MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Music will present Brian Balmages, as a composer-in-residence to demonstrate the use of technology in music, during the week of Nov. 13-17.

He will give a formal presentation to the entire music student body and faculty on Tuesday, Nov. 14, at 3 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall. In the address, he will examine questions about current applications and trends in music publishing, industry and production for music educators.

Throughout the week, students and faculty members will have the opportunity to meet with Balmages on an informal basis to discuss topics presented in this initial session. He also will work with several ensembles including the MSU Concert Band, directed by Dr. Susan Creasap; the MSU Trumpet Ensemble and MSU Brass Choir, directed by visiting professor Amy Jones; and the MSU Faculty Brass Quintet whose members include MSU faculty Dr. Stacy Baker, Dr. Curt Hammond, Dr. Jeanie Lee, Jones, and Deb Eastwood, professor at Marshall University.

These groups will perform a free public concert of Balmages' works for brass and for concert band on Thursday, Nov. 16, at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall on MSU's campus.

The composer's visit is a collaborative effort with Marshall University's Department of Music. The MSU Faculty Brass Quintet and members of the MSU Trumpet Ensemble will travel to Huntington to present a concert of Balmages' works with some of Marshall University's students and faculty on Wednesday, Nov. 15, at 8 p.m.

An active performer, arranger and composer, Balmages holds a bachelor's degree in music industry from James Madison University and a master's degree in media writing and production from the University of Miami. His works have been performed internationally at conferences, such as the Southeastern Tuba-Euphonium Conference, the International Trombone Festival, and the International Trumpet Guild Conference. In addition, his band and orchestral music has been widely performed by bands and orchestras across the country. He is frequently requested as a clinician and composer and is currently composer-in-residence for the Skyline Brass Music Festival and the Mid-Atlantic Wind Conductors' Conference.

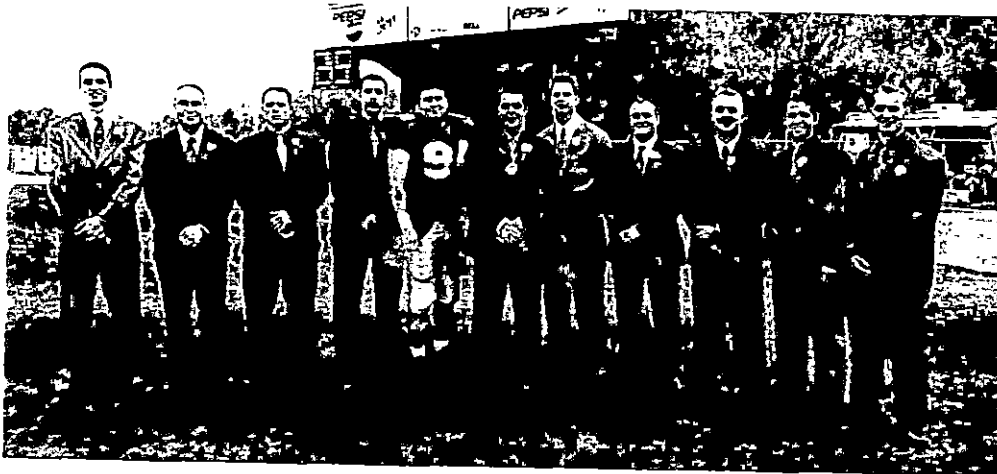

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A nationally recognized sociologist and author will lecture on gender issues at Morehead State University on Tuesday, Nov. 14, at 3 p.m. in 111 Rader Hall on the campus.

Michael Kimmel, known for his work on men and masculinity, is an educator who developed a "Sociology of Masculinity" course, which examines men's lives from a pro-feminist perspective. He has been featured in The Wall Street Journal, Boston Globe, Newsweek and People. He has appeared on "Donahue," "The Today Show," "CNN Live" and "Crossfire."

