The workshop will be conducted by John Osborne, MSU assistant professor of accounting. He is an experienced tax preparer and consultant who has served the Morehead area for more than 42 years. Topics to be discussed will include records needed for start-up, tax implications of choosing a structure, proper completion of schedule C forms, as well as farm taxes and business expenses which may be deducted.

There is no cost for members of the Montgomery County Cattleman's Association. There is a \$5 registration fee for nonmembers to cover the meal being served. The program is open to all interested persons. However, due to limited seating, pre-registration is necessary.

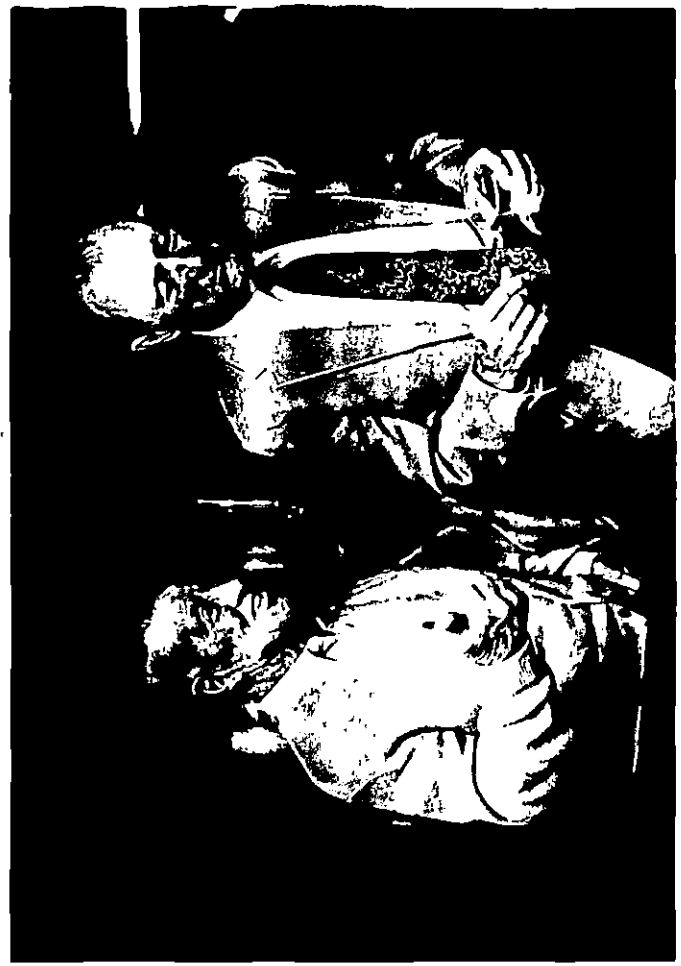

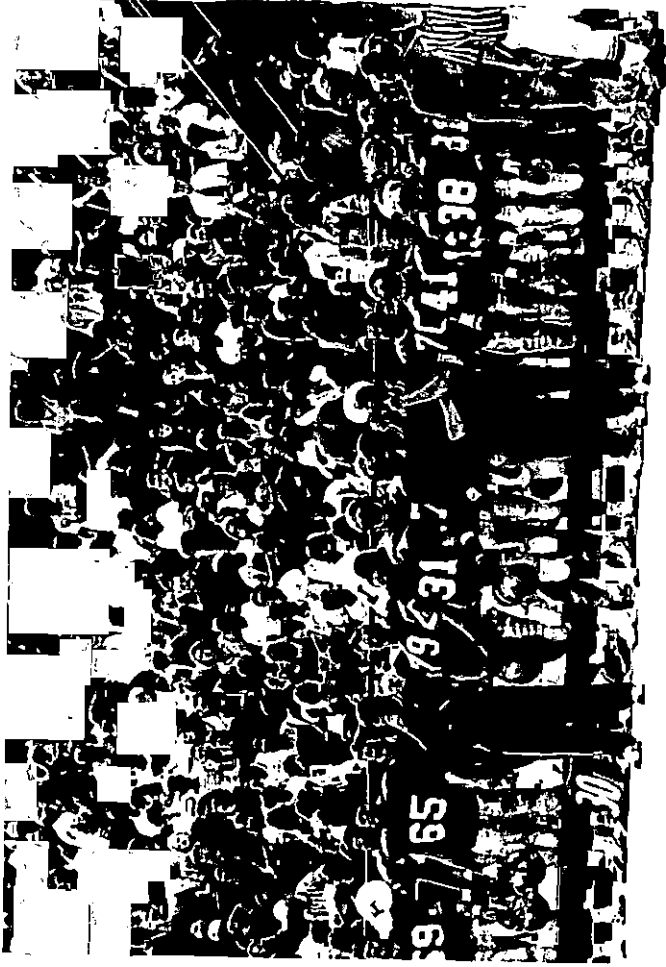

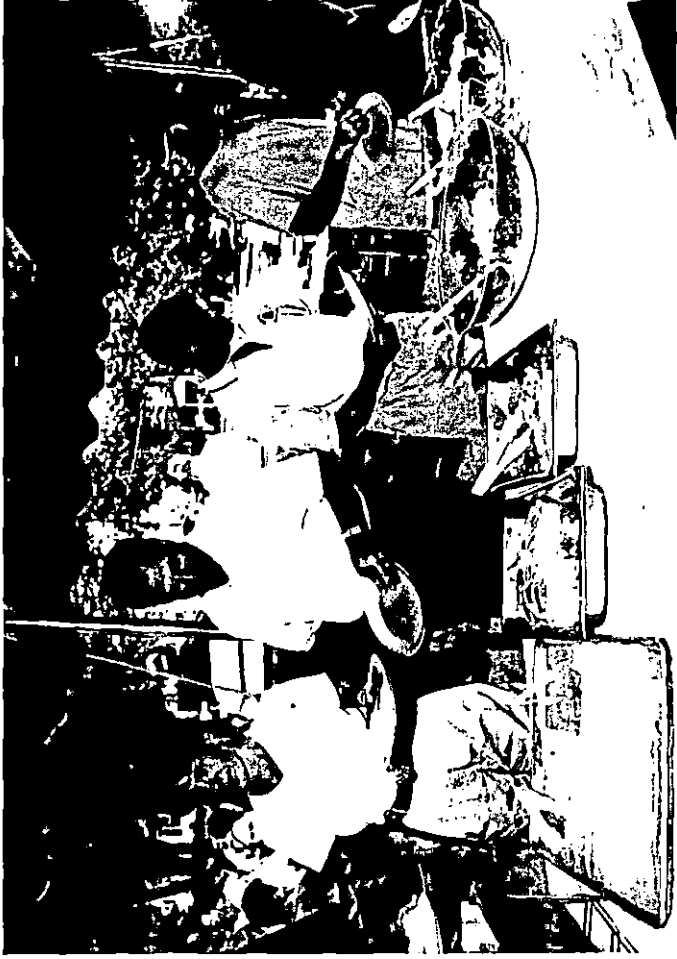

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Business-minded students at Morehead State University will soon have another resource to assist them in preparing for the future thanks to a new organization that is in the process of being established on campus.

"Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) is a national, non-profit organization that provides college students the opportunity to establish a variety of community outreach programs that teach free enterprise," according to Betty Hoge, assistant professor of management who will serve as faculty adviser for the new MSU chapter.

SIFE was designed to help students sharpen their communications, creativity, team-building and leadership skills through the process of developing, planning and implementing outreach projects in their communities, according to Hoge. "Students then showcase these skills by presenting their team's projects to a panel of judges at a regional competition. 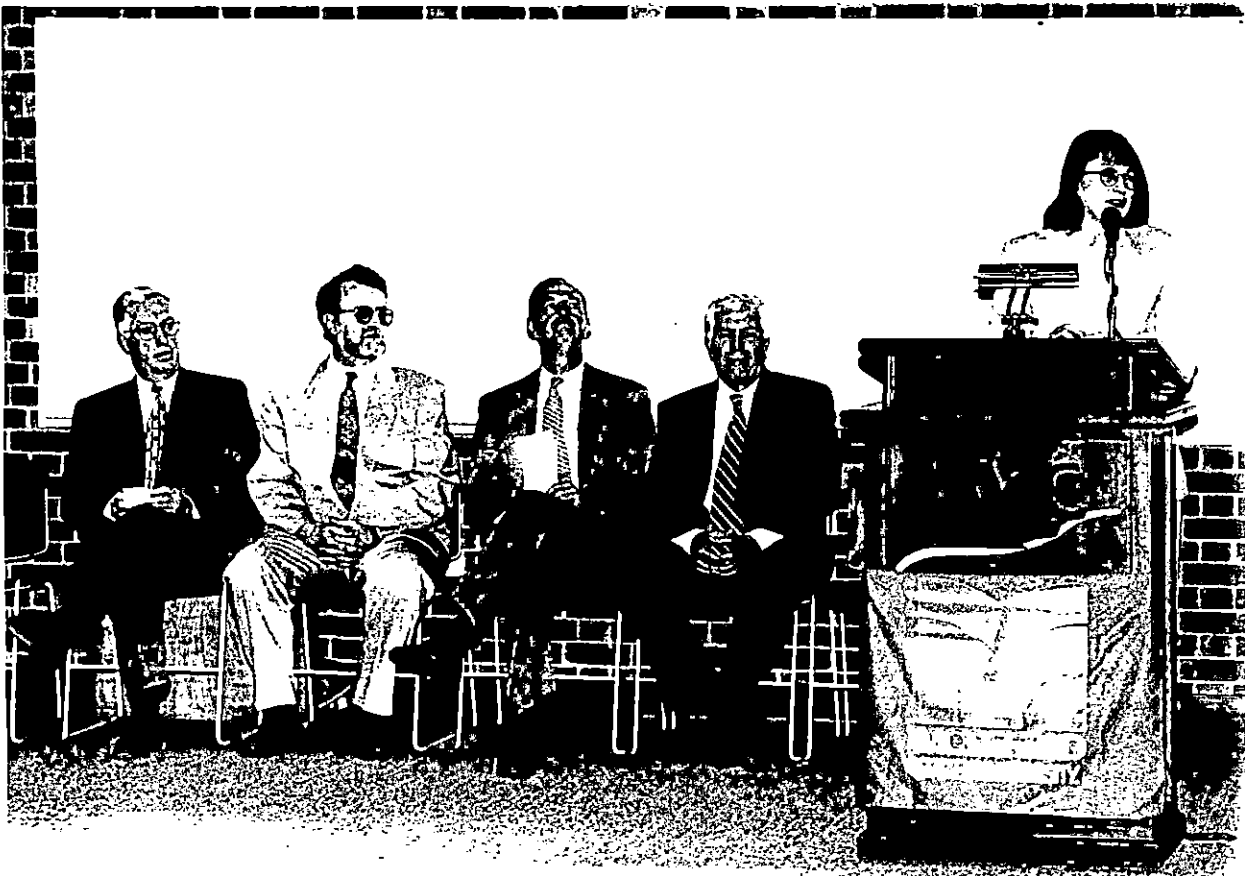

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University is on the cutting edge of distance learning, according to Dr. Rosemary Carlson, professor of finance.

