MOREHEAD, Ky.---After spending the first part of the year reviewing its education program, Morehead State University will begin the fall term with the announcement of its major initiatives.

On Tuesday, Sept. 14, the University will hold a "Teacher Education Reform and P-16 Regional Council Kick-Off" in 419 Reed Hall from 3 to 5:30 p.m. Dr. Janet S. Kettlewell, coordinator of the P-16 Regents of the University System of Georgia, will deliver the keynote address on the dual topics of "Lessons Learned from the P-16 Initiative in Georgia" and "Issues Involved in Doing Teacher Education Reform."

"This event will allow the University to highlight two major education initiatives currently underway on campus, " said Dr. Michael Seelig, executive assistant to the President.

Under the leadership of co-chairs Dr. Cathy Barlow, interim dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences, and Dr. David Magrane, professor of biology, a campus-wide task force of more than 40 interested faculty and staff members are prepared to begin a review of all aspects of MSU's preparation of teachers.

Organized into eight work groups focusing on separate issues of teacher preparation, the task force will utilize a P-16 (primary through postsecondary) context in conducting its work. Each work group will meet with representatives of pre-kindergarten, elementary, middle and secondary education, as well as with representatives of other public and private colleges and universities, community colleges and technical school in an effort to seek ways to enhance MSU's Teacher Education Program. This initiative is supported by recent recommendations by both the Prichard Committee on Academic Excellence to the Commonwealth Task Force on Teacher Quality, and the Kentucky P-16 State Council, both of whom recommended that strengthening teacher preparation be a top priority for Kentucky.

At the same time, under the leadership of co-chairs Dr. Harold “Bud” Harty of the Institute of Regional and Public Policy, and Dr. Edward Reeves, chair of the Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology, the University’s P-16 Leadership Council has been planning and advising the president for the convening of a “P-16 Regional Council” within MSU’s service region later this year.

“This Council would provide the opportunity to bring both representatives of P-12 and of postsecondary education to the same table to dialogue, plan and make recommendations regarding several important issues that interface with both systems, Dr. Harty said.

It is expected that teacher education preparation will become a primary, on-going priority of such a council, as well as issues related to developing an earlier interest within students for mathematics and the sciences; aligning high school graduation requirements with college admission requirements; determining responsibility for the remediation of students who struggle to attain desired levels of competency in reading, writing, mathematics and other area; and instilling within students a desire to pursue a postsecondary education.

The Teacher Education Reform Task Force and the P-16 Leadership Council have prepared themselves for the work ahead. The University hosted a “Teaching the Teachers for the 21st Century” Symposium Series last spring and the campus was introduced to national, state-wide and regional trends in each of these areas. Members of both the Task Force and Council were provided with the most recent articles on these topics and met with a consultant from The Education Trust based in Washington, D.C., a private association involved with more than 40 P-16 regional councils in 20 states, many of whom are involved in teacher education reform.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---At Morehead State University, the desire to learn does not have to link one to a degree program.

MSU's "special student status" allows individuals to take classes to expand one's knowledge, pursue an interest, or ease their way back into the educational process without making a commitment towards a degree.

This status is geared toward "anyone that wants to improve their personal or professional skills," said Sandra Barker, associate director of admissions. For example, students interested in brushing up on their golf skills, may wish to take a class in golf. Or, if someone in the business world needs enhanced computer skills, classes are available for them as well.

"In some cases, "non-traditional students apply for special status because they have been out of school for so long that it is a way to ease back into the lifestyle," Barker said. "It helps alleviate the pressures of doing something on a full time basis."

To be classified in the special student status, applicants must complete an MSU application and check the special student status box. These students are not eligible for financial aid unless they are over 65 years of age. Those who meet that age requirement, however, are eligible for the Caudill Fellowship which is a tuition scholarship.

If special status students decide to work toward a degree, they may become eligible for financial aid. "Students would then need to submit their ACT scores and high school transcript or GED scores," Barker said.

After being unconditionally accepted, students may then apply for financial aid. Twenty-four hours of coursework, completed under special status, may then be applied toward a degree.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Rowan County Domestic Violence Council, Inc., has joined with Morehead State University to provide public awareness on an issue that affects individuals of all ages and from all walks of life.

Statistics show that acts of domestic violence are committed every two seconds and that children who witness family violence may suffer emotional trauma and become abusers themselves later in life. In Rowan County, there were nearly one hundred Emergency Protective Orders (EPO) filed last year.

To educate and assist students with research projects related to the issue of domestic violence, the council has contributed 13 books to MSU's Camden-Carroll Library. Among the donated works are: "Rural Women Battering and the Justice System," "Getting Away With Murder," "Every Eighteen Seconds," "The Battered Woman's Survival Guide," "Emotional Abuse," "Keeping the Faith," "Men Who Batter," "In Love and Danger," "Violence in Gay and Lesbian Relationships," "Surviving," "New Beginnings," "Understanding Family Violence" and "Children and Trauma."

Similar books also have been donated to the Rowan County Public Library, according to Lynn Geurin, a mental health therapist at Pathways. "We are utilizing every means to increase the awareness of domestic violence," she said. "Our goal is to provide assistance to victims as well as the necessary emotional support that will allow them to lead productive lives."

Gary Adkins, assistant Commonwealth attorney, noted that even though teachers now report child abuse, there are still a number of children who never receive the help they need. "Assistance will be available only if information is distributed," he said. "It needs to be understood that domestic violence is not a 'normal' thing."

More than 400 books on various aspects of domestic violence are currently available in the CCL library, according to Tom Kmetz, library liaison to MSU's Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology.

