Morehead Among Cities To Get Gov't. Airport

To Be Constructed By Civil Board of Aeronautics, State

Development of eighty-nine air ports in Kentucky at a cost of \$8,000,000 is planned by the Civil Aeronautics Board under the national defense program if and when Congress makes funds available.

In a report to the House Appropriations Committee, the board listed 3,841 projects in the United States which it said could be developed at a cost of more than half a billion dollars. The committee recommended that \$80,000 be made available immediately to start work on approximately 200 sites to be selected by defense officials.

The Kentucky projects include the four Louisville area, a new undertaking at a cost of \$492,500, and the other improvement of facilities at Bowman Field at a cost of \$23,000.

Among other Kentucky projects in the program, and the estimated cost for development of each were: Paducah, \$30,000; Berea, \$75,000; Bowling Green, \$442,500; Carlisle, \$75,000; Cynthiana, \$30,000; Danville, \$180,000; Flemingsburg, \$20,000; Frankfort, \$473,500; Harlan, \$180,000; Hazard, \$30,000; Irvine, \$180,000; Jackson, \$75,000; Jenkins, \$75,000; Lexington, \$30,000; Lawrenceburg, \$30,000; Liberty, \$30,000; London, \$75,000; Lynch, \$30,000; Mayfield, \$180,000; Middletown, \$412,500; Morehead, \$75,000; Mt. Sterling, \$75,000; Mt. Vernon, \$30,000; New Castle, \$75,000; Nicholasville, \$75,000; Owsboro, \$75,000; Paducah, \$20,000; Paris, \$75,000; Richmond, \$20,000; Shelbyville, \$20,000; Simpson, \$20,000; Sparta, \$20,000; Taylorville, \$20,000; Vanceburg, \$20,000; Williamsburg, \$75,000; Williamson, \$20,000.

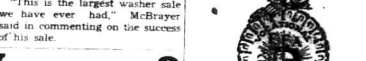
Athletic events will take up most of the time Friday afternoon starting at two p. m., in the College.

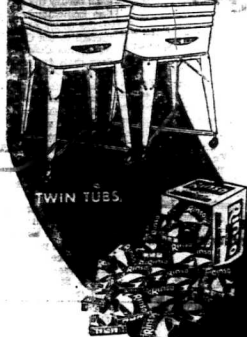
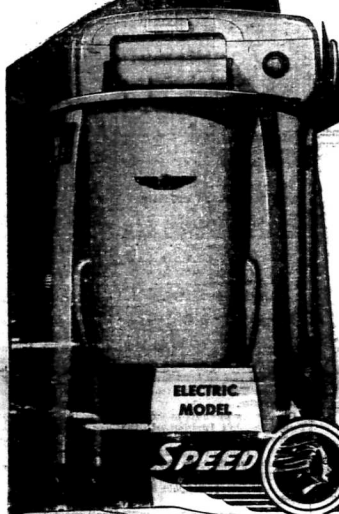