Dr. Carlson was quoted in the "Wall Street Journal" in an article by Hal Lancaster on Aug. 4. In the article on use of Internet technology in the classroom, she said:

"Students and faculty can mingle and brainstorm just as effectively, and perhaps more effectively, on the Internet as they can face to face."

In 1996 when MSU offered its first class on-line, Dr. Carlson was the first professor to teach a course. Now, 100 percent of the students enrolled in the Master of Business Administration degree program are completing their coursework through distance learning.

"The crucial issue, specifically for MBA students, is access to education," Dr. Carlson said. "Most of our MBA students are working professionals, so commuting to off-campus classes after work is difficult for them. Since we began utilizing distance learning for this program, our enrollment has increased over 300 percent."

As technology evolves, Dr. Carlson believes that the Internet will be utilized more, as it eliminates the time and place constraints of off-campus courses. The MBA program currently uses compressed video, an interactive two-way audio and video presentation where the professor broadcasts the course to students in off-campus classrooms, in combination with courses delivered over the Internet.

There are limitations of using this format, Dr. Carlson noted. "Students still have to be in a certain place at a certain time to receive the instruction," she said. Utilizing the Internet, students may log-on at any time of the day or night to receive instruction and may use chat rooms to hold "real time" discussions with classmates as well as the professor.

This technology was first explored in Canada and Australia, where rough terrain often impedes students from attending college, according to Dr. Carlson. She notes that this same philosophy of taking education to the students greatly benefits students in Eastern Kentucky.

As a result of making the degree program more accessible to students, course enrollment has increased "from 10 students per class to exceeding the standard classroom maximum," Dr. Carlson said. "We currently have 70 students enrolled in a managerial communications course and 45 in a specialized financial service marketing course."

The University's MBA program hopes to be among those chosen as a pilot program in cooperation with the Commonwealth Virtual University proposed by legislators last spring. Each of Kentucky's eight state universities has selected a program to develop through distance learning to test the effectiveness of this technique. If the MBA program proves effective, other programs may follow, increasing the opportunities for distance learning in Eastern Kentucky, Dr. Carlson said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Dr. Jonell Tobin, director of Morehead State University's Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in West Liberty, has been appointed by Gov. Paul Patton to serve on the Task Force on Adult Education.

The 18-member Task Force was created during the last legislative session to develop recommendations and an implementation plan for raising the literacy level and educational attainment of Kentucky's adults who have not graduated from high school or who have poor literacy skills.

The governor will serve as chair of the Task Force that includes six Senate members appointed by the President of the Senate, six House of Representative members appointed by the Speaker of the House, and six members appointed by the Governor.

About one in three Kentucky adults do not have a high school diploma and approximately 40 percent of the state's adults are at low or minimal literacy levels, according to a survey conducted last year. "There has never been a thorough and full review of our adult education system," said Gov. Patton in announcing the Task Force's creation in February.

During her appointment, Dr. Tobin will meet monthly with the Task Force which will examine the current adult education system in Kentucky and report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Legislative Research Commission in the fall of 1999.

A former training specialist with the state Cabinet for Human Resources, Dr. Tobin was named director of the Licking Valley ECC in 1987 and added oversight of MSU's activities in Jackson in 1996. She holds the faculty rank of assistant professor of vocational education.

A graduate of Leadership Kentucky, she serves on several boards in the area and works with numerous agencies, such as the One-Stop Career Centers. She is currently president of the Morgan County Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Tobin earned her bachelor's, master's and the Doctor of Education degrees from the University of Kentucky.

