MOREHEAD, Ky.---Recognizing that drug and alcohol abuse is a national, as well as state problem, individuals from across the Commonwealth will meet on Friday, March 5, to address the issue.

The session, entitled "Development of Statewide Higher Education Binge-Drinking Prevention Coalition Utilizing the Ohio Model," will run from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. in 221 Perkins Building on the Eastern Kentucky University campus. Registration is required for attendance.

Among the speakers for the seminar will be Connie Boehm, acting director of student wellness at Ohio State University, and Candace Peters, system development specialist for the Office of Criminal Justice Services. Boehm, who has nearly 20 years experience in drug and alcohol prevention, is a licensed professional counselor and a center associate of the National Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention. Peters, who has more than 20 years in criminal justice services, has worked with a variety of groups to develop consensus on possible policy statements and problem solutions.

More than 30 representatives from various colleges and regional prevention centers are accepting the challenge to join in this united effort to combat abuse, according to Judy Krug, coordinator of the Kentucky Region of the Network of Colleges and Universities Committed to the Elimination of Drug and Alcohol Abuse. "We realize that this is a monumental task and that no school can do this alone," she said.

Using a model developed by the Ohio Parents for Drug Free Youth as a guide, the Kentucky contingency hopes to develop a strong network that will utilize its strengths and weaknesses.

Alcohol and other drug abuse is a major problem, affecting all walks of life, noted Krug, who is coordinator of student wellness at Morehead State University. "Not only is there the loss of valuable resources of our youth, but the financial and emotional drain as well. Binge drinking keeps students from being able to perform to their fullest," she added.

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
EXHIBIT AT KFAC

MOREHEAD, Ky.---At its Feb. 26 meeting, Morehead State University's Board of Regents approved residence hall fire safety projects that will be implemented this year and next year for an estimated \$1,690,000.

The board adopted resolutions that would allow the university to utilize \$400,000 from the University's Housing and Dining System Repair and Maintenance Reserve to be used for the installation of sprinkler systems and upgrade other fire safety systems in two student residence halls, 1999; three halls, 2000, three halls, 2001, two halls, 2002, and three halls, 2003. The Board also approved authorizing the university to issue Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds in order to complete the project over a five-year period.

Another \$1.5 million was allocated for the residence hall improvement projects which will include roof replacements and elevator repairs and upgrades.

The Board also was informed that the renovation projects will mean increase of \$35 in residence hall fees per semester.

In other matters, the board approved a lease/purchase agreement with the MSU Foundation, Inc., authorizing the University to acquire an approximate 62-acre parcel of land adjoining the MSU golf course on U.S. 60 east of Morehead. The tract will be used for a soccer field for the women's soccer team, to enhance the driving range and to improve the safety of the existing nine-hole golf course.

Tenure and promotion to associate professor rank was approved for two faculty members: Dr. Lynne Taetzsch and Dr. Timothy Pitts. Sabbatical leaves, contingent upon the availability of funds in the academic department, was granted to Dr. William Green, Dr. Robert Grueninger and Dr. James Smallwood for Spring 2000, and Dr. Sarah Morrison for the coming year.

A preliminary figure of 7,548 was given as MSU's enrollment for the current semester. The final count will be announced at the next meeting.

The board also re-elected the following to serve as officers for the coming year: L.M. (Sonny) Jones of Frankfort, chair; Buckner Hinkle Jr. of Lexington, vice chair, and Carol Johnson of Morehead, secretary. Reappointed by the regents was Porter Dailey, MSU vice president for administration and fiscal services, as treasurer.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A series of films highlighting the challenges and accomplishments of women will be presented at Morehead State University during Women's History Month. Each film will be shown in 111 Rader Hall, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

The series begins on Tuesday, March 9, with "My Brilliant Career," hosted by Dr. Nancy Peterson, associate professor of English. In this work, the oldest daughter of a poor Australian ranch family must choose between her aspirations as an artist and a less-than-perfect love affair. Nominated for an Academy Award in 1979, the film was directed by Gillian Armstrong and stars Judy Davis and Sam Neill.

