MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. John C. Philley, a Morehead State University professor of geoscience, has been elected president of the National Association of State Boards of Geology (ASBOG).

Currently serving as president-elect, he will begin his term in 2000. Previously, he served the group as secretary in 1997 and treasurer in 1998.

ASBOG is composed of representatives from 26 states that have enacted laws for the registration and licensing of professional geologists. Among its primary functions are to provide and update the licensing examinations.

In addition to his duties with ASBOG, Dr. Philley serves as chair of the Kentucky Board for the Registration of Professional Geologists. Appointed by the governor, he has been serving on this board since its inception in 1992.

Dr. Philley, who is a certified professional geologist, was elected at ASBOG's annual meeting held in San Francisco, Oct. 11-17. Since coming to MSU in 1960, he has served in a number of leadership roles including executive vice president for academic affairs and dean of MSU's former College of Arts and Sciences.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---There is no need to look any farther than the campus of Morehead State University to find the identity of the American artist.

On Wednesday, Nov. 3, MSU's Department of Art will open a new exhibit entitled, "The Great Wall of the MSU Art Department," in the Strider Gallery, Claypool-Young Art Building. A reception will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. in the gallery later that day.

The exhibit, which runs through Dec. 3, is sponsored by the department's "Art of the United States" art history class under the direction of Dr. Joy Gritton, assistant professor of art. It was designed to help students explore their history and what that means in terms of the art they create.

Each of Dr. Gritton's students was responsible for the development of a portion of the wall, which reflects that student's own heritage and who they are as an American artist. To discover their histories, the students interviewed family members to compile an oral history.

Students learned names of family members, countries of origin and migration, and the cultural and work traditions of their families," Dr. Gritton said. "They also researched the culture, economy and politics of their home communities."

Armed with this information, the students wrote a paper that included their own experiences. The next step of the project was the production of their portion of the wall.

"Together, their wall speaks to the diversity of Morehead State University's art students," Dr. Gritton said.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.---To further their educational experience, Morehead State University students may choose to study abroad during the summer.

The Kentucky Institute for International Studies is offering 15 summer study abroad programs for 2000. "Studying abroad gives students a look at different cultures from the inside," said Mary Jo Netherton, an associate professor of French.

New on the summer listing is a program in Costa Rica which will be directed by two MSU professors, Dr. Dean Owen, professor of education, and Dr. Victor Ballestero, assistant professor of educational administration. This program will feature advanced and graduate education courses.

A new program in Bregenz, Austria, also will offer graduate education courses, which focus on special problems in environmental education.

The remaining new summer abroad programs will be offered in Brazil and Japan. The courses in Brazil will focus on anthropology, geography, and conservation, while those in Japan will focus on the country's language, art and culture.

Dr. Vincente Cano, professor of romance languages, will direct the Spain for Teachers program, which will be in its third year during summer 2000. Additionally, Dr. John Secor, associate professor of romance languages, and Dr. Sylvia Henneberg, assistant professor of English, will teach a summer program in France which will be directed by Netherton.

Dr. Secor will teach an intermediate-level, conversational French course and an honors course in the humanities. Dr. Henneberg will teach an introductory French culture course and a 300-level literature course on ex-patriate British and American writers.

"For language students, studying abroad gives them an opportunity to speak with natives in the native country," Netherton said. "In the United States, students are able to speak with people in their native tongue, but the students have an advantage because they are in their own element."

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Studying the language abroad is “within the cultural context so its more meaningful and more challenging,” she said.

In general, studying abroad “gives students confidence and independence” because they are in a country without friends or family members on whom to lean. “Part of their learning experience is developing relationships with the people in the community (abroad),” Netherton said.

KIIS also has study sites in Salzburg, Austria; China; Athens; Rome; Germany; Italy; Mexico; and Spain.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Advance registration for the Spring 2000 semester at Morehead State University may now be completed electronically by current students.

When the University begins the pre-registration process on Monday, Nov. 8, students may process a schedule of classes at their convenience from their personal computer in a residence hall or at home, or in the on-campus computer labs, according to Loretta Lykins, MSU registrar.

The new online registration option was added to the MSU Web site this fall to expedite the process for students. Before beginning the process, students must have their schedule approved by their adviser and have an MSU PIN number. Undergraduate students will need to have an official checksheet on file in the registrar's office. The electronic service will be available 24 hours each day.