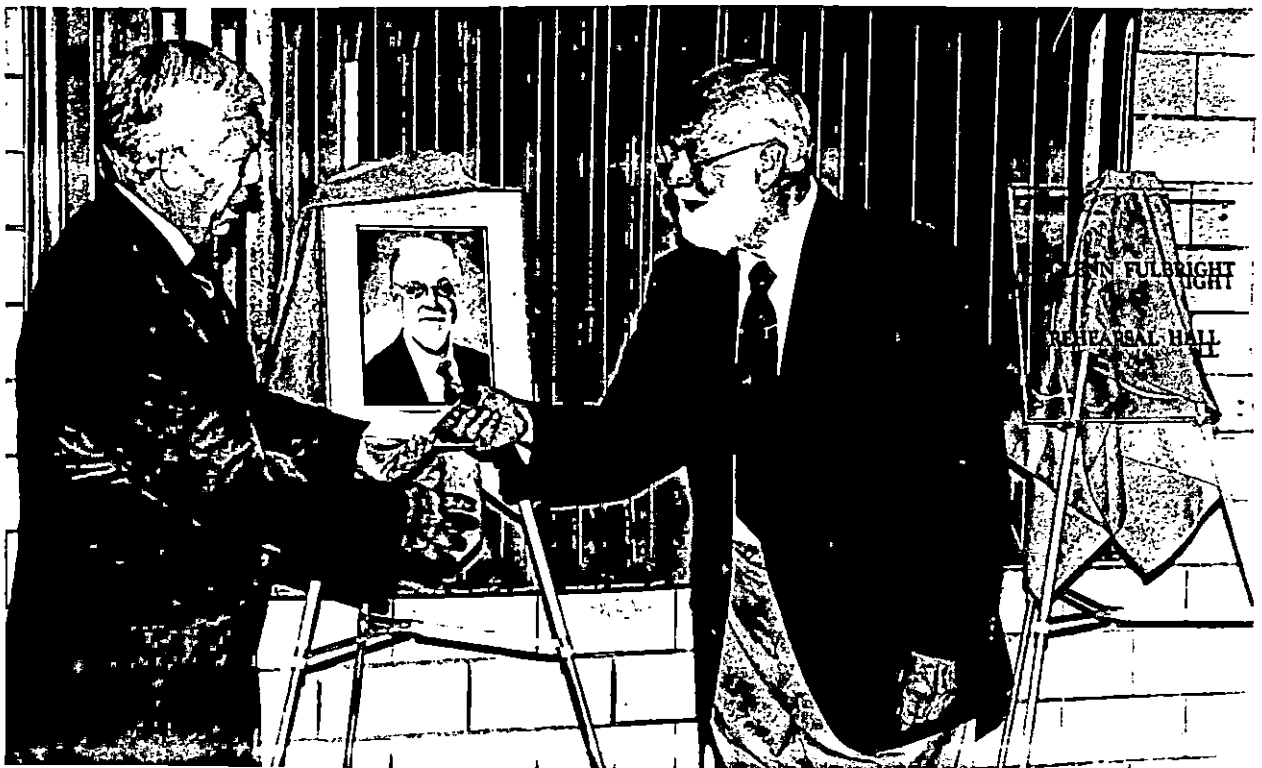

Eaglin, left, noted that the room was "being re-dedicated as a world-class rehearsal hall for a world-class music program."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Music will host its 39th annual Choral Festival for High School Singers on Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 16 and 17, in Duncan Recital Hall.

A concert, that is free and open to the public, will be presented each evening.

The MSU choirs, under the direction of Dr. Greg Detweiler, assistant professor of music, will present a fall concert on Monday, Nov. 16, at 8 p.m. The program will offer a contrast of sounds between large and small mixed ensembles and an all-male choir. Concluding the evening's entertainment, the Concert Choir will offer several early Baroque motets and oratorio choruses and selections from "Christmas Cantata" by Daniel Pinkham for chorus and double brass choir.

On Tuesday, Nov. 17, at 7 p.m. a 100-voice chorus composed of high school students from Kentucky will be heard in concert. Dr. Jeffrey Riehl, director of choral activities at the University of Richmond (Va.) will conduct the performance.

Dr. Riehl is active throughout the Northeast and South as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator.

Musical renditions for the evening will include the polychoral "Buccinate in neomenia tuba" by Croce; Haydn's "Te Deum for Marie Therese," two spirituals and the Russian "Veniki". The men's chorus will present "Noel Canon" and the women will sing the spiritual "Hold On." The MSU Concert Choir will join the Festival Chorus for Copland's "The Promise of Living" from his opera "The Tender Land".

MOREHEAD, Ky.---After five years of gradually declining enrollment, the count is up slightly at Morehead State University this fall, according to figures from the Office of the Registrar.

MSU has 8,263 students for the fall term. Enrollment for the fall of 1997 was 8,208.

“The increase is small but we are very pleased because it means we are making progress in keeping more students in school and on the path to personal success,” said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. “Maintaining enrollment is challenging in a shrinking marketplace due to smaller high school graduating classes and a strong economy. At the same time, we have built the state’s second-highest graduation rate among public universities.”

MSU’s highest fall enrollment was 9,162 in 1992. Dr. Eaglin said the institution’s target enrollment is 8,700 students within the next two years.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A \$25,000 grant from the Coleman Foundation is being used to develop a small business entrepreneurship program for students at Morehead State University.

Dr. Stacy Vollmers, assistant professor of marketing, and Betty Hoge, assistant professor of management, petitioned for the grant and will direct the program over the next 1 1/2 years. "This grant gives us a unique opportunity to develop courses that will truly benefit our students at a minimal initial expense to the University," they said.

"The University is interested in meeting the needs of people in the area and small business is important to MSU's service region," according to Hoge.

In her research of entrepreneurship programs internationally, Hoge noted:

"Evidence suggests that small firms create the majority of new jobs; for example, between 1976 and 1986, 1.3 million new jobs in manufacturing were created by small firms, while the number of manufacturing jobs in large firms decreased by 100,000 during the same period. More important for our students, well over 80 percent of college graduates nationally get their first jobs in a small business--this number may be even higher for college graduates in Eastern Kentucky."

The Coleman Foundation grant will allow the professors to develop courses by allocating funds for resource materials and adjunct faculty salaries. They anticipate that courses for the program will be available for students as early as fall of 1999 with the completed program in place by spring of 2000. Courses may include an introductory course, marketing for small business, finance for small business, and a business-planning course in addition to the core curriculum courses currently required for the Bachelor of Business Administration degree.