On Wednesday, March 10, the series will feature "Salt of the Earth," hosted by Eric Swank, assistant professor of sociology. The film, written, directed and produced by members of the "Hollywood Ten" who were blacklisted after its release in 1953, documents the struggles of striking mineworkers in New Mexico and highlights the prominent role of women in union activism after the men are prevented from picketing. Directed by Herbert Biberman, the movie stars Juan Chacon and Will Geer.

"The Joy Luck Club" will be presented on Tuesday, March 23, hosted by Dr. Rebecca Katz, assistant professor of sociology. This 1993 film based on the novel by Amy Tan, explores the oppressive treatment of women in traditional China as well as the contemporary generational and cultural conflict among four Chinese-American daughters and their Chinese-born mothers. Directed by Wayne Wang, the film stars Rosalind Chao and Ming-Na Wen.

On Tuesday, March 30, "A Woman Called Moses" will be featured, hosted by Peggy Overly, coordinator of minority student affairs. The life story of Harriet Tubman, this film portrays the bravery of the ex-slave and "conductor" of the Underground Railroad. Tubman made 19 journeys into the Deep South and assisted more than 300 slaves to freedom. Considered the "Moses" of her people, Tubman herself escaped from bondage, claiming that "there was one of two things I had a right to, liberty or death. If I could not have one, I would have the other; for no man should take me alive." Cicely Tyson and Will Geer star in the film.

Concluding the series on Wednesday, March 31, "The Dollmaker" will be presented, hosted by Kathleen Winter, instructor of English. Jane Fonda won an Emmy for her role as Gertie Nevels in this 1984 film adaptation of Harriet Arnow's story of a poor woman from Kentucky who migrates to Detroit in the 1940s. Nevels deals with discrimination against "hillbillies" as well as poverty but finds salvation in her skills as a whittler of wood. The feature also stars Levon Helm and Geraldine Page.

The film series is sponsored by MSU's Interdisciplinary Women's Studies Program, the Office of Undergraduate Programs, and the Office of the Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs. All presentations are free and open to the public.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---For more than two decades, John Douglas has been assisting police departments and prosecutors, becoming both the predator and the prey, as he researched some of the world's most notorious crimes.

On Wednesday, March 10, he will share some of those experiences when he visits Morehead State University for a public lecture that begins at 7 p.m. in Button Auditorium. There is no charge for attending and reservations are not necessary.

Douglas is a 25-year veteran of the FBI where he headed the investigative support unit. During that time, he confronted, interviewed and studied dozens of serial killers and assassins, including Charles Manson, Sirhan Sirhan, John Wayne Gacy, David "Son of Sam" Berkowitz and James Earl Ray.

He developed his first psychological profile of the Unabomber case but his "pioneering techniques" were ignored by others in the field. Today, profiling criminals is standard procedure and has become a popular theme for television shows, among them "The X-Files" and "Millennium."

For his life in law enforcement, the special agent was the model for the Scott Glenn character in "The Silence of the Lambs." He is the author of three national best sellers, "Obsession," "Mind Hunter" and "Unabomber: On the Trail of America's Most Wanted Serial Killer."

Now retired, Douglas travels the country offering an inside look at some of the most intriguing criminal cases in which he has been involved. Drawing from his career, he demonstrates the struggle between investigators and assailants and shows how understanding the mind and motives of an opponent can influence success in any arena.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Spring is coming soon and if learning to ride a motorcycle is a personal goal, register now for one of the courses offered by Morehead State University's Office of Continuing Education in conjunction with the Kentucky Motorcycle Program.

Among the courses scheduled is the Basic Riding and Street Skills that is designed for non-riders or those who want to brush up on their skills. The course offers instruction that covers on-cycle maneuvers in a controlled, off-street environment, learning the proper mounting technique and emergency braking. Participants must be at least 16 years of age to register and those under 18 must have parental consent.