Author of several books, Kimmel's most recent work was assessed by the New York Times Book Review as a "concise, incisive book that elucidated the masculine ideals of the past 200 years just as shelves of feminist books have elucidated the feminine." Some of his book titles are "Changing Men: New Directions on Men and Masculinity" (1987); "Against the Tide: Profeminist Men in the United States, 1776-1990" (1990); and "Manhood In America: A Cultural History" (1996).

National spokesman for the National Organization for Men Against Sexism, Kimmel has lectured at more than 200 colleges and universities on a variety of topics including the changing relations between men and women. He has led workshops for public and private sector organizations on preventing sexual harassment and implementing gender equity.

The program, which is free and open to the public, is co-sponsored by the departments of geography, government and history, and sociology, social work and criminology, as well as the Interdisciplinary Women's Studies Program and the Office of the Vice President for Student Life.

MSU STUDENTS AID WITH CHILD'S MEDICAL EXPENSES: A Picture Story

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The men of Morehead State University's Eta Eta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity used an unconventional water race to raise \$1,500 to help defray the medical expenses of a 5-year-old **Poplar Plains** boy.

The group held a "rubber duckie regatta" in Triplett Creek near Morehead's City Park after selling several hundred ducks to individuals and organizations at \$5 each. The proceeds will benefit Kyle Hamilton, the son of Penny Hamilton, who has Wilms' tumor, a cancerous growth in the kidney that occurs most commonly in children. Kyle and many of his friends and family members were on hand to watch the race.

The duck belonging to Kerry Adkins, **Sandy Hook** sophomore, came across the finish line first, garnering \$100, which he gave to the Hamiltons.

Because there are few known cases of this type of cancer and limited research funds, the fraternity hopes to make this an annual event. In the future, the money raised would benefit research of Wilms' tumor and other diseases that affect children.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Many people visit Hawaii for a vacation, but Dr. Marshall Chapman, assistant professor of geology at Morehead State University, went to the island to work.

Dr. Chapman spent three-and-a-half-weeks on the Big Island of Hawaii, studying Kilauea, an active volcano. His work was part of a course at the University of Hawaii at Hilo's Center for the Study of Active Volcanoes. The training course in monitoring active volcanoes and predicting eruptions uses the most modern methods in interpreting seismograms, sampling and analyzing gases, sampling lava, and conducting geodetic and leveling surveys.

Dr. Chapman's interest in this field began while he was a graduate student when he studied a 424 million-year-old, inactive volcano off the coast of Maine. "The same process that created them, works in volcanoes today," Dr. Chapman said. "In order to understand ancient volcanoes, you have to study active ones."

Kilauea has been continuously erupting since 1983, but it has a slow, steady flow of lava. "Others erupt infrequently and when they do they're extremely deadly," Dr. Chapman said.

On the volcano, he learned and used several monitoring techniques, many of which are used to predict eruptions. "By monitoring seismicity, physical distances, tilting and gases, it is possible to forecast volcanic activity. For example, when a volcano is filling up with lava before it erupts, it physically swells and we can measure these changes," he said.

In the future, Dr. Chapman hopes to use the knowledge he gained in Hawaii to study active volcanoes in the Marinas Islands. "You want to look at a volcano before it erupts to measure its vital signs," he said.

While in Hawaii, Dr. Chapman, who is in his fourth year at MSU, also collected rock samples for the University's collection.

A lifetime member of the International Association of Volcanology and Chemistry of the Earth's Interior, Dr. Chapman earned a master's degree in geology and a doctorate degree in geochemistry from the University of Massachusetts. He holds a bachelor's degree in religion from the University of the South.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---WMKY 90.3 FM, public radio from Morehead State University, will make some programming changes in December to provide a greater variety and more appeal to the Appalachian Region. The changes, effective Monday, Dec. 11, are based on listener feedback, a call-out music survey, input from WMKY's Community Advisory Board and market research.

Among the changes are the return of "A Prairie Home Companion" on Saturday evenings at 6 p.m., extending classical music until 3 p.m. weekday afternoons, the introduction of "The World" from the British Broadcasting Company at 3 p.m., and the addition of "Americana Crossroads" with bluegrass, folk and other forms of traditional music, each weekday evening from 8 p.m. until midnight.