During the application process to get the program established, the duo will organize an entrepreneurship curriculum advisory board, assess the need and effectiveness of the program as determined by the needs of MSU's service region, and then submit their proposal to a series of committees from the department to the state level.

Professors Vollmers and Hoge are currently soliciting volunteers and nominations for individuals from or near MSU's service region to serve on an Entrepreneurship Curriculum Advisory Board. MOREHEAD, Ky.--Smokers in the Morehead State University community will be encouraged to quit on Thursday, Nov. 19, when the American Cancer Society's Great American Smokeout once again encourages America's 47 million smokers to kick the habit and asks youth never to start smoking.

"We want to encourage smokers to quit for a day; then they can decide about tomorrow," said Judy Krug, MSU coordinator of student wellness.

"It is important that smokers take time at least once a year to reflect on their habit and decide whether to reduce or stop their tobacco usage. The Great American Smokeout offers assistance in taking the right steps to accomplish this goal," Krug said. "The Smokeout also offers family, friends and co-workers of smokers ways to approach smokers to encourage them to quit."

This year, smokers may prepare psychologically for the Great American Smokeout through the "Commit to Quit" program, designed to help smokers map out a method for quitting smoking that best fits their personal needs, according to the American Cancer Society. Support for smokers who successfully quit on Smokeout day will be continued through the holiday period until New Year's Day in the hopes that more smokers will quit for good, Krug said.

Each day more than 3,000 teenagers in the United States become regular smokers--more than 1 million annually, according to data from the American Cancer Society. In a survey of MSU students during 1993-95, 21 percent of students responding reported daily use of tobacco and 79 percent of student smokers said they had begun smoking by the age of 18, Krug reported.

In a campus outreach project, Krug is working with the Gateway Prevention Coalition, a five-county agency composed of community volunteers, which offers prevention programming in alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse. The Coalition provides tobacco information kits to middle and high school students in public schools, encouraging students to stop smoking.

During the Great American Smokeout, information booths and materials will be available on the second floor of the Adron Doran University Center, as well as at the Wellness Center on the MSU campus, to encourage participation in the one-day cessation. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Utilizing a unique combination of fiddle and violin, Andrew Carlson, assistant professor of music at Morehead State University, will be the featured violinist during the five-date, East Coast performances of The Center for New Music of the University of Iowa.

The tour, which will open at the University of Iowa on Nov. 13, will include performances at Yale University on Nov. 16, Merkin Hall in New York's Lincoln Center on Nov. 17, Harvard University on Nov. 18 and Connecticut College on Nov. 20.

A doctoral student in violin performance at UI's School of Music, Carlson will perform "Finnegan's Wake" with composer and director David Gompper on piano.

Gompper wrote the music specifically for Carlson's unusual combination of talents. "My intention was to transform the feet-stomping dance music through a labyrinth of rhythmic manipulations into a series of playful excursions for both instruments," Gompper said.

This is a unique piece that features both fiddle and violin, Carlson said. "I performed it 6-8 times last year, so it's a well-seasoned piece for me. I enjoy the satisfaction of winding up in New York, playing this piece before a classical audience," he added.

Carlson notes that while the fiddle and the violin are the same instrument, the bow technique and the musical styles are different. He enjoys taking folk music to classical music audiences. "It is important to preserve folk music traditions. There is a new attitude about fiddle playing; classical musicians are rethinking their attitudes toward fiddling. This piece transforms folk into 20th Century mediums," he said.

Because of his versatility, Carlson has had a number of opportunities. While studying classical violin, he served as concertmaster for the University of Iowa Symphony, has twice won the Georgia state fiddle championship, has made recordings with R.E.M. and has performed in Iowa City with the folk/bluegrass group Big Wooden Radio and his own group, Andy Carlson's American Music Ensemble.

As he prepares for the upcoming tour, Carlson practices at least two hours per day to commit the music to memory. His preparation is not only benefiting him but his students as well. "They see that I'm doing what they do. They hear me playing scales and putting into practice what I tell them to do," he said.

Since joining the MSU faculty earlier this semester, Carlson, who has completed his doctoral dissertation entitled "Fiddling for Classical Violinists," has maintained a full schedule. "I'm teaching a music listening class in folk and country and teaching private violin and viola. Some of my private violin students are fiddle students," he said, adding that he is trying to organize an orchestra for the University. "As string majors, students need that experience. I want my violin students to have the opportunity to perform with an orchestra."

Those who cannot attend the East Coast tour may hear Carlson on Jan. 31 at 8 p.m. at Duncan Recital Hall in Baird Music Building on campus when he presents a solo violin recital. This performance is free and open to the public.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---To assist with the University's continuing effort to ensure safety on campus, the Morehead State University Family Association and Student Government Association have purchased a van to shuttle students from outlying parking areas to their residence halls.

The shuttle van transports more than 100 students per night from parking lots near the athletic complex across campus to their residence halls, according to Richard Green, director of public safety.

Students use emergency telephones in the parking areas to contact the Office of Public Safety for dispatch of the van to given locations. The emergency telephones allow students to call without leaving their vehicles. "We recommend that students stay in their locked cars until the van arrives," Green said.

The van, a 1998 Ford Windstar, was purchased for \$16,900 through joint funding by the Family Association and SGA, according to Larry Stephenson, director of student activities. The Family Association became interested in the project in fall 1997 and used money contributed to the Parents' Fund to help purchase the van. The Student Government Association endorsed the project and voted to donate \$2,000 to help with the purchase. The van is now property of the Office of Public Safety to be used solely for the purpose of shuttling students from outlying parking areas to their residence halls.