RSS will be offered on four weekends during the spring: March 19-21, April 9-11, May 7-9 and June 18-20. Each weekend will follow this schedule; Friday, 6-10 p.m., Saturday, 8a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.. The fee for RSS is \$60.

For riders who want to fine-tune their street skills, the Experienced Rider Course may be an option. Learning the mental strategies to avoid risk will be discussed in the classroom instruction portion. The course is designed for individuals who have a current motorcycle license, have access to a street cycle and have riding experience.

Make that 700 "extra miles" on a bicycle as part of "Gear Up Florida." On May 14, Huff will join 23 other college students for a 14-day trip from Miami to Tallahassee.

The 1999 Gear Up Florida team are all members of Pi Kappa Phi fraternity. During the trip, they will travel an average of 60 miles each day, making presentations and participating in special events, often meeting those for whom they are riding. It's all being done to promote the message of Push America--improving lives of those with disabilities through service, volunteerism, education and awareness.

When the opportunity to participate in Gear Up Florida came along, he knew he wanted to participate because "those with handicaps are people, too."

Riding the 700 miles will be exhaustive for Huff even though he has been training for the expedition. If an experienced bicycle is an asset, he is making progress. Fraternity brother and MSU alumnus Paul Cantrell of Frankfort, who participated in the project in 1994, has loaned him the use of his bicycle.

Huff, who enjoys hiking and camping, is a volunteer in MSU's Office of Admissions and works for the marketing director in the Department of Athletics.

In addition to raising awareness, the Gear Up Florida Team will raise more than \$40,000 for future educational projects and programs for Push America. Huff and the other team members must each raise a minimum of \$1,500 to qualify.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Those traveling westbound on the Mountain Parkway near Salyersville are seeing a familiar face since the latest billboard was installed.

There, bigger than life, is the smiling face of Magoffin County's own Laura Joseph, a junior elementary education major at Morehead State University.

The caption reads, "My name is Laura and all my professors know it." It is a message that she wants to share with future students who travel along the Parkway, emphasizing one of the advantages of attending MSU, the low student/faculty ratio.

Joseph admits she was "embarrassed" when she saw the billboard, even before her family and friends began commenting on it. Now, when someone speaks to her, she makes a quick mental note to determine if that is a new face or an old friend.

Assisting with the University's marketing efforts has been a part of Joseph's learning experiences since arriving on campus. Last year, she and her sister, Marci Joseph Wells, were featured in an ad on WSAZ-TV that was shown throughout Eastern Kentucky.

While touting the advantages of MSU, Joseph also is promoting the place where she has lived all her life. "I don't like it when people put down Eastern Kentucky," she says. "The people have strong family values."

She offers the advice, "Don't get above your raising," something that she believes is still important in today's society. "You need to be true to yourself," she says. "I don't like it when I hear people say they're depressed. If you're helping others, you're helping yourself."

One of the faults of college, Joseph notes, is that too often students lose sight of who they really are. "You don't have to be like someone else to be popular," she adds.

After completing her studies at the University, Joseph hopes to stay in the region and teach. "I want to be a different kind of teacher," she says with enthusiasm. As she works toward fulfilling that goal, she has already decided that she wants to add art, music and drama to her lesson plans.

Describing herself as studious, but not organized, Joseph believes she is still a kid at heart and that children like her because she treats life like a playground.

Joseph recalls that teaching has not always been her first career choice--even though it was in her blood. Her father was a high school principal in Magoffin County before he retired; her mother currently teaches at Salyer Elementary School, and her grandparents were teachers as well.

"I refused to think about being a teacher for a long time. I never wanted to do it," she adds with a sigh. "But, it's my calling. Little kids just flock to me."


As she studies for her career choice, the future teacher notes that learning can be fun. "You need to know the basics before it can be applied," she said. Joseph came to MSU on a Regional Honors I Scholarship as she was valedictorian of her class at Magoffin County High School. She also received an Alumni Award as her parents were graduates of the University.

While she has very little free time, Joseph continues to teach Sunday school in Cannel City and enjoys performing arts and dance, especially clogging. Actively involved in music all her life, she sings and plays the violin.

