MOREHEAD, Ky.—Erin Siegel is the equestrian coach at Morehead State University.

In addition, she teaches all the riding classes offered by MSU's Department of Agricultural Sciences. "We offer eight classes from beginner to advanced riding and also an equitation teaching class," she said. She trains more than 50 University students as well as 10 riders who participate in independent training classes.

Currently, MSU's equestrian team is composed of 25 students with 19 competing regularly. They will participate in a total of 20 horse shows, during 6 weekends, and plan to compete at an invitational in New Mexico in the spring, according to Siegel.

To prepare team members for Intercollegiate Horse Show Association (IHSA) competitions, Siegel holds eight practices per week. Hunt seat and stock seat riders practice three times a week with two additional practices weekly for jumping.

"The team members had been riding once a week where now they are riding three times a week. The practices are much more demanding in regards to strength and ability but I have seen a great improvement in both the riders and the horses," Siegel said.

In competition, riders are not permitted to practice before entering the ring. "Each rider picks a name out of the bucket, finds the horse then gets on," she said. "They are not allowed to move, only to fix stirrups. Then they enter the ring and must show the horse without riding it beforehand. It tests not only the rider's ability to equitate but also shows whether the riders can ride different horses."

In the future, Siegel will devote her efforts to improving the quality of the horses in the program. "My main focus is on the needs of the team and the horses, but in the end, as any coach would like, I hope to see our team grow into a successful group in the IHSA arena."

Prior to coming to MSU, Siegel worked as an assistant teacher and barn manager at MayPine Farms, an A circuit hunter/jumper farm, where she traveled on the circuit for nine months. While attending Miami University in Ohio, she served as a member of the barn crew for four years and as student barn manager during her senior year. In addition, she taught at least 10 hours per week for the university.

Siegel earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education in math from Miami University in 1997.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Laurie Couch, assistant professor of psychology at Morehead State University, has received a grant from Kentucky's Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research to study the influence of embarrassment on coping with interpersonal betrayal.

As an extension of her research on betrayal, Dr. Couch is investigating embarrassment as a factor on choices for coping strategies such as social support. This research is in conjunction with a study being conducted at Western Illinois University by Dr. Kristine Kelly, who is investigating physiological data associated with embarrassment, specifically as it relates to the betrayal experience. Psychology students at MSU are assisting Dr. Couch in gathering data on betrayal through directed research.

Grant funds will be utilized for supplies, travel expenses and payment of research subjects.

"We hope that when our research is completed we will be able to publish information that mental health professionals can use to help people who are coping with betrayal," Dr. Couch said.

A native of Huntsville, Ala., Dr. Couch obtained her bachelor's degree in psychology from Mississippi State University and completed her master's and doctoral degrees in psychology at University of Tennessee. She has been an MSU faculty member for nearly two years.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---“If you’re going to teach writing, you’ve got to be a writer. This is one of the two main premises of the Morehead Writing Project,” said Dr. Nancy Peterson, associate professor of English at Morehead State University who has directed the Morehead Writing Project since 1994. “The other premise is that teachers learn best about the best practices from other teachers.”

The University’s Writing Project, funded in part through a grant from the Kentucky Department of Education, is designed to help train teachers throughout Eastern Kentucky to be more effective writers and teachers of writing.

Each year, 20 participants are invited to attend a four-week summer institute at MSU, during which they attend classes and workshops for six hours per day, five days a week. In addition, they meet for follow-ups on four Saturdays during the academic year. Participants receive free tuition, housing and a \$500 stipend in addition to six hours of graduate credit for completing the program.

With the implementation of the Kentucky Education Reform Act, classroom teachers became responsible for helping students develop writing portfolios that document each student’s best work. The portfolios are assessed and students categorized according to their levels of writing expertise.

“Writing teachers who are not trained in portfolio assessment have difficulty teaching and assessing writing according to the new standards,” Dr. Peterson said, noting that, in contrast, a trained teacher has the ability to train others, therefore carrying the knowledge of writing and assessment to teachers in other disciplines who are also responsible for portfolio composition.

“Our goal is to cultivate leadership among teachers and to help them take responsibility for their professional lives,” Dr. Peterson said. “We are working toward Master Teacher development.”

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Access to professional development can be challenging in Eastern Kentucky due to regional terrain and geography. “We serve a constituency from as far away as Knott County where most of our students travel from 50 to 100 miles one way to the MSU campus for the program.”