"This has been a very big help to us," Green said. "We are very appreciative of the SGA and the Family Association's donation. The van seats seven and gives students something nice to ride in instead of a retired police car."

The Office of Public Safety provides student cadets to drive the shuttle van, which runs between the athletic complex and student residence halls from 8 p.m to 1 a.m., Sunday through Thursday. Students may request transportation after 1 a.m.; however, they will be transported in cars by police officers. There is no charge for this service.

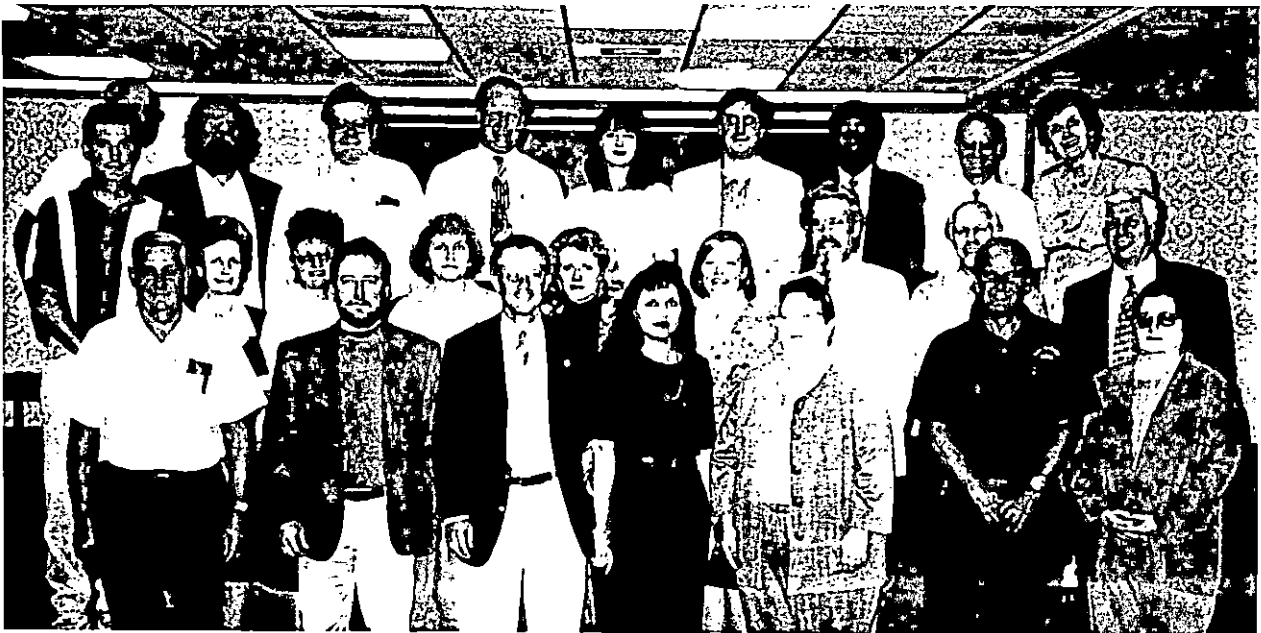

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Students enrolled in the "Art 467: Native American Art" class at Morehead State University have organized an art exhibit based on their studies of Serpent Mound in Southern Ohio.

The show, entitled "The Spirit of the Earth," is on display through Nov. 20 in Strider Gallery, Claypool-Young Art Building. The gallery is open weekdays, from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. There is no charge for viewing.