She likes to spend time with friends and enjoys helping others. Life is good, according to Joseph, noting that there is only one part missing. "It is really hard to be home now that Marci has gotten married," she said of her only sister, whom she calls her best friend. But soon home will change again as Joseph was recently engaged to MSU alumnus Anthony Todd Fraley of Ashland.

Selections to be performed include three choruses that celebrate the gaiety of the party being given by Prince Orlofsky: "What a joy to be here," "A Toast to King Champagne" and "Sing to Love."

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MUSIC SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION RENAMED AT MSU



MOREHEAD, Ky.---A scholarship that rewards musical performance and competition at Morehead State University has been renamed to honor the lives of the late A. Frank and Bethel C. Gallaher.

The competition was established through a \$10,000 endowment to the MSU Foundation, Inc., by the children of A. Frank Gallaher following his death in 1987. With the passing of their mother in July 1998, the family renamed the scholarship to honor the lives of both parents, who believed strongly in education, music and competition.

The Gallahers were business owners in Ashland, starting a drive-in restaurant in the late 1940s and expanding their interests to include a market, now Ashland Foodfair, and a pharmacy, still known as Gallaher's Pharmacy. While neither was a professional musician, the Gallahers pursued personal interests in music throughout their lives and encouraged their children to do the same. As a result, two of their three children became professional musicians while the third became active in the family business.

"Mother loved to play the piano," said Dr. Christopher Gallaher, chair of MSU's Department of Music. "She played mostly by ear and would play a song in whatever key her hands landed on. I remember one time I bought her a 'fake' book with a number of familiar songs. She used the table of contents as a reference point, then chose a song and played it without looking at the music. She was a remarkable woman," he said.

After her husband's death, Mrs. Gallaher traveled extensively, visiting every continent and making several excursions to the North and South poles. "She visited each of the Pacific Islands where Dad had fought in World War II," Dr. Gallaher said.

This year the A. Frank and Bethel C. Gallaher Memorial Music Performance Competition at MSU featured 10 semi-finalists, the most entrants in the 12-year event, with the five finalists competing for the \$1,000 cash prize. The winner will perform at the University's Academic Honors Convocation on Sunday, April 25, at 2 p.m. in Button Auditorium.

Finalists in this year's competition included: Julie Ackman, Falmouth junior, oboe, accompanied by Rebecca Hopper on piano, performing "Concerto for Oboe in C Major, K.314" by W. A. Mozart, first movement, Allegro aperto; Julia Graepel, Uhldingen, Germany, junior, flute, accompanied by Mary Ellen McNeill, performing "Sonata for Flute and Piano" by Eldin Burton, first and third movements, Allegretto grazioso and Allegro giocoso; Chi Wai Kam, Wan Chai, Hong Kong, junior, violin, accompanied by McNeill, performing "Scene de Ballet" by Charles de Beriot, three movements, Tempo di bolero, Adagio, and Allegro appassionato--Piu animato; Dean McCleese, Portsmouth, Ohio, junior, organ, performing "Toccata and Fugue in D minor, BWV 585" by J.S. Bach, and Jason Wiley, Flatwoods junior, trombone, accompanied by McNeill, performing "Arrows of Time (1997)," Movement I, by Richard Peaslee.

Judges for the semi-final competition were associated with the University. Included were Dr. J. E. Duncan, dean emeritus; Leo Blair, associate professor emeritus; and Myron Doan, dean of students. To maintain objectivity, judges for the final round of competition will be selected externally.

All full-time music majors with at least a 2.5 grade point average may compete for the Gallaher Scholarship. To participate, the student must perform from memory a work that is 8 to 10 minutes in length.


The program, under the direction of Dr. Greg Detweiler, MSU assistant professor of music, is free and open to the public.

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

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



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University faculty and alumni as well as artists, journalists and lawyers are encouraged to apply for the Fulbright Senior Scholar Awards for U.S. Faculty and Professionals: 2000-2001 Competition.

