MOREHEAD, Ky.---To celebrate February as Black History Month, Morehead State University will sponsor a number of events including: a renowned guest speaker, an Underground Railroad field trip and an African dance workshop.

On Wednesday, Feb. 17, Dr. Julia Hare will present "Culture and Consciousness: The Struggle Continues" at 8 p.m. in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center (ADUC). This event is sponsored by MSU's Office of Minority Student Services.

Widely regarded as one of the most dynamic motivational speakers on the major podiums today, Dr. Hare currently serves as national executive director of the Black Think Tank. She recently addressed the Congressional Black Caucus's 27th Annual Legislative Conference chaired by Congresswoman Maxine Waters and has appeared on numerous television programs, including "Geraldo," "Sally Jesse Raphael," "Inside Edition" and "Politically Incorrect."

On Saturday, Feb. 20, Underground Railroad historians Jerry Gore and Peggy Overly will host a field trip, tracing ancestral footsteps along their perilous road to freedom. Also sponsored by the Office of Minority Student Services, the field trip will include stops at the National Underground Railroad Museum in Maysville as well as visits to Underground Railroad sites in Washington and the Rankin House in Ripley, Ohio. An admission fee is required at some sites.

At 8 p.m. on the same evening, Gore and Overly will be featured on the History Channel's "Save Our History: The Underground Railroad" along with former MSU history professor Stuart Sprague, author of "His Promised Land: The Autobiography of John P. Parker."

On Monday, Feb. 22, the Student Activities Council will sponsor an African dance workshop and performance, featuring Malarka Cooper, who will demonstrate a number of specific African dances. The workshop begins at 4 p.m. in the Crager Room, ADUC, and will be followed by the performance at 7 p.m. in Button Auditorium.

MOREHEAD, Ky.-- "Our objectives are high," said Michael Pennington, project director for Morehead State University's Educational Talent Search II. "It is our goal that 95 percent of our program's seniors will graduate from high school and that 75 percent of those will go on to college."

A new grant from the federal government will allow the Educational Talent Search program to expand its reach. "We have 22 counties in our service region, and the first grant enabled us to serve 10 of those counties," Pennington said, "but we wanted to do more." Through a second grant, Educational Talent Search II will serve six additional counties: Rowan, Boyd, Greenup, Johnson, Mason and Montgomery.

Educational Talent Search II is a program designed to encourage and enable area students to continue in and complete high school and to enroll in a postsecondary educational program. Working in cooperation with local school guidance offices and sponsored by Morehead State University, the program is funded by the U.S. Department of Education.

The new program serves approximately 600 students in 13 middle and high schools within the six-county area and focuses on benefiting students through the program's curriculum. Services provided include educational, personal and career counseling as well as financial aid counseling and cultural and academic field trips.

"We begin at a very early age, in sixth grade, giving counseling, providing educational materials and sponsoring field trips," Pennington said. "We provide dictionaries, thesauruses, calculators, planners, and writing guides to students in various grades. As students go through grade levels, we do ACT preparation and financial aid workshops and review the college admission process with students. We want them to be comfortable with the idea of going to college."

Approximately 70 percent of the students participating in the program come from homes with low incomes and parents who have not graduated from college, Pennington noted. "I can identify with these students," he said. "I came from a single-parent home, and no one in my family had ever gone to college."

In addition to his responsibilities as project director, Pennington serves as a talent search counselor at Greenup County High School. Originally from Ashland, he received his bachelor's degree in communications in 1993 and his master's degree in adult and higher education in 1995 from Morehead State. He is currently working on a doctorate of education at the University of Kentucky. Previously he served as assistant director of admissions operations at MSU. He and his wife Charlotte have one child, Andrea Hope. He is the son of Margie Pennington of Ashland and Bill Pennington of South Shore.

Other Educational Talent Search II staff members include:

Michelle Patrick serves as talent search counselor for Boyd, Mason and Rowan Counties. A Morehead native, she is a two-time graduate of MSU, receiving her bachelor's degree in social work in 1988 and her master's degree in adult and higher education in 1998. She previously served as MSU's assistant director of telecommunications. The wife of Jeffrey Patrick Sr., she is the mother of three children, Jeffrey, Elizabeth, and Gabriel and the daughter of Garland and Roberta Earley of Morehead.

