To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Rowan County:

We, the Members of the Rowan County Board of Education, outgoing and hold-over members alike, wish to submit to the citizens and taxpayers of Rowan County the following statement:

It has been the aim and earnest endeavor of each of us, during our tenure of office, to give Rowan County the best possible school system for the tax dollars expended. The welfare of the school child has been, as it should be, the uppermost consideration in our minds. We have been careful and conscientious in the spending of your tax monies and we feel that we have been faithful in the discharge of the trust you placed in us.

The present school administration, of which we are a part, has reduced the floating indebtedness of the Board of Education from a sum in excess of \$100,000.00 leaving 8 percent interest to the sum of \$61,500.00 bearing only 4 1/2 percent interest, thus reducing in six years the sum of \$38,500.00 on the huge indebtedness inherited by the present administration from previous administrations. At the same time, while paying on this old debt, there have been constructed five new school buildings, three of which are modern stone structures at Haldeman, Farmers and Elliottville as well as new buildings at Slab Camp and Perkins. There has also been constructed a modern Superintendent's office building. Many other school buildings have been added to and improved. Altogether the value of the school property has been increased by approximately \$150,000.00. Teachers salaries have been materially increased and many new departments have been added to the schools.

Our administration has been headed by Roy Cornette as Superintendent, whose capable management has been largely responsible for placing Rowan County Schools on a sound business and high scholastic basis. We urge the continuance of these policies and we feel that the best interests of the Rowan County school child as well as the taxpayers can best be served by the continuance in office of Superintendent Roy Cornette.

SEVEN MILLION PRODUCERS

There are seven million farmers in the United States. Add their families, and the total comes to 32,000,000 people who live from tilling the soil—and who constitute the largest single market for the products of our factories.

More are joining yearly. The co-ops don't perform miracles. But they do obtain the best possible price for agriculture as a whole.

be that country. Europe under such a German-dominated system would be an economic unit. Individual nations would still exist in many cases, and would be allowed to continue trade with one another on a barter basis, but always under direction from Berlin.

Wherever separate states existed, the type of government and the political thinking of the people would be adjusted to the ideology of the German leaders.

In all matters of international concern Hitler would reserve the right to determine their course.

Separate states would probably be given the right to carry on limited trade with countries outside Europe, but only upon approval from Berlin, and through specifications set up by the Fuehrer. The United States under such a scheme could trade with Europe only in such commodities and by such terms as provided by Germany.

His in a general way is what most people in the United States believe Europe would be like if Hitler wins. How far should we go to prevent it?

MSTC Pre-Medical  
Courses To Fulfill  
All Requirements

Dr. Pennebaker Has  
Arranged Four-Year  
Schedule For Students

Beginning next semester, Morehead will offer a premedical course which will meet all the requirements and recommendations of any medical school in the country. Dr. C. B. Pennebaker announced.

Dr. Pennebaker, head of the Biology department, is working on a schedule for students enrolling in this course, which will cover their whole four year work at Morehead. If the student follows these courses he will be eligible for an A.B. or a B.S. degree. Students enrolling in this course will not necessarily have to follow the schedule being planned by Dr. Pennebaker. However, it will simplify matters both for the student and the department head if they will follow the prescribed

course. Dr. Pennebaker stated the reason for offering such a course was that several men who graduated from Morehead and gone to medical school told him that a few courses that were required by the medical schools were not offered at Morehead. Then Dr. Pennebaker got catalogues from medical colleges and found out just what they required and also what they recommended. He has now arranged a schedule for four years that would meet the best medical schools requirements and recommendations.

### *This Is A Small Measure Of Roosevelt's Service To Our People:*

Under Roosevelt, Farm Income has nearly doubled. Farm mortgage interest charges are 40 percent less than in 1928. Soil Conservation Program has saved 30,000,000 acres. Farm loans have increased the net worth of borrowers 37 percent. One-fourth of all farms now have access to electricity.

Under Roosevelt, total non-agricultural employment is 9,000,000 greater than 7 years ago. Weekly payrolls are \$113,000,000 greater than they were 7 years ago. Wage earners have benefited by laws enacted granting unemployment compensation, old age insurance and assistance to needy blind and dependent children. Wage and Hour Act has reduced hours and increased pay of millions of workers. Collective bargaining has brought about a decrease of industrial disputes.

Under Roosevelt, National Income increased from \$40,000,000,000 in 1932 to \$65,500,000,000 in 1939. Employment increased from 37.5 million in 1932 to 45.3 million in 1939. Loans totaling \$5,000,000,000 have been made to aid banks. Government purchases of \$6,000,000,000 helped every kind of business.

Under Roosevelt 20,000,000 depositors benefited by RFC loans to banks. Loans have been made to 1,500,000 farmers; 150,000 stockmen; 20,000 disaster sufferers and to 200,000 families for purchasing electrical appliances. Federal Housing Administration has enabled 60,000 families to build or finance homes.

Under Roosevelt in the last 7 years, public works programs have produced \$18,000,000,000 worth of public properties and services. WPA has built 450,000 miles of roads; 93,000,000 worth of public properties and services. WPA has built 450,000 miles of roads; 93,000 bridges; 88,000 public buildings; 12,000 miles of water lines. WPA has served 386,000 lunches to undernourished children. PWA has financed work since 1933 has constituted 70 percent of all educational construction. PWA has accounted for more than \$3,200,000,000 in orders for materials.

Under Roosevelt, the U.S. Navy, destroyed under Republican administrations, has become the most powerful in the world. The Army, which had been reduced and neglected, is being brought up to an authorized strength of 500,000 officers and men. Air forces already increased can now expand easily to a strength of 50,000 planes. When defense program is complete the United States will have a two-ocean Navy or 733 fighting ships.