Opportunities for lecturing or advanced research in more than 125 countries are available to college and university faculty as well as to professionals outside academe. Many of the awards, which range from 2 to 12 months, are flexible to the needs of grantees. In addition, a number of open awards allow applicants to suggest their own grant activities and host institutions.

"The Fulbright Program provides educators and professionals the opportunity to immerse themselves in a culture very different from their own for an extended period of time," said Dr. Michael Seelig, special assistant to the president at Morehead State University. After receiving a Fulbright Senior Scholars Program grant in 1990, he took a sabbatical from teaching to conduct research regarding child welfare issues in Ethiopia.

"It was one of the greatest experiences of my life," Dr. Seelig said. "I would especially encourage our junior faculty to apply as soon as they are eligible for sabbatical."

Every year, grants are awarded to faculty at all types of institutions and at all academic rankings, including emeritus. International education administrators regularly receive Fulbrights, as do independent scholars, artists, and a wide range of professionals from the public and private sectors.

"I have found that the recognition of being a Fulbright Scholar opens the doors to several other opportunities in higher education," Dr. Seelig said. "I have also found that the Fulbright experience is very much available to MSU faculty."

Dr. Seelig suggests that applicants use a strategy for selecting a lecture/research destination. "In developing countries, more opportunities are available whereas applications to European countries are much more competitive," he said. "The booklet published by the Fulbright Program details, by country, what types of services and how many researchers and lecturers are needed. It also gives a history of the number of applications received and how many

are accepted in each country. This helps in developing a strategy for the application process," he said.

The deadline for lecturing and research grants for 2000-2001 is Aug. 1. Other deadlines are in effect for special programs: distinguished Fulbright chairs in Europe and Canada, May 1;, international education administrators programs and the Fulbright German studies seminar, Nov. 1, and NATO advanced research fellowships and institutional grants, Jan. 1, 2000.

The basic eligibility requirements for a Fulbright senior scholar award are U.S. citizenship and the Ph.D. or comparable professional qualifications such as a terminal degree in fine arts. For lecturing awards, university or college teaching experience is expected. Foreign language skills are needed for some countries but many lecturing assignments are in English.

Funding for the Fulbright Program is provided by the United States Information Agency, on behalf of the U.S. government, and by cooperating governments and host institutions abroad.

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

McCleese began playing the organ in high school. "We had a Hammond C-3 organ at Clay High School in Portsmouth. I became interested in that sound, so I began teaching myself to play a few songs," he said.

His interest in band performance began when he was a youngster, going to basketball games with his parents. "Everybody else was there for the game but I wanted to see the band play." He began playing trumpet in his elementary school band, but "during my eighth grade year, the band needed a tuba player, so I took up the tuba," he said. "I didn't really get serious about it, though, until I was a senior in high school." He has been playing the tuba for about seven years and currently studies with Stacy Baker, assistant professor of music at Morehead State.

McCleese is the son of Dr. Howard and Sue McCleese of Portsmouth, Ohio and the grandson of Dorothy Curtis of Sciotoville, Ohio.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University recognized five individuals who have been selected by their colleagues as recipients of the University's most prized awards during the 15th annual Academic Awards Convocation held Sunday, April 25, in Button Auditorium. The event launched a week-long tribute to scholastic excellence campus-wide.

- **Dr. L.K Williams**, professor of accounting, who encourages students to seek an education because "the ability to learn is a lasting hallmark of an educated person," was named the 1998-99 Distinguished Teacher.
- **Dr. Bruce A. Mattingly**, chair of the Department of Psychology, who has been studying the neurochemical and behavioral effects of chronic stimulant abuse for more than a decade, was selected as the 1998-99 Distinguished Researcher.
- **Dr. Richard B. Miles**, director of bands, who has received national and international recognition for his compositions of artistic merit, has earned the 1998-99 Distinguished Creative Productions Award.
- **Dr. Alban Wheeler**, professor of sociology, who is a former department chair, program director and dean, is the 1999 Distinguished Faculty Service Award recipient.
- Ruth C. Robinson, secretary to the director in Camden-Carroll Library, who is noted for her willingness to serve MSU and the community, is the 1999 Distinguished Staff Service Award recipient.
- Dr. Williams, an MSU faculty member since 1988, received the 1998 Dean's Citation for Teaching Excellence within the College of Business. In addition to teaching, he has served as a faculty mentor, chaired several committees within his college, and was a member of others including Faculty Promotion, Rank Confirmation, Assessment, and Accounting Curriculum, Recruitment and Retention. He is described by his colleagues as having a great deal of concern for his students and consistently giving them personal attention.