At today's press conference at MSU, Katherine Bustos, chair of the Rowan County Domestic Violence Council, and Donna Overbee, director of the D.O.V.E.S. Spouse Abuse Shelter, joined Geurin and Adkins to discuss the importance of public awareness for domestic violence. MSU First Lady Bonnie Eaglin offered welcoming remarks on behalf of the University and a former victim of domestic violence addressed the crowd with the story of her survival. Concluding the program was a 15-minute documentary on local victims titled "Black and Blue."

The Rowan County Domestic Violence Council is a multi-agency group, composed of representatives from Christian Social Services, the Commonwealth Attorney's office, D.O.V.E.S., Domestic Violence Victims/Survivors, the Kentucky State Police, the Morehead Police, MSU's Office of Public Safety, Northeast Kentucky Legal Services, Pathways, Inc., P.A.V.E., Probation and Parole, the Rowan County Attorney, Rowan County Community Based Services, the Rowan County High School Youth Service Center, the Rowan County Sheriff and St. Claire Medical Center.

The public awareness campaign was held in conjunction with Domestic Violence Awareness Month, which is observed nationally in October.

Included in her portfolio were 10 letters of recommendation, published articles that she had written, each of her job descriptions, a five-minute videotape of her philosophy of education and her written answers to four questions. After winning at the state level, her portfolio advanced to the regional level in the American Career and Technical Education Association. If her portfolio is deemed award-winning at the national level, it will move up to a national screening committee.

The award, sponsored by Ashland Inc., was presented to Ellington at KVA's July 27 meeting in Louisville.

Ellington chose home economics as her major when she enrolled at MSU because she liked the subject and wanted to work with people. "I had several positive role models growing up that got me interested in the area (of home economics)," she said.

MOREHEAD, Ky. ---With winter just around the corner, it's time to dig out those coats from the backs of closets.

However, there are some children in East Kentucky who do not have anything in the back of their closets. That is why Jeremy Cox, a Morehead State University student started Kids Koats through the University's Residence Hall Association a few years ago.

Each season, Kids Koats collects about 150 coats for children, said Sharon Colvin, RHA adviser and director of Mignon Hall. Cox and Phillip James, **Flatwoods** junior, who serve as co-chairs of the Kids Koats committee, have talked with area business owners and managers about placing collection barrels at their locations.

To date, arrangements have been made for approximately 12 barrels to be placed in businesses throughout the community. There will be two barrels on campus to accept the donated coats. In Morehead, barrels have been located in Rite Aid, Dollar Daze, Goody's, Martin's and Fashion Bug and a designated table will be set at Wal-Mart.

Cox, a **Cincinnati** junior, also wants to collect money to buy new coats, hats, and gloves for those in need and to offset the cost of advertising the Kids Koats project. Currently 17 money jars are located in area businesses.

The RHA sent letters to parents of MSU students asking them to bring coats with them when they visit the campus for Parents Weekend (Sept. 24-25). A coat collection barrel was stationed outside Jayne Stadium.

Cox plans to collect coats at basketball games later this year. For the MSU/Eastern Kentucky University game on Saturday, Dec. 4, there will be no admission charge for those who bring a coat.

Once the coats are collected, the RHA will arrange for the coats to be cleaned free of charge by Martinizing and Groce Cleaners. MSUCorps staff members will distribute the coats to Family Resource Centers in a 10-county area, said Steve Swim, MSUCorps coordinator.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"Kentucky Collects Kentucky," an exhibition of unusual Kentucky folk art, will be on display at the Kentucky Folk Art Center, Oct. 1 though Dec. 22.

The exhibit profiles rarely seen works of art from private collections around Kentucky, and includes a variety of items. "Most often, exhibitions of Kentucky folk art showcase the work of better known artists, many of whom have now become household names among folk art enthusiasts," said Adrian Swain, KFAC curator. "Through this exhibition, we hope to broaden public understanding of what folk art may encompass, by showing certain types of objects not generally available for public viewing."

"Kentucky Collects Kentucky" features signs, sculptures, walking sticks, paintings and art made from found objects. Included in the exhibition are several hand-made store signs, such as the 12 ½ foot-long "Winchester Model 12 Shotgun," which was displayed for several decades hanging above Joe Rosenberg's on Upper Street in Lexington.

"Legend has it that this sign was taken down, some time in the '40s, at the request of city officials in reaction to a magazine article and photograph suggesting the wild west was as close as central Kentucky," Swain said. "Many works of art carry similar stories and intrigue, while the origins of others remain a mystery."

The show also includes a stick made around 1867 by Henry Gudgell. This is one of only two known surviving examples of the work of this former slave. It was featured in the Dallas Museum of Art's landmark traveling exhibition "Black Art, Ancestral Legacy" in 1990-91.

The exhibition is supported in part by a grant from the Kentucky Arts Council, a state agency of the Education, Arts and Humanities Cabinet.

The public is invited to attend a combined opening reception and potluck supper at 6 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 1, at Kentucky Folk Art Center, located at 102 West First Street in Morehead.

