MOREHEAD, Ky.---To celebrate the release of a new compact disc, "Blue Duck Suit," Morehead State University's Faculty Jazz Quintet will perform on Thursday, Oct. 12, at 8 p.m. in the Duncan Recital Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

The production of the compact disc, which features MSU Department of Music faculty members and a student, was made possible through a research and creative productions grant from the University. The performers and their instruments include Jay Flippin, associate professor of music, piano; Ray Ross, assistant professor of music, guitar; Frank Oddis, associate professor of music, drums; Dr. Gordon Towell, assistant professor of music, saxophone; and J.T. Cure, **Elkhorn City** junior, bass.

"This group has been in existence for quite a while yet has never recorded together," Dr. Towell said. "The project also provided a wonderful opportunity for myself and Ray Ross to record our original compositions."

"Blue Duck Suit" is a collection of six original compositions by Ross, who wrote the title track, and Dr. Towell. It also features two jazz standards: "Chick's Tune" by Chick Corea and "You or No One" by Jules Stein and Sammy Cahn.

Dr. Towell and Flippin previously recorded a compact disc, "Ask Me Now," which was released earlier this year. It included original compositions by each musician as well as jazz standards.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Kermit Cyrus Whaley has been named chair of Morehead State University's Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences. He holds the rank of professor of radiologic sciences.

The department, with its 28 faculty and staff members, is composed of the ADN and BSN nursing programs and radiologic sciences program.

Dr. Whaley comes to MSU from Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, where he was a member of the graduate faculty and professor of radiologic sciences. He is a former vice chair, associate professor and radiography program coordinator at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia where he was special assistant to the chair of the Department of Diagnostic Imaging.

He has been director of allied/dental/public health continuing education at Greensboro Area Health Education Center in Greensboro, N.C., where he served as the liaison between the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill School of Medicine and Dentistry, as well as an adjunct associate professor. He has held various consultant positions, which included roles with the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology in Chicago and Diagnostic Imaging, Inc. and as a consultant for Project Hope and the University of Panama to develop a model for radiologic sciences education.

An educator for more than 30 years, he began his career in Chapel Hill, N.C., first in radiology at North Carolina Memorial Hospital. He later joined the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, School of Dentistry where he was an assistant professor of radiology for 10 years.

The 1990 Outstanding Faculty Award recipient at Midwestern State University's College of Health Sciences, Dr. Whaley has chaired 19 graduate project committees and made presentations at conventions, professional development workshops and continuing education sessions. He has written and co-written numerous articles for publication, including two in 1999 in cooperation with MSU faculty members. He is the co-author of "Dental Radiology" and "Oral Maxillofacial Radiology" in Mosby's Comprehensive Review of Dental Hygiene.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Eric Walters, coordinator of Morehead State University's Eastern Kentucky Wellness Project, attended the Kentucky Ambulance Providers Association annual convention, held in Owensboro in mid-September.

The convention offered continuing education for emergency medical technicians and paramedics, meetings on current topics in the field, as well as exhibitors and vendors.

A wellness initiative of MSU, the Eastern Kentucky Wellness Project (EKWP) aims at improving the quality of life for individuals in Eastern Kentucky. Locally, the project works closely with the Morehead Rowan County Emergency Medical Services and the Morehead Police Department, as well as the Boyd County Emergency Ambulance, Fleming County EMS and the City of Pikeville Fire and EMS.

During the convention, the EKWP staffed an exhibitors' booth, where information about the program was distributed.

The EKWP is administered through MSU's Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. It is directed by Dr. Dayna Brown, interim chair of the department, and coordinated by Walters, an American College of Sports Medicine health fitness instructor.

Among Walters' responsibilities are conducting fitness assessments as recommended by ACSM. The assessments are taken initially to prescribe an exercise plan, then repeated after six months to test for advancement. A final assessment is performed 18 months later to assess total health improvements achieved. Throughout the process, participants are encouraged to contact EKWP when questions arise or assistance is needed.

MSU has performed fitness assessments for paramedics, EMT's and fire fighters. This is a service available to other professions, such as those in healthcare and manufacturing.