Author of numerous works for professional publications, he has made presentations at state and national conferences. A member of the American Accounting Association and American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, he has served as session moderator, member of selection committee and reviewer of papers for conferences for the accounting profession.

Active in community involvement, he is a member of the Morehead/Rowan County Chamber of Commerce, Morehead Area Habitat for Humanity Board of Directors, Morehead Kiwanis Club and as coach for t-ball, little league and youth soccer and basketball.

A certified public accountant since 1983, Dr. Williams earned a Bachelor of Science degree in accounting from the University of Kentucky, a Master of Business Administration degree in marketing from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, and the Doctor of Business Administration degree in accounting from UK.

Dr. Mattingly, a member of the psychology faculty since 1980, has received numerous research grants, including the first National Institutes of Health grant awarded to a University faculty member. He also has received several National Science Foundation EPSCoR grants and was the University's 1987 Distinguished Researcher Award recipient.

Recognized internationally for his studies of behavioral stimulants, he is described by his colleagues as "a person who is extremely talented in both teaching and research with a firm commitment to both." Noted for encouraging students to assist in research activities, he is the author or co-author of more than 50 articles published in various scientific journals and more than 100 papers at state, regional and national conferences.

A faculty representative on MSU's Board of Regents from 1993 to 1998, Dr. Mattingly earned a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology and mathematics at MSU. He completed the Master of Science and Ph.D. degrees, as well as completed post-doctoral work at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Miles, who came to MSU in 1985, has published five books, 15 articles and three reviews and has national and international editorship. His text series, "Teaching Music through Performance in Band," Volume I and II, as well as the accompanying six compact disk recordings, is a best seller in the instrumental music field.

In addition to serving as director of bands, he teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting and other courses in music education and serves as director of the Symphony Band

which has been selected by audition to perform for conferences of the Music Educators National Conference, the National Band Association and College Band Directors National Association. In May, he will accompany the Symphony Bánd and Percussion Ensemble on a two-week tour of the People's Republic of China where the group will perform in several locations including the internationally renowned Beijing Concert Hall.

He has given more than 30 presentations at regional and national conferences and made appearances at nearly 80 national and international engagements as a guest conductor, including three international concert tours. On more than 50 occasions, he has attended national and international conferences, serving as a clinician, adjudicator and/or consultant.

A member of Phi Kappa Lambda, Phi Beta Mu and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Dr. Miles earned the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Florida State University. He received the undergraduate degree from Appalachian State University and a graduate degree from University of Illinois.

Dr. Wheeler came to MSU in 1972 as head of the former Department of Sociology, Social Work and Corrections and advanced to the position of dean of the former School of Social Sciences four years later. He also served as director of Undergraduate Regional Programs for one year and was the faculty representative on the University's Board of Regents from 1987 until 1993.

Involved in other areas on the MSU campus, he has served as a member of several of the University's committees including promotion and tenure, undergraduate curriculum, honors, academic computer users, academic programs and international affairs. A member and former president of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, he also served as an academic adviser to Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity and faculty adviser to the campus chapter of Young Democrats.

Active in the community, Dr. Wheeler was a member of the Morehead Area Habitat for Humanity, Gateway Council of Kentucky Cancer Program and Rowan County unit of the American Cancer Society, Morehead Police Review Board and advisory committee on domestic violence for Pathways, Inc.

Majoring in sociology, Dr. Wheeler earned his B.A. and M.A. degrees from Mississippi College and the Ph.D. from Mississippi State University.