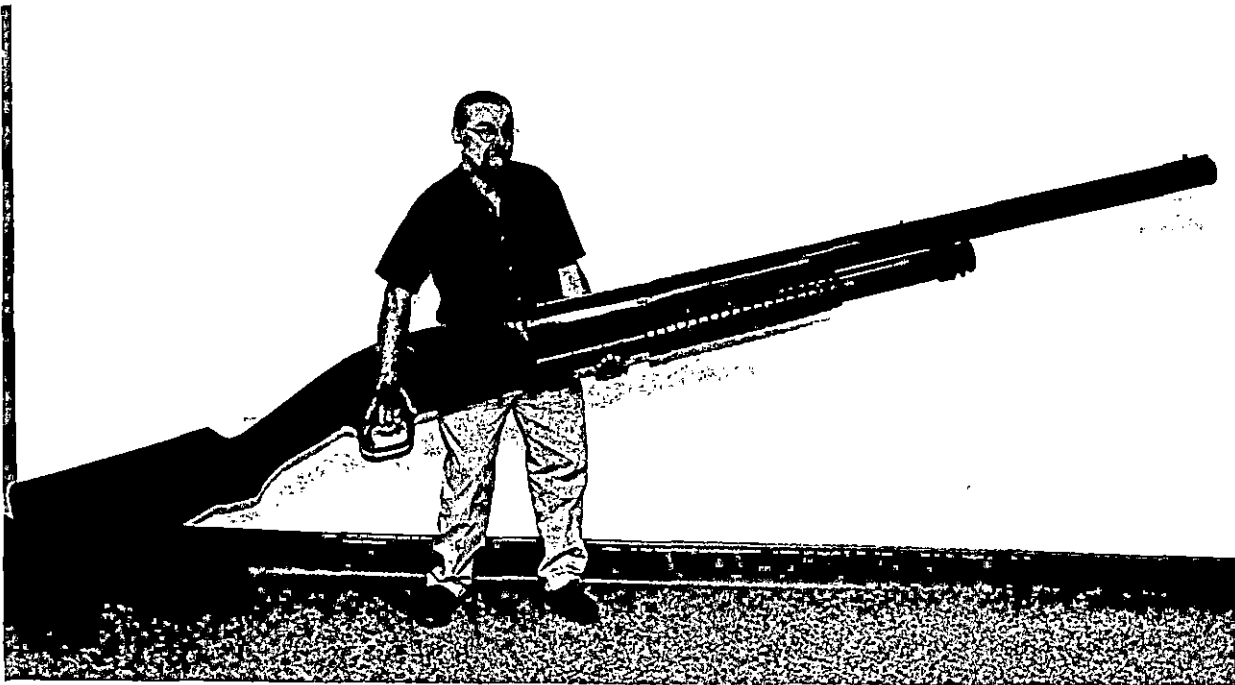
## THE BIG GUN COMES TO MSU

MOREHEAD, Ky.---There is another award winner in the community of Morehead State University. The Kentucky Communication Association has named Dr. Bob Frank, assistant professor of speech communications, its communications teacher of the year.

Before coming to the University three years ago, Dr. Frank had taught at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh for three years and 18 years in a high school setting. At MSU, he primarily teaches in the areas of intercultural and rhetorical studies.

Dr. Frank earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Richmond, his master's degree from Wake Forest University and his doctoral degree from the University of Georgia. His background is in German public address and rhetoric.

In addition to teaching speech classes, he is active in the MSU Leadership Program and is working on establishing a global studies certificate that "would give (the students) proof that they have taken coursework that gives them a broader perspective on the world."

Students who receive the certificate would have taken two interdisciplinary courses, nine global perspective courses, studied a foreign language and/or studied abroad. "It gives them the understanding that we are not isolated in our own little country and that we are part of a much bigger society," Dr. Frank said.

The professor was not the only MSU award winner at the KCA conference. MSU graduate Jason Myers was recognized for presenting the outstanding student paper of the year.

The Kentucky Broadcasters Association was so impressed with the voice and its owner that they presented her a 1999 KBA scholarship. She will receive the award when KBA holds its annual meeting on Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 6-7, in Lexington.

According to KBA guidelines, the scholarship is given each year to two Kentucky students who have a grade point average of 3.0 or higher and remain in a broadcasting/telecommunications major. The student must demonstrate a continuing desire to pursue a career in broadcasting.

Woell has been involved in the business of broadcasting during her college days. She has worked on campus at NewsCenter, a student-produced news program; for the KET/Star Channel; served as an intern for WDKY TV in Lexington; and is currently working at WMKY, MSU's radio to the mountains.

"I am negotiating with the High Plains Newservice from Montana to sell a radio feature which aired on WMKY," Woell said. "This news service feeds news all across the western United States."

The journey from her native country to MSU included a stop in Africa where her father was working. "I first learned to speak English while going to school in Africa," Woell said. "I was in fourth grade and had an American teacher from Georgia, needless to say, when I returned to Germany a year later, I could speak English but I had a southern accent."

After the year in Africa, Woell was convinced that she wanted to study in the U.S, and in 1992, she came to America as a foreign exchange student. In her first opportunity to experience life in an American family, she stayed with Jack and Connie Barker of Morehead and completed her junior year at Rowan County Senior High School.

Woell then returned to Germany where she graduated from high school. But she had remained in contact with the Barkers and through that connection, she was invited to live with her former host family while attending MSU.

"They are like my real family. I help the two children, Jordan and Rebecca, with activities. I pick them up or drop them off whenever needed," she said. "It's the same as I would do for my family in Germany."

Education would be terribly expensive without the help of the Barkers, who provide housing and meals, Woell noted. "International students are not eligible for student loans or grants and tuition is the same as for out-of-state students.

"Even with scholarships and help from my parents, I work two jobs to pay for tuition," she said. "I bought a car the first year I was here to save Jack and Connie from taking me everywhere."

Woell said the KBA scholarship will help with her final year of studies at MSU. After graduation in May 2000, she hopes to find a job with a television station..

"My real dream is to be a foreign correspondent for TV news," Woell said. "I love to travel. I don't have any plans to live in Germany after graduation, but traveling the world would be great."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Statistics show that the use of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs by 12-to-17 year-olds is increasing in the state of Kentucky, but the Rowan County Youth Alcohol Prevention hopes to reduce the use of these substances by replicating an existing program.

Project Northland, a drug and alcohol prevention program, originated in Minnesota in 1991 with 2,400 students enrolled. By the end of their eighth-grade year, student use of alcohol and tobacco was down 27 percent among those in the intervention group, according to Project Northland's fact sheet.