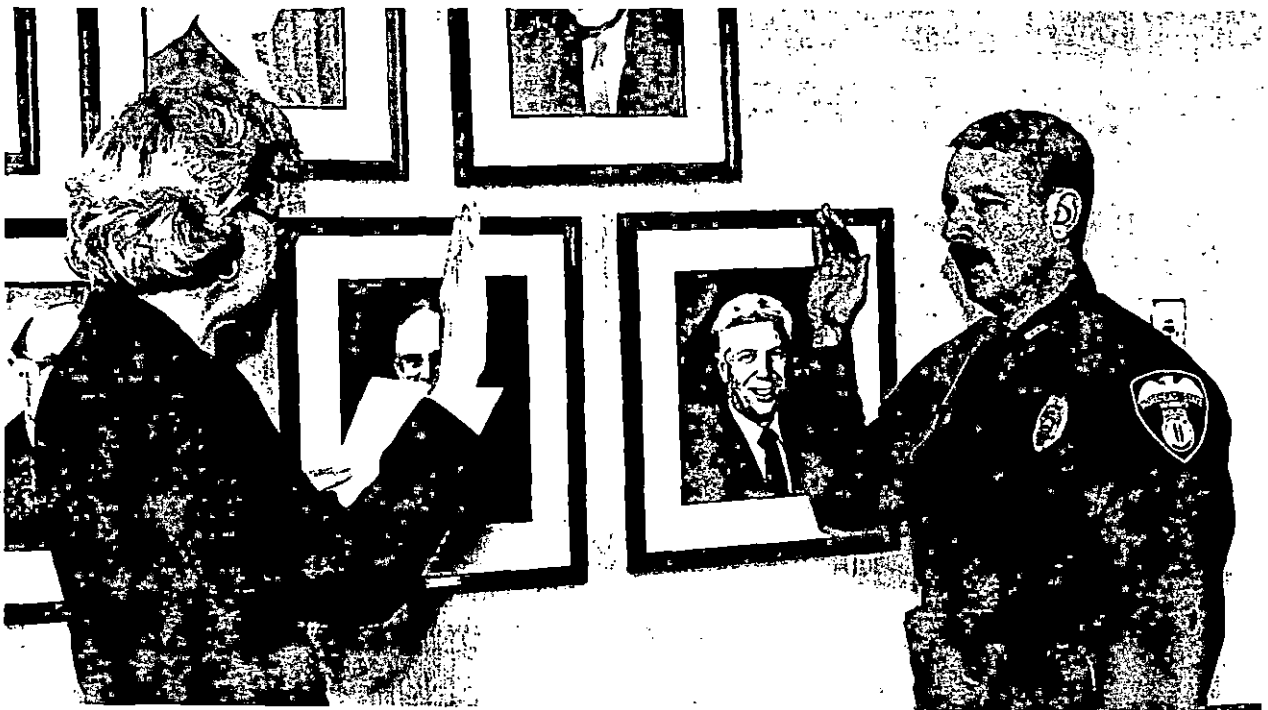
CURTIS NEW MSU POLICE OFFICER

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's OperaWorks ensemble will present "A Kentucky Mummer's Play" on Dec. 1 and Dec. 3 at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall on the campus.

The play was created by Dr. Roma Prindle, MSU associate professor of music, who will direct the production. She will give a brief pre-concert lecture, beginning at 7:30 p.m. both nights, to explain "the rich symbolism involved in the scenes of a mummer's play."

Guest artists will include local children's choirs, the White Horse String Band, bagpipers and other folk artists and dancers. Cameo appearances will be made by members of the MSU faculty and administration as well as "mystery" guests that will include political figures and other dignitaries from the community and across the state.

Mummer's plays were thought to be in existence throughout the British Isles by the 18th Century, according to Dr. Prindle. "These productions were full of allusion tailored for local audiences; the moral theme centers on death and resurrection or death of the year and regeneration of the human spirit," she said. Mummer's plays were brought to the Kentucky highlands by the immigrants but their practice has died out. The last known performances in this area were at the Pine Mountain Settlement School in Harlan County in the 1940s, Dr. Prindle noted.

A Kentucky Mummer's Play is said to restore several customs practiced by our ancestors. Drawing from the rich heritage of the folk currently residing in the Kentucky highlands, this production will include lost folk customs such as Kentucky folk dances, traditional mountain and Celtic folk melodies, use of native instruments such as dulcimer and fiddle and bagpipes, Dr. Prindle said, adding "that music from the classical style is interwoven into the fabric so the work is a patchwork creation."

The characters in the play include traditional folk and allegorical figures such as Father Christmas, St. George, the Dragon, the Fool and the Hobby Horse. In addition, the play features historical figures such as Rebecca Boone, Mary Breckinridge, Cora Wilson Stewart and Bert Combs. The role of the doctor, who appears in nearly every mummer's play, is named "Dr. Ouizer," in honor of local physician Dr. Louise Caudill.

"'A Kentucky Mummer's Play' is a work the entire family will enjoy," Dr. Prindle said, noting that all ages are encouraged to attend. "For the senior citizens, it may be a sweet trip into the past. For the youngsters, it will provide an exciting trip into their heritage."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---At its meeting on Nov. 13, Morehead State University's Board of Regents approved the awarding of honorary doctorates to an English professor and two Eastern Kentucky folk artists at the University's Winter Commencement on Dec. 12.

An honorary Doctor of Letters degree will be presented to Dr. James E. Davis, chair of the Department of English at Ohio University. Minnie Adkins of Isonville and her late husband Garland, each will be awarded the honorary Doctor of Humanities degree.

Dr. Davis, a former MSU faculty member, taught in the Rowan County School system. He earned a doctoral degree at Florida State University where he developed an interest in censorship that led him to membership in the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE). He later edited the organization's best selling book, "Dealing with Censorship," and was elected president of NCTE in 1992.

Before his death in 1997, Garland Adkins gained fame for his creation of stylized wooden horses, including the piece that inspired the logo of the University's Kentucky Folk Art Center. His work appears in the National Gallery of Art.

Mrs. Adkins, the recipient of the first Award of Distinction to folk artists from the Folk Art Society of America, is best known for her distinctive carved and painted animals. She has been recognized with the Eastern Kentucky Leadership Conference Award for Arts and Culture and with MSU's Appalachian Treasure Award.

Additionally, the regents learned in the spotlight report that the University's computer system will be ready for the next millennium. The report, given by Beth Patrick, assistant vice president for information technology, noted that 88 percent of the programming changes have been completed and that on-going communications would remain a critical factor.

With the final enrollment figures of 8,263, Dr. Michael Moore, executive vice president of academic affairs, told the board that headcount continued to be up for freshmen, sophomores and juniors. He discussed the efforts being implemented to improve retention including the restructuring of the former Office of Enrollment Management.

In other business, the regents accepted various fiscal reports, including the 1997-98 Audit Report, 1997-98 fourth quarter financial report and amendment, and first quarter financial report amendment to the 1998-99 operating budget. The board also amended the 1998-99 fee schedule.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Two Morehead State University faculty members won multiple gold medals in swimming during the Kentucky Senior Games and will compete in the National Senior Games in Orlando in October 1999.