Machelle Holbrook serves as talent search counselor for Greenup, Johnson and Montgomery Counties. Born in Paintsville, she received her bachelor's degree in elementary education in 1996 and her master's degree in elementary education guidance counseling in 1998, both from Morehead State. She previously served as a substitute teacher in Morgan and Elliott counties. She and her husband Darrell are the parents of three children, Jarrod Wayne, Jacqueline Lee and Clinton Darrell. She is the daughter of William James Day of Morehead and Nannie Day of West Liberty.

Dianna Stevens serves as secretary specialist. A native of Olive Hill, she graduated from West Carter High School in 1980 and previously served MSU as a secretary in the Office of Admissions. She and her husband Donald Lee are the parents of two children, Derrick Lee and Jonathon Casey. She is the daughter of Geraldine Tackett of Sandy Hook and the late Hubert Tackett.

The program is open to students who have completed five years of elementary education or who is at least 11 years of age and demonstrates potential for success in education at the postsecondary level is eligible to apply for the Educational Talent Search II program.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Two educators who provide leadership at the state level will be guest speakers at Morehead State University on Friday, Feb. 5.

Dr. Gordon K. Davies, president of the Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE), and Dr. Wilmer S. Cody, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE), will share their individual comments and observations during the second session of the University's "Teaching the Teachers for the 21st Century" symposium on teacher education reform. The program begins at 3 p.m. in 419 Reed Hall and will be broadcast live on Kentucky Educational Television's Star Channel 705.

Dr. Davies is the first president of CPE, a council created by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1997 as part of a higher education reform initiated by Gov. Paul Patton. He came to Kentucky after serving 20 years as director of the State Council of Higher Education in Virginia.

During his lengthy tenure in Virginia, Dr. Davies saw substantial enrollment growth in the state-supported colleges and universities and innovative programs and funding initiatives that helped place the state in the forefront of American higher education. He was the principal author of "The Case for Change," the report issued by Virginia's Commission on the University of the 21st Century that drew national and international attention.

A former visiting professor at the Teachers College of Columbia University, Dr. Davies taught courses in higher education with special attention to public policy, finance and the changing relationship of colleges and universities to government. He earned a B.A. degree in English and the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in philosophy of religion from Yale University.

Before being named commissioner in 1995, Dr. Cody was director of the Southern Region for the National Faculty, a non-profit corporation that conducts teacher education programs. His more than 35 years in education include four years as state superintendent of public instruction in Louisiana, two years at the National Education Goals Panel, as well as a stint as superintendent of schools in Montgomery County, Md., Birmingham, Ala., and Chapel Hill, N.C., and a teacher and principal in Mobile, Ala.

Dr. Cody, president of the Council of Chief State School Officers, served as chair of the executive board of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) for the 1997-98 year. He earned a B.A. degree in social relations, an M.A. in elementary teaching and the Ed.D. degree in school administration from Harvard.

MSU will continue its symposium on Friday, Feb. 19, with an address by Dr. Robert F. Sexton, executive director of the Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence. He will discuss his organization's task force to explore the results of statewide education reform. The Prichard Committee was instrumental in shaping and passage of the Kentucky Education Reform Act in 1990.