Working together, the Kentucky Governor's Youth Substance Abuse Prevention Initiative (also known as the Kentucky Incentive Prevention Project or KIP) and Project Northland aim to significantly reduce alcohol, tobacco and drug use by that age group. Project Northland's curricula targets sixth, seventh and eighth graders, said Elizabeth Whitt, director of the project.

The federal government awarded Kentucky \$9 million for KIP, and Rowan County was among the 20 to receive KIP funds. The county also received \$88,000 from the state for Project Northland. "That would not have been possible, however, without the Gateway Prevention Coalition, Champions for a Drug-free Kentucky community group, which is the local sponsor of RCYAP," said Dr. Stuart Scharf, head researcher for RCYAP and an assistant professor of social work at Morehead State University.

The partnership between the KIP Project and the Gateway Prevention Coalition began earlier this year when Roger Holbrook, a representative from the GPC, asked MSU to serve as the fiscal agent for the project and for professors to serve as research partners. Dr. David Rudy, former chair of the Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology, then asked Dr. Scharf and Dr. Bill Martin, also an assistant professor of social work, to serve as researchers for the project.

"The professors' research will not focus on assessing the program's success or failure, because Minnesota already has proven the program's worth and the federal government promotes it," Dr. Scharf said. Rather, they will survey the locally participating students to find out if "there is a change in [the students'] knowledge base" or if "there is a change in their attitude [towards alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs]."

Additionally, “we felt that as social workers, we’d like to explore parental involvement,” Dr. Scharf added. In the coming months, the professors may conduct telephone interviews with parents to talk about alcohol and drug issues.

In this first school year with RCYAP, approximately 250 sixth-grade students will be involved, said Debra Boggs, a program specialist for RCYAP who will deliver the curricula to the students. She will meet with the students once a week for five weeks.

Next year, the program will include sixth and seventh graders, and the following year, the program will add eighth graders. The program also will include parents in the education process.

“Throughout the year, we will do family fun nights to show parents and students alternative ways (to have fun),” Whitt said.

The first three years of the program will be funded by federal money awarded to KIP. “Part of our responsibility in those three years is to get community agencies interested in the project so that the program may continue after we are gone,” Boggs said.

RCYAP will have to raise money from community agencies to fund subsequent years. “Wide-scale community involvement is important,” Whitt said. “We need community leadership for the project from the people who form public opinion, such as the police chief, the mayor, judges and pastors,” she added.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Burlap to Cashmere will join Blessid Union of Souls for a concert at Morehead State University on Tuesday, Oct. 12.

Burlap to Cashmere, a seven-member band, will perform in the Academic-Athletic Center at 7:30 p.m. The music of the group, which toured with Jars of Clay in late 1998, is described as progressive, a blend of folk and pop.

The Brooklyn, N.Y.-based group's debut pop album, entitled "Anybody Out There?" has songs about love, war, salvation, divorce, humans conflicting against the spiritual world and the death of friends. Their style could be compared to that of songwriters in the 1970s, if they had used flamenco guitars.

PRESTONSBURG, Ky.---Prestonsburg Community College, an institution of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System, and Morehead State University are joining forces to further their campaign for student success.

The two institutions will sign an agreement on Thursday, Oct. 7, to establish a Two Plus Two Program leading to the Associate of Applied Science plus a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree. The signing will be held in Room 102 of the Johnson Administration Building at 3 p.m. on the PCC campus.

The arrangement will fulfill the requirements of the Kentucky Postsecondary Improvement Act of 1997 that mandates a seamless system be established for promoting ease of transfer between Kentucky institutions. This agreement allows PCC students who satisfactorily earn an associate degree in business technology to continue to take courses to earn a bachelor's degree from MSU.

"Working together, we can offer more educational opportunities for students in the Prestonsburg area," said Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin, MSU president. "This agreement will be of mutual benefit to the students of both institutions."

Dr. Charles Stebbins, interim president of PCC, agrees that this will be a win-win situation. "We are pleased to be collaborating with MSU on this 2+2 program that will provide a well coordinated option for students enrolled in our Associate in Applied Science Business Technology Accounting and Management Options. I wish to thank all those at Prestonsburg Community College and Morehead State University who have worked to make this agreement possible."

The administration and faculty in MSU's College of Business are excited about establishing this two-plus-two program, according to Dr. Bob Albert, dean of the college. "We are proud to be a part of this agreement that will bring the educational opportunities to the doorsteps where it would not otherwise be possible," he said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Octubafest 1999 will feature a recital-lecture by Dr. Stacy Baker, assistant professor of tuba and euphonium.

Her performance, "Vocal Technique Performance Challenges for the Tubist with a Soprano Vocal Range," will kick off this year's celebration on Thursday, Oct. 14, at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall. The program will focus on extended vocal techniques such as multi-phonics and speaking through the instrument.

Dr. Baker will cite specific challenges for women tubists with high vocal ranges. She will clarify techniques and offer suggestions and opinions on their merit toward overcoming obstacles in the interest of performing works in the standard tuba repertoire.

She also will deal with issues that surround ideas of gender and the canon of brass performance and pedagogy. In the program, Dr. Baker will perform pieces to demonstrate the use of such techniques beginning with the "Encounter II for Solo Tuba" (1966) by William Kraft.

The lecture and recital will provide a view of the evolution of the use of vocal techniques within the solo tuba repertoire in addition to exploring the gender issues which may inform future trends in the use of such techniques.

Encounter II will be followed by musical representations from several decades. Included will be "Two Poems" (1975) by Marta Ptaszynska, "Aria di Coloratura" (1984) by Istavan Lang, and "Aboriginal Voices for Tuba with Tape" (1994) by Neal Corwell.