Students who are currently enrolled also may register through their academic departments. They must have a schedule of classes approved by their adviser, to be dropped off in their academic department. The hours of operation are 8 a.m. until 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

All graduate students and current seniors and juniors may complete the registration process on Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 8 and 9. All classifications may register Wednesday through Friday, Nov. 10-12.

Students may register through the Web site, Nov. 13-Dec. 17, for any classes that have not been filled.

David Collins, an assistant professor of communications, was presented the J.T. Whitlock Life Member Award in ceremonies during KBA's fall meeting. Whitlock, of Lebanon, was the executive director of KBA for 25 years.

Whitlock retired from the organization approximately five years ago, according to Gary White, executive director of KBA. The award named in his honor is "presented to KBA members who are retiring or leaving the broadcast profession permanently and who have earned perpetual membership as a result of their contributions to the association."

After graduating from Huntington East High School in the early 1950s, Collins began his career in broadcast as a disc jockey, staff announcer and news announcer at several radio and television stations in Huntington, W.Va. For 11 years beginning in 1966, he was the director of information for the West Virginia Department of Agriculture, the assistant editor of "Inco News" at Huntington Alloys and the assistant director of publications at Marshall University.

In 1977, Collins returned to television to host a live morning show on WSAZ Television, the NBC affiliate in Huntington. He also was the weather reporter, sports reporter and a staff announcer.

Collins was the recipient of the 1978 West Virginia Broadcasting Award and the 1979 International Broadcast Award, both from the Soil Conservation Society of America.

He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in communications as well as completed 18 post-master's credits from Marshall University and an additional 30 hours of doctoral hours in mass communications/speech from The Pennsylvania State University.

Collins came to MSU as an assistant professor of radio-television in 1981. Ten of his years at the University were spent as the adviser to NewsCenter 12, an on-campus internship for communications students.

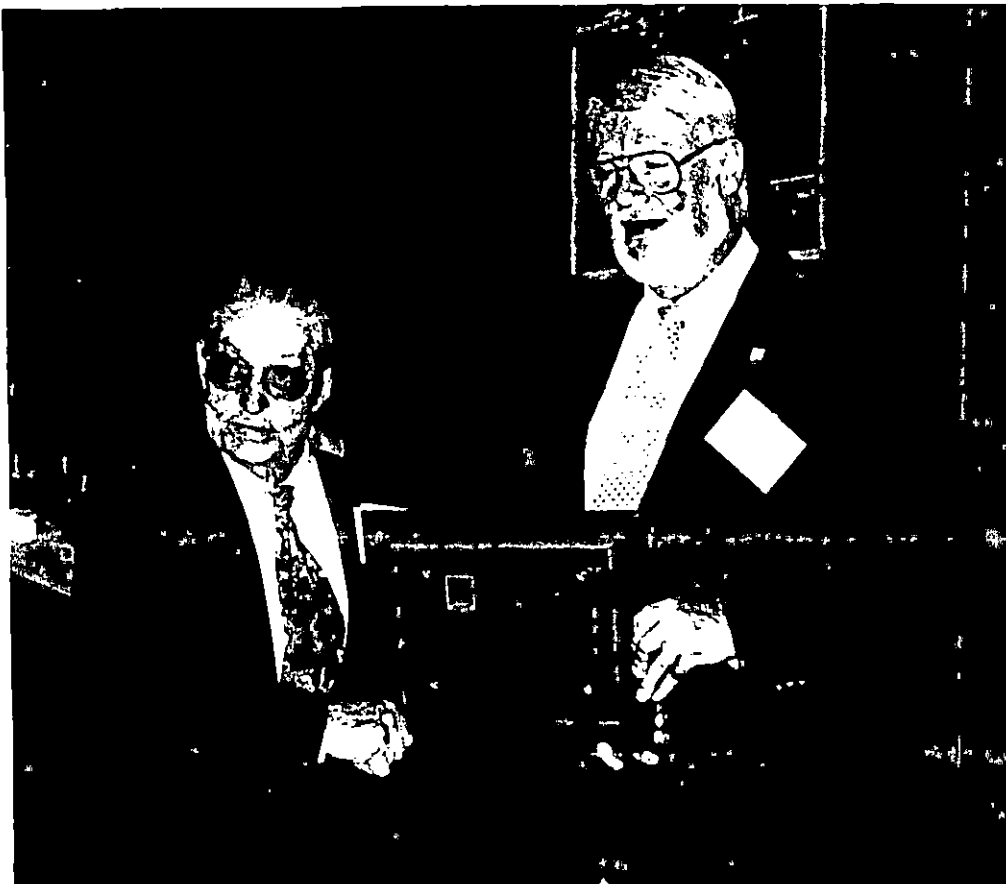

MOREHEAD, Ky.---When she made the career commitment to come to Morehead State University in 1986, Dr. Lynne Fitzgerald was interested in contributing to a positive experience for all who decide to affiliate with the institution.