The seven-part symposium was initiated by MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin to challenge the faculty to reexamine its teacher education program. Upcoming sessions will include newspaper editorial page editors, public school teachers and administrators and MSU faculty members. 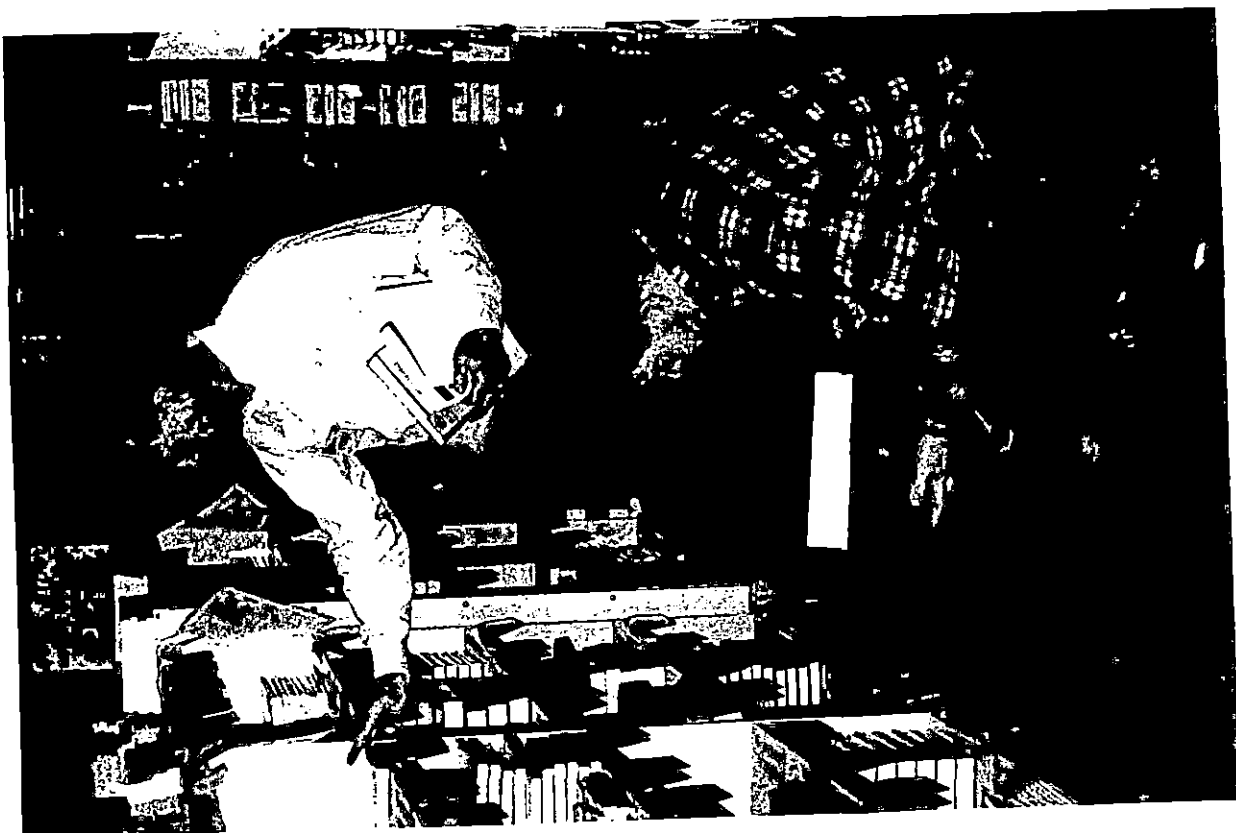

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Thirteen Morehead State University faculty members will share \$38,884 in institutional research and creative production grants this year.

The awards, ranging from \$670 to \$5,000, were based on proposals submitted during the fall semester, according to Dr. Michael R. Moore, MSU's executive vice president for academic affairs.

Andrew Carlson, assistant professor of music, was the recipient of a \$4,170 Creative Production Grant for a project entitled "Bassfiddle: The First Full-Length Compact Disc of Duets for Bass and Violin."

Dr. Roma Prindle, associate professor of music, received a \$3,500 Creative Production Grant for "A Kentucky Mummer's Play."

Dr. Paul Becker, assistant professor of sociology, \$1,439 for a project entitled "The Sociology of Shoplifting."

Mattie Burton, assistant professor of nursing, \$670 for a project entitled "Healing Herbs: Oral Prescription from Lay Healers in Northeastern Kentucky."

Dr. Andrew Curtis, assistant professor of geography, \$5,000 for a project entitled "Using a Spatial Filter to Improve Rabies Surveillance in Kentucky."