Walters may be contacted by telephone at (606) 783-5316. The EKWP, located in room 157 of the Academic-Athletic Center, has been in operation on the MSU campus for nearly two years.

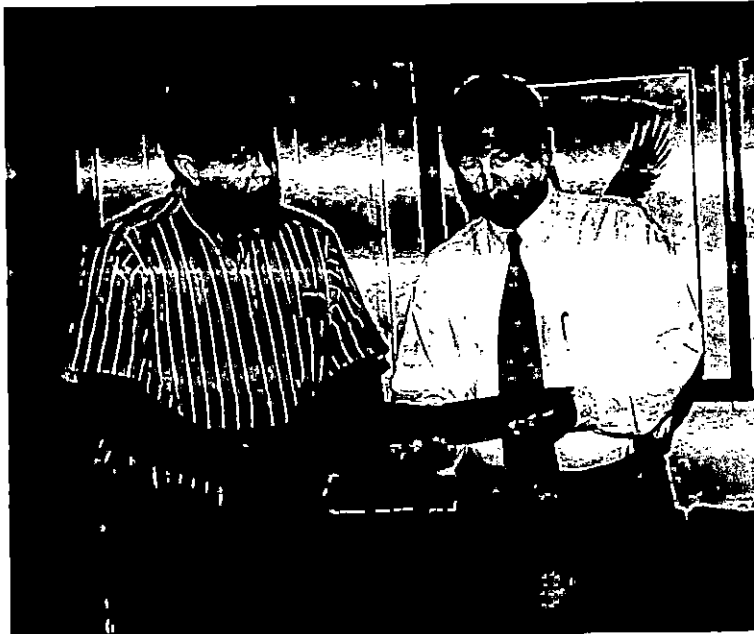
MCCLEESE RETIRES AT MSU

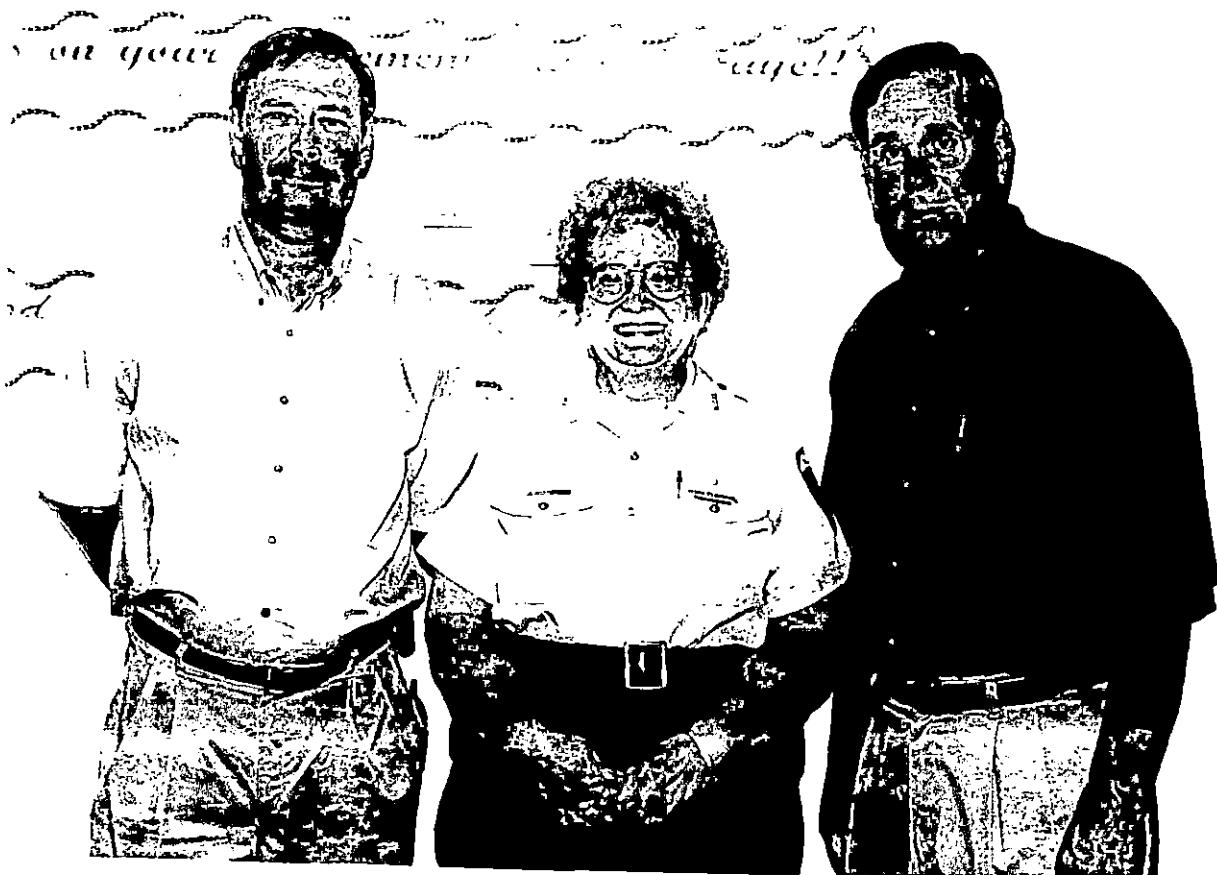
MSU PUBLIC SAFETY EMPLOYEES RETIRE

"This will be helping many people from different situations," she said. You can never tell what may happen in your own life when you may need help. This is the fifth semester that MSU students have participated in this project, according to Dr. Brenda Malinauskas-Overton, assistant professor of nutrition/dietetics. "A total of 90 students are preparing 50 packages this time."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Public access to the Cora Wilson Stewart Moonlight School at its new downtown home near the Rowan County Public Library becomes official on Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. when the school's state historical marker is unveiled at its new location.

The Rev. Lloyd Dean of the Rowan County Historical Society will unveil the marker with the assistance of Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin and Mayor Bradley Collins. Following the brief ceremony, the 90-year-old one-room school will open to the public.

Starting next week, group tours of the school can be scheduled through the nearby Kentucky Folk Art Center by calling (606) 783-2204.

The Cora Wilson Stewart Moonlight School, formerly known as Little Brushy School on Ky. 32 north of Morehead, was restored by MSU in 1972 in conjunction with its Golden Anniversary Celebration as a public institution. Until last spring, the school was located adjacent to Breckinridge Hall on the MSU campus. Built in 1910 and closed in 1963, the school was a gift to MSU from William Dailey of Morehead.

