

Horses Win By 25-22, Pioneers By 27 to 18 And Eagles By 30-24

Bowling Green, Ky., Feb. 22. — The Hilltoppers of Western, hosts and defending champions, will meet the Eagles of Morehead, and the Thoroughbreds of Murray will engage the Pioneers of Transylvania, in the semi-final round of the tenth annual K. I. A. C. cage tournament on College Heights tomorrow afternoon. The victors will fight for the championship tomorrow night. The hosts are heavy favorites to repeat, and the Racehorses to support them in the title scrap.

Western defeated Georgetown's Tigers tonight by 10, an hour after Murray managed to gain a 25-22 advantage over the Colonels of Centre. Transy eliminated Louisville by 27 to 18, and Morehead mowed Eastern, 30 to 24, this afternoon.

An enthusiastic and noisy crowd of more than 2,300 patrons saw Friday night's tussles and approximately 1,000 were on hand for the afternoon bouts assuring the financial success of the meet and indicating that Bowling Green will be host to the quizzettes annually for an indefinite period.

On Thursday morning the Fore-ground "forecaster" department picked as follows: Thursday—Murray to beat Weiyan, Western to beat Berea, and Georgetown to take Union.

"Friday—Transy to down Louisville, Murray to defeat Centre, Western to whip Georgetown and Morehead to conquer Eastern." It also selected Murray to top Transy and Western to whlop Morehead Saturday afternoon and Western to top Murray in the title fight. Seven out of seven so far. So far so good.

Fans Leave Early

The Toppers exhibited their slow-breathing tactics against Georgetown and seemed to have the game so well sewed up at the end with a 15-7 advantage that a great percentage of the fans went home.

They were handicapped by the absence of Asher Skull, star forward, who remained in a hospital in Louisville with an infected leg, and by Kenny Doll's inability to hit his stride because of a recent illness.

Bill Imorde counted Louisville's first basket early in the second half. C. V. Sanders made the second and Schectey the third.

The win was Transy's third in succession over Louisville this season. In the first the margin was 24 to 23 and in the second 26 to 20.
