anytime after age 15.

In her presentations, King talks about the basics. "I give them the statistics and show them a video. We also use models to help demonstrate proper technique for testicular and breast self-examination (BSE)."

Sometimes during the demonstrations, students will giggle a little at first because the models are very realistic and they feel awkward about touching them, King noted. "But then they are surprised by how hard it is to detect abnormalities on the models and how much pressure has to be applied to feel the BB-size lumps," she said.

Self-examination is a key to early detection of cancer, according to King. "It makes you aware of what is normal for your own body. You may see your doctor only once a year for a physical exam, but he or she may not be aware of what's normal for you. When you know your body, you are more likely to tell when something is not normal and that is what's important," she said.

To increase awareness of self-examinations, MSU's Student Health Services is distributing cards that may be hung in showers. The shower hangers are available in Camden-Carroll Library, Wellness Center, Non-traditional Students office in the Adron Doran University Center, and through the Residence Hall Association.

These shower cards show proper examination technique for BSE and TSE and a calendar to mark examination dates. Also included are telephone numbers for anyone who wants to ask a question or who finds anything suspicious during self-examination.

King also stresses the importance of a basic mammogram screening for all women between the ages of 35 and 40 to establish a baseline for comparison. For women who have a family history of breast cancer, this screening may begin in their mid- to late 20s. "After the age of 40, women should receive a mammogram once a year," she said, "because women at this age are more likely to develop breast cancer."

Single accommodations are available at an additional cost. Special course field trip costs and entrance fees may be additional.

Participants should budget approximately \$800 for other meals, snacks, entrance fees, and personal expenses such as souvenirs and independent travel.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Elementary through secondary school students in the area are participating in a cultural exchange program with students in Sunderland, England, through the Information-Communication-Technology (ICT) Project International.

This collaborative educational research project, jointly developed by Morehead State University's College of Education and Behavioral Sciences and the School of Education at University of Sunderland, utilizes Internet communications to link a number of regional public schools in Kentucky with comparable schools in England.

Rowan County Middle School, Rowan County Senior High School, Morehead Grade School, Lakeside Elementary School in Elliott County, Mason County High School, and Morgan County Middle School will be teamed with Farrindon Community School in Sunderland, Prudhoe High School, The Norton School in Stockton, Hilton Primary School in Newcastle, Hirst High School, and Norton Primary School in Sunderland. Each team will be guided by a teacher from the respective school and will be paired with faculty members from Morehead State and the University of Sunderland who will be investigating action research projects.

Students will use web sites, audio and video recordings, digital cameras and e-mail to share information and conduct research. Video conferencing will allow students to interact in "real time" and share classroom experiences.

A steering committee from each university was formed to focus on project development. Members of the steering committee include: Bonnie Eaglin, the University's First Lady, committee chair; Shirley Blair, MSU associate professor of education, project coordinator; Kay Freeland, superintendent of Rowan County schools; Randy Evans, technology coordinator for Elliott County schools; Helen Pennington, principal of Morgan County Middle School; Pat Needham, counselor with Montgomery County schools; Janice Barnett, Mason County High School; Dr. Cathy Barlow, chair of MSU's Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education, and Beth Patrick, MSU assistant vice president for Information Technology.

Area teachers who are participating are Lara Allen, Morehead Grade School; Denton Blair, Rowan County Senior High School; Mary Alice Oldfield, Morgan County Middle School; Jay Padula, Rowan County Middle School; Dena Smith, Lakeside Elementary School, and Barnett.

MSU faculty members partnered with public school teachers are Dr. Kent Freeland, professor, and Dr. Colleta Grindstaff, Karen Hammons, Dr. Adele Moriarty, and Dr. Melinda Willis, assistant professors, who will conduct action research projects.

“This is what Kentucky education reform is all about--partnerships,” said Blair. “Project International gives us a link to the world.”

As students and teachers share projects, much of their work will be published on the Internet through Web pages, creating a valuable resource for all Internet users. For example, under Padula’s guidance, Rowan County Middle School students plan to map the Licking River from its source to its end. Their work will be used to create an electronic resource on the Internet.

A group of educators from Sunderland will visit Rowan County in late October to work in the team schools with their MSU partners.

ICT Project International is encouraging global communication among students on a very personal level, Blair noted. Students and teachers will be exchanging ideas and values, giving them the opportunity to conduct research and compare cultures while gaining technological experience.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A committee of Morehead State University's Board of Regents has adopted a resolution encouraging President Ronald G. Eaglin to seek state funding for the upgrade of fire protection systems in campus residence halls.

The Board's Audit Committee this week said it would recommend to the full membership on Nov. 13, that Dr. Eaglin be authorized to secure financing from the state general fund rather than issue housing revenue bonds for that purpose.

The Audit Committee learned at the meeting that Michelle Francis, MSU Student Government Association president and student regent, and student body presidents at six other public universities have shown their support for state funded fire safety improvements. Ms. Francis told the committee that the Board of Student Body Presidents had sent its resolution to Gov. Patton.

"We believe that taxpayers are willing to fund the cost of life safety measures for all students on campus," Francis said. "We want this to become a priority at the state level and not be added to each student's financial burden."

It is estimated that room rental rates would have to be increased by at least \$100 per semester to pay off new bonds issued to install sprinklers. At Morehead State, the estimated cost of in-room sprinklers is \$4 million.

The death of a Murray State University student in September prompted the concern for the welfare of students who live in campus residence halls without in-room sprinkler systems. While campus housing at Morehead State meets current fire safety codes, only three of its residence halls have in-room sprinklers.