Dr. Rita Egan, assistant professor of education, emerged from a 35-year retirement in swimming competition to win five medals in swimming at her first senior games. She won gold medals in the 50-, 100- and 200-yard breaststroke, a silver in the backstroke competition and a bronze in freestyle.

Dr. Bob Tesch, associate professor of computer information systems, won the gold in four events: the 50-, 100-, 200- and 400-yard freestyles. He will compete in each of these events at the national games next year.

Dr. Egan began swimming regularly last summer in an effort to strengthen her knee. "I was having problems with arthritis and was facing surgery so I started swimming every day," she said. "Then someone told me about the senior games and encouraged me to participate." She then trained 2 1/2 months, preparing for the competition.

She now trains 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week at the University pool. "Swimming is a lonely sport; it's entirely self-motivated. Winning the medals motivated me to keep swimming and gave me a goal--I want to finish in the top 10 in the 50 and 100 meters breaststroke next year."

Dr. Egan hopes other seniors will participate in this type of competition. "The senior games support an active retirement and an active older life. Women, especially, are notoriously unfit after their mid-20s," she said.

Dr. Tesch, who has been swimming competitively since junior high school, is a member of the U.S. Masters Swimming Team and the Wildcat Masters Swimming Team. He currently holds the masters state records for his age category in all six freestyle events, including the 800- and 1500-meters events. He also won the masters national championship in the 2-mile freestyle and received the distinction of Masters All-American.

“Swimming is probably the best thing you can do for your body,” Dr. Tesch said. “The water is 85 degrees so you’re in a friendly environment. You can train as fast or as slow as you want and unlike in other sports, the potential for injuries is limited.”

However, Dr. Tesch is competitive even when he practices. “I cannot just go to a pool and swim lengths without a competition in mind. I train to compete. That’s what pushes me. I enjoy staying in shape but I also enjoy winning,” he said.

Dr. Tesch said that he is inspired by the older competitors at the senior games. “As I look and see those who are 60 and 70, I’m actually one of the kids. It’s a nice feeling but it’s great to see people older than me training and competing,” he said.

Participation in the Senior Games is open to anyone over the age of 50. Categories are based on five-year age intervals; for example, Dr. Egan and Dr. Tesch will be competing next year in the 55-59-year category. To qualify for the National Senior Games, competitors must meet the qualifying time mark or finish in the top three in their age categories.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---“America can’t seem to turn loose of the Vietnam War,” said Dr. John Ernst, assistant professor of history at Morehead State University. “It was the flash point of our fight against Communism.”

In his book, “Forging a Fateful Alliance: Michigan State University and the Vietnam War,” Dr. Ernst explores the role of America’s universities within the Vietnam conflict.

Published by the Michigan State University Press in May, “Forging a Fateful Alliance” discloses the crucial and often covert relationship between the world of academe and U.S. government involvement in Southeast Asia from the early 1950s through the late 1960s.

Dr. Ernst began his research in this field while working on his doctoral dissertation at the University of Kentucky. His mentor, George C. Herring, a professor at UK, is one of the leading scholars of the Vietnam War and directed Dr. Ernst toward Michigan State’s involvement in the conflict.

In his research, Dr. Ernst learned that during the mid-‘50s, a young political science professor, Wesley Fishel, became involved with the U.S. Agency of International Development, whose goals were to help developing countries modernize and fight Communism. Through his position, Fishel represented Michigan State as a liaison between the South Vietnamese and American governments, acting as a leading policy maker in the fight against Communism. In exchange, the U.S. government “provided the university with generous financial remuneration--money that the school would use to expand academic programs, construct new facilities and fuel its dramatic growth.” However, as students learned of the university’s involvement in the war and of the CIA’s use of academic settings to cover its agents, Fishel became a target of student protest, his prominence fading as quickly as it had flourished.

Dr. Ernst conducted most of his research for the project through papers housed in the archives at Michigan State University as well as through personal interviews with many of the professors who were at the university during the conflict.

As a result of his research, Dr. Ernst presented a paper entitled "Bogart (Humphrey, That Is) Professors: Michigan State University and the Vietnam War" at the Popular Culture/American Culture Association Conference in Orlando, Fla. In addition, he has published an article in the "Michigan Historical Review" and in a textbook entitled "America's Wars in Asia," published by M.E. Sharpe.

As a continuance of this project, Dr. Ernst is working with Dr. Yvonne Baldwin, MSU associate professor of history, to compile "an oral history that examines Kentuckians in the Vietnam War, not only those who were fighting but those who were protesting the war at home and others whose lives were affected by it." The work will result in a book and a CD-ROM. With the help of fellow faculty member Dr. Andrew Curtis, assistant professor of geography, the CD-ROM's prototype was showcased at a recent meeting of the Kentucky Association of Teachers of History Conference. "The CD-ROM format offers the audience an opportunity to hear the stories in the people's own words," Dr. Ernst said.

The research will benefit his students at Morehead State, said Dr. Ernst. "Any time a professor publishes an article or book that is respected, it always adds to the intellectual climate of the university," he added, noting that students' interest in the course on the Vietnam War, which he often team-teaches with Dr. Baldwin, is even greater because students know that each of these professors are publishing work in the field.