Dr. Baker earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in music at the University of Michigan, where she graduated summa cum laude as a James B. Angell Scholar. She received her doctoral degree in performance and literature with highest honors from the University of Illinois.

Before coming to MSU, she performed with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Warren Symphony, the Allen Park Symphony, the Illinois Symphony, the Warren Symphony, and the Danville Symphony. She is a tubist with Monarch Brass, has appeared as featured soloist at the 1999 Southeast Regional Tuba/Euphonium Conference, the 1998 International Tuba/Euphonium Conference in Minneapolis and the 1997 International Women's Brass Conference in St. Louis.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A shortage of minority teachers in the state is still a cause for concern for one group that has been assisting in this endeavor for 11 years.

The Minority Teacher Education Program, established in 1988, began as an agreement between Morehead State University, Jefferson and Fayette county school districts and the Council on Higher Education, the forerunner of the Council on Postsecondary Education. In 1992, the Kentucky Department of Education joined the liaison.

MTEP is in place to "recruit, retain and graduate minority students in the teacher education program to increase the number of minority teachers in Kentucky," said Ernestine M. Winfield, MTEP coordinator at MSU. "There is a dire shortage of minority teachers in Kentucky."

Currently there are approximately 65 students in the University's MTEP program who were recruited during middle and high school. Before enrolling at MSU, the students came to the university each summer for a special program and were invited to visit the campus at various times during the school year.

After enrolling at MSU, students who are education majors are recruited for the program if they have a 2.5 high school grade point average, Winfield said.

If a student should change their major, "we don't just drop them, we keep them" in the program, Winfield added. She continues to work with the students to ensure they graduate on time. "Many of the MTEP students who do not receive a degree in education are still employed by the school systems in some capacity," she said.

Once admitted to MTEP, students have an opportunity to apply for scholarships through the program. At the start of this school year, there was \$105,000 to be awarded during both terms.

As part of the program, Winfield and student peer counselors monitor the students' academic progress and assists them with other needs, Winfield said. LaRaissa Davis, a Radcliff sophomore and a peer counselor, meets with each student twice in the first half of the semester to assess how they are doing financially, in school and otherwise.

Davis, who has a scholarship through MTEP, hopes to teach in her home county after she graduates. She plans to one day become a superintendent.

Winfield also meets periodically with the MTEP students to provide help as needed, to administer a college student inventory and then review the results.

Sometimes younger students' problems are solved simply by sending them to the health clinic for medicine for a cold, Winfield said. Other times, students need help preparing for the Praxis or other tests. Winfield uses a program called Learning Plus to help students study for tests.

Winfield likes to remain in close contact with the students. She teaches an MSU 101 class designated for MTEP members only. "We're here for the students," she said. "If they have a problem, my door is always open."

After the MTEP members graduate, they are normally successful in finding a job. "Of our graduates, I'd say 97 percent of them have been employed and 90 percent of them are employed in education."

Three MTEP students graduated in May. They are Anthony Gibbs of **Louisville**, a secondary education/social studies major, Donetta Groves of **Louisville**, a secondary education/special education major, and Zenaida Smith of **Worthington**, a secondary education/Spanish major.

Six MTEP students are completing degree requirements and may graduate in December. They are Shannon Gathwright of **Prospect**, an elementary education major; Shamenda Harper of **Louisville**, a learning and behavior disorder/P-12 major; Tonya Williams of **Louisville**, an elementary education major; Paul White of **Louisville**, a physical education/K-12 major; Edith Ballesteros of **Mt. Sterling**, an elementary and secondary education/Spanish/P-5 major; and Steve Nolden of **Vine Grove**, a middle school/5-8-English and social science major.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---In a world dominated by computers, there is an increasing need for those who know how to think logically.

Luckily, there are places to learn the skills to be able to do just that. Morehead State University is one of those places.

At MSU, students may graduate with an area of concentration in mathematics and computing. "An area of concentration takes the place of both a major and a minor," said Dr. Rodger Hammons, chair of the Department of Mathematical Sciences. The area of concentration "requires well over 60 hours of coursework" with more than 30 of those hours in mathematics, he said.

In combination with the mathematics courses, students may take classes in programming, database management, database communications and physics/electronics.

Normally, students in the area of concentration are interested in mathematics, science, engineering and computers and this offering blends all of those areas.

While MSU does not offer a computer science degree, this program may serve its graduates better because of the strong background in mathematics.

"You need very good logic skills and problem solving skills (to work in the technology industry) and what better place to get that than mathematics," Dr. Hammons said. "The logic of mathematics is imbedded in computers." Because of this, graduates may branch out into different directions, so they are more marketable in their job search, he noted.

"We've had good luck with graduates in this program," Dr. Hammons said. "They've had little trouble getting good jobs."

MSU mathematics and computing graduates have landed jobs at companies such as Lexmark, BellSouth, AT&T, Ashland Oil and Humana. Currently, Joe Gilman, a 1974 graduate who received a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics, is the senior vice president of business operations at BellSouth.

Gilman said his mathematics background has helped him throughout his career because it enabled him to think logically. “The ability to think through problems is the most critical element to professional success,” he said.

His 25-year association with BellSouth began three weeks after Gilman graduated from MSU. His first job was as an assistant manager of traffic engineering where he monitored the “way in which calls weave through the network.”

To help improve his skills, BellSouth sent Gilman to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to pursue a master’s degree in the management of technology that combines a master’s degree in business administration with technology.

After completing the master’s degree, Gilman worked as a project manager to implement new services in Australia and Belgium and in business development in Asia. Two-and-one-half years ago, he started work in BellSouth’s long distance division as the senior vice president.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University will be the site for four evenings of satellite seminars beginning later this month.