The Kentucky Historical Marker to be unveiled also was moved from the campus. It recounts the history of the "moonlight schools" begun by Cora Wilson Stewart, former Rowan County school superintendent, who was a pioneer for adult education in the United States. The name originated because adults were encouraged to attend their local schools at night, after completing a day's work.

Ms. Stewart and her volunteer teachers expected about 150 adults to appear on the first night of classes in the fall of 1911. However, more than 1,200 came to learn to read and write. The "moonlight school" became a model for adult education throughout the world and Ms. Stewart achieved national and international prominence. She retired from public life in 1936 and died in 1958.

The Cora Wilson Stewart Moonlight School is located on land owned by the city and leased to MSU.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Derek V. Price has been awarded a \$25,000 grant from the American Educational Research Association to fund research on "Educational Debt Burdens and Social Inequality: Effects of Race, Class, Gender and Educational Attainment." The project will be completed during the next two years.

Dr. Price is an assistant professor of sociology at Morehead State University with a joint appointment in the Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology and the Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy (IRAPP).

For his research, Dr. Price will use the National Center for Education Statistics' Baccalaureate and Beyond Longitudinal Study, which follows a cohort of students who received at least a bachelor's degree in 1992-93. The study will document the variation of educational debt burdens among students of different post-secondary educational attainment levels according to race, ethnic, class and gender characteristics.

Dr. Price believes his research is especially significant for the MSU service region "because working class students are most likely finding student loans as the primary source of federal financial aid for attending college."