Dr. Fitzgerald, a professor in the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, will now take that involvement one step further by serving as the faculty member on MSU's Board of Regents. She was elected in June and will serve a three-year term, ending July 1, 2002.

"I want the messages that people give and receive about the institution to be reflective of a shared vision among all who are responsible for shaping, implementing and assessing the University experience," she said.

As the faculty regent, she believes that her goal is to hear the individual and collective voice(s) of the faculty: their hopes, concerns, visions and ideas. "In other words, I want to get us on the playing field in time to make a difference in the outcome of 'the game'.

"My assumption here is linked to the idea that participation in the decision-making process about faculty and academic issues will have a positive impact on increasing the sense of shared responsibility for these aspects of the institution," Dr. Fitzgerald added.

A native of Vestal, N.Y., she earned the B.S. degree in physical education and the M.Ed. degree in health and physical education from East Stroudsburg (Pa.) State College and the Ed.D. degree in dance from Temple University in Philadelphia.

Before coming to MSU, Dr. Fitzgerald was a facilities coordinator and part-time faculty member at Temple. She also taught in the Gloucester (Mass.) Public School System as a physical education instructor and coach.

Morehead State University and hundreds of other colleges and universities are participating in the first-ever National College Week, Nov. 15-19, to send home the message that, with sufficient academic preparation and sound financial planning, Americans can realize their dreams of a college education.

As Kentuckians, we should be proud that our state has become a national leader in improving the quality, affordability and accessibility of postsecondary education through the bold and courageous reform effort led by Gov. Paul Patton. Our governor told us in his first inaugural address that history would brand him as the Commonwealth's "higher education governor" and he already has created that legacy with another term still to serve.

And we owe another debt of gratitude to those visionary men and women in the General Assembly who last year established lottery-funded, academically-based scholarships to reinforce the state's commitment to helping families meet the costs of college.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Many people travel from their hometowns to improve their education; some travel much farther to improve their knowledge of the English language.

At Morehead State University, there are students who have traveled from nearby Carter County, but there also are students who have come from as far away as Asia and South America. These students may be found at MSU's English Language Center where they are learning to adjust to their new environment.

International students' presence at MSU is not only a good way for them to improve their English language skills and study towards a degree, but it is also good for American students.

"Our planet has become a global village," said Dr. Yushin Yoo, director of the center. "MSU students need to acquire the knowledge, skills and attitude that will equip them for living in a global environment.

"By increasing the diversity of MSU's student body through worldwide recruitment, the English Language Center helps provide the campus and the community with a greater understanding of cultural diversity," Dr. Yoo said.

The center, which began operation during the summer, now has 40 students, an increase of 26 students from the first class. Dr. Yoo wants to increase the center's enrollment by 20 students each semester until the total reaches 100.

To ensure that the center increases its number of students, Dr. Yoo hopes will travel overseas on recruiting trips throughout the year.

The program is totally self-supported through students' tuition to the center. The students pay tuition to both the University and ELC.

To be admitted to the center, students must take the Michigan Assessment Test, write an essay and complete the interview process. After Dr. Yoo and the ELC staff assess the students' language ability, they are placed in the appropriate language class.

There are six different levels of language classes with one being the most basic. After each of the eight-week class sessions, the students are re-evaluated and may move up to a different level.

At level five, the students may take one University course for credit in addition to their language class. This is “so they can have a smooth transition” when they begin to take all University classes, Dr. Yoo said. Currently, about 10 of the center’s students are taking both language courses and credit classes.

In addition to teaching the students language skills, the staff at the center also assists them in adjusting to the American way of life, according to Becky Bailey, an instructor at the center. The staff helps get the students “settled in their dorms” and helps them get used to having an American roommate.

However, not all of the international students live in residence halls; some live with families in the Morehead area. “We like to give them various experiences” that all result in the students learning English and the American way of life, Dr. Yoo said.

The students who choose to stay in a home must pay the host family \$400 per month to cover room and board.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has become one of only 20 institutions in the United States, and the only one in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, to offer a Bachelor of Science degree in radiologic sciences.

MSU has offered a two-year associate's degree in radiologic technology since 1973. That option will be part of the radiologic sciences degree package.