The programs will be presented live by the University Satellite Seminar Series in association with The Museum of Television and Radio. Each of the sessions will feature writers, directors, producers and actors from television.

The seminars, which are free and open to the public, may be viewed in 225 Rader Hall on the campus. Each program will run for 90 minutes and will include clips from the museum's collection. A question-and-answer session will allow viewers to speak to the panelists via telephone.

On Tuesday, Oct. 19, the seminar, "Video Activism: Television for Social Change," will explore the history of activist video and discuss clips that provide strong and, often controversial, points of view. The panelists will discuss how they created radical television with lightweight and inexpensive equipment.

Panelists will be John Alpert, co-director of the Downtown Community Television Center and producer at HBO; Skip Blumberg, former member of Top Value Television (TVTV) and producer at Cultural Documentaries and Performance Television; Dee Dee Halleck, founder of Paper Tiger Television and professor of communications at the University of California at San Diego; Michael Moore of The Awful Truth and TV Nation; George Stoney, The Paulette Goddard Professor in Film, Tisch School of the Arts, New York University; and Sara Stuart, president of Communication for Change.

"Reporting the Cold War: Dispatches from Washington to Moscow" will be presented on Tuesday, Nov. 9. It will examine 40 years of Cold War media coverage from the perspective of American and Russian journalists and correspondents. Discussion topics will include the drawing of the Iron Curtain, Sputnik, the Cuban Missile Crisis and the collapse of the Soviet Union.

The panelists will include Sergei Khrushchev, senior fellow at the Thomas J. Watson Institute for International Studies at Brown University; Vladimir Pozner, journalist; and Morley Safer, correspondent for CBS News and "60 Minutes."

The third seminar on Wednesday, Nov. 10, will be "The Fifties and Sixties in America: The Culture of the Cold War." This session will look at the influence of the Cold War on American public affairs and entertainment programming of the 1950s and 1960s. Discussions will include the blacklist, anti-Communist propaganda and the proliferation of spy shows.

The panelists will include Walter Bernstein, writer for "You are There" and author of "Inside Out: A Blacklist Memoir" and William F. Buckley, journalist and host of "Firing Line."

Completing the series on Monday, Nov. 15, will be "Writing for Teen on Television," which will be presented in cooperation with the Writers Guild of America, west. The session will explore a new generation of writers who identify and explore issues relevant to young people. The panelists will discuss the challenges of providing an accurate voice for the American teenager.

The panelists will be Winnie Holzman, "My So-Called Life," Peggy Nicoll, "Daria," Vida Spears, "Moesha," and Joss Whedon, "Buffy the Vampire Slayer."

PROVIDING PUBLIC AWARENESS: A Picture Story:

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Acts of domestic violence occur every 12 seconds in the United States. More than six million American women are beaten each year by their husbands or boyfriends and more than 4,000 of them die. The victims are your friends and neighbors.

The Rowan County Domestic Violence Council, Inc., and Morehead State University have joined together in an effort to provide public awareness on an issue that affects individuals of all ages and from all walks of life.

Statistics show that children who witness family violence may suffer emotional trauma and become abusers themselves later in life. One in four females who commit suicides were victims of abuse. In Rowan County, there were nearly 100 Emergency Protective Orders (EPO) filed last year.

To educate and assist students with research projects related to the issue of domestic violence, the Council has contributed 13 books to MSU's Camden-Carroll Library. Among the donated works are: "Rural Women Battering and the Justice System," "Getting Away With Murder," "Every Eighteen Seconds," "The Battered Woman's Survival Guide," "Emotional Abuse," "Keeping the Faith," "Men Who Batter," "In Love and Danger," "Violence in Gay and Lesbian Relationships," "Surviving," "New Beginnings," "Understanding Family Violence" and "Children and Trauma."

Similar books also have been donated to the Rowan County Public Library, according to Lynn Geurin, a mental health therapist at Pathways. "We are utilizing every means to increase the awareness of domestic violence," she said. "Our goal is to provide assistance to victims as well as the necessary emotional support that will allow them to lead productive lives."

Gary Adkins, assistant Commonwealth attorney, noted that even though teachers now report child abuse, there are still a number of children who never receive the help they need. "Assistance will be available only if information is distributed," he said. "It needs to be understood that domestic violence is not a normal thing."

More than 400 books on various aspects of domestic violence are currently available in the CCL library, according to Tom Kmetz, library liaison to MSU's Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology. (MORE)



In making the book presentation, the Council and MSU held a press conference on the campus. Katherine Bustos, chair of the Rowan County Domestic Violence Council, and Donna Overbee, director of the D.O.V.E.S. Spouse Abuse Shelter, joined Geurin and Adkins to discuss the importance of public awareness for domestic violence. MSU First Lady Bonnie Eaglin offered welcoming remarks on behalf of the University and Miranda Collins, a former victim of domestic violence, addressed the crowd with the story of her survival.

After the program, a 15-minute documentary that highlighted the plight of some local victims was shown. The work is titled "Black and Blue."

The Rowan County Domestic Violence Council is a multi-agency group, composed of representatives from Christian Social Services, the Commonwealth Attorney's office, D.O.V.E.S., Domestic Violence Victims/Survivors, the Kentucky State Police, the Morehead Police, MSU's Office of Public Safety, Northeast Kentucky Legal Services, Pathways, Inc., P.A.V.E., Probation and Parole, the Rowan County Attorney, Rowan County Community Based Services, the Rowan County High School Youth Service Center, the Rowan County Sheriff and St. Claire Medical Center.

The public awareness campaign was held in conjunction with Domestic Violence Awareness Month, which is observed nationally in October.