The American Educational Research Association receives support for its grant programs from the National Science Foundation. The AERA also supported Dr. Price's dissertation, "Systems of Inequality: Student Indebtedness and Early Labor Market Incorporation," in 1998-99.

Dr. Price also is director of IRAPP's Center for Educational Research and Leadership. He received his Ph.D. degree in sociology from American University in 1999, the same year he came to MSU.

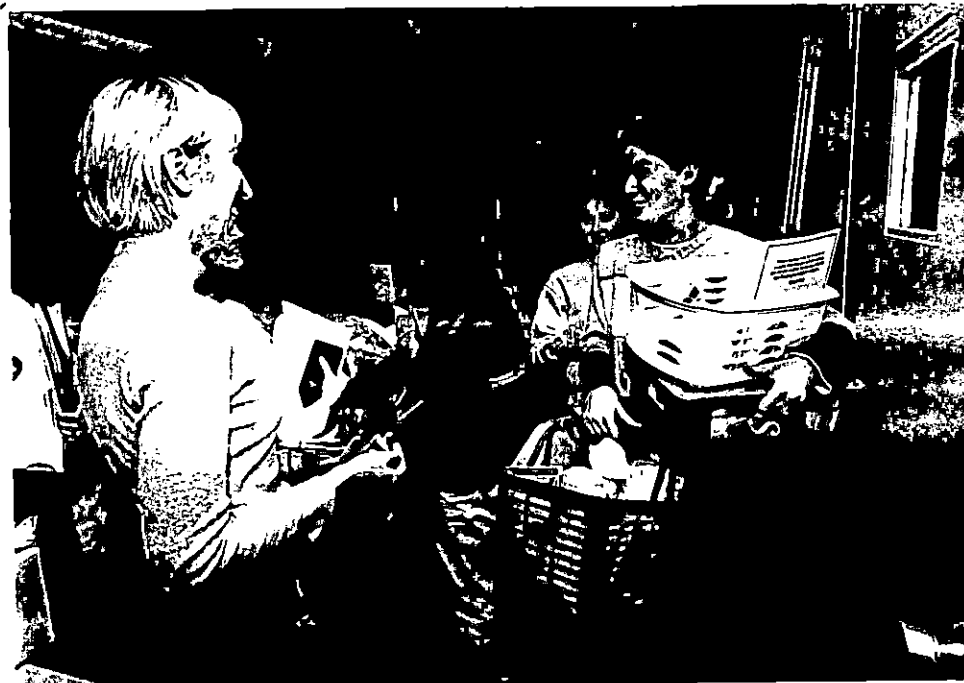

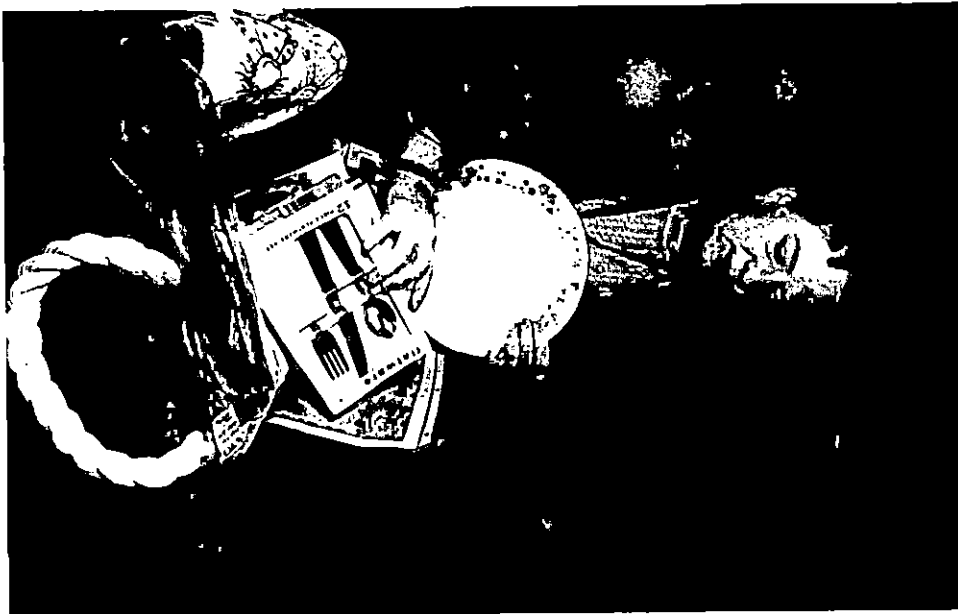

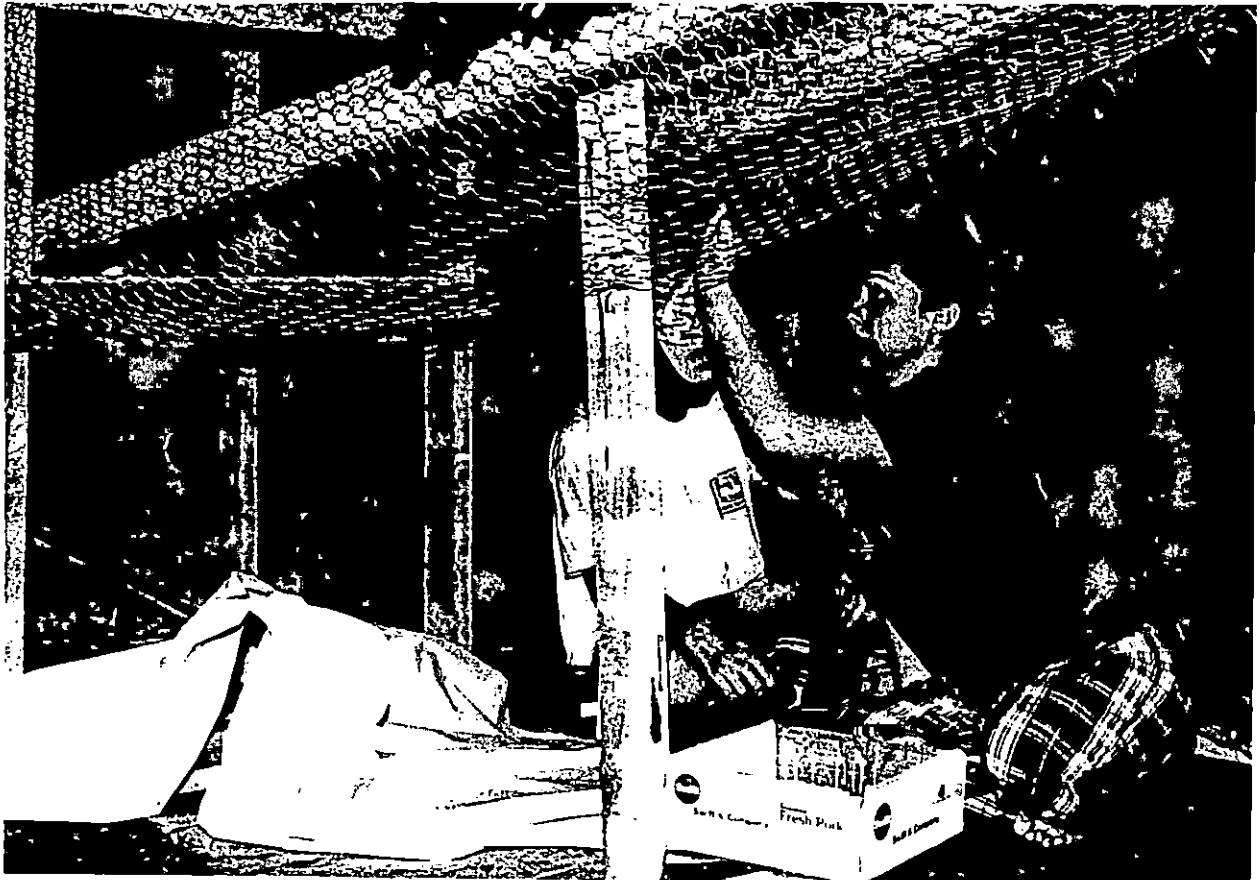

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. David Magrane, professor of biology, has been named chair of Morehead State University's Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences.