Robinson, who has been at MSU for 25 years, is described as "proven to be very dedicated and concerned with doing what is best for her co-workers and community." In the library, she has served on numerous committees, including automation, social and security.

Her service to the University also includes more than 10 years on the Staff Congress, serving seven terms as an officer and she currently holds the office of secretary. She has chaired the credentials and elections committee, job classification appeals and the ad hoc task force for performance evaluation.

In the community, Robinson has played an active role in the Elliottville Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary including three terms as president, three as reporter and a stint as secretary and one as vice president. She has served as chair of various committees for the fire department, including Teddy Bear which makes homemade toys for children at St. Claire Medical Center; Food/Clothing, which assists those in the community who have lost their homes through disaster, and Charity Auction, a fund raiser.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Symphony Band and Percussion Ensemble will perform a Spring Benefit Concert on Sunday, May 2, at 3 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall on the campus.

The benefit concert will preview the musical selections from their upcoming performance tour which will run May 12-25 in the People's Republic of China. More than 70 students will participate in the tour, accompanied by three faculty conductors: Dr. Richard Miles, director of bands and director of the Symphony Band, Dr. Susan Creasap, assistant director of bands and assistant director of the Symphony Band, and Frank Oddis, coordinator of the percussion program and director of the Percussion Ensemble.

Music for the tour will feature the national anthems of both countries as well as "My Old Kentucky Home." Works by Berlioz and other classical composers and American standards from the Big Band era, George Gershwin and the "Star Wars Trilogy" will be highlighted as well as modern percussion pieces such as a tribute to Broadway's "Stomp."

The two-week tour will center primarily in Beijing, the capitol city, which is home to more than 12 million residents and covers more than 6,488 square miles.

The Percussion Ensemble and Symphony Band will give seven performances on the tour with concerts open to the public at concert halls, universities and schools, including a performance at the internationally renowned Beijing Concert Hall. To refine their performance of the Chinese national anthem, the MSU students will rehearse with Chinese guest conductors at each location.

The tour also will include many sightseeing and educational activities that will allow performers to experience the culture of one of the world's oldest continuous civilizations, spanning more than five thousand years. Included on the travel agenda are the famous Great Wall, the Ming Tomb, the Forbidden City, Tiananmen Square and the Beijing Zoo.

In preparation for their journey, students are rehearsing daily to refine the music they will present, much of which they have performed during their three campus concerts this year, according to Dr. Miles. They also are educating themselves on Chinese culture by studying history, geography, etiquette and basic survival language skills.


More than 4,000 pounds of equipment will be shipped to China for the tour, according to Oddis. "Because many of the percussion instruments we use are not as prevalent in their culture, the instruments are either unavailable or not of the same quality as we use in performance, so we have to ship everything," he said. "The students are contributing many extra hours to assist with getting the equipment to Beijing. They are building cases especially for this equipment to make it flightworthy. We have to weigh and measure each piece and provide a detailed description for Northwest Airlines in order to ship the equipment as luggage."

More than 1,400 contributors have provided sponsorship of the students to make the concert tour possible, according to Dr. Miles. "This is an independently funded student adventure," he said.

Before returning to their homeland, the couple hopes to gain job experience in the U.S.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Anupa and Jerry John traveled halfway around the world to study business administration at Morehead State University, a relationship that was facilitated by the Internet.

Originally from Calcutta, India, they were full-time international students at Ashland University in Ohio where their resources were being drained paying out-of-state tuition. While browsing on the Internet for an institution that would offer an assistantship, they learned about MSU.

They previewed the campus and met with Dr. Marc Glasser, dean of graduate and undergraduate programs. With his help, they selected MSU as the place to pursue their master's degrees. The couple enrolled in June 1998 and are currently working as graduate assistants: Anupa works in Career Services where she coordinates cooperative education opportunities for students and Jerry works in the Office of Institutional Planning, Research and Effectiveness.

Before coming to the MSU campus, the couple held jobs in their homeland. Anupa worked in advertising and Jerry in marketing and distribution. "We had both reached a certain stage as managers and we realized that in order to advance, we needed a professional degree," she said.