Cutlines:

1.--The Rowan County Domestic Violence Council recently donated books on domestic violence to MSU's Camden-Carroll Library. At the press conference, Katherine Bustos, left, a victim advocate and chair of RCDVC, talked with Pamela Fultz, a deputy sheriff with the domestic violence unit, and Diana Antuna, an attorney at Northeast Kentucky Legal Services and a RCDVC member. "It is hoped that by informing the public, it will mean one less victim, one less crime," she said.

2.--Domestic violence victim and survivor Miranda Collins, an MSU alumnus, addressed the audience about her experiences as Donna Overbee, left, director of D.O.V.E.S. spouse abuse shelter, and Gary Adkins, assistant Commonwealth attorney, listened. "It is important to get an education, because an education is one thing that cannot be taken from you," Collins told the audience.

3.--Before the program, Lynn Geurin, a mental health and domestic violence therapist at Pathways, talked with Gary Adkins, assistant Commonwealth attorney, and Bonnie Eaglin, MSU first lady.

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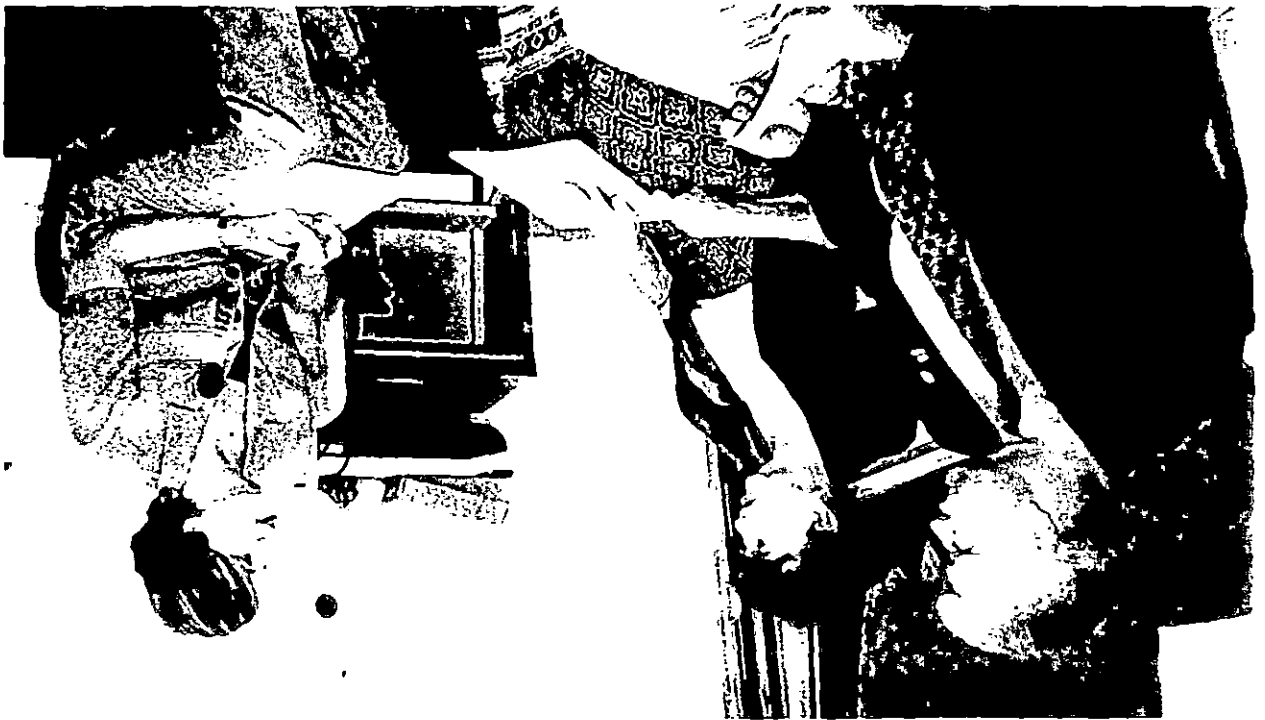

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Students at Morehead State University have made helping those in need a little easier for the Christian Social Services Center.

The students in an introductory nutrition class, taught by Dr. Brenda Malinauskas-Overton, assistant professor of nutrition/dietetics, collected the materials and donated 73 packages of food to CSSC.

"They (the students) wanted to do something that would actually give back to the community," she said. "We needed to do something nutrition-related."

Each package contained recipes and the corresponding non-perishable items for an easy-to-prepare meal. Additionally, the students provided other food items and toiletries to help families in need.

"Some packages had items for one meal while others had enough food for more than one meal, said Paul Semisch, a case manager at CSSC.

According to the staff, CSSC's food pantry is low right now, except for canned vegetables. "We have an overabundance of canned vegetables," Semisch said.

The students' donation will enable CSSC to assist more families. "We usually give between 35 and 40 food boxes per month," Semisch said. Each box contains a seven-day supply of food.

The food pantry at CSSC is in need of items that can become easy meals such as canned fruit, canned tuna and chicken, canned soups and stew, macaroni and cheese, and rice and pasta dishes.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin has announced that WMKY Radio will now broadcast 24 hours daily.

The announcement came during the station's fall fund raising drive which continues through Sunday, Oct. 17. As of Tuesday, WMKY reached the halfway point of its \$20,000 goal.

"We are proud that the University can expand its public service to our region by extending WMKY's broadcast day," said Dr. Eaglin. "WMKY helps us fulfill our mission of education and cultural enhancement. The extension of our broadcast day will be an added plus for public radio listeners," he added.

WMKY, 90.3 FM with translator 88.3 in Inez, will offer classical music between the hours of midnight and 5 a.m. each day. The program will originate with Minnesota Public Radio, the leading producer of classical radio programs for public radio, which has a library of more than 30,000 classical compact discs.

