U. S. GOVERNMENT A CORRUPT OUTWORN SYSTEM??

"The present government of the United States is in the last death rattle of a corrupt and outworn system which is a blot on this people." —Adolph Hitler

"IT IS NOT POSSIBLE to minimize the moral and spiritual implications of what is happening in the world. To me, and I am sure to most of you, those factors are important enough without consideration of economics to justify us as a nation and as a people in doing anything we possibly can to stop Hitler.

"We are already at war with the Nazi philosophy. Although Hitler calls it a revolution of young nations and young peoples against old and decadent nations, we have already recognized it for what it is, a bestial revolution against all the freedoms men have won through centuries of sacrifice. There is no new 'era' in this so-called 'new order,' in what some people in this country call the 'wave of the future.' It is in reality a wave of the past, a delirium tremens of speculators of the Inquisition, of medieval torturers, Roman legions, pogroms, and vigilantes and Ku Klux Klans. It represents all the bad things we thought we had outlived in our march toward civilization.

"In all the centuries since the Renaissance human beings have been denying with their blood that one man was master of the world or that one man should be master of the world. And through all these struggles we, the people, have won some things which we regard as simple and fundamental and which are indeed simple and fundamental until somebody tells us that they are evidences of decadence—until Hitler, for instance, says: 'The present government of the United States is in the last death rattle of a corrupt and outworn system which is a blot on this people.'

"No matter what Hitler says, we do believe in the free election of our rulers, no matter how we have distorted the idea. We believe in the dignified right of petition for redress of grievances, in free assembly, trial by jury, freedom of speech, freedom of the press—not the right of a newspaper publisher to hand you propaganda but your right to see that in your news columns the absolute truth is told you. We believe in the right to worship God as we please. Besides these things which we have incorporated into the Bill of Rights, we believe in and will fight for a great many other things. We believe in the right of the mind to explore for itself as opposer to the doctrine of 'gleichschaltung.' We believe that the purpose of science is to create for use and not for destruction. We believe in the right to go our peaceful ways without any fear and hate and suspicion of our fellow man which are the by-products of the Nazi philosophy. We believe we have a better destiny than to live in fear of an international gangster whose methods and philosophy differ in no respect from those of Al Capone. We believe in a better destiny for our children than to send them marching into a raw barbaric struggle to take away what somebody else has."

N.Y.A. Resident Projects Increased Over Kentucky

Pikeville, Paducah, Named As New Sites, Says Administrator Salyers

A number of National Youth Administration resident projects in operation throughout Kentucky has been increased to twelve by the recent establishment of additional centers at Pikeville and Paducah, according to Robert K. Salyers, State Youth Administrator.

Employing approximately 200 young women, the new part-time resident center at Pikeville, Kentucky, offers work experience in sewing, cooking, weaving, laundering and metal and woodworking shops. Sponsored by the Pikeville Board of Education, the center is planned so that the young women may live there while working. Each girl stays on the project two weeks per month. Garments produced on the project are turned over to the Board of Education for distribution to needy school children.

At Paducah, Kentucky, negro boys have been employed by the National Youth Administration to repair and remodel buildings at Western Kentucky Vocational Training School, which sponsors the project. These young men are also engaged in the construction of dormitory furniture for the college, while a tailoring unit will produce clothing for distribution to needy McCracken County Youth.

Throughout the State, NYA resident projects are offering

young people varied work experience. Each center is set up to do specific jobs, and arrangements are made for employees to live on the site of the project. This plan is especially valuable to rural youth, enabling them to live and work at centers offering the best facilities and a wide variety of jobs.

At Kentucky resident centers, emphasis is placed on work experience in fields essential to national defense. Young men are gaining basic skills in sheet, metal, woodwork. Young women are engaged in sewing, cooking, canning, weaving, gardening, and a number of other homemaking activities, as well as shop work.