Dr. William Green, professor of government, \$2,934 for a project entitled "The Odyssey of Depo-Provera: The FDA, Contraceptive Choice, and Chemical Castration."

Dr. Rebecca Katz, assistant professor of sociology, \$2,553 for a project entitled "Violent Sexuality in the Media and Gender Inequality: A Macro Analysis of the Effects of Rape."

Dr. Ted Pass, professor of biology, \$4,929 for a project entitled "A Comparability Study of the ASTM-IFA Method with ProNetic Method for the Isolation and Enumeration of Cryptosporidium in Nine Surface Waters in Eastern and Western Kentucky."

Dr. Brian Raichle, assistant professor of physics, \$4,482 for a project entitled "Characterization of Scintillating Neutron Detector Nonlinearities."

Dr. David Saxon and **Dr. David Magrane**, professors of biology, \$4,327 for a project entitled "Comparison of Antioxidant Activities of Phytoestrogens, B-Estradiol and Tamoxifen on the Oxidation of Lipoprotein."

Eric Swank, assistant professor of sociology, \$1,905 for a project entitled "Student Activism Study."

Research grants are available to faculty members desiring to do special research that has potential for contributing to the field of knowledge within their disciplines. These competitively awarded grants are designed to assist the researchers in meeting the costs of their proposed projects.

"It is important that we recognize and stimulate professional growth in the academic community which, in turn, benefits our students as well as our faculty," said Dr. Moore.

The University's Research and Creative Productions Committee is responsible for reviewing proposals and making recommendations to the executive vice president for academic affairs. Carole Morella, director of MSU's Office of Research, Grants and Contracts, is chair of the committee.