In conjunction with the summer program, Angela Hilterbrand, the Writing Project’s executive director of outreach, has developed an extended program which tailors workshops to meet the needs of individual schools and teachers. Hilterbrand, an associate professor at Ashland Community College, is on loan from the college for three years to serve in this capacity for MSU.

Hilterbrand customizes professional development workshops for public schools throughout MSU’s service region. She has logged 120,000 miles and 60,000 teacher contact hours in three years. “Everything she does is new,” said Dr. Peterson. “She prepares each workshop to meet specific needs, so no two are the same.

“Eventually this has to be a self-sustaining system in which teachers who complete our program are mentoring others in their schools,” Dr. Peterson said. “It is difficult to ask teachers to do more. They are responding to total curriculum reform which is unprecedented.”

The Writing Project currently has three associate directors who are Morehead State graduate students as well as practicing teachers. Dwayne Adkins of Rowan County Senior High School, Mary Campbell of Straub Elementary in Mason County, and Paula Stafford of Elliott County middle-high school are graduates of the summer institute who now mentor other teachers in their respective counties and serve in a leadership capacity for the Morehead Writing Project.

“Our goal is to become a National Writing Project Mature Site,” Dr. Peterson said. “This would mean more involvement of project graduates and would offer programming beyond the summer institute. We are developing an advisory committee of teacher consultants to help mentor others out in the school systems. We want to make it easier for teachers to reach us,” she said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Hailed as one of the finest euphonium virtuosos of all time, Dr. Earle Louder, professor emeritus of euphonium and tuba from Morehead State University, was the recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Tubists Universal Brotherhood Association (TUBA).

Dr. Louder received the TUBA's highest honor during the International Tuba Euphonium Conference at the University of Minnesota. The award was "given in recognition of his career-long dedication to excellence in music teaching and performance," according to TUBA officials. He is one of only 11 persons, and the fourth euphoniumist, to be awarded this honor in the association's 25-year history.

"It was a great feeling," Dr. Louder said after receiving the prestigious award. "When your peers and colleagues select you, it has an even deeper meaning. It overwhelms me to think that I'm included in such an elite group." Previously honored with this distinction was Dr. Louder's undergraduate mentor at Michigan State University, Leonard Falcone.

Prior to the award presentation, Dr. Louder performed the premiere of Simone Mantia's "Polka Fantastic," a previously unpublished piece which had not been heard since 1929.

"I've been performing more than ever, but I miss the day to day contact with young people," Dr. Louder says of his retirement from MSU. His performance schedule, which is booked many months in advance, includes solo and clinic appearances with the Western Kentucky University Symphony Band, the Danville Advocate Brass Band, Akron University Symphony Band and Wichita State University Symphony and Concert Bands.

He will perform as a euphoniumist with River City Brass Band from Pittsburgh on its fall and spring tours, as principal and featured euphonium soloist and narrator with Keith Brion's New Sousa Band on an 18-date fall tour, as a soloist with Wilmington, Ohio, Community Band, and as euphoniumist with the Faculty Festival Band from the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in the Finale-Concert of the Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago.

Remaining close to the campus, Dr. Louder served as adjudicator for the critique panel at MSU's Blue and Gold Festival of Marching Bands in October. In addition, Dr. Louder is a member of the newly formed ensemble Symphonia, composed of the top 25 euphoniumists and tubists, whose performance of John Stevens' "Rest in Peace" has been nominated for a Grammy award this year.

Dr. Louder served as resident artist at Morehead State for 27 years. He resides in Morehead with his wife, Louise, who is a retiree of MSU's Department of Mathematics. They have five children, 14 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren who keep them involved.

The first session, "Recordkeeping: Payroll and Employer Taxes Seminar," is set for Tuesday, Jan. 19. Elizabeth Hurst, owner/operator of Greenup Tax Service will present the workshop.

Topics to be discussed will include part-time and full-time employee payroll deductions, how to keep accurate payroll records and various types of employer tax forms and requirements. There will be time for questions and answers during the program.

The second workshop, "Self-Employment Schedule C Tax Form Seminar," will be Wednesday, Jan. 20.