Part-time resident projects employing girls are located at Fanningsville, London, Pikeville, Bellevue, and Stanton, with one full time project at Murray. Resident projects for boys, all full-time, are located at Morehead, Bowling Green, Carrollton, Murray, Richmond, Paducah, and Frankfort. At the present time, 1,358 young people are employed on NYA resident projects in Kentucky.

"Better Times On Way," Statement Of U. S. Economist

Orvis Wells Foresees Big Business Uprising In Coming Months

Better times are ahead for farmers, as a result of the defense program and the rise in employment, Orvis V. Wells, United States Department of Agriculture economist, said at the Farm and Home Conference at Lexington, Kentucky, last night. "Consumers are expected to have available fifteen percent more money this year than they had in 1940," he said, and this will mean better wages for all kinds of food. "He thought incomes would rise further in 1942, and that the farmers can look forward to a considerably better price and demand situation during the next few years than has recently prevailed."

Better times, however, will apply on to farmers who produce for domestic consumption, as "the outlook for agricultural exports for the duration of the current war is dark," the economist said. "The long-time trend in exports is downward, and he warned that producers of export commodities face a problem in retaining or retaining their export market if and when the war is ended."

Farmers were advised to participate in the agricultural conservation program. "The conservation program, together with the accompanying marketing quota, surplus removal, and commodity loan programs... offer farmers a chance to work together in adjusting supplies for agricultural situation, a chance to supplement their incomes from marketing and government payments, and a chance to conserve both soil resources and human effort," he concluded.

Fifth Corps Area High In Nation

Kentucky First Among States In List Of Volunteers

The Fifth Corps Area virtually tied for second place among the nation's nine corps areas in Army Flying Cadet procurement for Army January, War Department figures revealed today at Fort Hayes, Columbus, Ohio.

The Ninth Corps Area, embracing the Pacific coast states, ranked first with 197 cadets. The Eighth Corps Area, including the far southwest, stood second with 161, while the Fifth Corps Area—Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia and Indiana—had 160, raising its total to 1,204 approved applicants in eight months.

Applications for Flying Cadet scholarships are being taken at all Army Recruiting offices from single, male American citizens at least twenty years old and not yet twenty-seven. The scholarships, paying \$75 monthly plus living expenses, lead to officers' commissions in the Army Air Corps Reserve.

State Dept. Of Agriculture To Give Monthly Programs. For the first time in history the rural people of Kentucky will have an opportunity to hear monthly reports from their State Department of Agriculture at Frankfort, Kentucky, over radio station WHAS.

These programs will be broadcast from 1 to 1:15 p. m., (C.S.T.) on the following Saturdays: first, March 1st and March 29th, April 1st and April 21st.

The program will present various phases of the State Department of Agriculture's work, such as inspection of scales, live stock markets, tobacco markets, cooperatives, work of Marketing Division; accomplishments of cooperatives; results of agricultural legislation; discussion of Dog Law and baby information from the State Veterinarian.

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Defense Plans To Disappoint Towns Wanting Factories

Just So Many And No More Washington Senators Say

Several scores of Kentucky municipalities and chamber of commerce are going to be disappointed in their hopes for defense projects, if informal opinion of the Kentucky congressional delegation is based on fact.

For the past few months hardly a day has passed that hasn't brought to Washington a delegation from Kentucky seeking establishment of a munitions plant or similar project.

Only a few cities notably Louisville and Henderson, have met with success in landing something substantial. Henderson has been designated as the site for an ammonia plant, while Louisville has bagged a naval research station and an army air base and has benefited indirectly from establishment of a huge powder factory at nearby Camp Bunnell.

The chances for the other cities getting something big out of the defense program appear slim. Bids of both Paducah and Ashland for construction of aluminum plants have been turned down within the past few weeks. Northern Kentucky, which has made one of the most determined bids of any locality for recognition in defense construction, hasn't had a first-hand base yet and indications are it won't get there for some time to come.