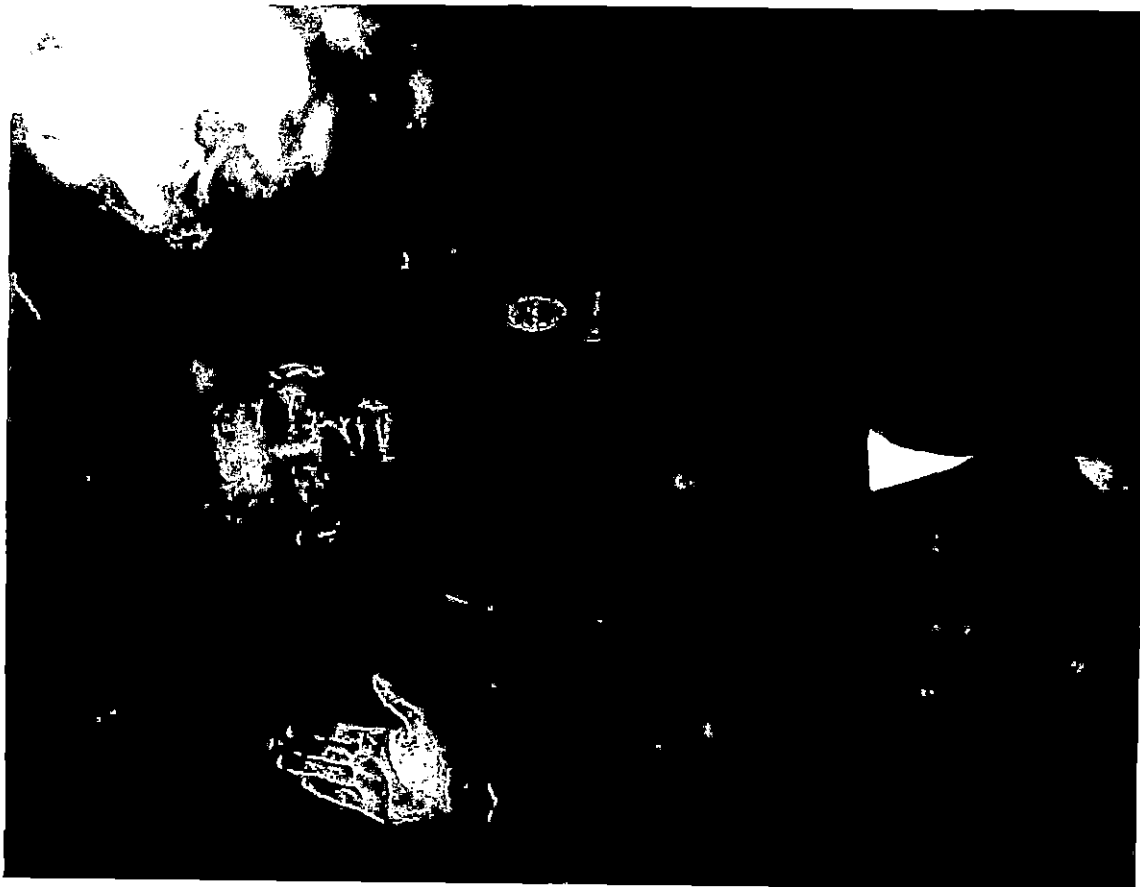

MOREHEAD, Ky.--- "Aromatherapy is not about aroma," explained Kim Rice of Morehead, "it is the therapeutic use of essential oils on the body. It is a philosophy that nurtures mind, body and spirit."

Rice, who will teach an aromatherapy course through Morehead State University's Office of Continuing Education, began studying herbalism with her grandmothers. "They both used herbs for bath products, remedies and cooking," she said. "But it was my great-grandmother who used essential oils."

An essential oil is the pure essence of a plant that is retrieved through a distillation process. "Essential oils create a real physiological change in the body, affecting neurochemistry and therefore influencing emotions, glands and the ability to relax," Rice said. "The idea behind aromatherapy is to use essential oils therapeutically to enhance other healthy choices such as diet and exercise by helping the body produce the chemicals it needs to be healthy."

Rice studied the basics of aromatherapy with Jeanette Page, herbalist and founder of the Oak Ridge Herb Society. However, much of her knowledge has come through self-study. "It takes a lot of research and a lot of trial and error to find the right combinations," she said.

Students in Rice's aromatherapy course will learn the history and ancient uses of the art, as well as insights into modern science that demonstrate how aromatherapy works. Through the classes, they will produce 10 different body care products.

The course will begin Thursday, Feb. 18, and meet from 5 to 7 p.m. weekly in the Waterfield Hall Conference Center. The fee for enrollment is \$100 plus \$15 for materials. Because class size is limited, reservations are necessary.

Author of 16 books and numerous short stories, the author has had two of her novels, "The Rosewood Casket" and "She Walks These Hills," on the New York Times Best Seller list.

A two-time recipient of the Best Appalachian Novel award for "The Hangman's Beautiful Daughter" and "Lovely in Her Bones," McCrumb was honored by the Appalachian Writers Association in 1997 with the Award for Outstanding Contribution to Appalachian Literature.

A graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill with a master's degree in English from Virginia Tech, McCrumb has taught journalism and Appalachian studies at Virginia Tech. She is currently a full-time novelist and lecturer.

McCrumb attributes her regard for books, her love of the Appalachian Mountains, and her gift of storytelling to her great-grandfathers, who were circuit preachers in North Carolina's Smoky Mountains a hundred years ago.

She is one of the creators of Women's History Month which has been recognized by the U.S. Congress and most state legislatures.

Presently, Dr. Brinson serves as the director of the Kentucky Civil Rights Project for the Kentucky Historical Society and is doing research about Kentucky women who were active from 1930 to 1970 in the struggle to eliminate legal segregation.

