

ALL QUIET IN ROWAN.

Three More Tolliver Men Put Under Arrest,
and Mrs. Martin Treated Likewise.

MOREHEAD, KY., July 6.—To-day was County Court day. There was an unusually large attendance of citizens, who seemed in a thorough good humor, well behaved, and wore a curious, expectant look. This is the first public day since the outbreak of the trouble in Rowan upon which peaceable citizens have felt entirely secure in gathering upon the streets of the county seat. Three more prisoners, T. A. Day, G. P. Day and James Oxley, were brought in to-day by Sheriff McKenzie, under the same warrants under which previous arrests have been made, viz., for the murder of Ben Rayborne. This makes nine prisoners who have been turned over to the militia for safe keeping. Eight of these, R. E. Messer, J. D. Bowling, H. M. Keaton, P. G. Day, T. A. Day, D. B. Day, John M. Trumbo, and James Oxley, are under guard at the court house, the other, the leader, Craig Tolliver, who is still confined by his wounds, is under vigilant guard at the hotel. These parties all court, or pretend to court, an inquiry into their conduct. Attorney General Hardin, who left Saturday, returned on the east-bound train of to-day, and the examination will be taken up on to-morrow morning, July 7.

Mrs. Vina Martin was to-day arrested on a charge of unlawfully selling poisoned food, knowing the same to be such, to Dr. Raine, the proprietor of the Cottage Hotel. The Tolliver faction say the act with which she is charged was an attempt to poison Craig Tolliver—who, as has been said, is in confinement at the Cottage Hotel—out of revenge for the burning of her house and the arrest and imprisonment of her daughters. The Martin faction, on the contrary, say that the accusation is an utterly false one, made for the purpose of turning the tide of public sympathy towards the accusing party, and with the hope of breaking down the testimony of Mrs. Martin, who will be the strongest witness for the Commonwealth in the approaching examination of Tolliver and followers. Mrs. Martin's bail was fixed at \$500, and her examining trial continued until July 8.

The number of militia now here is small for the work required, and the men are much fatigued. Much to their credit, there is small complaint. The militia is clothed with the fullest power compatible with subjection to the civil authority. Numerous arrests are yet to be made.