The station will continue to air classical music overnight. "Talk of the Nation" will be dropped from the weekday lineup. Classical music will comprise 10.5 hours of the station's 24-hour broadcast day.

"Americana music is a mixture of several styles," explained Paul Hitchcock, WMKY's music director. "The new format will feature music from artists like Emmylou Harris, Rob McNurlin, Taj Mahal, Nanci Griffith, Asleep at the Wheel and John Prine." The program will include frequent concert highlights from regional festivals, in-studio guests and listener requests.

"Many listeners have been telling us they like classical music but their tastes are more eclectic than what we've been offering," said Dan Conti, WMKY's general manager. "We did the music survey in eight counties this past summer to find out what kinds of music people in our listening area enjoy but have trouble finding on the radio. The results clearly showed a preference for more bluegrass and traditional music.

"It's the mission of public radio to provide an alternative to commercial broadcasting," Conti continued. "It's also appropriate that alternative be more reflective of the arts and culture of Appalachia, since those are the people we serve."

To accomplish their goal, WMKY will broadcast a monthly concert in partnership with the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music, which is based at Morehead State University. Arrangements for the series are not complete but it will be hosted by KCTM Executive Director Sandy Knipp, produced by Hitchcock and feature regional talent.

“People have been telling us for quite some time they’d like to hear Garrison Keillor’s “A Prairie Home Companion” on WMKY,” said Conti. “We haven’t been able to accommodate that request because APHC often conflicted with sports broadcasts.”

This year, however, WMKY will not be carrying football or basketball games, thus allowing the station to air Prairie Home which will be rebroadcast Sundays at 2 p.m. The station’s popular “Mountain Stage” program is moving to Friday at 8 p.m., “E-Town” will follow at 10 p.m., and a new program, “Beale Street Caravan,” will be broadcast at 11 p.m. “Nothin’ But the Blues” is being expanded on Saturday nights from 8 p.m. to midnight.

“During the past year, WMKY has altered its program schedule to provide more community service, more local and regional news and sportscasts, educational shows and local health care information,” Conti said. “These changes are designed to continue our effort to strengthen ties to our region.”

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Doug Kelly of **Louisville** was a high school student when he had his first contact with Morehead State University's Astrophysical Laboratory.

He was a sophomore at Louisville Male High School when he enrolled in Robert Baar's research class. The course, which paired students with professors and industry leaders, matched Kelly with Dr. Benjamin Malphrus, MSU professor of science and director of the Astrophysical Laboratory.

One weekend a month, Kelly came to the University and "pulled several all-nighters" studying the stars. "I learned a lot about observing," he said of the experience.

Using the University's radio telescope, the only one of its kind in the state, Kelly mapped the Cygnus A galaxy, but not before recalibrating the instrument's positioning.

Having had the opportunity to work with high school students before, Dr. Malphrus had high regard for his protégé and says of Kelly, "Doug's skills are unique and beyond his years."

After the research class ended, Kelly continued working on projects at MSU's lab. He and Dr. Malphrus, or "Doc" as he calls him, co-wrote a paper for a scientific journal. "That's unusual because we had never had a high school student co-author an article with us," Dr. Malphrus said.

Currently an MSU freshman, Kelly is mapping the Northern Hemisphere's sky and working on improvements to the radio telescope's operator program. The map "is really good for comparing previous surveys to look for change in the universe," he said.

"The universe is a very dynamic place—stars go to novas, stars burn out," Dr. Malphrus said. Many large labs do not do maps of the sky, so "it's a niche that Morehead State attempts to fill."

In addition to doing research at MSU during his high school days, Kelly also was a Web applications developer for ipop.com, an Internet company that helps businesses set up online stores and databases. As he was not old enough to drive when he began working for that company, "My boss had to pick me up for meetings," Kelly said.