During his career at MSU, Dr. Magrane has taught courses in cell, animal and human physiology, cell and developmental biology, and principles of biology. He has served on numerous campus committees and currently is chair of "Teaching the Teachers of the 21st Century," the University's teacher education reform task force.

Dr. Magrane has served as research director to 39 Master of Science degree candidates at Morehead State. He has taught numerous courses at all levels in the undergraduate programs and played a significant role in developing the curriculum for the master's degree program. He served as the adviser for the pre-physical therapy program for 14 years and as graduate coordinator in biology for 24 years.

His areas of interest include steroid biochemistry and physiology as they relate to breast cancer and preimplantation of embryos, and the cardiovascular effects on diabetic rats. Those studies have led to grants totaling more than \$88,000 and his work being published in 37 scientific journal articles.

Recipient of MSU's 1998 Distinguished Teacher Award, Dr. Magrane was nominated for the 2000 Carnegie Outstanding National Teacher Award. He also received pre-doctoral and post-doctoral fellowships from the National Institute of Health.

A judge and examination developer for Kentucky's Science Olympiad, he has been a regional science review committee chair. Dr. Magrane has trained undergraduate students to give cancer prevention presentations to more than 10,000 high school students, which earned him the McDowell Cancer Achievement Award in 1988 and 1989.

A native of Ottumwa, Iowa, he joined the MSU faculty in 1976 as assistant professor of biology. He was promoted to associate professor in 1979, professor in 1984 and served as interim department chair during the 1995-96 academic year.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Farm policies and issues related to agriculture programs at colleges and universities were explored at a national conference hosted by Morehead State University's Department of Agricultural Sciences and Eastern Kentucky University.

The American Association of State Colleges of Agriculture and Renewable Resources held its annual convention in Lexington earlier this month. The five-day meeting was designed for department chairs and deans of agricultural programs at non-land grant universities, according to Dr. Lane Cowsert, chair of MSU's Department of Agricultural Sciences.

"We discussed various activities that the programs are doing and shared ideas," he added. On an annual basis, the group, which includes nearly all of the 60 eligible state colleges and universities, follows legislation and lobbies for support of its member universities.

During the meeting, Billy Ray Smith, Kentucky's agriculture commissioner, and Dr. Jim Baker, director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, addressed the group. In his welcome speech, Smith spoke of Kentucky's efforts to promote agricultural products and Dr. Baker discussed the problems and policies of grain inspection, packers and stockyards as they affect AASCARR institutions.

To learn more about agricultural businesses, participants took excursions to horse and tobacco farms in the area, with stops in Fayette, as well as in Jessamine, Madison and Mercer counties, said Dr. Cowsert, who is chair of the groups special projects committee and serves on AASCARR's board of directors. "Some members of the group don't raise tobacco, and if you don't grow it, you don't know much about it," he added.

Next year, California State University-Fresno will host the meeting.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---To maintain a learning environment that is suitable for all customers, Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library has implemented a code of behavior for users, including a new policy for its youngest patrons.

In an effort to serve all patrons, the library hopes to minimize the potential for disruptive behavior and protect underage children from possible problems, according to Larry Besant, director of libraries.

"Unsupervised children may have access to books and other resources that some parents may deem inappropriate for their use," Besant said. "The library also has computer terminals with Internet-access which are unfiltered and unmonitored at all times, because of the educational nature of the institution.

"We believe that guidelines must be established to protect the welfare of children and available resources," he said.

Under a recently-approved policy, children up to the age of nine must be accompanied by an adult. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Eric Jerde, assistant professor of geology at Morehead State University, recently embarked on a project that took him and Dan Salvato, Ft. Thomas senior, canoeing and camping through an otherwise unreachable portion of Minnesota to study the geological features of the area.

The area, which is near Lake Superior, was mapped in the 1960s, but Dr. Jerde wanted to study the chemistry of the rocks that began forming through volcanic activity about 1.1 billion years ago. "It's very remote and there hasn't been much work done there," he said.

"Harold Nathan, who originally did his dissertation on the area, was an excellent observer of the rocks," Dr. Jerde said. "However, I'm seeing that some of his interpretations need to be rethought in terms of modern geochemistry."