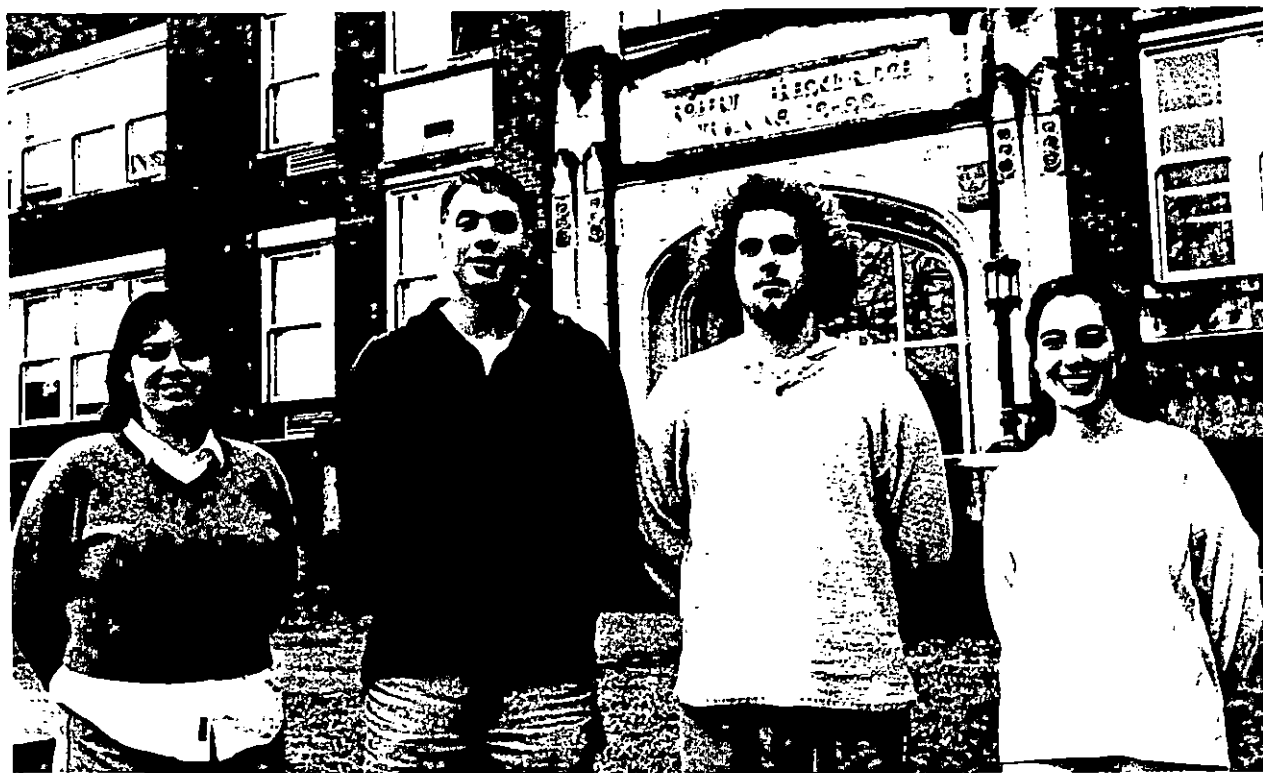

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Kentucky Department of Education has awarded a \$33,304 grant to Morehead State University's College of Education to secure Minority Educator Recruitment Scholarship funds for the spring semester. This award includes \$5,303.75 for the 1999 Minority Teacher Education Program's summer recruiting efforts.

"We have 57 students receiving scholarships for the spring semester," said Ernestine Winfield, coordinator of the Minority Teacher Education Program in MSU's Office of Retention. "For each year that the student receives a scholarship, he/she signs an agreement to teach for one year in a Kentucky school." This exchange not only helps recruit minority students into the teacher education program but also encourages them to remain in the Commonwealth as they begin their teaching careers.

The Kentucky Department of Education has granted an average of \$30,000 per semester to support the scholarship program since 1992, according to Winfield. In addition, the University contributes approximately \$30,000 annually to the program.

The scholarship program began at MSU in 1988 under the leadership of then-president C. Nelson Grote. Morehead State collaborated with the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, Jefferson County and Fayette County Schools to establish a scholarship program that would encourage minority students to become Kentucky teachers. In 1992 the Kentucky Department of Education Division of Minority Educator Recruitment and Retention, under the direction of Kathryn Wallace, joined the University to help fund the scholarships.

"That money is very important to students who need more than four years to complete a bachelor's degree or to students who don't qualify for financial aid," Winfield said. "These scholarships are the only way those students can go to college.