The four-year degree, which officially admitted its first students in the fall semester, is unique in the region because it offers a specialty track in advanced imaging of computed tomography or ultrasound for students in their fourth year of study, according to Wretha Goodpaster, assistant professor of radiologic sciences in the Department of Nursing and Allied Health. "This feature will make graduates of the program especially desirable to prospective employers," she predicted.

"Changes in the health care system in this country mean that individuals no longer have the opportunity to cross-train while on the job because of the cost involved," she said. "Our graduates will have the educational preparation in computed tomography, sonography and mammography that Medicare increasingly will require in order for hospitals to be reimbursed."

MSU's program meets all requirements for accreditation by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges, according to Jacklynn Darling, program coordinator. "All of our faculty members hold Master of Arts or Master of Science degrees in radiologic sciences, adult and higher education or vocational education.

We have a combined total of 100 years' experience as professionals and educators in the field and all of us have an advanced certification in at least one of the advanced imaging areas," she noted.

MSU faculty members in radiologic sciences in addition to Goodpaster and Darling include Barbara Dehner, clinical coordinator; Cynthia Gibbs, associate professor; and Marcia Cooper, assistant professor.

Darling reported that the Gateway Regional Health Center and Mary Chiles Hospital in Mt. Sterling have been particularly supportive of MSU's efforts to establish the program. The hospital donated a fully-operational mammography unit for student use in the campus laboratory.

The concept of a bachelor's degree program in radiologic sciences at MSU originated with a survey conducted by the Kentucky Commission for Collaboration in Medical Imaging Science, a joint effort of the University of Louisville, Northern Kentucky University and MSU. The study indicated that 95 percent of the responding hospitals, primary care facilities and health care agencies in those service regions prefer to hire multi-competent radiography and sonography technologists.

Combined with a telephone survey to determine how many medical images are done in East Kentucky yearly, the study helped establish the need for an advanced imaging degree program located within MSU's own service region.

The University will collaborate with other regional associate degree and vocational programs in the field. This will allow graduates of other programs to obtain the degree and an advanced imaging track..

Students are eligible to apply to the program once they have earned 31 hours of credit in approved general education courses, including several prerequisites specific to the radiologic sciences program of study.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---In recent years, employers have had more jobs than there are qualified candidates. This seems to be especially true in technical fields, such as engineering.

Morehead State University helps to fill some of the void with students who participate in its pre-engineering program. This program gives students three different options for their course of study, said Dr. Jack Whidden, chair of the Department of Physical Sciences.

In the first option, which is the Direct Transfer or 2-2 program, students complete two years of coursework at MSU then transfer to an engineering school. Their MSU coursework includes science, mathematics, English and liberal arts courses.

With the Dual Degree, or 3-2 program, students stay at MSU through their junior year before transferring to an engineering school. After completing courses at the engineering school, students transfer that credit back to MSU. With this option, students earn a bachelor's degree in physics, mathematics or university studies from MSU in addition to a bachelor's degree in engineering.

"Two degrees make students much more marketable when the time comes to look for a job," said Dr. Capp Yess, assistant professor of physics.

The general requirements for the 3-2 program have been coordinated with the University of Kentucky as most of MSU's Direct Transfer and Dual Degree students go to the University of Kentucky, said Dr. Brian Raichle, assistant professor of physics. However, students may go to the engineering school of their choice.

Students' third option is to complete a degree in physics with a concentration in engineering physics at MSU, then follow that with a graduate studies in engineering from an engineering school, or they can complete an intensive, one-year bachelor's degree program at a university such as the University of Dayton. This course of study gives students the advantage of learning necessary skills in a small environment before moving into upper-level engineering classes at a large engineering school such as the University of Kentucky or Georgia Tech.

Rather than being taught lower-level courses in large classes taught by graduate assistants, students come to MSU, where the professors “really do get to know (the students),” Dr. Whidden said.

In pre-engineering, the most difficult classes the students have to take are the fundamentals, said Dr. Russell Brengelman, professor of physics. By helping students through the difficult first years, “giving them a solid background,” which includes personal mentoring by professors, the students are successful when they leave MSU, he said.

Additionally, “the Morehead radio telescope is one of the unique things at our school and it appeals to people,” Dr. Yess said. Most students take a class that uses the radio telescope, or they do a project that involves the telescope, he added. The telescope provides the students hands-on application of engineering and general science knowledge.

The department also has established a pre-engineering and physics club that brings students closer together. Through the club and the availability of the telescope, “we’ve seen a lot more group work and cohesion” among the students, Dr. Whidden noted.