After collecting rock samples during their summer expedition, he and Salvato, a geology major, took the specimens to Macalester College in Minnesota for study. The pair was allowed use of the college's geochemistry laboratory to do mineral analyses free of charge through a collaborative agreement. The results of their findings will be the subject of a journal article.

"That facility is available to Morehead State's students," Dr. Jerde said. "The geology department Macalester College is working in an area very near to where I am," he added. "They're interested in my results and I'm interested in theirs."

The project, which will take several years to complete, is one that is conducive to the inclusion of students. Dr. Jerde is seeking funding to take a group of MSU students during the next few summers.

"This would make a great one- to two-week field course for the Coalition of Kentucky Geoscience Departments," he added. The alliance is composed of Northern Kentucky University, Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University, Murray State University, the University of Kentucky and MSU.

The coalition pools the resources of its universities in association with the Kentucky Geological Survey, Dr. Jerde said. Students from the contributing universities have the opportunity to participate in field courses offered by the schools.

“Students working together is of great value,” Dr. Jerde said. “As an undergraduate, that really helped me to think that I was part of a team.”

Salvato, who participated in nine or 10 field experience trips last academic year, agreed. “Morehead State is a good place to get an undergraduate degree because of the direct contact with professors and the opportunity to see what we’re studying.

“Whatever we’re discussing in class, we can go out in the field and look at it. This is an area famous for its geology,” added Salvato, whose parents, Deborah and Albert Salvato of **Ft. Thomas**, and grandmother, June Porter of **Boldman** are all graduates of MSU.

Dr. Jerde holds a bachelor’s degree in physics and earth science from St. Cloud State University, a master’s degree in structural geology from Washington State University and a doctoral degree in geochemistry from the University of California, Los Angeles.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Students enrolled in Morehead State University's Baccalaureate Nursing Program will now receive additional educational experiences to develop the leadership skills that are necessary to succeed in today's world.

The Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences has received a \$32,903 grant from the Helene Fuld Health Trust to fund the revision of a clinical practicum designed to facilitate the acquisition of leadership skills and competencies. The grant will be administered by Drs. Janet Gross and Freda L. Kilburn, professors of nursing.

"It is an area that we believe our baccalaureate students will benefit from the most," Dr. Gross said. "We want them to be the leaders of tomorrow."

The Helene Fuld Health Trust is the nation's largest private fund devoted exclusively to nursing students and nursing education, according to the organization. It was established as a foundation by Dr. Leonhard Felix Fuld and his sister, Florentine, in 1935 in honor of their mother. It became a trust in 1965 and is overseen and administered by HSBC Bank USA.

Accredited nursing programs in the United States are eligible for a grant in "Leadership Development," "Curriculum and Faculty Development in Community-Based Care" or "Educational Mobility." MSU's grant will be used to develop a curriculum model to be applied to the nursing capstone class, NURB 499C Advanced Clinical Practicum, which is taken during the last semester of a student's senior year, Dr. Kilburn said.

"We want our students to enter the work force and emerge as leaders not only in health care but in their personal lives and community activities," Dr. Kilburn added.

"Nurses should assume leadership roles in community settings that impact health care," Dr. Gross continued.

The two-year grant is currently being used for planning and developing contacts with agencies where the department will place students for practicums. Next fall, the professors will recruit mentors for the nursing students, and in the spring of 2002, the program will be implemented.

The curriculum, which will include pairing student nurses with members of management in industry and administrators in health care, will include “leadership and decision-making skills that could be used in any setting,” Dr. Gross said. “We’re not focusing on the setting, but the skills and competencies that students may acquire in these environments.”

The grant also will fund the purchase of technology needed to implement the curriculum, as well as a guest speaker. “We have asked Dr. Tim Porter-O’Grady to lead a one-day workshop for students, mentors and faculty to assist us in understanding this model which has practiced leadership abilities,” Dr. Kilburn said. Dr. Porter-O’Grady is recognized for his knowledge of transitional nursing leadership practices and organizational and participative management, she added.