Approaching its 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary next year, WMKY started broadcasting on June 15, 1965, for four hours daily as a 10 watt station. On April 4, 1970, WMKY began operating at 50 kilowatts and increased the broadcast day to 12 hours. The broadcast day was expanded to 18 hours daily in 1972 and to 19 hours in 1998.

When National Public Radio launched "All Things Considered" in 1971, WMKY was among the first stations to air the news program. Other milestones in the station's history include going stereo in 1972, satellite reception of NPR programs in 1980 and moving to its current quarters on Henry Ward Place that same year. In 1985 and 1996, WMKY purchased auxiliary generators which enable the station to continue operations in the event of a power outage or other emergency.

WMKY's future plans include making its signal accessible to more of East Kentucky, according to Keith Kappes, MSU's vice president for university relations. "We are searching for other sites where we can locate repeater transmitters or translators. Our Martin County translator went on the air last summer, but may be relocated to improve the signal quality in Inez."

When the \$14 million Breckinridge Hall renovation project is completed, WMKY will be housed in the new facility and plans are to create a state-of-the-art digital broadcast station.

Both Dr. Eaglin and Kappes noted that one of the most important aspects of WMKY is that it still is a laboratory where students learn the basics of broadcasting. This fall more than 20 students are employed or volunteer at the station and over the past 35 years, dozens of awards have been won by students working in the areas of news, sports and cultural programming.

The administration and faculty in MSU's College of Business are excited about establishing this two-plus-two program, according to Dr. Bob Albert, dean of the college. The two institutions will work together in designing a course schedule to enable students to complete the degree program within a reasonable time period. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Kentucky Folk Art Center was the birthplace of two art exhibitions that are currently touring the region.

"African-American Folk Art in Kentucky" and "Kentucky Quilts: Roots and Wings" will be on tour until February 2001 and Oct. 31, 2000, respectively. Adrian Swain, KFAC curator, was responsible for the creation of both exhibits which were first shown at KFAC.

The African-American exhibit "provides the first, focused examination of work by self-taught African-American artists who were born and raised in Kentucky, or who have spent the major part of their lives here," Swain said. The exhibit was developed with support from The Elizabeth Firestone Graham Foundation, the "Lexington Herald-Leader," Kentucky Humanities Council and Kentucky Arts Council.

The artists have varied backgrounds—everything from a sharecropper to a professional basketball player. Their media include wood, paper and plastic garbage bags.

The exhibit will be displayed at the Kentucky Art and Craft Foundation in Louisville through Oct. 30. From Jan. 2 until Feb. 28, it will be at the Mennello Museum of American Folk Art in Orlando, Fla., and from June 1 until Aug. 15, at the Weston Gallery of the Cincinnati Arts Association.

From mid-August to mid-October, 2000, the exhibit will be in Memphis, Tenn., at the University of Memphis Museum of Art before moving to its last stop, at the Kentucky Museum at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green for display in January 2001.

Swain began the quilt exhibit after he was approached by many people with questions about Kentucky quilts. Shelly Zegart, the co-founder of The Kentucky Quilt Project, was the curator. More than 200,000 quilts were documented for the exhibit.

"Kentucky Quilts: Roots and Wings" is currently on display at the Water Tower Gallery at the Louisville Visual Arts Association. The exhibit will move to Eastern Kentucky University for display from Jan. 24 until Feb. 15, then to Springfield Museum of Art in Springfield, Ohio, from Aug. 15-Oct. 31, 2000.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---President Emeritus Adron Doran returned to Morehead State University on Friday (Oct. 15) to be honored for his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday and left the campus with a permanent birthday present.

It was announced that \$265,000 had been given or pledged to be matched by the same amount of state funds to establish the Adron Doran Endowment for Educational Leadership. This is MSU's first endowment fund created under the state's matching funds program through the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin said a public campaign would be initiated to raise the endowment from \$530,000 to \$1 million.

The endowment will be used to support activities in the University's College of Education and Behavioral Sciences to prepare educational leaders of tomorrow. The money will sponsor professorships, lectureships and seminars.

Known for his trademark bow ties, Dr. Doran greeted nearly 400 friends and colleagues, many who traveled from across the country for "The Tie That Binds" celebration. The program included remarks by several alumni, including Virginia "Ginni" Fox (1961), CEO of Kentucky Educational Television; W. Terry McBrayer (1959), an attorney; and Lisa M. Palas (1972), an actress, singer and professional songwriter each of whom spoke with admiration for Dr. Doran's influence on their educational and personal development.

His wife, Mignon, expressed her thoughts on his accomplishments and their 68 years of marriage. She concluded with a verse she had written especially for the occasion.

Presiding at the luncheon, Dr. Eaglin described Dr. Doran as the one individual who had the most impact on the institution over its 112 years of existence. "He is 90 years young and I believe that qualifies him as a living legend."

In his nearly 30-minute response, Dr. Doran expressed his gratitude for the overwhelming display of affection in remarks that brought both tears and laughter from the audience. He described the initial amount of the endowment as "the most astonishing, astounding and moving thing."

Whether in education, politics or religion, Dr. Doran is a recognized leader not only in Kentucky but throughout the nation. He has been a teacher and principal in the public schools, speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives, and president of the Kentucky Education Association.

With his wife by his side, Dr. Doran served MSU for more than two decades, from April 1954 until December 1976. Under their leadership, MSU experienced its most rapid growth- in student population and campus construction. The couple now resides in Lexington.

A minister of the Church of Christ since 1928, Dr. Doran devotes much of his time to research, writing and lecturing on the history of the American Restoration Movement.

The celebration, originally scheduled for Dr. Doran's Sept. 1 birthday, was rescheduled when the former president needed time to recover from surgery following an accident.