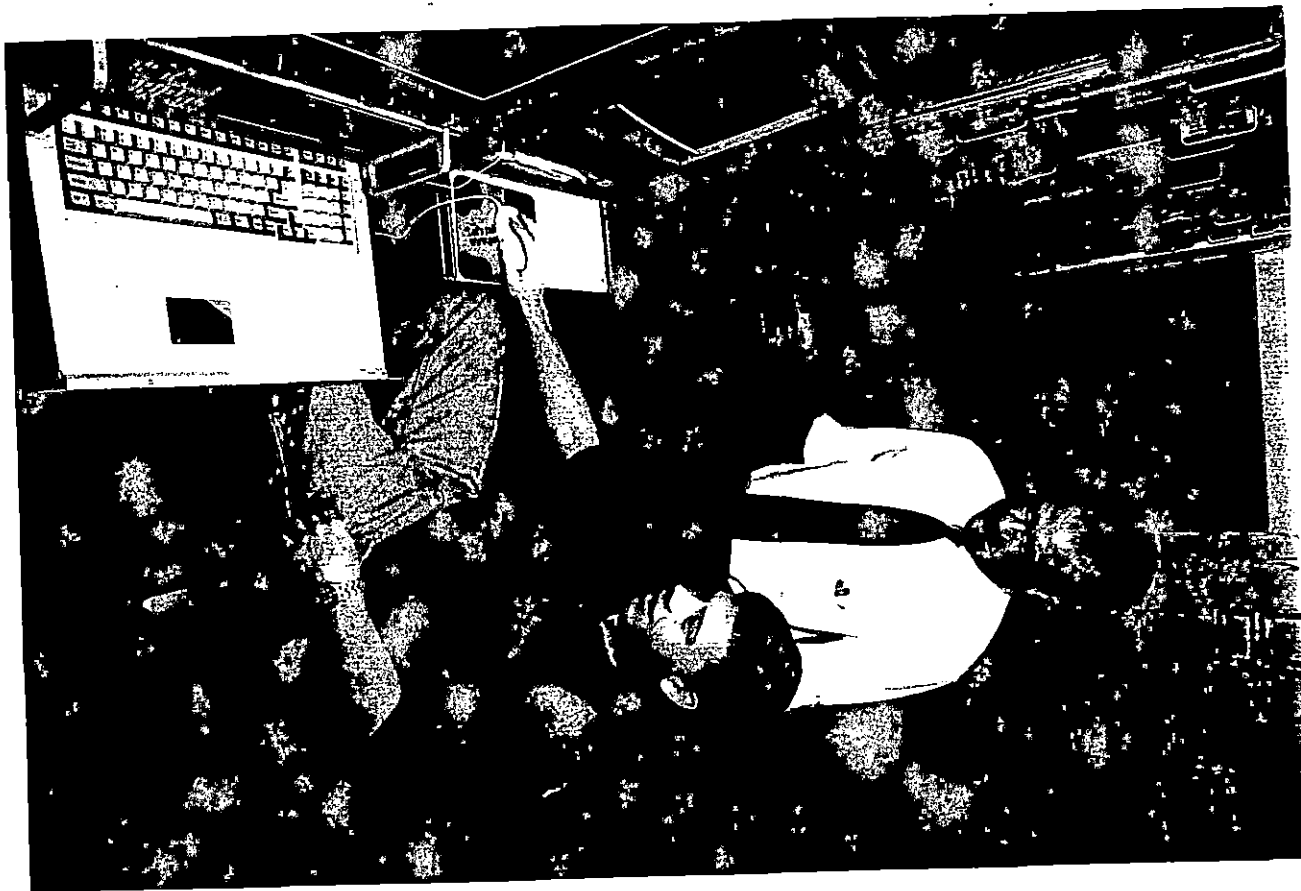

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dennis Karwatka, professor of industrial education at Morehead State University, has had several of his research efforts published as books.

In his most recent book, "Technology's Past: Volume Two: More Heroes of Invention and Innovation," Karwatka profiles 81 different Industrial Revolution-era scientists from the United States and Europe. SB & F (Science Books and Films), the magazine of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, gave the volume its top appraisal, "highly recommended."