Jerry began his career in Calcutta with Nestle India but later took a position in circulation and marketing for the "Times of India," the sixth largest newspaper in the world. During that time, Anupa was working in advertising for a yellow pages company. When she advanced from copywriting to assistant manager of publishing in two years, several members of the company's trade union thought she had been promoted too quickly.

"Trade unions are very active there and can be volatile," Anupa said. To avoid controversy, she moved to a job with a large ceiling fan company in Calcutta. "Jerry was working for 'Times of India' and we often met at advertising events," she recalled.

As sometimes happens when cultures are joined, the pair experienced initial resistance from their families when they married in 1994. Anupa was Hindu, as are 80 percent of Indians and in Hindu tradition, marriages are arranged by the parents. "I went out of the way and married a Christian, so it was pandemonium at my house," she said. "My parents were so upset because not only was I marrying on my own, but he was outside my religion," she said.

An only son attending a Jesuit school, Jerry was encouraged by his parents to meet different girls. "I did, because of my parents, but it never worked out," he said. "When I told them that I wanted to marry Anupa, a Hindu, they were quite upset, but eventually they came around."

During a visit with relatives in the Middle East, Jerry contacted "Gulf News" and was offered a position as a distribution executive, so the Johns moved to Abu Dhabi.

"The Arabs rule the country but about 80 percent of the population are expatriates (immigrants)," Anupa explained. "Because the Arabs fear that the expatriates might take over the country, the government does not allow them to settle in the country. They can never own property; they cannot own a house."

"There are numerous advantages and disadvantages of living in Abu Dhabi which is home for people from all over the world," Jerry said. "Everyone works for the Arabs and it is a very oil-rich country. The income is tax-free so you can make a lot of money," he noted. "But you cannot change jobs easily. I received a company car but I could not get a driver's license during the first year."

In Abu Dhabi, Anupa worked for Team Advertising, creating marketing strategies for Florsheim Shoes and J.C. Penney. "It was great fun but every ad had to meet government approval," she said. "As it was against their religion for a woman to show her bare arms, if the dress was sleeveless, we had to use the computer to make sleeves to cover the arm for the ad." All publications that came into the country were censored.

Ads for Saudi Arabian publications were worse, Anupa noted. All women outside their homes must be completely covered from head to toe and could not be shown in the ads. "I had to promote women's clothing without showing women," she said.

After living in Abu Dhabi for three years, the couple decided it was time to continue their careers by way of an MBA degree. "We could have studied in the Middle East at the local American University and kept our jobs," Jerry said, "but we decided that we wanted American degrees from the U.S. so we could climb the corporate ladder when we return home."

In India, the education system is based on the British system and very different, according to Anupa. "My undergraduate degree in English literature took three years there. Students are pressured and overworked because exams are given only once--at the end of each year, so you study only at the end of the year and it is not an accurate measure of your intellectual capabilities," she said.

"Here it is very different," she continued. "Examinations are staggered and you have marks for class participation, assignments and for the way you do your presentations. I prefer the system here so much that I wish I could get my whole family to study at this university. I keep telling my nephews and nieces, 'Keep your grades up and I will help you come to MSU.' They are so excited."

Anupa's enthusiasm includes the two classes she has taken via the Internet. "I'm having a wonderful time. My professor in managerial communication, Dr. Donna Everett, (assistant professor of business communication) is really good. I have even asked questions by e-mail at 11:30 at night and she has responded within 15 minutes. Some professors may think that it is less work for them when their classes are offered on the Internet, whereas, some professors realize they have to work even harder with Internet students. The most important component of the Internet course is the professor," she said.

Before making their next move, the Johns have expressed an interest in gaining some job experience in the United States. After they graduate, they would like to get at least one year of practical training. "We want to get American work experience; then we plan to go back to our country," Anupa said.

"India is opening up economically, encouraging business ventures with large international companies, including American firms. It is becoming a very vibrant economy," she added.