Hurst will instruct this workshop which will cover small business tax deductions, keeping accurate sales and expense records and procedures for completing the Schedule C tax form. A question and answer session will conclude the program.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A new Public Child Welfare Certification Program will offer improved training for Morehead State University social work students who wish to work with children and families in the Commonwealth.

MSU collaborated with six other Kentucky universities to develop the program in cooperation with state government. "Viola Miller, secretary of the Cabinet for Families and Children, wanted a statewide program to train social workers to be certified in child protection," said Dr. Judith Stafford, coordinator of MSU's undergraduate social work program.

"Undergraduate social work programs have to train students in generalist practice skills, thus making it difficult to provide the specifics in risk management and crisis intervention that are needed for introductory level community-based social workers in child protection," Dr. Stafford said. "With the creation of the Public Child Welfare Certification Program, state agencies will have employees who are better trained and more skilled when they are hired as opposed to the agencies initially having to spend six months training them."

Morehead State will begin offering the new program this fall. Admission will be competitive with a five-student cap, according to Dr. Stafford. To be eligible, a student must be a full-time junior or senior enrolled in the Bachelor of Social Work degree program with an overall minimum grade point average of 2.5 and at least a 3.0 grade point average in any social work courses.

Students who are selected to participate will receive full tuition for up to four semesters and will receive a \$1,300 per semester stipend for books, living expenses and travel related to the program.

Upon completion of the PCWC Program, students will be given priority for employment with the Cabinet for Families and Children. They will be expected to accept a position with the Department of Social Services within six months of certification and remain employed there for two years. "The program is a collaboration between employers and universities to train students so that they will be adequately prepared to begin work as community-based social workers," Dr. Stafford said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Three Morehead State University researchers are featured on the History Channel program "Save Our History: The Underground Railroad" which will air on Saturday, Feb. 20, at 8 p.m. in a two-hour world premiere special.

Jerry Gore, executive director of the National Underground Railroad Museum in Maysville and former director of minority student affairs at MSU, provides commentary and anecdotes regarding the history of the Underground Railroad. Through his extensive research, Gore reconstructs the past, piecing together stories which, because of their secrecy, have remained largely untold and undocumented.

Peggy Overly, MSU's minority student services coordinator, is featured in scenes which reenact the plight of travelers along the perilous journey to freedom.

Historian Dr. Stuart Sprague, author of "His Promised Land: The Autobiography of John P. Parker," shares information regarding the book's protagonist, a freed black man from Ohio who put his life at risk by crossing the Ohio River on many occasions to pick up fugitive slaves.

In addition to Parker, the program features stories of other prominent figures who played vital roles in making the railroad run, including Frederick Douglass, William Still, Harriet Beecher Stowe, and Harriet Tubman.

Hosted by award-winning actress Alfre Woodard, "Save Our History: The Underground Railroad" chronicles the stories of men and women -- black and white -- who risked their lives in the pursuit of freedom for all races.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---As a result of extensive efforts to conserve energy on the campus, Morehead State University has received the Governor's Environmental Excellence Award for Energy Conservation.

April Haight, MSU's recycling/energy conservation manager, accepted the award at the Governor's Conference on the Environment where the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet annually recognizes outstanding individuals and companies who have contributed to the enhancement of Kentucky's environment.

"We were recognized for our management of the institutional conservation program grant," Haight said.

In February 1995, Morehead State joined the more than 2,300 participants in the EPA's Green Lights Program, a voluntary effort to prevent air pollution and save on operating cost by installing energy-efficient lighting. "We have been working on some outdoor lighting projects," Haight said. "We switched to high pressure sodium lamps and metal halide lamps for the street lights such as those outside Fields Hall and at Jayne Stadium.

"We have redesigned a couple of buildings' lighting layout for energy conservation measures to achieve greater efficiency. In Ginger and Breckinridge halls, we worked on lighting projects and did some insulating," she said. While these projects cost the University \$53,686, the initial savings of \$54,750 was more than that anticipated in the engineering plan.

The energy conservation program also is involved in upgrading the computerized energy management system for buildings on campus. "We have some new software that will allow building maintenance to better control temperatures and comfort," Haight said.

The program also has reviewed lighting efficiency and standards for renovation and construction projects. "We look at the current lighting systems and determine where a more efficient system can be installed," she said.

In addition to the lighting projects, the energy conservation program is currently working through two grants to improve the heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems and establish better indoor air quality in Laughlin Health Building and Claypool Young Art Building.