He currently is working on a third volume to accompany it and volume one: "Technology's Past: America's Industrial Revolution and the People Who Delivered the Goods."

Each biography within the books is three pages long and illustrated. "It's more like an encyclopedia than a textbook," said Karwatka, who has been a member of the Morehead State faculty since 1970.

A recipient of MSU's 1988 Distinguished Faculty Award, Karwatka began writing biographies because the information that he was interested in was not readily available. For the past 20 years, Karwatka has written "Technology's Past" as a biography column for "Tech Directions," a journal for teachers and students of industrial education.

It is from those columns that he compiled material for his books for Prakken Publications, Inc., the company that published his manuscripts and the magazine.

Karwatka also has co-authored two textbooks. He and Alan Pierce co-wrote "Introduction to Technology" for high school students and with Michael R. Kozak, "Discovering Technology: Energy, Power and Transportation" for middle school students.

A graduate of Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering, Karwatka holds a master's degree in physics from Indiana State University. He also did graduate-level work in engineering physics at the University of Virginia.

WEST LIBERTY, Ky.---Students from Morgan County and the area who attend classes at Morehead State University at West Liberty Center will soon have a new place to call home.

A groundbreaking ceremony is set for Thursday, Nov. 30, at 11 a.m. for a new facility on Continental Drive, at Index in the Industrial Park near the CMS Plant. The new center should be completed in November 2001.

"We are excited about the opportunities this new center will open for the students," said Dr. Jonell Tobin, director of the center. "We believe this new building will accommodate our needs for the coming years." Dr. Tobin, who has been the center's first and only director, is especially pleased to have all of Morehead State's classes under one roof. Currently, classes are offered at four sites in West Liberty.

A contract has been awarded to C B & S Construction Company of Somerset for \$4,235,000. Construction is underway with Pearson/Bender Associates of Lexington as the architects.

When completed, the 36,000-square-foot center will have three distance learning technology classrooms, up from one currently being used, and a well-equipped computer laboratory and two computer classrooms. The two-story building will have administrative offices, an auditorium and a multi-purpose room, equipped with a kitchen. On the second floor will be classrooms and the distance learning laboratories.

The MSU-Morgan Center was established in 1987 to make educational opportunities accessible to area students in Elliott, Menifee, Morgan, Magoffin, Breathitt and Wolfe counties. From the beginning it was home for the Adult Learning Center that has grown to become a model program for the state. After serving 5,602 adults, with 600 receiving GED certificates, the name was changed to the Education and Career Center to better reflect its mission of assisting adults be better prepared for jobs.

The Center's name changed to the Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in 1990 and provided additional educational classes, both adult and college classes and governmental services to the people. MSU began offering classes leading to a two-year degree in University Studies, which emphasized basic skills and liberal arts studies needed for retraining workers. In addition, some graduate courses were added.

Through the years, student population has grown and MSU officials had to look for a larger site to meet current needs. The MSU Board of Regents approved adopting a new, shorter name change to MSU at West Liberty at its September meeting.

The ground breaking ceremony will be followed by a meeting of the Center's Board of Advisors at noon on that day.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Getting a college degree in some technical fields just got easier for students in East Kentucky thanks to an agreement signed by the leaders of Ashland Technical College and Morehead State University.

The schools chose to work together to provide a seamless education with a two-plus-two program. Students may earn an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree by taking two years of classes at Ashland Technical. These classes will then transfer to a corresponding Bachelor of Science (BS) degree at Morehead State.

The initial degree options include:

*AAS degree in machine tool technology, BS degree in industrial technology, manufacturing/robotics option

*AAS degree in computer aided drafting, BS degree in industrial technology, graphics communications option

*AAS degree in electronics technology, BS degree in industrial technology

*AAS degree in electricity technology, BS degree in industrial technology, electricity/electronics option

Degree requirements range from 61 to 72 credit hours, depending on the program option selected. Additional classes may be taken at Ashland Community College, MSU at Ashland, or the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University (KCVU).