"During the summer program, we invite 45-50 high school and middle school students to spend a week on campus, staying in the residence halls, attending classes and social functions, and taking tours of the campus and surrounding area attractions like the Underground Railroad Museum," Winfield said. "Some high school seniors come to campus without any inclination toward going to college. We use this time to familiarize these students with the college environment and encourage them to enroll in MSU's teacher education program.

“We are here to help students get through college and graduate,” Winfield said. “Not only are we into recruitment and retention, but we offer mentoring, tutoring and financial aid counseling to students. We are unique in what we do. Now institutions from other states are looking to our program as a model.”

To assist eligible individuals, Morehead State University has mailed a substitute Form 1098-T, Tuition Payments Statement, which provides information necessary to apply for credit on one's federal income tax return.

The University suggests that individuals who file their own tax return should obtain a copy of various Internal Revenue Service publications: 508, Educational Expenditures; 970, Tax Benefits for Higher Education; 4, Student's Guide to Federal Income Tax, and Form 8863, Education Credits (Hope and Lifetime Learning Credits). These publications and forms are available without charge by calling 1-800-829-3676 or from the IRS web site at <http://www.irs.ustreas.gov>.

If you were an MSU student at any time during the 1998 calendar year and believe you are eligible for the credits and have not received a Tuition Payments Statement, contact MSU's Office of Accounting and Budgetary Control, at (606) 783-2019. A copy will be mailed to you.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A NASA representative will visit Morehead State University for an address on Monday, March 1, at 8 p.m. in 419 Reed Hall.

James P. Dean, outreach specialist with the International Space Program office, will speak on "International Space Station-Some Assembly Required." His presentation is free and open to the public.

The International Space Station, described as NASA's next step toward the stars, was implemented to enable long-term exploration of space and provide benefits to people on earth. For this venture, the U.S. is partnering with Russia, Europe, Japan and Canada to build and operate the ISS that will be a permanent orbiting science institute in space, capable of performing long-duration research in the materials and life science areas in a nearly gravity-free environment.

The ISS will allow scientists to conduct medical research in space and to develop new materials and processes in collaboration with industry, according to Dr. Benjamin Malphrus, professor of science and director of MSU's Astrophysical Laboratory. "The ISS is a technological and scientific leap ahead in terms of laboratory facilities in space," he said.

Dean, who is stationed at Johnson Space Center in Houston, has been with NASA's ISS program since 1994. During his more than 25 years in space exploration, he has served in a number of positions including payload operations development engineer in the ISS Astronaut Support Office, mission planner with Barrios Technology in Houston, spacecraft engineer in Las Cruces, N.M., and systems crew chief in Alice Springs, Australia.

A Stockton, Calif., native, Dean earned a B.S. degree from the University of Minnesota and M.S. degrees in physics and astronomy from New Mexico State University.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Kentucky Folk Art Center will display "The Paintings of Nan Phelps" which will open with a public reception on Sunday, March 7, from 2 to 4 p.m. at the center, 102 West First Street in Morehead.

The exhibition, which runs through June 13, includes 40 paintings, that showcase a variety of subject matter. Although her work is well-known in folk art circles, this is the first solo exhibition of Phelps' work.

Born in Laurel County in 1904, Phelps moved to Hamilton, Ohio, in 1922. Although her formal training consisted of only one correspondence course in the 1920s, she was a prolific artist, painting consistently for more than 60 years and producing more than 1,000 works.

Phelps' paintings were exhibited regularly in the Cincinnati area after 1940, but she gained wider recognition after she traveled alone, paintings in hand, to New York City in the 1950s. There, the importance of her work was recognized by the Gallerie St. Etienne which represented her until her death in 1990.

Her work was subsequently included in major exhibitions of self-taught art, alongside Anna Mary Robertson "Grandma" Moses, where she gained international recognition. More locally, her paintings appear in numerous churches, libraries and other public institutions in Ohio and Kentucky to which she frequently donated specific works. In 1997, Phelps' family donated 26 of her paintings to Morehead State University.
